## DATES FOR TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS ARE SET

The 1931 teachers' examinations will be held May 28 and 29 and July 10. Questions on Theory and Practice will be based on Kentucky school laws and Schedule 23 of Elementary School Subjects, issued by the State Department of Education.

The Kentucky statutes provide that those who have not held a certificate in Kentucky prior to 1927 must present 12 credit units of high school credits for the May examination and 12 for July. Applicants must bring a transcript of their high school record, when making the examination.

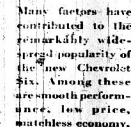


