 Seiler will be reported to enforcing agencies.

Judge Layman in appointing Mr. Seiler as chief compliance officer of the NIRA, stressed the qualifications and experience of Mr. Seiler, who has long been associated with labor welfare movements in the state. As a representative of the International Association of Machinists, he was appointed state labor director in 1924. Under his direction the scope of the Labor Department was expanded and its functions enlarged until the department gained national recognition. He is a graduate of the Jefferson School of Law and has taken special work in economic and industrial relations at the University of Louisville. He was appointed state director of the National Re-Employment Service in Kentucky in 1933, at the inception of the service, and organized a state-wide service that has been an important agency in the application of the recovery program in Kentucky.

In recognition of his work in Kentucky, Mr. Seiler has been elected vice-president of the Association of Environmental Officials in Industry. He is also a member of the American Legion and assistant division adjutant of the Third-Eldest division, Kentucky National Guard.

thing has been made. The time is clearly drawn. Shall public offices be maintained to provide jobs, or to give value received to the people who pay the tax bill?

The summary of county bills enacted into law follows:

**1. COUNTY BUDGET BILL.**—Provides for a uniform budget system for all counties and establishes a budget commission in each county composed of the county judge, county attorney, and one citizen holding no other public office. The commission shall classify all expenditures of county funds to separate budget units, the total of which shall not exceed anticipated revenues. Liability is fixed upon each member of the commission for any expenditure in excess of the budget amount. Other important features are:

(a) Publication of the budget at least 10 days before its adoption.  
(b) Right of any taxpayer to petition the budget commission and request court with respect to any item of the budget before its adoption.  
(c) Installation of a uniform accounting system by the state budget office at county expense.  
(d) The appropriation ledger, the treasurer's books, and all fiscal court orders relating to expenditures shall be open to the inspection of any taxpayer at any reasonable time.

(e) Sinking fund protected and provision made for the orderly redemption of bonds and floating indebtedness.  
(f) Penalties provided for violation of the act, and enforcement placed in hands of state inspector and examiner.

**2. COUNTY INSPECTION BILL.**—Provides that the state inspector and examiner shall inspect and examine once a year the books, accounts and official papers of all county officers receiving and disbursing public moneys belonging to the counties. (1) present he is entitled to examine only the records pertaining to the collection and disbursement of state tax money handled by county officials. This new state law will reveal among other things, the exact amount of fees collected by the sheriff, county clerk, auditor, assessor, and other officials. (2) the state inspector will examine the official returns of the officials themselves who benefit by the fees. This measure will offset to some extent the loss of our bill abolishing the fee system.

**3. JAILERS' BILLS.**—Consolidates the office of jailer with that of sheriff in all counties, effective at the expiration of the terms of the jailers now in office. The saving will be the difference in compensation paid a deputy sheriff as compared to the jailer, and the compensation of the present jailers, who are entitled under the constitution to keep for themselves an amount up to \$5,000 a year. Under the new county budget law, the salary of the jailer position will have to be shown in the budget which will be published in a post newspaper, thus localizing and fixing responsibility close at home.

**4. TRUSTEE OF JURY FUND.**—Abolishes the jury fund and the office of trustee of the jury fund, and provides for the payment of jurors by the circuit court clerk.

**5. FISCAL YEAR-OF-COUNTIES.**—Enables counties to operate more nearly on a cash basis by providing that the fiscal year shall begin July 1, after the bulk of the tax money is paid in, instead of being the same as the calendar year as at present.

**Quartz Is Slow to Melt**

Even in 'Hottest Flames' Quartz is one of the most difficult to melt of all materials, says Canada News Bulletin. It softens and forms a glass only in the hottest of flames.

Such quartz spiral balances are used at the Forest Products Laboratories of Canada, Department of the Interior, by workers in the pulp and paper division, Montreal, for the investigation of the relationship between water and paper-making pulps. The quartz is melted into a flame of oxygen and acetylene and drawn into long threads about the thickness of a hair. By the aid of a somewhat less intense flame, these threads are cooled and solidified, springs about half an inch in diameter. Encased in glass apparatus from which air is removed, they make possible the weighing to extreme accuracy of small samples of pulp. The extension of the quartz spring, read by a small telescope to an accuracy of one-thousandth of an inch, indicates the weight of the sample suspended on it.

## Natural Ice Caves

Another large European ice cave is the Kolowrat cave near Salzburg, Austria. Probably the best-known ice cave in this country is the one at Coopersport, Pa., but others have been found in Iowa, South Dakota, Michigan, etc. There are subterranean dwellings known also as earth lodges or souterrains, in many parts of Europe as well as in this country; it is probable that some of these are still in use as dwellings.

## Tassel Growing

One of the curious crops grown in England and in Europe is the tassel. The tassel is used for raising the nap on the best cloth and blankets, no machinery having been invented that answers the purpose so well. Tassels are the flower heads of the plant of that name, and are very prickly, having long straight bristles all over them. The cultivation of the plant has been carried on for centuries chiefly in Somerset and Gloucestershire. The journey to the Yorkshire tassel used to take as long as a week or ten days in olden times and was a dangerous undertaking owing to the footpads who infested the highways.

## Origin of Knives and Forks

In those days the knives were used as forks; and it was only in Tudor times, when the snobbish ruffians were then made to discard their knives, that the fork came into vogue. It took centuries to develop the modern fork.

The product was a fruit, of which there was so great a surplus that the product could not be humanly consumed. It was a beverage which, in one state, was called the delicate palate and light heads of women and children, while in another it became a sort of Villain's banquet.

So characteristic of America was this drink that it became the symbol of a Presidential campaign. William Henry Harrison, who, incidentally, came from the very heart of Applesauce John's domain, was swept to victory on a hard-fought platform—Washington Star.

## Lightship Placed Where

## SAYS COAL INDUSTRY THREATENED BY POWER

Chicago, Ill., March 21.—Information furnished by the United States Senate, showing that 40,000 miners and thousands of railroad employees and others dependent on the coal industry will be forced into the ranks of the unemployed was given out here today by the National Job, Housing and Investment Protection Bureau for the Coal Industry.

The information was contained in a bulletin, issued by the National Coal Association, quoting from a speech made by Senator Jesse H. Metcalf, of Rhode Island, in which Senator Metcalf stated that not only would the coal industry be threatened by the governmental program, but also this would cause distress for 150,000 men, women and children.

"Our drift toward federal financing of hydro-electric power is having a real electric effect, and that is the damage which is being done to the coal industry," said Senator Metcalf.

Senator Metcalf, in this way, called the attention of the Senate to the uneconomic hydro-electric program of the administration in Washington.

Senator Metcalf stated that the hydro-electric power developments of the government will displace 65,000,000 kilowatt hours. "We must assume that the production of electric energy by water power will displace a similar amount of energy which would ordinarily be produced by coal and steam turbines," said Senator Metcalf. "It is estimated that an average of one and four-tenths pounds of coal is consumed in the production of one kilowatt hour in a coal and steam plant. This would mean that the hydro-electric developments of the United States government will displace the use of about 65,000,000 pounds of coal annually. I have no estimate that one mine is needed for the production of 1,000 tons of coal per year. On this basis the United States government will be responsible for the unemployment of forty thousand miners each year. This would mean distress for over 150,000 men, women and children.

"Such a tremendous spread on the gaspings of coal not only would have a disastrous effect upon the coal industry itself but would cause an unemployment problem among the mine workers of much importance. The whole country would feel the effect of it through decreased income to the railroads and to the mine operators themselves."

## R. M. A. URGED TO CONTINUE ITS TAX FIGHT

W. Reed Embury, president of the Retail Merchants' Association, today urged Louisville merchants to carry united opposition against a sales tax into the special session of the Legislature anticipated in April.

Speaking at the close of a dinner meeting at the Brown hotel, Mr. Embury said the business administration would have passed a sales tax at the committee investigating lobbying with a regular session if it could have got enough votes. The merchants, Mr. Embury said, still have the pledges

of the same Representatives who stood as a barrier against a sales tax at the regular session.

Dora E. Cross, vice-president of the Bellknap Hardware & Manufacturing Company, discussed experience of his firm in its business relations with retail merchants in the states.

"Business is getting better," Mr. Cross said, as he cited numerous indications of recovery in the hardware trade. The depression hit low in July, 1932, Mr. Cross said, and the business since then has been on the incline.

Mr. Cross charged the legislative committee investigating lobbying with inviting him and other officials of the Kentucky Retail Merchants' Association before it for the purpose of

intimidating them.

"I was in Florida," Mr. Embury said, "trying to keep away from the whole mess. I wasn't sick. I was down there for pleasure. The committee sent me a most insulting telegram, demanding my presence before it. They knew that I was without their jurisdiction, and I know they wanted me to refuse so they could spread the word that Reed Embury had disappeared with all records of the Association. So I came back and went before them."

Out of all its labors, Mr. Embury charged, the committee produced only one fact—that the merchants had paid Congressman John Young Brown \$500 expense for a trip to Washington and return.

"If standing up for the taxpayers of Kentucky is treason," Mr. Embury said, "let the bright young men of the committee make the most of it. If paying \$500 to John Young Brown for expenses to Washington to see Harry Hopkins on a relief matter is debauching the legislature, we plead guilty to the charge."

"It has come to pass in Frankfort," the speaker said, "that taxpayers can't be represented in the Capitol, but favored lobbyists can be represented to the fullest extent. This is the first time I have known that citizens and taxpayers have been questioned their right to ask their so-called representatives how they stand on legislation."

"After all," Mr. Embury said, "it is the taxpayer who will foot the bill if a sales tax or any other tax is passed. The merchants could stand a sales tax, if one were necessary. The consumers could stand it if a sales tax were passed up to them, and don't let anybody tell you it won't be passed."

"Our contention is that a sales tax is not necessary," he continued. "We don't believe any additional tax is necessary. Let those fellows at Frankfort do what business has had to do—live within their income by cutting out waste and reducing expenses. I am in favor of compelling the people who run this state to reduce expenses. I say compel them to reduce. They have raised the cost of government from \$18,000,000 to \$42,000,000 in 12 years. The more money you give them, the more money they will squander."

Reduction of the real estate tax, estimated to dip \$2,000,000 from the state revenue annually, is a fallacy, Mr. Embury charged. The reduction on an average farm worth \$3,000 will be only \$5 a year, he said, whereas the proposed sales tax on \$500 worth of goods the farmer must purchase every year would amount to \$10.

"Thus, as a matter of fact, this farmer's tax would be raised 100 per cent," Mr. Embury said. "They propose to trade this \$3,000,000 worth of real estate tax for \$12,000,000 in a sales tax. Who you put that much money in the hands of unscrupulous politicians and it's like pouring it down a rat hole."

Mr. Embury said it's time "to look for a nigger in the woodpile" every time the legislature does something for the farmer. As to the proposed "trade of \$3,000,000 in real estate taxes for \$12,000,000 in a sales tax,"

Mr. Embury said the politicians at Frankfort "consider themselves out for four."
