Otter Creek, the birthplace of Ed Hall, isolated and fend-ridden, maintained its dread social mores until the turn of the twentieth century. The head of Right Beaver, home of Talt Hall, was a favorite range of feudists like old Clabe Jones and Devil John Wright.

Ed Hall, son of Wash and Cindy Hall, with his brothers and sisters in a mountain cabin near the forks of Otter, met the stern everydays of a near-pioneer existence with no complaint, as it was the only life he knew. He went to school a little when there was a school, was kept home for foddering, corn gathering and potato digging at the least excuse, as was the mountain custom. He liked school, though, for he was famed locally as fleet of foot and no schoolmate ever caught him when he was the fox being raced by the hounds. 



But Ed Hall was no dealer in illicit liquor, and he followed his occupation of logger, leaving the nefarious business to others until the law beckoned for his services. He was appointed a deputy United States marshal and, with his associates, Bill Edwards and Billy Renfro, began to search and seize. He became hated and feared, but Donkey breathed a bit easier and there were fewer nights when guns barked incessantly.

Donkey was traditionally lawless, the town and its vicinity accursed with murders. It had been that way for generations.

In 1810 a Kentucky-bound pioneer, with the family's "belongings" strapped on a donkey, had stopped on Pound River to spend the night. The animal died and the family awoke to find itself stranded. Travelers, noting the bleaching bones of the beast, named the place Donkey. Under President Benjamin Harrison's administration he was appointed a deputy United States marshal and so being a man of authority he encased himself in firearms. A five-inch belt was wound around his body and filled with two rows of cartidges while the revolver for which they were intended hung from his shoulder. Across his back or lying on the pommel of his saddle was a Winchester and tucked in his habiliments was a five-foot-long telescope with which he searched the hills for the tell-tale smoke of the moonshnier.

On his star-faced black mare he roamed the countryside, seeing patients, looking for distillers, preaching a sermon now and then, assisting at funerals, and what was dear to his heart, chasing men wanted by the law. Often he changed shoes, wore a pair upon which the heels had been nailed to the toe. Many an unwary fugitive, scanning the plain footsteps, and thinking he was taking a path away from the presence of the dreaded sleuth, walked into his arms.

Ed Hall had little respect for the Red Fox and sought his professiongency. For one thing Big Ed didn't like the dual character of the doc-Illicit whiskey, bad men and the tor's face. On one side was kindness two miles to the general with scarcely an invitation to "light

Big Ed, though a kinsmen of Talt's, had little regard for him, too, one reason being that the bad Beaver man had struck up a partnership with the Devil John Wright clan. Wright, living in a fortresslike log home on Elkhorn, was feuding with Old Clabe Jones, of Knott county. Both Wright and Jones had their henchmen, both carried warrants for each other.

Talt Hall was a worthy lieutenant of Devil John and the gang they organized was bound together with an affinity of meaness and diviltry and deepened by the solemnity of The Oath. Years later the oath was Cumberlands, heard the Wright band repeat it many times

"I swear by God Almighty, by Heaven his home and by Hell his prison home to befriend and hold in the sacred bonds of brotherhood all members of the Band," the initiate affirmed. "I swear that I will lie for them, die for them, steal for them, and if they are in trouble that I wil give up everything I have to save them. I swear that I will be burned in oil, cut to pieces and salted rather than inform on them. I swear that I will obey my Captain in all things, even to the killing of my kinsmen and if I break this Oath I hope God will strike me dead in my tracks and that my whole life shall be damned."

In such a gang the Wright henchmen roved about a great deal, on Elkhorn, Shelby, especially the Long Fork, over on Boone, deep down Troublesome when they were not afraid of Old Clabe Jones, now jailer of Knott county. Old Clabe had cut portholes in the log jail at Hindman to protect himself from the Hays family and now and then used the log structure as a sanctuary when the Letcher men rode into town.

Talt, though, a sort of lone wolf, would leave the pack at times and lodge on the head of Right Beaver. There he took fancy to a woman, had her husband ambushed and killed. Rapidly growing worse, he went to Norton, Virginia, to elude the law, watched Enos Helton, the town marshal with cold-black, catlike eyes. Helton noticed him one day, too, and sought to ease up closer. Bad Talt saw his purpose and shot him down. He fled to Devil John Wright's, 'The Elkhorn clansman gave his henchman money for a one-way trip to Canada.

Talt didn't think much of the Canadian climate, disregarded Devil John's order, drifted down to Memphis. Here his taste for whiskey upset his discretion and sending a little girl to a saloon for it he spread about a bit of suspicion. Legend in the mountains has it that it was the Red Fox who learned Hall was in Memphis and tipped off the Tennessee authorities. The Memphis police took no chances on the Kentucky bad man but waited until he had sat down to supper and then charged in. The doomed man whined that the Bateses had sworn his life away in order to clear themselves. Judge H.A.W. Skeen ordered him taken to the Lynchburg jail for safekeeping until the Virginia Court of Appeals should act.

The captured man went on trial, July 24, 1894. The chief witness, Mrs. Jane Mullins was now dead and after six days of ineffectual effort on the part of the Commonwealth's attorney to establish guilt without her positive identification he asked the court to dismiss the case. Heenan Fleming went back to West Virginia to live the life of law abiding citizen, serving several years as an officer himself. Henry Adams who had been indicted as the fourth member of the mountain killer band, was freed by the court on inpicion being allayed, they went on sufficient evidence. Big Ed Hall and Doc Swindall split the \$700 reward for the Flemings and lived quietly for awhile. Swindall finally moved to Rockford, Illinois after his recovery, but he ever afterward wheezed through his

larynx as he breathed. January 31, 1895, was bitterly cold on Pound River and Big Ed Hall, now almost universally called the Mountain Man-Hunter, decided to haul a few loads of firewood. He sent up to Bold Camp Creek, asked Hop Mullins for the loan of his oxen. Mullins sent the cattle by his ten-year-son, Esau, with orders to bring them back home when the

hauling was finished. Ed yoked the cattle to a sled, dropped his Winchester in it, drove several hundred yards up along the side of Pound River, Isaac Cantrell, a neighboring man about 22 years

old, went along. The sled being loaded, Ed turned the oxen homeward and drove past the store of Martin Soward. There were several men inside and out, all enjoying the apple brandy being dispensed. Farther down the road, in sight, was the home of Eli Swnidall, where his daughter, Ida, lay dead. Three others of the Swindall family were ill. Ed's home was nearby, on the opposite side of the road. He looked up to see Cat on

the porch of their home. Suddenly a rifle cracked, Ed felt the impact of a bullet entering his back, and he instinctively turned to grab his Winchester in the sled. Looking back he saw smoke issuing from the upper story of the store Cat screamed at him to run and said they were shooting from the store, and knowing he was a perfect target ,he sprinted toward the Swindall house. He collapsed and died at the porch. Several people gathered and he was carried in, laid on a bed opposite the corpse of Ida

Cantrell reminisced a lifetime about the murder. "No one was ever arrested for the killing because there were 20 or 25 men in the store at that time as well as 400 gallons of apple brandy.
