## Bank Announces Plans For New Building Here

Construction will be started next fall on a four-story structure overlooking the Big Sandy River here which will house the First Commonwealth Bank.

Cost of the building and interior work has been estimated at \$4.4 million, and completion is scheduled for 18 months after work is begun.

The bank building, which will provide an area of 58,000 square feet, will be located on the former Garfield Place property and adjacent lots on Arnold Avenue, at the Arnold Avenue and Friend Street intersection.

The new facility will contain all departments of the bank that are now housed in the First Commonwealth building at the corner of Court Street and Lake Drive and in the old States Motel property on the opposite side of Lake Drive. Plans for this property after it is vacated were not disclosed.

In announcing architects' plans for the new bank building, Burl W. Spurlock,

president of First Commonwealth, detailed features of the overall project:

—The angular, four-story building will be constructed of brick and bronze glass bands, creating a dramatic form which emphasizes the significance of the bank in the community. At ground level the building form is used to articulate the entries, the drive-through and bank office spaces. The upper two floors, which will be for leaseable office space, will be set back from the second floor which will house the bank administrative offices. A sloped skylight extending across the front of the building will create an atrium effect, tying together the two bank floors.

—The building is designed so that a floor may be added with relative ease. Four elevators will service the building. The heating, ventilating and air-conditioning systems will use energy-efficient water source heat pumps which move heat from hot building areas to cold while giving tenants complete in-

dividual control. Central equipment for the mechanical system and elevators will be housed in a brick penthouse on the roof.

—Bank functions will occupy 29,500 square feet on the first and second floors, with teller lines, customer service, cash vault and loan departments located on the first floor. Administrative, accounting, data processing and safe deposit functions will occupy the second floor. These two floors will be connected by elevator and by a grand stairway in the atrium space.

—The bank will have the latest developments in customer and bank security equipment, in addition to four drive-thru teller lines, a night depository and a drive-up automatic teller. Bank interiors will utilize low and full height moveable partitions to allow total flexibility to meet future banking trends.

The new bank's parking area is designed to accommodate 170 vehicles.

## Coal Firm Faces Theft Charges, Damage Action

A husband and wife who operate a Prestonsburg coal firm face theft charges and a civil suit for damages, following separate actions filed in district and circuit courts here last week.

According to warrants sworn out in district court Thursday, Peter and Loretta Neal, operators of the Katron Coal Corp., paid with a cold check for coal they bought from a Wheelwright mining company.

William H. Gadsby, representing Remine Coal Company, said his firm, which recovers coal from gob piles, sold 1629 tons to Katron for \$31,134 in March but that the Neals' check, drawn on the First National Bank of Pikeville, was returned for lack of funds.

While the Neals subsequently resold the coal, they have paid Remine only \$5000 of the sum they owe, claims Gadsby, who accused them of "fraud, misrepresentation and unfair dealings."

The district court warrants charge the couple with two theft counts each. A \$10,000 bond was fixed and a court date set for July 9. In the civil suit, Remine seeks the \$26,134 it says is still due and a further \$25,000 in punitive damages.

(Only one side of the case is presented in the filing of civil actions.)

## Attorney Claims Recent Aid Plan Shy on Legality

Prestonsburg City Council members agreed Monday that the \$2500 Keith Stevens was looking for was in a very good cause. But, alas, they said, cities are forbidden by state law from donating to worthy causes.

Stevens, managing director of the Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theater, said he needed the money to have brochures printed. The theater, which has seen phenomenal growth in the past four years, is an economic boon to Prestonsburg, Stevens reminded the council. But City Attorney Larry Brown said state law was plain on the point.

Not only would the theater get no city funds but neither will the American Red Cross, Mayor Harold W. Cooley made clear. The council earlier appeared favorably disposed to granting the Red Cross \$6000 a year toward the cost of

## Woman Jailed In Blair Death On Mud Creek

A Prater Creek woman is being held in the Floyd county jail on a murder charge following the shooting death of John Paul Blair by the side of the Mud Creek road last Thursday night.

Blair, 30, who is said to have been visiting here from Chicago, was shot in the back of the head at 9:10 p.m. on KY 979 at the mouth of Akers Branch, between Grethel and Craynor. Charged in his death is Ruth Greer, 27, of Happy Hollow of Prater Creek.

Witnesses said the shooting occurred after an argument broke out between Blair and Randy Hall, 39, in the back of a pickup truck heading up Mud Creek toward Hall's Mink Branch home. Greer, who was driving the pickup, stopped abruptly when Hall fell or was knocked onto the roadway and shot Blair as he was fleeing, according to reports.

## Church at Ligon Loser in Court

A 5½-year legal wrangle between a Clear Creek church and one of its neighbors ended quietly last week when Circuit Judge Hollie Conley dismissed the church's complaint.

Officials of the Ligon Community Baptist Church filed a complaint in circuit court in December, 1978, alleging they were damaged by a road belonging to Palmer Humphrey, who lives next door.

Later, church members claimed ownership of the road by reason of their having used it over a period of time.

In a counterclaim, Humphrey asserted his ownership of the road and said he was being damaged by the church, which diverted water onto his property.

Until Judge Conley's order stemmed the flow last Tuesday, the suit had generated a continuing exchange of legal papers that occupy a bulging file, six inches thick, in the circuit clerk's office.

In the end, the judge held that it was Humphrey rather than the church who had been damaged, and he ordered the church to pay \$500 to Humphrey for the damage and \$500 to Gary Johnson, Humphrey's lawyer, toward the cost of his legal fees.

## County Board Hears Teacher Cut Protest

Parents and school administrators again clashed last week over the question of where the cuts should be made in next year's school budget.

Regena Lafferty, president of the Clark Elementary School PTA, presented to the Floyd Board of Education a petition signed by 240 parents protesting the board's decision not to rehire a physical education teacher at that school. But board chairman Dr. J.D. Adams defended last month's decision to drop three elementary music teachers and two physical education teachers on grounds that, by state standards, the Floyd school district is "overstaffed" in those areas.

John Rosenberg, Prestonsburg attorney with two children at Clark, complained to the board that "as the school gets bigger, you keep reducing teachers." Clark, which has enjoyed a name for relatively high academic standards and parent involvement, began a period of rapid growth about six years ago—prompted partly by its reputation and partly by population growth in the Middle Creek area—which severely strained the school facilities.

The school census peaked at 670 pupils in 1981, when parents persuaded the school board to prohibit new enrollments of children from outside the Middle Creek area. Enrollment as of April this year was 622.

To Clark parents, who have repeatedly petitioned the board for more teachers and classroom space, the prospect of losing physical education teacher Bridget Clay was insult added to injury. But Adams said the board followed a recommendation of state

education officials in cutting the school district's so-called ASIS units—categories which include some administrators, guidance counselors and librarians as well as art, music and physical education teachers—and warned that further cuts might follow.

Another budget-cutting measure adopted last month will no longer be necessary, the board decided. Rescinded was a decision to reduce the work year of administrative and supervisory personnel. Unanticipated state funds have now been allocated for those positions, it was said.

Over the objection of board member James A. Duff, contracts with two firms were extended for another year, Asst. Supt. Ray Brackett explaining that the extensions would enable the school district to replace more quickly school supplies and text books lost in last month's flood. Duff said the contracts—let last year to Southern School Supply, Inc., of Bowling Green, and Baker and Taylor, Inc., of Mokenca, Illinois—should be again advertised for bids.

The May flooding caused an estimated \$1.7 million in damage to Floyd schools, including \$54,000 in lost textbooks, school officials reported. A federal grant is expected to pay for any repairs or supplies not covered by insurance.

Weekend field trips to the King's Island theme park in Cincinnati were approved for Betsy Layne and Prater Creek students. Board members questioned the educational purpose of the excursion planned for Betsy Layne FFA and VICA clubs, but approved it anyway. An educational objective of the

## Graduating Class Hears Embittered Valedictory

Dena Curry warned the Wheelwright High School Commencement audience Friday not to expect "the usual kind" of valedictory address. What she gave them, instead, was a crisp commentary on her recent dispute with the Board of Education and a word of bitter advice. At least in Floyd county, she told her peers, "to get to the top, it's not what you know but who you know that counts."

On behalf of his daughter, a 17-year-old senior, Ellis Curry, of Bypro, sued the board last month, arguing that, as the graduating student with the highest grade point average, she should be declared valedictorian. Instead, Wheelwright Principal Ervin Pack insisted that she share the honor with classmate Bethel Hall.

No one was denying that Miss Curry topped her class, explained school board attorney Woodrow Burchett, but the difference between the two girls' grade average was a paper-thin .018 of a point. Neither student ever earned less than an A in high school and only when the qualifying plus and minus signs were taken into account could their scores be separated at all.

Representing Miss Curry, attorney Gary Johnson protested that neither the board nor the school principal had any business changing the rules simply because the finish was close. But Pack insisted no one had bent any rules.

Since 1977 Wheelwright grade averages have been figured on a 12-point

## Mine Trouble Spot Reclamation Okehed

A notorious slate dump on Clear Creek, a series of landslides on Buck's Branch, and a 126-acre spoil bank on Right Beaver Creek are among five Floyd trouble spots listed for correction under a plan designed to clean up old mine sites. Another project will convert a Mare Creek refuse dump into a recreation area.

They are included among 69 projects, most of them in the eastern part of the

state, funded principally by fees paid by coal operators under a program for reclaiming mines worked before 1977 and then abandoned.

Many of the projects involve landslides caused by the practice, illegal since 1978, of simply pushing spoil over the hill at stripmine sites. Surface operators now pay 35 cents per ton of coal mined and underground operators 15 cents a ton into a federal abandoned-mine reclamation fund.

The list of projects was approved May 1 by the U.S. Office of Surface Mining. Last week, state Finance and Administration Secretary Lester "Mac" Thompson approved 22 firms for engineering contracts on 47 of the projects. The rest of the engineering work

## Sheriff Blames Fiscal Court For Lack of Operating Funds

Delinquent tax bills, due to go out last week, have been held up for want of the money to mail them. And, if that is hardly likely to inspire a taxpayers' revolt, it has unleashed a war of words between the sheriff's office and the fiscal court.

For Sheriff Henry Hale, it is just one more instance of the fiscal court's failure to support his office in the manner to which he is entitled by law. "Whenever I ask them for something," he grumbled last week, "it seems like it's going in one ear and out the other."

But Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo said the only reason the sheriff did not get the \$565 he needs to mail the tax bills is that he did not ask for it at the last fiscal court meeting. "He can't come up here and ask for a check any time he wants it without fiscal court approval," the judge said.

The sheriff is not buying that argument. The reason he has no money to send out the bills is not that he failed to make himself clear at the fiscal court, he insists—but that he is always forced to beg, cajole or threaten the magistrates before they will give him the money he needs to run his office.

He has a list of examples to illustrate his theme. His full-time staff has been cut to two deputies and three clerks, though four non-salaried deputies help him serve legal papers. He has a fleet of six cars but lacks the funds to maintain and operate them. He has radios and his own assigned frequency but the court will not fund the adjustments needed to put him on the air.

In April the fiscal court agreed to include the sheriff's staff in the county's

system—which permits pluses and minuses to be included in the reckoning —he pointed out. The naming of co-valedictorians where grade averages are close is a common practice in Floyd high schools and happened at least once before, in 1974, at Wheelwright.

The trouble with that kind of reasoning, Johnson argued, is that it affords no protection to the student who comes out ahead on grade scores and it "weakens the honor" of being named valedictorian. To see the lengths to which school officials might go to accommodate the runners-up, one need only consider this year's Betsy Layne High School commencement, where no fewer than five co-valedictorians were named, the lawyer said.

In executive session last Wednesday, the board of education voted unanimously to back the Wheelwright principal's decision to name co-valedictorians, and Circuit Judge Hollie Conley affirmed the board's decision in a court order Friday.

"One word describes what they did to me and this graduating class," Miss Curry told the commencement audience later that night, "—and that's politics." The graduate later declined to specify how politics had influenced the board or court decisions, however.

In the fall, Miss Curry plans to attend Alice Lloyd College, where she originally planned to major in education. But after her experience with the board "that might not be the best idea," she commented this week.

hospitalization benefits plan, but said the sheriff would have to pick up the \$763-a-month premium. The sheriff says that is discriminatory and claims the attorney-general and a state finance official agree with him.

Now that responsibility for collecting motor vehicles taxes has been transferred from his office to the county clerk, he is dependent for funds solely on the four percent commission he gets on property taxes and the \$10 fee he earns for each warrant served. It is not enough to live on, the sheriff complains. "People want me to be out patrolling at night. They think the county furnishes me what I need. It isn't true," he said.

The sheriff's salary—\$30,605—is set by state law but he is dependent on the county for his office expenses. All but \$2205 of the \$12,000 set aside in this year's county budget for his materials and supplies has been spent paying bills that have nothing to do with the sheriff's office, Hale said. And yet the property taxes he collects—he has turned in \$635,834 this year—represents about a third of the county's total annual income.

There will be no problem about paying the sheriff's postage costs when the fiscal court meets next on June 15, said Judge Stumbo. And the court might be willing to pay what it takes to convert the sheriff's radios to his new frequency. But on the other matters he would make no promises.

"I don't blame the magistrates. They know that anything they spend is going to have to come from the road fund," Stumbo said. "In the past, when there was coal severance money coming in, they didn't have to worry." But severance tax receipts thinned to a trickle this year and county officials have been warned to count on none at all in the year to come.

Most of the expenditures provided in the \$1.7 million county budget—like salaries and utility bills—are fixed, the judge explained. The \$150,000 set aside in the budget for road materials is one of the few areas where the fiscal court has any discretion.

"Anything we take out has got to come from the roads," the judge explained. "That's a problem—and the sheriff is going to have to live with it."

maintaining an office here, a fact noted later by local Red Cross organizer Cassie Allen in persuading the Floyd fiscal court to commit an identical amount to the relief agency.

At Monday's council meeting, Mrs. Allen formally withdrew her request for city funds. Stevens said he would look elsewhere for support for the theater.

A U.S. Department of Labor official is in town this week to study the operation of the Prestonsburg Job Corps Center, the council was told. Reports of a breakdown of discipline at the facility led earlier this year to a demand by some that the Singer Corporation be replaced as manager there. Anyone wishing to speak to the federal official, Paul J. "Jack" Krois, should call him this week at the Job Corps Center, it was said.

Council members asked for more time to study a bill that would set up a kind of police judge to deal with city parking infractions. Under a newly-enacted state law, cities may establish a parking commission to enforce rules which currently fall within the jurisdiction of the district court. Because district court judges rarely bother with parking tickets, city officials have long complained that the parking ordinance is virtually unenforceable. Under the law proposed here, a one-member parking commission would be established.

Cabletelevision, Inc. failed to appear as scheduled to outline proposed improvements to the cable system that serves many Prestonsburg residents. Officials of the firm are now expected to appear at the council's June 25 meeting.

Folklore has long insisted that the birds have a knowledge of death among humans. If a bird gets in the house, someone is going to die—that's the way it went.

The Licking Valley Courier, in one of its "Annals of Old Elliott" stories told a bird story I think is worth passing on.

Uncle Rich Ferguson (James Richard Ferguson) lived out his adult life on Briar Fork, farming and staying on there after the death of his wife. His two children had matured and moved away.

During his last year on Briar Fork, he adopted as a friend a cardinal, scarlet and resplendent, which he fed crumbs and seeds on the porch. The bird even came so close as to perch on the arm of Uncle Rich's chair and eat from his hand.

But Rich got sick, and went to live with his daughter. A nephew and family moved into the homeplace. When Rich died, in 1962, his nephew, Dallas, arranged for the body to be brought "back home" for visitation and last rites, because the burial site was nearby.

The late Dick Ferguson, long associated with Lewis & Ferguson Funeral Home at Sandy Hook, recalled that when he arrived with the body and the casket was being carried through the door into the house, the cardinal suddenly appeared on the porch, as if from nowhere, and flew inside ahead of the casketbearers.

It perched on the casket, remaining there or nearby through the entire period before and during the funeral. From time to time it would flit to other parts of the house, but always returned to perch in or above the casket.

When family members gathered around the casket for traditional photos, the bird stayed there too, and the family has pictures showing the cardinal with them.

As the casket was being taken from the house, the cardinal flew out the door and disappeared.

About a week later, the nephew's family heard a fluttering at the door and went to investigate. It was the cardinal. It flew inside and fluttered briefly around Uncle Rich's former bedroom, then left through the open door and was never seen again.

I have for some time now maintained that the mountain expression, "fer-ninst," which means, even the uneducated should know, "opposite," evolved from the English, "over against." Blair was pronounced dead at the scene; Greer is said to have made a frank statement to police, admitting she fired the fatal shot.

Arraigned before Trial Commissioner Thomas D. Lafferty, Sr. in district court Monday, Greer entered a plea of not guilty. Bond was set at \$50,000 and the public defender was appointed to represent her.

Greer, Randy Hall and his uncle, Bert T. "Sill" Hall, 62, of Arkansas Creek, were also booked on charges of public intoxication. Sill Hall paid \$47.50 in fine and court costs and was released. Randy Hall is being detained in jail as a parole violator.

According to witness reports, eight persons were traveling in Randy Hall's pickup immediately prior to the shooting: Blair; his mother, Eileen Hall, stepfather, Sill Hall, brother, Lonnie Blair, Jr., and half-sister, Tammy Hall; Randy Hall; Miss Greer, described as Randy Hall's girlfriend; and her brother, Freddy Greer. The three women were in the cab, the five men in back.

As Randy Hall lay dazed or unconscious after his fall from the truck, Greer reportedly leaped from the cab with a .38 caliber revolver and fired several shots at Blair as he fled, one of the shots striking him in the back of the head.

**Viewership Of '84  
General Assembly  
Most In E. Ky.**

Each day that the 1984 Kentucky General Assembly was in session, from the opening January 3, to the closing gavel April 13, KET's cameras were present to record the events in both the House and Senate, and in committee meetings. Highlights of each day's events were aired that night on KET, and according to a telephone survey conducted by the University of Kentucky Survey Research Center (SRC), an estimated 867,600 people watched these programs over the course of the session.

The SRC reports that 33.5 percent of all Kentucky households watched some portion of KET's coverage of the Legislature, compared to 22.6 percent during the 1982 session. More men than women tuned in, with highest viewership among those aged 41 to 65, followed closely by those 24 and under. Viewing was highest for those with college postgraduate educations—65.4 percent in this group reported watching.

Viewing was greatest in suburbs and small towns. Geographically, viewing was highest in the Appalachian regions of Kentucky, followed by the Central area, Northern Kentucky, West Kentucky, and the Louisville area.

Finally, registered voters indicated viewership more than double the rate of non-voters, with 37.8 percent of registered voters reporting some watching, compared to 15.9 percent viewership among non-registered voters.

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

### '84 Scholars Program Instructors Selected

Twenty-three Kentucky high school teachers and 22 college professors have been selected as faculty for the 1984 Governor's Scholars Program, to be held at Centre College and Eastern Kentucky University this summer.

"They are among the best classroom instructors in Kentucky," Governor Martha Layne Collins said, as she released the names of the 45 educators who will teach in the academic enrichment program for outstanding students entering their senior year in high school. The teachers will be divided between both campuses.

Six hundred Scholars—300 on each campus—are expected when the five-week sessions get underway on June 30 at Eastern and July 1 at Centre.

The teachers were chosen from almost 200 applicants. Applications were screened by a statewide committee of educators and extensive interviews conducted with finalists before appointments were made.

### After The Flood

(M.C.C.C. News Release)

A child whose family and home were victimized by flooding may not show signs of being troubled until after the water has receded. Sometimes it is weeks or months later.

It is often harder for children than adults to adjust to the crisis, and disruption of home life. They just cannot put their feelings into words as well as adults.

Children are keenly aware of the look in their parents' eyes, and the sound of their voices. Tension that the grown-ups are feeling compound children's anxieties.

Therefore, parents are encouraged to watch for changes in behavior, especially in regard to sleep, fears, and personal responsibility. One may begin to notice problems such as:

1. Nightmares, fitful sleep, bedwetting, or fear of the dark;
2. fearfulness of storms, rivers, or mud, especially during rainy spells;
3. irresponsibility;
4. clinging behavior; withdrawal;
5. loss of interest in school;
6. unruliness and anger.

If these problems should worsen or persist for a long time after the flood, it would be a good idea to seek help. Professional counseling is available at the local mental health center, Mountain Comprehensive Care Center, on weekdays. After hours and on weekends, telephone counseling can be received through Help-Line at 1-800-422-1060. Watch for upcoming articles in this newspaper on the long-range emotional effects of disasters on adults and families.



**FLOYD COUNTY HEALTH NEWS**

The health department advises all pet owners to vaccinate their pets against rabies.

Although most instances of rabies occur in wildlife, some domestic animals also get rabies. Cats, as well as dogs, should be vaccinated against rabies.

Last year in Kentucky there were 134 cases of rabies reported. Although most of these were wildlife, rabies could easily spread to domestic cats and dogs. The health department will once again be sponsoring rabies clinics throughout the county, June 25 through June 29. A small fee will be charged for the vaccinations.

All pet owners are urged to bring their pets, both dogs and cats to these clinics. The times and places of these clinics will be announced in next week's edition. The veterinarian will also have vaccinations for other diseases in animals for an additional charge.

There will be glaucoma screening clinics at the health department Wednesday, June 13, and Friday, June 15. These clinics are free and are open to persons of all ages, but those persons age 40 and over are especially urged to take advantage of this service, since this is the high risk age for the disease.

A nurse from the health department will be in Harold at East Kentucky Builder's Supply Monday, June 18. She will offer T.B. skin tests, urinalyses, anemia screening, blood pressures, and immunizations. This clinic is open to the public.

**State's Bar Members To Continue Education**

A mandatory continuing legal education rule has been approved by the Kentucky Supreme Court and will affect the state's 8,400 practicing attorneys, beginning July 1.

The rule provides that each lawyer in active practice will be required to attend a minimum of 15 hours of accredited continuing legal education seminars each year.

Announcement of the new mandatory continuing legal education plan was made by Kentucky Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert F. Stephens who noted that this is "one of the most progressive and significant rule changes made by the state's Supreme Court, and as such, will upgrade the performance quality of lawyers in their delivery of service to the public." One year ago, the court ordered mandatory continuing judicial education for all the state's judges.

The new plan originated with a recommendation from the Continuing Legal Education Commission that the Bar's six-year-old voluntary plan be made mandatory. The Bar's Board of Governors approved the recommendation in September 1982 and asked the Supreme Court to order the plan. The Court conducted a public hearing on the mandatory proposal last August 29, 1983, with members of the Bar given an opportunity to comment. In addition, a survey of the Bar membership conducted in the fall of 1983, indicated that 62 percent of the lawyers favored a mandatory continuing legal education program.

This fall the Kentucky Bar Association will be conducting a two-day seminar in each Supreme Court district to give attorneys an opportunity to obtain mandatory credit hours. In addition, the state law schools will be offering regional seminars across the state. Numerous local bar associations and other bar groups also offer seminars throughout the state.

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

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## Foster 'Sid' Meade Honored; To Retire After 49 Years

It was a time for beginnings and endings, for jokes and awards, for happiness and tears Thursday night when Lewis County School Superintendent Foster "Sid" Meade was honored at a special pre-retirement dinner.

Meade, who will retire on June 30, was feted at a dinner at Shawnee State Park, Portsmouth, O., where well over 200 friends, educators and acquaintances turned out to honor the educator of 49 years, who in earlier years was perhaps the state's most colorful coach and referee.

The program for Meade was chaired by Vanceburg physician, Dr. H.M. Bertram. Speakers and awards applauded the efforts Meade has made during not only his 17 years as school superintendent in Lewis county and also his accomplishments as superintendent of South Portsmouth Schools, Irvine City (Estill county) Schools and in Kentucky as a whole.

The educator, who was born on Clear Creek, in Floyd county and attended Frazier's Creek Elementary and McDowell High School, went to Lewis county in 1967, and during his tenure established such programs as the construction of a new vocational school; beginning kindergarten and headstart programs, with the headstart program cited as the best in 22 states by the Appalachian Regional Commission; started football and music programs; built a new library at Garrison Elementary and a new band room at the high school; constructed a new administrative office building; began an ROTC program, and required proper certification for all teachers.

In addition, Meade has long been involved on the state level, working closely with Congressmen Carl Perkins and other legislators, and was also instrumental in the implementation of programs through the Eastern Kentucky Educational Development Corporation (EKEDC). Meade has served as chairman of EKEDC from 1971 to 1976 and again during 1979-81.

Meade said he would like to be remembered as follows: "I would like to be thought of as an educator who did

all he could for the betterment of each boy and girl in Lewis county, as well as all the other communities where I have served."

Meade was honored by the sports department and the Lewis County Fair Board; given a gift certificate from Paul Westerfield and Jim Clark; received a letter of appreciation from the mayor of Vanceburg; received a painting from a local student, and was given an engraved watch from area residents and educators.

When Meade officially steps down at the end of the month, he will be succeeded by James W. Clark, 55, a Lewis county native and Tollesboro resident.

## Idle Rate Drops In 106 Counties

In 106 Kentucky counties the unemployment rate dropped between March and April as the state rate went down seven-tenths of a percent, according to the Cabinet for Human Resources figures released today. The rate went up in 11 counties and remained the same in three.

There were 69 counties reporting unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in April, compared to 76 in March. The preliminary state rate for April was 9.4 percent, down from a revised March rate of 10.1 percent. Nationally the rate was 7.6 percent for April, down from 8.1 percent in March.

Bourbon County reported the state's lowest rate, 3.6 percent, followed closely by Scott County, which reported 4.0 percent, and Fayette and Woodford counties, which each reported 4.2 percent. Robertson County reported the highest rate, 35.1 percent, followed by Menifee County, with 33.6 percent.

In the five-county Big Sandy district the unemployment rates were: Floyd, 15.4%; Johnson, 13.9%; Magoffin, 16.5; Martin, 6.7; Pike, 14.1.

State labor market statistician Carlos Cracraft noted that employment throughout the state has climbed steadily since December. "The estimated 1,570,500 Kentuckians who were employed in April is the fourth highest employment figure on record for the state. The April figure is 21,100 higher than the March estimate and 81,600 greater than in April 1983, when 1,488,900 Kentuckians had jobs," he said.

Cracraft cited employment gains in almost all sectors, including services, trade, construction, bituminous coal mining, transportation, communication and utilities, and manufacturing of transportation equipment, textiles and apparel, petroleum, rubber and plastic products, food products, primary metals, lumber and furniture, and stone, clay and glass products. Employment was down in finance, insurance and real estates, education and manufacturing of fabricated meals, tobacco, chemicals and leather products.

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## Kentucky Fishing Report

Stable weather and rising water temperatures have caused a big improvement in fishing conditions across Kentucky, with good catches reported from many locations. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

**KENTUCKY:** Crappie good over submerged cover (3-10 feet deep); catfish fair to good along rocky banks and rip-rap; black bass fair on plastic worms along shoreline cover; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 72°.

**BARKLEY:** Bluegill very good along shoreline cover; black bass fair to good casting plastic worms along shorelines; crappie fair over drop offs and along brush lines (2-10 feet deep); in tailwaters, bluegill good, white bass

fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 72°.

**BARREN:** No report available.

**NOLIN:** Black bass excellent casting plastic worms, spinner baits or crank baits off rocky points; white bass fair (with an occasional walleye) night fishing off deep banks; bluegill fair off shallow banks; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 80°.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Bluegill fair off shallow banks; clear, falling slowly, seven feet above summer pool and 76°.

**TAYLORSVILLE:** Bluegill very good still fishing worms or crickets around stick ups; black bass good on spinner baits and crank baits along shoreline cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 75°.

**HERRINGTON:** Black bass fair on plastic worms off points and rocky drop offs; bluegill fair drift fishing mealworms along deep banks; clear, stable at summer pool and 69°.

**GREEN:** Crappie good over submerged cover (5-8 feet deep); black bass fair on plastic worms or spinner baits off points and steep banks; clear to murky to muddy, falling, 2½ feet above summer pool and 72°.

**CUMBERLAND:** White bass fair to good night fishing off steep banks; black bass slow to fair on surface lures and crank baits along edges of flooded timber; walleye fair on rigged nightcrawlers or crank baits; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear to murky, falling, eight feet below power pool and 72°.

**LAUREL:** Trout fair to good off steep banks in lower lake; bluegill good in timbered coves; clear, falling slowly, three feet below power pool and 72°.

**DALE HOLLOW:** Bluegill good off shallow banks; black bass fair drift fishing large minnows along shallow banks; clear, falling, one foot above normal pool and 80°.

**CAVE RUN:** Black bass good on plastic worms, crank baits or spinner baits along shoreline cover; muskie slow casting medium to deep runners in timbered coves; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 76°.

**GRAYSON:** Catfish good jug fishing at night; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-10 feet deep); black bass slow on crank baits in upper ends of coves; clear, stable at summer pool and 76°.

**BUCKHORN:** Crappie good over submerged cover (4-6 feet deep); bluegill good along shoreline cover; murky to muddy, stable at summer pool and 76°.

**DEWEY:** Crappie fair over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 76°.

**FISHTRAP:** Crappie fair around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 76°.

**To Attend Special Summer Workshop**

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
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

## Diving Tragedy Claims Fireman

Ricky Davis, a sergeant with the Prestonsburg Fire Department, died Saturday in a diving accident off the North Carolina coast while practicing skills of underwater rescue work.

The 28-year-old Davis, who was one of 12 firemen in Kentucky who were certified to conduct underwater rescue and investigative work, was scuba diving from a boat about 20 miles south of Cape Lookout, N.C., with a Huntington, W. Va. group when the tragedy occurred. Lt. Richard Atlee, of the Coast Guard Rescue Coordination Center at Portsmouth, Va., said Davis surfaced, unconscious, after a dive. He was dead on arrival at a North Carolina hospital to which he was flown by Marine Corps helicopter. Atlee said he apparently died of a massive air embolism resulting from surfacing too quickly from the dive.

The victim had been active in Fire Department work 14 years, first as a volunteer and later as a career fireman. At the time of his death he was also emergency medical technician with the department.

Davis was presented the Firefighter of the Year award in 1982 when he returned to active duty after suffering a serious injury several months earlier. Born Dec. 22, 1955, he was the son of Sylvia Helen Davis and a grandson of Mrs. Lucille Davis and the late Dick Davis. He was a graduate of Prestonsburg High School and was a member of the First (Irene Cole Memorial) Baptist Church here and the Civil Air Patrol.

Prestonsburg firemen will form an honor guard at the Floyd Funeral Home, Tuesday and today (Wednesday) and at the funeral at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow (Thursday) at the First Baptist Church. The Revs. W.D. 4-H Puppy Project To Help The Blind

Puppies and kids. The two just naturally go together. Almost every child has a pet at one time or another.

Rodney Farmer, 14, Manchester, Ky., just got a black Labrador Retriever puppy. You might think, "So what, lots of kids get puppies." But this boy and dog have a very special relationship.

Rodney, a 4-Her, and his dog, Silks, are part of the Pilot Dogs, Inc. guide dog training project.

Under the project, a youngster receives a puppy from the foundation and spends a year raising and training it. When the dog reaches 12-14 months of age, the child will return it to Pilot Dogs, Inc. where the dog will receive 3-4 months of extensive guide dog training.

Rodney found out about the program through an article his eighth grade teacher at Manchester Elementary School read to the class from a women's magazine. "She said it would be nice if someone in the room would want to do this," said Rodney.

He was interested in the program as a 4-H dog project.

"Mom wasn't too thrilled about the idea at first, but after two or three weeks, my stepdad and I talked her in to it," said Rodney.

Mrs. Shafter Bowling, Rodney's mother, remembered, "I was a little bit reserved but the program is a good idea. It is a sacrifice for the whole family, but it is a worthwhile project. I'm a little worried about him having to give Silks up," she added, "but it is a good growing experience for a child. It teaches responsibility."

Rodney confided, "At first I didn't think I'd get too attached to Silks, but I've gotten attached to him a whole lot. I just have to keep in mind that I've raised a seeing eye dog," he said. "I'll be glad as long as he gets a good owner."

Pilot Dogs required that Rodney have a fenced-in back yard and a place for the puppy to run and play.

"Silks sleeps beside me and I feed him three meals a day," said the 4-H'er. "I spend one hour a day training Silks and one hour playing with him. I teach him to walk on a leash, sit, roll over and beg. I also have to housebreak him," explained Rodney.

"We're having some problems getting him housebroken," said Mrs. Bowling. "That will be our biggest accomplishment."

Rodney's whole family has gotten involved with the project. His brother and three stepsisters play with Silks, and his grandfather is going to help with the obedience training.

The 4-Her keeps monthly records of Silks' height and weight, and at the end of the training period he will fill out a report on the dog.

Once a dog goes back to the foundation and completes training, Pilot Dogs will notify the 4-Her of the successful completion of the project. The youngster will also have the opportunity to visit the dog's new owner and will receive a picture of the dog and his new master.

If the dog cannot pass the extensive training, it is offered back to the breeder or the 4-Her volunteer who raised it.

Pilot Dogs, Inc., located in Columbus, Ohio, was founded in 1950. Since then about 2,000 dogs have been placed with blind recipients. The non-profit organization gives the dogs to blind people who are deemed mentally and physically capable of using an animal.

The dogs came from donations and Pilot Dogs' breeding stock. The child is expected to housebreak the puppy, teach it to leash lead, enroll it in an obedience training course and provide the puppy with ample opportunities to be around unfamiliar people, such as in shopping centers and traffic.

The foundation supplies the 4-Her with a leash, choker collar, brush and combs. Pilot Dogs also will pay the obedience school fee and any veterinarian bills that may arise.

Pilot Dogs trains five breeds: German Shepherd, Boxer, Doberman Pinscher, Labrador Retriever and Vizsla. Female dogs are preferred because, on the average, they have tended to be more interested in the work and relate better to families.

Census Survey Here Seeks Statistics On Childbearing

The U.S. Bureau of the Census will conduct its regular survey on employment and unemployment in this area during the week of June 18-23, according to Joseph S. Harris, director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Charlotte, N.C.

In addition to the usual questions on employment and unemployment the June survey will have questions on childbearing. The information obtained will be used to determine how increased or decreased numbers of births at specified periods in the past have altered the nation's population composition.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 71,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the nation.

For example, in April 1984 the survey indicated that of the 113.2 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 104.4 million were employed. The nation's unemployment rate remained at 7.8 percent.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals. 6-13-2t.

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# Dangers in The Diet Game

Americans seem never to relent in their search for a pill or potion that will allow them to lose weight effortlessly. And hucksters seem never to run out of new products surrounded with glowing promises.

Dr. Darlene Forester, Extension food and nutrition specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, says one of the latest in the unending line

of questionable weight-loss products to hit the market in Kentucky is dehydroepi-androsterone.

While many purported weight-loss products simply don't work, some of them—and DHEA is among them—are potentially dangerous drugs, Forester said.

"DHEA belongs to a group of chemical compounds called steroid hormones. These are extremely powerful drugs and can produce serious effects when taken even in minuscule amounts," Forester said.

DHEA occurs naturally in the body, as do the other steroid hormones, but its functions are not fully understood. There have been only a few studies of its effects on humans.

The weight-loss claims for DHEA appear to be based upon studies on a type of mouse bred to be fat. When given high doses of DHEA the mice did not gain weight as they normally would have, Forester said. And the DHEA did not kill the mice.

Despite the fact that the study did not address the matter of reducing weight already gained, or the question of long-term effects of high doses of DHEA, some promoters now claim that DHEA will cause weight loss in humans, and that it is safe.

Further studies to determine how DHEA prevented weight gain in the mice showed that the mice's bodies were not manufacturing normal amounts of a chemical called nicotinamide adenine dinucleotide phosphate.

NADPH is a compound necessary for the formation of fat. It is also necessary for the formation of DNA and RNA, the chemicals of heredity and protein production.

Changes in the quantities, qualities and time of manufacture of either DNA or RNA could be fatal, according to Dr. James A. Lowell, a professor of life and health sciences at Pima Community College in Tucson, Ariz.

"Also, since DNA is involved, the possibility exists that improper doses of DHEA could cause birth defects," Lowell has written.

NADPH is also used by the body to help break down alcohol and barbiturates.

"Thus a depressed level of NADPH caused by taking DHEA could possibly result in death, by preventing the detoxification of this dangerous combination of drugs," Lowell said.

Forester said there is a basic tenet of science which holds that no drug is considered safe or effective until it has been clearly demonstrated to be so.

"Without such proof and in the face of inadequate testing and understanding of its functions in the body, we can only speculate about any effects DHEA may have," Forester said.

"Not only is there evidence to suggest that DHEA may be dangerous, there doesn't appear to be any good evidence that it will help people lose weight," Forester said.

Spring Rains Reduced Forest Fire Losses But Damage Heavy

Fourteen thousand acres of Kentucky's forest land were damaged during this spring's forest fire season, Donald A. Hamm, director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry said last week.

"From March 1 to May 15, the official spring forest fire season, there were 1,076 forest fires reported in Kentucky. This figure is nearly 300 less than during the same period last year," Hamm said.

"We attribute this decrease to three factors—favorable weather conditions, increased fire prevention activity and increased law enforcement," he said. During the 10-week fire season 438 citations were issued by Forestry personnel for various violations of forest fire laws.

"Favorable weather conditions allowed our firefighters to keep the average fire size to 13 acres," Hamm said. "This is a decrease of more than six acres from last spring's averages," he noted.

Forestry officials said that much of the decrease in individual fire acreage was the direct result of frequent rains which kept the materials on the forest floor from drying out and becoming fuel for the fire as quickly as usual.

Even with the favorable conditions and the decrease in acreage size and occurrence rate, forest fires this spring caused a \$28 million loss to the future economy of the state. "This figure includes the loss in lower stumpage prices, wages and rough lumber prices—all of which is directly attributable to the fires," Hamm said.

Forestry statistics show that more than one-third of the spring forest fires were caused by escaping trash fires, another third from arson, or deliberately set fires and a remaining third by a combination of causes which include careless smoking. "But all of these were caused by the actions of people, whether intentionally or not, and could often have been avoided if more care of caution had been used."

## Kentucky's New DUI Laws: A Sobering Experience

 On July 13, Kentucky implements a law aimed at stiffening the penalties for persons arrested and convicted of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. This law was passed by the 1984 Kentucky General Assembly and represents several years of hard work by a number of dedicated legislators and organizations from across the state such as Mothers Against Drunken Driving, The Governor's Task Force on Drunken Driving, and other Kentuckians who have come to realize that this critical issue continues to plague all of us.

Study after study indicates that people cannot handle excess alcohol consumption and still drive, that driving skills are significantly diminished after the blood concentration level reaches .10 percent, and yet studies also show that Americans still believe that it is acceptable to drink and drive, that "they can handle it."

The national statistics deny this belief. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in 1981 alone, there were more than 25,000 persons killed and another 50,000 maimed from alcohol-related accidents. NHTSA also cited statistics which indicate that alcohol is a factor in at least 50 percent of all fatal motor vehicle accidents.

The passage of this new law may not immediately stop the deaths, but perhaps it will encourage Kentuckians to stop and think before they get behind the wheel; those who "think they can handle it" might review these consequences before they drive:

—After July 13, if you are arrested and convicted for the first time for driving under the influence, you will receive a fine of \$200-\$500 and could spend 48 hours to 30 days in jail. You will spend at least 48 hours in jail if you physically injure another person. You will lose your license for 30 days if you agree to take an alcohol education or treatment program; six months if you don't. And you will pay for the program yourself. Under the old law, you were fined \$100-\$500 and more than likely did not spend time in jail.

—For the second offense, you used to be fined \$100-\$500 and received a sentence of three days to six months in jail, but you often received probation. Now you will be fined \$350-\$500 and spend a minimum of seven days in jail and could be sentenced to as much as six months. However, those seven days are nonsuspendable. You will spend them in jail. You could also lose your license for a year and you must attend a treatment program—again, to be paid for out of your pocket.

—For the third offense, you used to be fined \$100-\$500 and a sentence of 30 days

to one year in jail. After July 13, you will be fined at least \$500 that cannot be suspended and 30 days to one year in jail. Anything less than 30 days cannot be suspended. You will also lose your license for two years.

After July 13, these new DUI laws will truly be a sobering experience for many Kentuckians. They are tough, enforceable and designed to make drivers think twice before combining driving and drinking. I urge you to give these new laws some serious thought before you get behind the wheel—not after you get behind bars.

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**STAR TREK III: THE SEARCH FOR SPOCK**, (PG-PARAMOUNT PICTURES) Starring William Shatner, DeForest Kelley and James Doohan. ★ ★ ★

At the end of "Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan" there was no question that Spock was dead. Or was there? True, the pointy-eared Vulcan lay still in his coffin, yet Captain Kirk was wondering about Genesis and life from lifelessness and other such concepts of which sequels are made.

As soon as Paramount announced that "Star Trek III" would be titled "The Search for Spock," "Star Trek" fans everywhere entertained little doubt that the much-beloved Mr. Spock would somehow once again be "energized." Exactly how or when will not be divulged here, but suffice to say that Trekkies will not be disappointed.

One of the great pitfalls movie makers must deal with in reviving the dead is that the plot could easily end up being little more than sloppy metaphysical mumbo jumbo. That was essentially the problem with the first "Star Trek" film. Spock and Kirk were talking philosophy of life and evolution while the audience wanted to hear Kirk's commands "fire phasers, hard aport, ready

photon torpedoes" instead. Those pitfalls have been deftly avoided in "Star Trek III" with a fine script that allows for plenty of action as well as a not-too-implausible resurrection.

Christopher Lloyd ("Taxi"), is Kirk's Klingon opponent, out to capture the secret of Genesis. His wrath is not nearly that of Khan's, but he still creates plenty of heat for the Enterprise and crew.

Occasionally, a few loopholes you could drive a starship through crop up in the plot, but most "Star Trek" fans are a very forgiving lot. The special effects are all one might hope for without being intrusive, and Leonard Nimoy's direction keeps the film moving at a nice pace. Yet even Nimoy cannot curb William Shatner's overacting, and in that he is not alone.

Does Spock really return? We're not telling, but one thing's for sure — two other characters meet their doom in this film, and so there's little doubt that "Star Trek IV" is on its way.

## Butcher To Head Athletic Program

Paul Butcher, a 26-year leader at Pikeville College through athletics as well as teaching, has accepted the position of director of athletics, beginning with the 1984-85 season, according to Dr. Jackson O. Hall, president of the College.

"I am really excited that Paul has agreed to become director of athletics at the college," Dr. Hall began. "His involvement in our varsity athletic program over so many years will give him important insights that I am positive will be of enormous benefit to the coaches, the players and the entire program. I could not be more pleased."

Butcher is a legend in his own time at Pikeville College. During his 26 years as physical education instructor, he has also served as baseball coach 23 years, basketball coach 11, as well as heading the athletic program as director from 1967-72.

After graduating from Meade Memorial in Johnson County in 1941 as an all-State basketball player, he was chosen to play in the Kentucky-Indiana all-Star Game in Indianapolis, Indiana, which highlighted his high school career.

He then spent the following 41 months in the U.S. Army. Upon being discharged, he enrolled in classes at Pikeville College. After graduating in 1951 with a two year teaching certificate, he continued his education and was awarded an A.B. degree in physical education at Morehead State University in 1953. He then completed graduate work at the University of Kentucky to earn his M.A. degree in 1963.

Butcher's first experience in the coaching profession came during the 1950-51 season at the Pikeville Academy. He led his basketball team to the Academy's first, and only, district tournament championship. His high school coaching career at the Academy and Meade Memorial totaled 212 wins and 78 losses.

Looking back on his 23 years as baseball coach at Pikeville College, Butcher remembers two players in particular who were stand-outs at the college in the early 1960s. "Paul Setser and Raymond Ricketts were the best combination to play Pikeville College baseball. One would catch the first game while the other one pitched, and vice versa in the second game. One year we lost only one game with this combination. We won the conference a couple of years in the early 1960s and finished second three years in a row in the early 1970s."

Butcher wasn't limited to a talent in baseball (he was recruited to play for the Pittsburgh Pirates after he was discharged from the army, and his father, Beecher Butcher, was also recruited to play professional baseball) because he was also coach of the basketball team at Pikeville College for 11 years.

"I came from a basketball playing family of seven brothers and four sisters. The girls were tough basketball players. Any time teams were picked,



the girls always were chosen first. They were better than some of the boys."

He began as coach of the Pikeville College basketball team during the 1959-60 season and stayed there eight years. He stepped down from that position for awhile and later came back for three more years.

Some of the outstanding players during Butcher's reign were Donnis Butcher, brother, an all-American, all-K.I.A.C. player for three years; Vernon Woods, Bill Woolfer, George Carroll, Paul Setser, Terry Epling and Steve Butcher, nephew.

Butcher led his teams to three K.I.A.C. wins and three district finals where they were beaten in the games that would have advanced them to Kansas City. He was twice named coach of the year.

Butcher is excited about returning as athletic director, especially since he has spent the better part of his life involved with sporting events. "It is important that we involve the college community, as well as the Pikeville community, in the athletic program at Pikeville College. With the support of this institution interjecting into the community and the area high schools, we can help our basketball teams move back into a winning tradition."

As athletic director, Butcher's primary responsibilities will include coordinating the schedule of the gymnasium, preparing and supervising the budgets, administering all athletic policies, and promoting inter-collegiate athletics.

He and his wife Doris are the parents of three daughters, Paula Butcher Ratliff, Susie Butcher Stanley and Ruth Ann Butcher Moore.

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
