



This applies to general farmers, truckers, dairy farmers and cattle farmers. ODT urges voluntary co-operation. This is the same as the pooling of auto use, now being urged on factory workers in the city.

Acute rubber shortage brought Lawn mower manufacture cut OPA ruling that recapping materials will be wholly of reclaimed rubber for Class B passenger cars. Tires recapped with this lower grade camelback should be driven not more than 35 miles an hour, OPA reported. At that speed they ought to last 5,000 miles, and even then all care must be taken.







CURRENT platitude No. 1 is, We are at war.

No exclamation belongs after that sentence. It is a mere statement of fact.

Must you see enemy aircraft winging overhead, hear enemy bombs and shells bursting in your own backyard before you can realize that your own little corner of the world is involved in this fight to the finish?

Have you so little imagination that you see civilians leaving today to become soldiers of tomorrow, without thought of them or their importance to you, your community, county and na-

HOW TO CURE THE EVIL

CHERIFFS in Virginia will go on a salary basis next January as a result of a 1942 law abolishing the ancient fee system for these officers

The measure, abolishing the fee system, which always injected a profit consideration in handling of prisoners, was one of several bills sponsored by the Virginia Advisory Legislative Council to modernize the state's penal system. The other bills, also enacted, established a state department of corrections and a system of probation and parole, and abolished the office of constable.

Maximum compensation of sheriffs and city sergeants was set by the new law at \$6,000 a year, with salaries graded according to size of jurisdiction. The Commonwealth will pay two-thirds and localities one-third of the salaries, and will divide fee collections similarly. The fee system of paying county officers still is found in about half a dozen states-including West Virginia-despite its elimination in many places during the last several years. The system is a relic of early days of the country, when many public officers received fees or commissions and were allowed to retain them as compensation without reporting the amount.-




