## POSSEMAN KILLED BY SHOTGUN FIRE

Insurance Man, Well-Known Here, First Fired Upon by Morgan Ambushers

After firing upon J. R. Bolen, Lexington, special representative of the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company, who is well-known in this county and in Knott county where he was born and reared three brigades are alleged to have shot and fatally wounded a member of a Morgan county posse Wednesday night, last week, at (White Oak, Ky.).

The slain man, Holly Wright, West Liberty taxi driver, was fired upon, shortly after Bolen had escaped a rain of shot Wednesday night, and went to West Liberty where he called upon the Sheriff for a search for his unknown assailants. Returning to White Oak in an auto with five other possemen, Wright was fatally shot. Benny Patrick, Morgan county deputy sheriff, was wounded. Wright died on the following day.

Bolen found the highway barricaded approximately six miles south of West Liberty. The shots fired at him inflicted only a slight wound, most of which was caused by flying glass. A bus, which passed the spot shortly afterward, had

A gun battle in the darkness followed the fatal wounding of Wright. Sam O. Griffith, about 22 years old, of White Oak, is under arrest, charged with participation in the shooting. Mr. Bolen said here Tuesday, Clint Elam and Chet Griffith are sought for his companions on the night of the shooting.

## REGISTRATION FOR WORK NECESSARY

All unemployed persons who wish to qualify for assignment to public works employment are required to register with the National Re-employment Service, W. A. Peterman, Pikeville, district manager, 11th NRS district, said this week.

Persons who wish to register for possible employment on public works or assignment to private industry should present themselves to the re-employment office, Pikeville, located on the third floor of the courthouse, or write Mr. Peterman at Pikeville, who will arrange to have them properly registered.

Qualified veterans with dependents are given preference in all work assignments on public works. Veterans who intend to establish their preferential qualifications should bring or send their discharge papers or other satisfactory documents of evidence of their service.

Those who have registered with the National Reemployment Service at any place in the state of Kentucky since October, 1933, do not have to register, but should notify the National Reemployment office at Pikeville if still interested in locating work.

## MARTIN COUNTY COUPLE KILLED

Stranded Husband Shoots Former Wife and Escort to Death Sunday

Paintsville, Ky., April 21—The fatal shooting of a man and woman on their way to church near Davisport, in Martin county, allegedly by her estranged husband, was reported to Johnson county officers here tonight.

Bud Delong, 23 years old, died this afternoon while he was being brought to the Golden Rule hospital here. Mrs. Minnie Pack, about 30 years old, died a short while after she was shot about 10 o'clock this morning, as she walked along a road to the Trace Fork United Baptist Church.

Martin county officers were reported searching for Bill Pack, the woman's husband, who recently returned to Davisport after an absence of several months. Pack was sought in the slaying, after Betz Delong, father of Bud Delong, said his son shortly before he died, named Pack as the man who did the shooting.

The woman, a daughter of James Arthur Davisport, was shot in the forehead. Delong was shot in the back and chest, according to Dr. W. R. Castle and Dr. J. A. Wells, who examined the body at the hospital here.

Dr. Castle said a report to night that Martin county officers had arrested Pack could not be confirmed because there were no phone connections at Inez, the county seat.

## SAYS SHOT THRU LUNG ACCIDENTAL

Dennis Hall, of McDowell, Seriously Wounded at Martin Monday Night

Dennis Hall, 23 years old, is in the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, seriously wounded by a .32-caliber revolver bullet which he says was accidentally fired Monday night, through his right lung. He will recover, it was said at the hospital Wednesday morning.

Hall, a son of "Buddy" Hall, McDowell merchant, was quoted at the hospital as saying that he could not explain exactly how the shot was fired. The shooting took place at Martin.

The wounded man in September, 1932, shot through the door of his father's store, which he was guarding after a series of burglaries, and killed a man named Newberry who, it was alleged, was attempting to break into the store. He was absolved of all blame for the shooting.

## 4 HELD IN SIFT OF PIKE KILLING

Two Sons of Tom Hopkins, Victim, Arrested in Yeager Affray

Pikeville, Ky., April 21—Basil Roberts, Willie Hopkins, Ted Hopkins and Garland Smith are being held in jail here pending investigation of the shooting and killing of Tom Hopkins at Yeager, Ky., yesterday afternoon. After the shooting Roberts came here and surrendered to Deputy Jailer J. C. Stewart.

Stewart said Roberts told him that he shot Hopkins after Hopkins threatened to cut his throat and started toward him with a knife. He said Hopkins had been in Pikeville yesterday, he said, and on his way back home he overtook Hopkins near the mouth of Little Creek. Hopkins was drinking, he said, and was having trouble with his sons, Will and Ted. He said Hopkins had not been speaking, he said, but when he met them, he declared Hopkins threatened to kill him. He wanted Hopkins to go on, he said, and fired four shots after Hopkins had attempted to within a few feet of him with knife in hand.

Roberts married a sister of Hopkins, Miss Belle Hopkins, who died a few years ago. Hopkins was 48 years old. He was convicted, Pike circuit court a few years ago on a charge of burning the residence of "Bat" Porter at Yeager. After he was indicted he shot and killed Porter. He was acquitted in the killing and convicted on a charge of shooting.

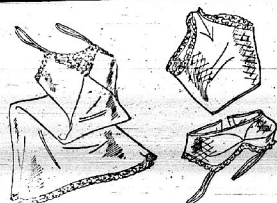

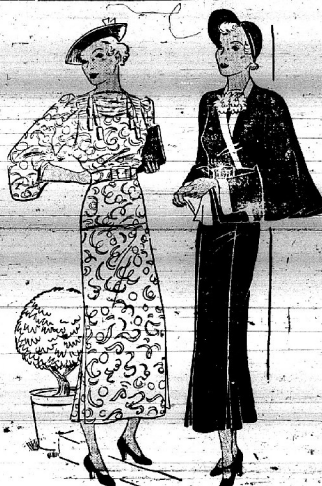

#### Big Sandy Region As Kentucky's Rock Gardens

Western Kentucky has its lagoons and beautiful sunsets. Central Kentucky has its beautiful bluegrass farms that look like well-kept lawns. And Eastern Kentucky, with its rivers, valleys, hillsides and its great variety of trees, shrubs, and wildflowers that, if allowed, would form a great show of bloom from March to the end of November, is Kentucky's wildflower and rock garden. And it could and should be the loveliest natural gardens in America.

Let's make it so! I appeal especially to the farmers and to those who own land along the highways to keep what you have of nature's growing beauty and add to it instead of thinning out. For this luxurious growth along our roads and hillsides is our greatest drawing card for tourists.

If any part of the United States is so uninteresting as to be shunned by the motorist, it is in a position to lose both financially and spiritually. For everywhere the motorist goes, he leaves money and pleasant contacts.

If our roadsides and hills continue to become bare, this section will soon be a barren, ugly-looking that motorists will choose other routes to travel.

## Brother of John Young Brown Held in Slayings

Marion, Ky., April 20.—Critenden county officers today pressed their investigation of the "mystery murder" of an aged couple, while Martin Brown, 30-year-old brother of former Congressman John Young Brown, was held in jail without bond in the case. He is scheduled to have an examining trial in county court Monday.

The affidavit accompanying the murder warrant was signed by Orville Yates, 35, son of the slain couple, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Yates, whose charred bodies were found in the ashes of their farm home near Sturgis Thursday. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder and said robbery was the motive. Orville Yates said his parents had about \$15,000 in cash, their life savings, hidden in their home.

County Attorney E. D. Stone announced he would confer with Circuit Judge Charles Wilson, of Smithland, and Commonwealth's Attorney Alvin Lisabny, Princeton, to secure a special term of court for Brown's trial next week.

Brown, a resident of Union county, was brought here last night by Sheriff Roy Malcolm, of Critenden county, and Jno. Luttrell, of Union county. County Judge D. H. Postelthwait issued the murder warrant.

The officers indicated evidence against Brown was circumstantial, including a report by a filling station operator that Brown or a man resembling him was excited after the fire, a report by a storekeeper that Brown had purchased a five gallon can of gasoline the day of the fire, and another report, that Brown was seen in a boat on the river about the time of the fire.

Brown is unmarried and lives with his father, Jesse Brown, in Union county. Martin Brown and his brother, Eugene, are under indictment in Jessamine county for grand larceny in connection with the theft of copper wire from an interurban right-of-way.

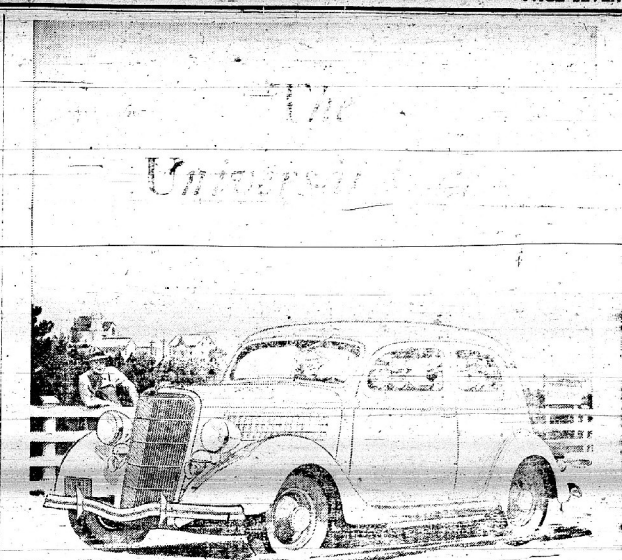

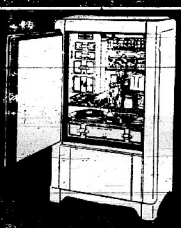

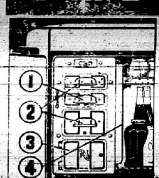

### Virgin Islands Include

Numerous Small Islands

The Virgin group comprises a large number of small islands—only a few of them of any considerable importance—lying to the east of Porto Rico between the Caribbean and the Atlantic ocean. They include not only those which the United States bought from Denmark, and which were formerly known as the Danish West Indies, but also a number which constitute a British colony called the Virgin Islands.

Columbus discovered the group on his second voyage in 1493. It is said he was amazed at the number of them, and feared he would not have enough sailors' names to go round—so he put them under the sacred patronage of the 11,000 martyred virgins of St. Ursula.

Danish traders early established themselves on St. Thomas, and by a sort of squatter sovereignty the island was taken under Danish administration in 1671. St. John and St. Croix and smaller islands were added in 1733. The British, meanwhile, appropriated the rest of the group.

In 1892 the American State department sought to buy the Danish islands. Denmark was willing to sell, and the islanders were eager for the transfer, but the United States senate refused to ratify. In 1902 a second treaty was signed, and the United States was to have the islands for \$25,000,000; but the Danish upper house did not ratify. In 1917 the transfer was finally effected, this country paying \$25,000,000.

### Sea Lion Is Wary of Man

and Hard to Photograph

Living in the wild, reef-protected waters off the coast of British Columbia, the sea lion is extremely wary of man and is practically impossible to photograph at close range. The males are from 15 to 18 feet in length, with 8 to 10 feet, weight from 500 to 2,500 pounds. Females are from 8 to 10 feet in length, average 500 to 800 pounds. The species hunted, says the Montreal Herald, is the Steller's or grey seal, first noted by a Russian of that name, who accompanied Vitus Bering on his ill-fated voyage in 1740.

They dwell on the Virgin Islands, rocky bare reefs rising just a little above the sea level, lying in a triangular-shaped territory of about 45 miles off the coast of British Columbia. Here they rest, breed and have their young, two pups being born to each female about the middle of June.

Enormous as are these beasts, they are inoffensive, and from them the attacking machine-guns and shotguns have little to fear. Only the stormy mother seal strives her best to save her children from these men who give her mercy. The Virgin Islands lie in most dangerous uncharted waters, swept by the north Pacific. Hunting only can be done in fairly quiet water.

### Jealousy Held Vital to Love

Chinese are among the world's worst lovers, declares M. Maurice Dekobra, the French love-story writer, and during his visit in China he has been telling the men how to show their devoted affection. Because the men do not make love properly, he says, the Chinese women are hard and untamed. He likens them to "attractive panthers." They are full of the fighting spirit, quick at repartee and very ready to challenge their menfolk. That, says M. Dekobra, shows the wrong spirit. As lovers the men lack imagination, romance and sentimentality. They make no attempt to understand women and never neglect them after marriage. Moreover, they consider it ungentlemanly to be jealous—and jealousy is necessary to true love, declares Dekobra.

### Radio in Richkash

Shanghai, China, to the city where East meets West and a queer combination of ancient oriental customs and the latest modern fads are part of the everyday life of the city. One of the latest is the installation of radio sets in the jivehous which are the principal means of transportation of the city. The two-wheeled, hand-drawn vehicles have been used for hundreds of years by the wealthier classes of Chinese. The narrow, well-lit streets of the native quarter make any other form of transportation impossible. In China, with its more than 400,000,000 population, man power is the cheapest in the world. It is an incongruous sight to see a coolie hauling his passenger in his ricksha and listening to the strains of a modern dance band.

### Sunshine Kills Rattlesnakes

One ordinary think of a desert rattlesnake as basking in the sun all day long awaiting his prey. Surprisingly, however, direct sunshine quickly kills this cold-blooded reptile. This was proved by members of the Yosemite Field School in Yosemite National park. A specimen rattlesnake was desired for museum exhibit but in a natural unutilized condition. Members of the school, therefore, placed a rattler in an exposed position where he died in convulsions under the direct rays of the sun in 17½ minutes. —Scientific American.

### Sirius, Brightest Star

Sirius, the brightest star in the sky, is one of the earth's nearest star neighbors. Its distance from our globe is a mere 8.6 light years, or 51,000,000,000 miles. Its mass is 2.4 times that of the sun. The mass of the heavy-weight companion of Sirius is only 50 per cent of that of the sun, and it emanates only 1/300th as much light.
