Then there was Spiritualism. One fine Spring day at the close of the Civil War, we are told, a Mr. Abrams sail his gig across a fence, out into a meadow and there passed out cold. They said he was in a trance, and he himself was quoted later as saying he had been in conference with his spirit guide, a winsome Indian lass named Lahlah. Anyway Abrams hit oil at 850 feet, exactly where Lahlah had said he would. This system was right popular until word got around that Lahlah was a hawk-nosed Indian chief. Thereafter prospectors strayed into

Creekology and other methods. Some resorted to the Oil Smeller who claimed he could smell oil or gas at great depths. Others liked the Soil-Taster. One of these professed to know how the soil above gas tasted. It finally developed he was a chronic dirteater and for some reason lost easte. Still others depended on dreams, and they seemed to do the job about as well as any other means, and that includes the doodlebugs that are comparative-

Personally, if I were given the task of picking a location for drilling for gas I would use the Don't - Trust - My - Judgment Friends-and-Neighbors method. That method consists of this simple procedure:

I would study the landscape, dream about it, try out the witchhazel sprig, consult a medium if one could be found, pick the spot-and then tell the drillers to go at least a hundred yards away in any direction before they began work.



K. R. S. 64.990 (8)—Any officer who by any indirection collects or attempts to collect more for his services than is allowed by law, shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor and fined not less than \$50 nor more than \$200, and his conviction shall be prima facie evidence of his guilt in a proceeding to remove him from of-

K. R. S. 70.550 — No fees shall be allowed or paid to said officers or employes (of the County Police Force).

K. S. R. 70.560 — The Fiscal Court shall, by order, fix the amount of the salary of all appointees, but no fees or other compensation shall be paid or allowed to any of the officers or members of said County Police Force.

K. R. S. 70.570 — The members of said County Police Force shall not have power to serve subpoenas, summonses, and notices in civil cases.

### Not for the Sake of Argument

THE TIMES does not want to precipitate an argument or a row with our Pike county neighbors and their Virginia friends, but we insist that the muchpublicized attraction of the Breaks of Big Sandy for the tourist does not even approach in pulling power that of Dewey Lake.

We mention this fact not to belittle the Breaks but in an attempt to place things in their proper perspective and to keep official Frankfort from looking too high in the hills for their scenic spots.

There is a wild beauty about the Breaks, it is true. You get a touch of the primitive there. We're willing to go along even with that colorful phraseology by which it is likened to the Grand Canyon. Truth is, we are all for the Breaks and for the Breaks

But we're just a little bit tired of sitting by and letting state officials and others of influence grow ecstatic over the grandeur of the Breaks when we know that more people will visit Dewey Lake and find more beauty and relaxation there than at these storied Breaks. Water has a peculiar fascination to the human being, and we have plenty of it at Dewey. Add the expanse of blue sky, give people the outdoors of woods and wind and sun, and some elbow-room, a place to swim, to boat, to fish, picnic, camp, laze in the sun-and what chance has a mere gorge and woodland, no matter how majestic, against all this? And Dewey has all these.

Then may we suggest, fellows, that we all get realistic about this matter of parks? Let's rely on the facts and not on publicity or sentiment or legend.

We want a park at the Breaks. But we want a park also at Dewey Lake-an honest-to-goodness state park, not talk or sets of plans, master, working or otherwise. And we want the place that has the greatest possibilities, the highest potential benefit for the greatest number of people, to get the most attention and the most money.

Tell us, pray, when the Breaks of Big Sandy ever on one day attracted sixteen thousand people! But there we go inciting another argument.

### Who Would Use the "Drag Strip"?

It has been suggested locally that a "drag strip" be constructed as a move toward taking youngsters with a mania for speed off the highways where they endanger the lives of others as well as their own.

In support of such a project it is pointed out that off-the-highway strips for impromptu auto racing such as this have been very helpful elsewhere. The idea is, form a club, have its members governed by strict rules as to their behavior as drivers on the highways, and give the whole undertaking official

"Drag" racing on the highways—on the streets of Prestonsburg, one report says-has caused much concern in recent weeks. Only by the greatest good fortune have those who thus race escaped serious injury or death. They have been equally fortunate in not causing the deaths of innocent motorists. As we understand "drag" racing, two automobiles line up, side by side, on the highway, then take off. On a twolane road this leaves a minimum of room for the unsuspecting driver who may drive meeting them.





Floyd county, Kentucky, was created by an act of the General Assembly and was signed by Gov. James Garred, Dec. 13, 1799, to become effective June 1, 1800. It was formed from Mason, Montgomery and Fleming counties.

The new county was organized at the home of James Brown who lived on the present Auxier Road but Preston's Station, renamed Prestonsburg, was designated as the county seat. Only six persons resided in Prestonsburg when it was made the seat of government for a vast section of Eastern Kentucky and only 478 persons lived in the entire area.

Comprising the new county of Floyd in 1800 were all or parts of 15 present Eastern Kentucky counties. These are Floyd, Pike, Martin, Johnson, Lawrence, Elliott, Morgan, Magoffin, Knott, Letcher, Perry, Breathitt, Wolfe, Menifee and Rowan. The present Floyd county is very much reduced in area since it was formed but it has grown in population and industry



### Test Livestock Before Buying. Farmers Warned

Frankfort, Aug. 12 (Spl.) Acting State Veterinarian Dr. Robert H. Singer warned farmers Maysville hospital where he had against risking financial loss by failing to require all cattle be tested for brucellosis prior to being bought or sold at stockyards

> Dr. Singer said reports had reached his office here that some stockyards were not blood testing cattle before they went into the sales ring. Often the purchaser would buy a cow or bull only to find that it was brucellosis infected. In such cases, the animal must be sent to immediate slaughter, often at prices considerably lower than was paid for the animal an hour or so earlier.

The State Veterinarian added pre-sale testing also was advantageous to the seller because the prospective purchaser could buy knowing the animal in question was a healthy one. He added that some yard operators had reported to him that the selling price of pre-tested animals ran \$15-\$25 higher than for one that had not been tested.

This reduction requiring testing of cattle being returned to the farm has been in effect since July
