SIX YEAR MOLARS

The first permanent tooth to make its appearance in the mouth, according to a recent statement by the U. S. Public Health Service, is the six-year molar. This tooth comes through the gums just back of the last temporary tooth on each side of the jaw. It usually makes its appearance at about the sixth year and is often mistaken for a temporary tooth and many times allowed to decay because of the belief that it will soon be removed anyway.

This permanent tooth was partly formed even before the child was born. Every single factor which had any influence on the health or nutrition of this child during the first four or five years of his life is reflected in the development of this tooth. The diet of the mother before the child was born, her health during the nursing period, the child's health and ability to assimilate his food, feeding early, childhood, all have an important bearing on the quality and location of this tooth. Teeth are made of lime, phosphorus and magnesium. These are the bones of the child, and if these were not supplied, he would be weak. It will be reflected in the development of the child as well as in his temporary and permanent teeth. The child's diet and his ability to properly assimilate food will determine to a very great extent whether the enamel which should protect the tooth will be hard and properly formed or if a soft, hampered, more or less broken and subtle decay.

Any sickness of childhood during these early years before this permanent tooth has erupted is usually the cause of some imperfection in the enamel. Measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria, smallpox, chickenpox, in fact nearly any of the so-called childhood diseases leave their imprint upon this six-year molar and many times disfigure it to such an extent that it is extremely difficult to keep it free from

and the six-year molar comes in too crowded. If it is going to seriously crowd the positions of all the teeth that are to come in front of it. Some of them may come in twisted sideways or overlap the teeth next to them and the mouth will have a unsightly, crowded appearance. This may not seem of importance, but it seriously handicaps the whole balance or equilibrium of the mouth, and although the teeth of the lower and upper jaws only meet when the mouth is closed, it has caused what dentists call malocclusion, because the teeth do not fit properly one against the other.

In later years this may help to cause serious diseases. If the soft tissue of the mouth because, due to the irregularities of the teeth, they cannot easily be kept clean, or because certain teeth stick together with force applied in the wrong direction.

HAVE YOU A BABY?

If you want your baby to stay well and strong, if you want carefully and practice the following simple rules, especially during the warm summer months.

SUMMER COMPLAINT IS THE CAUSE OF MORE DEATHS IN CHILDREN UNDER TWO YEARS OF AGE THAN ANY OTHER DISEASE. SUMMER COMPLAINT IS CAUSED BY IMPROPER FEEDING OR ALLOWING THE CHILD TO HAVE POISON IN ITS STOMACH OR NOT DRESS.

IF YOU WANT YOUR BABY TO STAY WELL AND STRONG:

Nurse your baby regularly every three hours, a the clock, 6, 9, 12, 3, 6 and 9 a. m. from birth until the fourth month, then every four hours, 12, 2, 4, 6, 8, 10.

DO NOT give baby anything but mother's milk, except a little water. **DON'T** give your baby sweets of any kind, as sugar, candy, syrup, cakes, **DO NOT** feed your baby **GREEN** or **RAW** fruits of any kind, as peaches, apples, bananas, whole grapes, plums, etc. Give orange juice in water, daily, after the third month.

DON'T let the baby sleep in a bed with any one. Put him in a box or basket bed or kiddie camp of his own. **DON'T** let your baby suck his thumb or pacifier or anything else, but his food. **DON'T** rock or hold your baby.

Leave him in his bed quietly.

DON'T let flies get on your baby. They bring sickness. Cover him with mosquito net.

No baby should have breast milk after ONE year. Ask your doctor how to feed the baby the right kind of food. If there is no doctor, ask your county health department.

DON'T get hot. If possible, avoid it when nursing your baby.

DON'T let your baby nurse every time it cries; leave him quietly in bed until he is asleep.

If your baby cries, frequently and is not gaining, consult your doctor. If you have not enough milk for your baby consult your doctor.

If your baby vomits or has diarrhea, stop all food. Do exactly as your doctor tells you.

See that your baby gets plenty of cool water between feedings.

Keep your baby clean and cool. Always dress according to the weather.

If your baby is bottle fed, boil bottles after each feeding, wash bottles and keep in a soda water.

SENSELINE and all are as necessary for the growth of your baby as it is for the growth of flowers.

WEIGHT your baby at least once a month. Visit your family doctor or your county child health conference to keep your baby well.

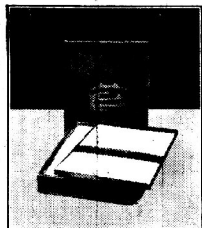

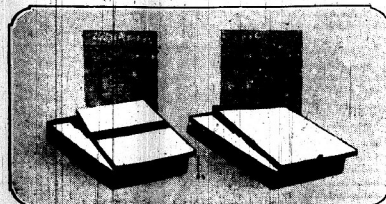
