\$3,600,000 More Is Needed, However, Before Completion of Project

Approximately one-tenth nearer its completion was the Dewey flood control dam on Johns Creek this week as the national House of Representatives approved an expenditure of \$300,000 of the proposed \$3,900,000 to be spent on the project.

Ultimate aims for the dam were not known here, word from Congressman A. J. May, sponsor of the flood control projects in this section, lacking.

Mind you, this newspaper is predicting no prize-winning playwrights, actors or actresses out of Prestonsburg's Little Theater movement. But it does hazard the opinion that no "bad" will come of their work, and, therefore, would gladly accept the role of buffer to all those malicious darts hometown folks throw at hometown folks who step off the beaten path to try to do something new in the community.

Points By Other Editors

IS FISHING WHAT IT USED TO BE?

Quite often old timers will say, "Fishin' ain't what it used to be," in a tone that is calculated to settle all arguments.

In those fond-remembered old days the picture was a little different than it is today. Streams were teeming with fish because fishermen were few and far between. The lucky ones who lived close to fishing waters or the more hardy ones who packed in by horseback or team, or hiked, caught fish-lots of them.

But the number of fishermen was small Back in 1914 Kentucky's Game and Fish Commission reported the sale of 34,129 resident fishing and hunting licenses and 47 non-resident licenses. During the year 1937 a total of 152,798 fishing and hunting licenses were sold. Fishermen to the number of 73,640 bought licenses in Kentucky during 1938. Licenses for hunters totaled 101,696. This makes a total of 175,336 hunting and fishing licenses for the year 1938, or an increase of 141,160 over the nimrods and anglers

Despite the ever-increasing number of fishermen and the easy accessibility of fishing waters, there are still plenty of fish for everybody. And plenty of anglers are still getting their limits.

But with more anglers, better roads, fast automobiles, shorter working hours, more holidays, there is an increasingly heavy demand on our streams, ponds and lakes. Were it not for stocking the streams, the army of fishermen would deplete the supply of fish the first of every season.

Everything possible is being done by the Division of Game and Fish to give the sportsmen as much game and fish as can be made available. The sportsmen can reciprocate by doing their part-by being good sports, by not violating the laws, and by refraining from taking more fish and game than they can actually use. -Pike County News.

LOSING 8,000 ACRES A DAY

It will take twenty or thirty years of continuous effort to get danger from possible soil erosion under control, says Dr. Hugh Bennett, of the Department of Agriculture.

Testifying before a House committee Dr. Bennett declared that about 100,000,000 acres of crop land, some of it the best, were "completely finished" as a result of soil erosion. He estimated the annual direct cost of soil erosion to farmers alone, not counting the chief of the Soil Conservation Service of the damage to reservoirs, stream channels, irrigation ditches, highways and railways, at \$400,000,000.

During the last 50 years the damage from erosion could be placed at \$20,000,000,000 and if the present rate of erosion is allowed to continue, the next 50 years will suffer the same loss. "We are losing every day, as a result of erosion," says Dr. Bennett, "the equivalent of 200 40-acre farms."

Now, this is interesting information. It should attract the attention of farmers everywhere. There is no use to wait for the government or some other agency to fight the erosion that affects your land. The time to start the war on erosion is at hand and every farmer can do something in the struggle. Moreover, by doing something, the individual will help himself.-Morehead Independent.







"At a special meeting of the association in its offices at Ashland, Ky., lasting for two days, the Appalachian agreement was thoroughly discussed. In addition the operators had explained to them the remarks made by Mr. Charles O'Neal for the operators and Mr. John L. Lewis for the miners in interpreting various provisions of the

"The operators have today accepted the Appalachian wage agreement, and have authorized its officers to execute that agreement as well as the district agreement. During the negotiations in New York the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Association made every effort to have the unfair wage differentials which have obtained against it for some time eliminated, and in authorizing the signing of both the Appalachian and the district agreement protesting this condition and announces it will continue its efforts to eliminate these differentials, which place our district in an unfair competitive position."

Sam Caddy, representative of the U.M.W.A., present for the final signing of the contract, said that he felt this action would mean contentment and prosperity for this district and that he felt both sides to the controversy just closed would now work whole-heartedly toward that end.
