



MY parents, belonging to a church that had no other members near Fidelity, had thus a sort of theological aloofness that enabled them to take in preachers of all faiths without hurting anybody's feelings. The Methodists, the Baptists, and the Christians were our three denominations, with congregations at or near Fidelity. Occasionally other sects were represented by a chance visitor. All of them found their way into our home and actually sometimes made it their headquarters while they preached nearby. We opened up the parlor or front room and made it the room for the preacher as long as he held his meeting. Sometimes he had a brother minister who shared his bed with him and furnished us another personality to know and study. A very large part of my education consisted of learning these new ministers who came and went.

Every one of them deserves a biographical sketch, as much for what we children thought him to be as for his real merits. Most of them put tires, 34 new tubes and 23 re-capped away theology while they were around, as if that would be an unseemly subject to discuss with such accommodating neutrals as my parents. Instead of doctrinal points they gave us many a point on the ups and downs of the itinerant minister. Some of these men had genuine humor and might have done well as entertainers in this radio-dominated day if they could have lived so long. They remembered comic things that befell them and their parishoners and limbered up enough to make us roar with laughter, though I hardly ever felt that it was quite proper to laugh at anything so serious a person as a preacher could say. 
