

NO AUTHORITY FOR ARRESTS,

Jury Says Witness Absences Hinder Work, This Term

Ten indictments returned this week brought to 11 the total of true bills returned by the Floyd circuit court grand jury against five Floyd county officers who are accused of making arrests without authority of law

Officers named in the indictments are Constable Henry Keathley, of District No. 4, Dewey Hicks, who recently resigned his deputy sheriff post, Deputy Constables Harrison Hunley, Elliott Prater and Jim Hall, all of District 4.

Only 47 other indictments were returned by the grand jury during its nine-day session which ended Tuesday afternoon. One indictment against Hunley

was made on the testimony of Rich Allen, Middle Creek mine employe, who claimed the officer had no warrant and that he committed no offense in the officer's presence. The indictment naming Constable

Keathley, Deputy Constables Prater and Hunley was issued on Dewey Patrick's statement to the effect that the three stopped and humiliated him by forcing him to walk a car track. The officers accused him of being drunk and searched him but did not make an arrest, the statement continued.

Ralph Clark, the complaining witness whose testimony resulted in Tuesday night in the basement of another indictment against Prater the Methodist Church, with Jack and Hunley claimed the officers arrested and jailed him after he had drunk only two bottles of beer. Three other indictments against Prater were made on statements of Walker Hall, Sie L. Hamilton and Fay Lawson, Hall denied being drunk. Hamilton did likewise, buisaid he confessed and paid a fine of \$19.50 in order to retain his job. Lawson said Prater halted him, made him walk a car track, then released





RUSSIA—OUR ALLY

SO you don't like Russia! Well, you'd better pray for her, anyway.

For on the success or failure of the Soviet Union in its life-and-death struggle this spring and summer with Adolf Hitler's legions depends the duration of

Military authorities are agreed that,

if the Russians can withstand the German assault this year, hold Hitler at bay and give the United States time to prepare, the war may be of surprisingly short length.

They likewise are agreed that, if Hitler crushes the fierce-fighting Soviets and gains rendezvous in an East-West move with Japan, we're in for a long and exhausting struggle, with our own armies standing the full shock of a relentless foe made stronger through conquest and the disposal of a gallant enemy.

Now is no time to conjure up visions of a victorious and powerful Communist bogey man. The enemy we face is also facing Russia. Not Russia but Germany and Japan are the world-criminals we must shackle.
