MERGER PLAN HITS DELAY

Final Draft Not Ready As City Board Meets; Teachers Here Hired

The composite proposal to be formed from suggestions by individual members of the City Board of Education as a preliminary step to merger with the county system was not ready for Monday evening's meeting of the Board.

The proposal covering various angles of consolidation of the Prestonsburg independent district with the county system is in the hands of C. Kilmer Combs, the City Board's attorney, it was said, and the final draft is expected to be ready soon.

The City Board Monday employed 18 teachers for the high school for the 1953-1954 term and 16 grade school faculty members. The teaching staffs of the two schools are unchanged. City Superintendent Chalmers H. Frazier will later assign the teachers employed.

REPORT NOTES TEACHER NEED

Floyd County Has 127 Emergency Teachers; Kentucky Has 2,803

A report on the school teacher shortage in Kentucky shows that 127 teachers in Floyd county have emergency teaching certificates.

The study, issued by the State Department of Education's Division of Teacher Education and Certification, shows that 2,803 public school teachers in Kentucky have less than standard certificates. The figure is an improvement over a year ago, when there were 2,971 emergency teachers.

There has been a steady decline in emergency certificates since the 1947-48 school year, when there were 5,300 teachers employed on an emergency basis.

Of the emergency teachers in Floyd county this year, 126 are in the county system. There is one in the Prestonsburg system.

The study shows that of the state total of emergency certificates in use this year, 2,455 were issued to teachers in elementary schools, and that 17.7 per cent of Kentucky's elementary teachers have less than the required scholastic standing as there are 348 elementary teachers—5.6 per cent of the total. The combined percentage for all teachers in Kentucky is 14.05.

Only 2.6 per cent of the emergency teachers have not completed some college work, while 15 per cent have college degrees or above. About half have completed two years of college.

HEART ATTACK CLAIMS GOBLE

Times Veteran, 50 Years In Printing Work, Victim Monday at Lexington, Ky.

H. L. Goble, who for 50 years had worked with Eastern Kentucky newspapers as printer and linotype operator, died at 4 o'clock Monday morning in Good Samaritan hospital, Lexington, of a heart attack.

Mr. Goble's death followed months of failing health, but he had entered the hospital only two days earlier and had continued his work with The Floyd County Times until about 10 days before his passing. The seizure was unexpected, and he died in his sleep. Not until an autopsy was performed was the cause of death known.

"Printer" Goble, as he was known to hundreds of friends over this section, had been with The Floyd County Times since it began publication in 1927. Before that, he rendered the same service with The Times' predecessor, The Prestonsburg Post. He began his printing career at Inez, and, leaving there, was associated with the late Charles A. Kirk in the publication of a daily newspaper at Ashland and The Paintsville Herald, a weekly, at Paintsville.

Before becoming a printer he was a cabin-boy on a steamboat on the Big Sandy. His craftsmanship as a printer was widely recognized, and he gave to the trade the never-say-die loyalty and determination which marks the stage player, himself often shaking off illness to continue his work with the time-honored slogan of the stage, "The show must go on."

Born at Odds, Johnson county, a short distance below the present Dewey Dam, Henry Lafayette Goble was the son of Andrew J. Goble and Orpha Louisa Wells Goble. He was married on April 14, 1906 to Miss Erma Huff and they had resided in Prestonsburg since 1914. He was a member of Zebulon Masonic Lodge, and held the deep esteem of all who knew him.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters and three sons, Miss Louise E. Goble, Arlington, Va., Mrs. John R. Baldrige, of Langley, Charles Goble, West Liberty, James E. and Daniel L. Goble, both of Prestonsburg. One sister, Mrs. A. J. Kirk, of Paintsville, also survives.

Funeral rites were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 2 from the Presbyterian Church here, the pastor, the Rev. Orville Pearson officiating. Burial was made in the old Mayo cemetery at Lancer under direction of the Moore Funeral Home and the auspices of Zebulon Lodge.

BOSCO SCHOOL BIDS SOUGHT

Board To Let Contract On 4-Classroom School; Ligon Work Is Planned

The Floyd County Board of Education this week asked bids from contractors on the construction of a four-classroom, limestone block school at Bosco to supplant the old frame structure now in use there. Bids will be received until 1 p.m., June 12.

Plans of the structure provide a steam heating system for the school and two indoor toilets. Architects have planned the building so that other rooms may be added when, and if, needed.

The old building at Bosco will be dismantled and moved to a rural district in need of a building, it was said.

Superintendent Virgil O. Turner said Monday that plans on the proposed Ligon school are expected from the architects within a week and that bids will be asked on that work immediately thereafter. The Ligon structure will be the almost identical to that at Bosco, except that different heating arrangements will be necessary because of lack of natural gas at Ligon.

Work on the \$475,000 county high school building here was begun a few days ago by the contractors, Akers & Akers, who this week were pouring the foundation footer.

FRED JARRELL DEATH MISHAP

Is View of Relatives As Prestonsburg Man Bullet Wound Victim

Death of Fred Jarrell, 43-year-old Prestonsburg man early last Saturday from a revolver bullet wound, was the result of an accidental shot resulting from a fall, relatives and authorities said.

Mr. Jarrell, a former Floyd county teacher and at the time of his death an engineer at the Columbian Fuel Corporation compressor station in Pike county, was shot above the right ear, the bullet of the .38-calibre revolver emerging above the left ear. There was no trace of powder burn.

His wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jeff DeRossett, lived in the house occupied by the Jarrell family, and he and Mr. DeRossett had discussed the next day's work. After preparing to retire for the night, he heard dogs in his garden, thereupon procured a revolver with the announced intention of scaring the dogs away. A few moments later, a shot was fired.

Jarrell was found lying in the backyard, a few feet from the rear door of the home, and it is believed he had stumbled and that the weapon was discharged as he fell. He was dead on arrival at the Prestonsburg General hospital.

Mr. Jarrell was one of Prestonsburg's most highly respected men. He was a native of the Bull Creek section, the son of Jennie Rose

STEADY DROP IN WORK SEEN

Number of Claimants To Unemployment Pay 3,365, End of April

There has been a steady decline in employment in Floyd county since March, according to figures released by the Department of Economic Security this week.

The number of weeks of unemployment claimed has risen from 4,004 week in March to 4,660 at the end of April. The number of March claimants totalled 3,002 and the April total was up to 3,365.

Glenn Anderson, manager of the department here, in pointing out the difference between the weeks of unemployment for which benefits are asked and the number of claimants explained that his office has itinerant points of unemployment registration, like Paintsville, Salyersville and Inez and that some claimants filed for two weeks instead of one as at Prestonsburg. This would make the number of weeks for which benefits were asked greater than the number of claimants.

Initial claims have risen, too, it was pointed out. The total of the March initial claims were 523 but April had chalked up a figure of 685. Mr. Anderson commented that unemployment in the mining area was more than double that of any other area in Kentucky on a percentage basis.

COURT VOTES JAILER HELP

Allows \$1,200 Expense For Bookkeeper; Cooley Figures Due May 22nd

The fiscal court at its meeting Monday unanimously voted to allow Carl Horn a salary of \$1,200 a year as bookkeeper for his father, Jailer Guy Horn, and to allow this amount as a deductible item in the Jailer's expenses for the years, 1950 and 1951.

The action was taken in connection with the court's settlement with Jailer Horn on the basis of the audit made by the William Cotton Company. The court approved the audit by Cotton of the Jailer's records.

Circuit Clerk W. W. Cooley appeared before the court and asked additional time in which to complete data on his settlement with the county. He was granted an extension of time till May 22.

The rural highway allotment of \$68,007 for the next fiscal year was accepted from the state upon approval of a road program on which the fund is to be expended. Left unobligated of this amount to meet emergencies was \$3,474.07.

Five roads are marked under the program for traffic-bound surfacing. These are the roads on Stephens Branch, Little Paint, Buffalo Creek to Pike county, Stratton Branch, Frasure's Creek and Stone Coal. Two other roads, Cliff to Stephens Branch and the Dinwood road, are proposed for traffic-bound surface. These last two roads are on the list marked for regular routine maintenance; the others slated for traffic-bound surfacing are on the limited maintenance list.

Other routes listed for limited maintenance are: Little Mud, Toler's Creek, Cow Creek-Buffalo, Frazier's Creek, Buck's Branch, Turkey Creek, Branham's Creek, Lower Bull, Upper Bull, Spurlock, and the Betsy Layne high school road.

Additional roads marked for routine maintenance are farm-to-market routes which have had gravel surfacing. They are Bull Creek (Prestonsburg to Allen route), East Point-Cliff-Auxier, Cliff-Abbott Creek, Bosco-to-Knott county, Rock Fork, Brush Creek, Rough & Tough, Sizemore, Wilson Creek, Arkansas Creek.

DEADLINE SET FOR OFFICIALS

To Publish Statements; Martin Notices Eight Of Legal Requirements

Commonwealth's Attorney Burnis Martin this week notified eight officials of Floyd county and its Magisterial districts that compliance with the law governing publication of sworn statements showing itemized receipts and disbursements of public monies coming into the hands will be required on records for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1954 by the 15th day of next month.

The letters were addressed to County Judge Henry Stumbo, Sheriff A. B. Moade, County Clerk Dan Ran Moore, Circuit Clerk W. W. Cooley and Magistrates Milt Stanley, M. C. Wright, Ellis Martin and Edgar Howell. The prosecutor pointed out to each of the officials that he had on May 11 been advised by the Attorney General's office that Section 61.290 providing for publication of sworn statements of receipts and disbursements and Section 61.295 providing a penalty for failure to comply with the law have in no way been modified or repealed and that they are in full force and effect.

Section 61.290 provides that at the end of each fiscal year officials shall prepare and publish in a newspaper or itemized, sworn statement of funds collected, received, held or disbursed by them during the fiscal year just closed. They are given 15 days after the end of the fiscal year in which to do this.

Section 61.295 specifies that a copy of the published statement must be filed with the Auditor of Public Accounts on or before August 31 and that failure to do so is a misdemeanor subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500.

"It's one thing to file figures with the fiscal court, unsworn to, but it's quite a different thing to swear to them and put them in a newspaper," Martin said by way of comment on his action.

"You of course should realize," the Commonwealth's Attorney wrote the officials, "that you are already

BLOODMOBILE HERE MAY 19

Fund Drive Failure May Cost Floyd Part In Program, Is Claim

As Red Cross blood program workers prepared this week for the May 19 visit to Prestonsburg of the bloodmobile they again called attention to the fact that Floyd county is threatened with the loss of its place in the blood program and benefits which would be certain to accrue from the gamma globulin derived from blood for prevention of polio.

The county may lose its place in the program because of its failure to raise more money toward its \$9,600 quota in the Red Cross fund drive. The Times was told this week by an authoritative source that unless three-fourths of the quota is subscribed, the county will be out of the blood procurement work. Only \$4,600 has been contributed to date.

That would mean, it was explained, the loss to residents of the county of free blood for them when transfusions are needed at hospitals in or out of the county, and would deny the county the new anti-polio treatment derived from blood.

The May 19 visit here of the bloodmobile is a very important one, it was said, and every effort is being made to fill the full 125-pint quota.

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Citing Book, Chapter, Page and Verse

Many the rebuking letter was received by The Courier-Journal after that paper had in one of its weaker moments editorially asked, "Is Kentucky Coal a Doomed Industry?" and had given the wrong answer. But none hits back more effectively than the letter written by Nancy Elliott Harp, of Pikeville, to the Louisville newspaper's widely-read Point of View column.

Mrs. Harp's letter follows: As a member and secretary of the Pike County Social Service Committee, I wish to call your attention to an unfriendly misrepresentation of facts in your now renowned editorial of April 11, "Is Kentucky Coal a Doomed Industry?"

You say, "Coal counties, too, take the lion's share of state school aid, old age assistance and other welfare benefits. In other words, the taxpayers of Kentucky are subsidizing an industry which appears to be killing itself rapidly."

I have done some checking. Jefferson county has only 5.97 times as many people as Pike. Yet during March, 1953, Jefferson county received 6.11 times as much old age assistance as did Pike. Why should Pike county's taxpayers subsidize your industry? We've been in a business recession for several years while your business was growing better.

You received only 2.3 times as much for aid to dependent children as we did; but you have children's homes, and hospitals, of which we have none and much of the support of these institutions comes from outside Jefferson county. You received more than five times as much aid to the needy blind as we did and you have the Good Will Industry. We have no such institution and you get help on yours from the outside.

Even with all your local charities, for which you make state-wide appeals, you received 80 percent of the public assistance given to Pike and Jefferson counties in March, 1953. The Pike County Social Service Committee has been working hard to see to it that those eligible to receive such aid and only those eligible do receive public money. In January, 1952, \$22,563 was given for old age assistance in Pike county. In March, 1953, that item was reduced to \$31,714 and Pike county's financial condition has not been improving but becoming worse. We are working hard to regain and maintain patriotism and self-respect. We want to help build America, not to waste her resources and bankrupt our country.

You speak of us as if coal were all we had. During World War II one-eighth of all the coal loaded by truck in the United States came from Pike county, Kentucky. Coal is our big industry. If we can get a means of transportation which will let us compete with other coal regions. However, we have other possibilities. We have the best 4-H Club organization in the state with almost two times as many members as any other county. Although Jefferson county is listed with the U. S. Census Bureau as an agricultural county and Pike is not, we are training almost three times as many young people in our 4-H Clubs as you are there and you have almost six times as many people as we have.

We have 212,304 acres in farm land; you have 157,919 acres in farm land. We have not yet learned to be "big time" farmers but we can learn. We're teaching our children. We have 4,088 farms. You have 2,673 farms. We are learning to use our resources and not to exploit them. When we get the Big Sandy canalized, Louisville and Jefferson county will be looking to Pikeville and Pike county for more help and, as usual, you'll get it.

"Everyone in the delegation is 100 per cent for this project," Perkins assured him.

The three Pikeville men said they also visited Senators Cooper and Clements of Kentucky, Senator Byrd (D., Va.), and Representative Wampler (R., Va.) and that the congressmen were for it.

Canalization of the Big Sandy was discussed. Perkins said that new industrial developments along the Ohio River, including atomic-energy and new Tennessee Valley Authority plants, could use up to 20,000,000 tons of Big Sandy coal yearly.

"We're for canalization," Page said, "but right now we're a lost people. We'll settle for anything."

Perkins interrupted: "The benefits will outweigh the cost at Haysi anyway you look at it." Milne replied: "No man has fought harder for the Big Sandy than you."

Page emphasized the urgent need for jobs in his area and asked, "How can we get even a little bit of this?"

Milne said the Army engineers could not act in the direction of Congress. He said a Senate committee, which last week held hearings on the Big Sandy canalization, is studying the matter and could recommend a survey.

Perkins and Clements sent a letter to the meetings to Maj. Gen. Samuel D. Sturgis, chief of Army engineers, urging approval of Haysi.

"The Big Sandy has heavy rainfall in the winter and spring, with a dry season in late summer and fall," they wrote. In the latter, there is an actual scarcity of water in the valley, while the spring floods, often very destructive, are considered an annual affair.

These floods are not only destructive in the valley, but continue on to add to the crest of Ohio River floods which sometimes cost untold millions.

They said the Labor Department considers an area with 12 per cent unemployment to be "critical." Pike county crossed 11 per cent in March, and may already have exceeded 12 per cent, he added. (This figure already has passed 14 per cent.)

In March, Kentucky paid out unemployment insurance in Pike of \$113,999, compared to \$29,218 for the previous March.

In 1945, Army engineers disapproved the Haysi project because, they said, for each \$1 cost only 33 cents' benefits would accrue. Perkins and Clements said the picture has changed today and that the benefits now would exceed the cost.

Using guard rails, electric brooders and other late equipment, Raymond Pyle of Hickman saved 73 pigs from 10 sows, and D. P. Via, 64 pigs from six sows.

**Is Everybody Else Out of Step?**

The well known story of the mother, who, after viewing her son's regiment parade, remarked, "Well, everyone of them was out of step but Johnnie," can well be applied to what Burns Martin obviously thinks is wrong with Floyd county, Eastern Kentucky, and the whole state of Kentucky.

He seems to have set himself apart as the self appointed guardian of all, one can do no wrong, interpret the laws to suit himself, can insult the lowest to the highest courts and juries in the county and state and harass and harrange one and all who dare to disagree with him.

His article in a recent Floyd County Times might appear sound to some people but to a thinking person, one who wants all the facts as they are, his article is obviously just an effort to justify himself in all his activities; an attempt to further himself as the martyred saint who can do no wrong.

In the COTTON case, the court did not at any time bar the Commonwealth's Attorney from prosecuting the case. He refused to pass on the jury, or to read the indictment and state the case. There was nothing the court could do but to appoint an attorney to prosecute, and, incidentally, the court appointed a fine, able young attorney, in Robert Wellman, who well presented the case to the jury.

Until recently, when the Commonwealth Attorneys of the state succeeded in getting a law passed permitting them to have a county detective, Floyd county, never had one. In the past, when the district had two counties and more law violations, there was a lot of work to do. Now, Floyd county is a separate district, and it only has three criminal terms a year, and this three months covers the only time the Commonwealth's Attorney is required to be in court, unless he wants to take civil cases. So he has nine months vacation. Doesn't it seem a bit ridiculous that the services of a detective should be required, when the Commonwealth's Attorney is already being paid for twelve months of work for three?

There are two sides to every question and it is hoped that the thinking people will strive to find the merit in both. This official has some fine qualities and it was hoped in the beginning that he would make an outstanding official, but when he becomes so enamored of himself, so wrapped up in his own political future that he thinks only he is right and everybody else wrong and takes the position he is the only one in the county capable of filling all the offices, more able than the elected officials, then he loses his usefulness as a public servant.

After observing his biased conduct toward anything and everyone who disagrees with him, can we do else but believe that he is a source of trouble and discontent that is bringing ridicule and an unfavorable impression of all our citizens and county, to all parts of the State?

## Veterans Told of Steps To Take Seeking Loans

Veterans who plan to seek GI loans from private lenders for homes, farms or businesses should apply to Veterans Administration regional offices in advance for certificates of eligibility, VA has announced.

VA said this will reduce delays in processing the loan applications later, when the veteran is anxiously awaiting completion of the deal or is pressed for time to close the loan.

Certificates of eligibility are proof for lenders that VA will guarantee or insure a loan if the veteran meets other usual loan requirements.

In the past, veterans have been advised to submit their discharge or separation papers to the lending institutions making the loan. They in turn, would submit them to VA on behalf of the veterans.

However, since the passage of the Korean GI Bill which extends the loan guaranty benefits of the World War II GI Bill to veterans with service since June 27, 1950, VA must have information not previously needed to establish eligibility.

Now, to pass on a veteran's eligibility, VA must know whether the veteran served in World War II or since the start of the Korean conflict, or both; what prior use of his loan guaranty benefits, if any, has been made; the status of any prior GI loans, and whether the veteran still owns real estate purchased with any such loans.

Thus, by applying to VA office in advance, veterans and lenders may save considerable time in processing the loan application.

VA said its local offices can quickly determine what they will require in order to pass on a veteran's eligibility. This will do away with needless correspondence and expedite issuing certificates.

Most World War II veterans have until July 25, 1957 in which to apply for GI loans under the original GI Bill, but veterans with service since June 27, 1950, the beginning of the Korean conflict, have until 10 years from end of the current emergency in which to apply.







**Jamerson New Coach Of Morehead Grid 11**



Wilbur R. (Shorty) Jamerson, former backfield star for the University of Kentucky Wildcats, has been named head football coach at Morehead State College. This was announced Friday by Morehead President Charles R. Spain, following a meeting of the athletic committee at the college.

Now a first lieutenant in the Air Force stationed at Bolling Field, Washington, D. C., Jamerson expects to be released from active duty July 1 and to assume his duties at the college July 15. He will visit the campus for his first meeting with the football squad on May 23. "Shorty" was graduated from the University of Kentucky in June, 1931. A few days later, he married the former Miss Virginia Osborne, of Wheelwright. He then entered the Air Force with an ROTC commission and was stationed for three months at Sampson Air Force Base, N. Y., where he served as athletic officer. Transferred to Bolling Field in the fall of '51, he took on the dual role of backfield coach and player on the base football team for two seasons.

A four-letter man at Barret Manual Training high school, Henderson, Ky., Jamerson was captain and all-state halfback in his senior year. He lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track. Although a small player—5 feet, 9 inches tall and weighing only 168 pounds—Shorty earned a place for himself in the UK lineup through his competitive spirit, his natural ability and his willingness to put all of his effort into every assignment. Coach Bryant depended heavily on Jamerson for both offensive and defensive play.

In his senior year Jamerson, along with Bob Gain, co-captained the Wildcats to a 10-1 season, losing only to Tennessee. With All-American Babe Parilli at quarterback, the team had a passing combination that was well-nigh unbeatable. The Parilli-Jamerson combination clicked often to cause trouble for SEC foes. It plagued others, too, as it accounted for one of Jamerson's two touchdowns against the favored Oklahoma Sooners in the Sugar Bowl. At Morehead the new coach will be stepping into the post held for 17 years by Ellis Johnson, also a UK graduate. Johnson recently asked to be relieved of his football chores so he could concentrate on basketball. Jamerson will also coach the Breckinridge Training School basketball team.

An assistant football coach at Morehead is yet to be named. Stanley Padjuna, who has held the position since 1946, resigned recently to enter private business.



**BLADES OF BLUEGRASS**

By J. ALLAN SMITH

LEXINGTON, KY. — This being a day off from the office, my wife set me to dusting books. In my experience, books always need dusting, but these were in special need. The floors had just been sanded — and tack-up sheets as you will, the dust finds its way to the books. And so, armed with a soft-bearded attachment for the vacuum cleaner and a fluffy mitt treated with a concoction of some sort with a special affinity for dust, and a comfortable stool and an old newspaper to protect the bindings from the newly finished floor, or vice versa, I resigned myself to the task.

Now for anyone who'll take a minute's thought it is immediately clear that the most efficient book-duster must perforce be illustrate—the more completely illustrate the better. For who, if he once has tasted the sweet and stirring adventure, the solace and stimulation, the take-me-out-of-myself power hidden between the covers of a book, can handle the volumes without an occasional pause to peep inside? Novels, poetry, essays, history, biography — one by one they called up old memories and awakened new desires.

A book unopened may be a cold and unpossessing thing; it may stand on the shelf year in and year out unused—and yet it is there always, awaiting the willing eye. And yet, in the making of the book, how much toil and care, how many sleepless hours, how much agonizing over the choosing and discarding and recasting of materials, how much hope and how much pride went into it? A book is a part of the life of the author.

Take, for example, this book in bright blue binding and gold lettering—"Birds of Kentucky," by J. D. Higgins. Some books are called tragedies by reason of the materials they contain; this is a tragedy by reason of its experience as a book. I knew the author. He was a naturalist and museum curator, retired, and commissioned by the University of Kentucky about a dozen years ago to write a "definitive" work on the birds of the state. Into this book he put the last several years of his life, hard and painstaking work, much of the time under a burden of almost unbearable pain from incurable cancer. He looked upon it as the crowning work of his life, a monument to his efforts. He died before the book appeared; details of publishing were attended to by his wife and his friend, W. D. Funkhouser, naturalist of the University of Kentucky. The book appeared; copies were sent out to the dealers for review — and then, after only the first trickle of orders had been filled, the warehouse where the books were stored burned, and the entire edition was lost. And so the book is a tragedy.

But on with the dusting! We can't stop to look at every book!

**SPORTS AFIELD**

By TED KESTING

Spring is the time to paint boats. But don't set yourself a timetable to paint each spring, every other spring or every third one. The rule is: never paint unless it is needed. Willard Crandall, boats and motors expert, says there are only two objects in any repainting — to improve appearance and to protect the boat.

Preparing the surface, the first step, is probably the most important. Paint removers have been improved and are the amateur's standby. Experts burn off old paint but the novice may find this quite difficult; electric hot-scrapers are better. Electric sanders can be a real solution; avoid the disk-type—they rear up the wood too much and can do real damage to a plywood surface. The vibrating type is most often best.

Don't just pick out a dry day to paint but wait until it has been dry for a couple of days or more, and then not early in the morning and not later than early afternoon. Give the paint a chance to start drying before the evening dew gets on it to dull the wet finish. Warmer spring days are best—cold paint is slow drying.

Experts disagree on just how cold is too cold; but none advises painting at under 40 degrees, or varnishing under about 50 degrees and all agree that the ideal temperatures are somewhat higher. Too hot isn't good either; varnish won't flow right, act right or look right. Paint tends to blister when it gets too hot.

If you're outdoors, don't paint and certainly never varnish on windy days since there's sure to be sand and dirt flying to mess up the job.

Sand thoroughly and carefully, of course, before and between coats. Don't use a coarser grade than is needed — you'd only mar the surface unnecessarily. And really let a coat dry before applying the next one by waiting a day or so after all signs of tackiness have disappeared. Don't ever let it slip out of your mind that violation of temperature and humidity rules have ruined more paint jobs than poor material ever did, and that a poor job not only has to be done over—it has to be got off before the doing over can even start.

Use only marine paint. Other types simply aren't formulated to take the natural hazards of life on a boat. Brush the paint out well—don't put on a thick coat. Varnish, or a final gloss coat, should be "flowed on." Stir paint completely, varnish not at all — you don't want bubbles. Paint from the top down; otherwise, you'll have drooping paint on your just-finished edges. Keep a turpentine-soaked rag handy to take off paint in the wrong places. Fill all nail holes and so forth with marine wood putty after a primer coat — it won't adhere as well to bare wood. Use masking tape around metal fittings.

**SQUARE DEAL FOR TAXPAYERS**  
**GOOD GOVERNMENT TAXPAYER'S LEAGUE**

The Floyd County Good Government Taxpayers League at its meeting Sunday night voted unanimously to appeal the decision of Judge Grauman that the Tax League did not have a right to sue the members of the fiscal court without first demanding that they sue themselves.

Our attorneys inform us that the decision and the letters and correspondence between the fiscal court's lawyers and the court of appeals clearly indicate in their opinion that the decision was based on neither law nor reason.

Allow us to point out to the taxpayers that a personal judgment was sought against the magistrates for a misappropriation of public funds and Judge Grauman made the remarkable decision that in such a situation the magistrates could ignore the taxpayers suits, that they could meet, compromise and adjust their own cases to their own financial advantage and a taxpayer could not complain. Judge Grauman has been a judge only a few months and in all due respect to him the taxpayers of Floyd county will not accept Judge Grauman's statement that a taxpayer must ask the magistrates to sue themselves for their own wrong doing.

Furthermore our attorneys advise us that K. R. S. 68.100 (2) provides that where there is an illegal appropriation and the County Attorney fails to bring action in six months, any taxpayer may bring suit. And nowhere in that statute or in the law books is any kind of demand required. Why Judge Grauman ignored this completely is known only by himself.

The Judge is "DEAD" wrong when he stated that the law has become more liberal in granting expenses, for the very last session of the Legislature frowned on the granting of expenses and got more strict than ever and passed K.R.S. 64.710 specifically prohibiting "lump sum expense allowance, except where such allowance is expressly provided for by statute or is specifically appropriated by the General Assembly."

#### Open-Pollinated Corn Not Endorsed by Boggs

"Approximately 50 per cent of the corn raised in Floyd county is of the open pollinated variety," said County Agent O. E. Boggs, this week. "But it is the added stalks to the acre that increases yield and hybrid lends itself to this method. Hybrid yields about 20 to 30 per cent more per acre than open-pollinated, is drought and wind resistant," he added.

Boggs recommends for Floyd county planting the following varieties: Yellow, Ky. 103, Ky. 102 and U. S. 13 (which matures a little earlier). White varieties recommended are Ky. 203 and U. S. 533W. "The best way to learn the difference between open-pollinated and hybrid corn is to try one row of hybrid beside a field of open-pollinated. See the difference," Boggs said.

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

### GARDEN NOTES

by O. E. BOGGS, County Agent

#### POTATOES

Flea beetles are now at work in your garden to reduce your potato yield this year. They do a great deal of damage to potatoes and reduce yields each year but go unnoticed because it is hard to recognize the damage they are doing.

Examine your potatoes by taking a few leaves and holding them up between you and the sky. If you have flea beetles the damage can be recognized quickly.

If there are many fine holes in the leaves you can rest assured that you have an infestation of these insects. It is very easy to control the flea beetles if you use the right material. The material to use is DDT or Methoxychlor, a 5% dust of either material may be used or a spray made by using two tablespoonsful of 50% wettable DDT or Methoxychlor per gallon of water. NOTE—Rotenone is definitely not recommended to control flea beetles.

A garden spray schedule, prepared by John S. Gardner, Field Agent in Horticulture, at the University of Kentucky, is available at the County Agent's office. Write for it or come by the office and get one.

Keep sharp watch for green worms on cabbage and similar crops.

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
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

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
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
