PROMINENT KNOTT
MAN KILLED LAST
WEEK BY OWN GUNIs Decision Reached Following
Investigation Into Death of
Wiley Conley

DEATH HELD ACCIDENTAL

The bullet which killed Wiley Conley, 70-year-old man on Rock Fork Creek, five miles from Garrett, last Tuesday was accidentally fired from his own revolver as he was holstering the weapon under his arm, it was held following an investigation made by Commonwealth's Attorney C. Hall and relatives of the victim.

Mr. Conley, a well-known Knott county man, died two hours after being wounded. The bullet entered the left side of his chest and ranged downward, emerging from his leg.

The shooting took place at the home of Brice Green, about two miles up Rock Fork Creek from the home of Conley, where the aged man had spent the night. While dressing, or when preparing to leave, Thursday morning about 8 o'clock, he was wounded.

Surviving him are his widow and the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Della Collins, of Ohio; Kenneth Conley, Pedro, O.; Mrs. Dollie Chaffins, Chas. W. Maudie Stone, Warrenton, O.

Five brothers and two sisters also survive. Epperson, Morgan, R. L., Elige and Reuben Conley, Mrs. Josie Carpenter, Leander, Ky., and Mrs. Amanda Shepherd, of Royalton.

Funeral rites were conducted Friday by ministers of the Baptist Church, and burial was made in the family cemetery.

RAIN OBLITERATES
ASSASSIN'S TRAILBloodhounds Here Following
Futile Effort To Track
Down Pike Slayer

Mullikin's bloodhounds were taken through Prestonsburg Tuesday morning, returning to Lexington from Elkhorn City where they had been called to attempt to track down the slayer of Palmer Ratliff, 19-year-old miner, who was shot from ambush Monday morning while on his way to work in the mines of the Berryman Coal Company.

A. J. Caywood, who was in charge of the dogs, told The Times that rain during Monday obliterated the scent of Ratliff's slayer. A spot on the hillside where the ground was trodden hard by the unknown assassin's feet and where twigs were broken to clear his vision of his intended victim was found, but the trail could not be followed, he said.

A fusillade of shots was fired from the mountainside at Ratliff and several co-workers were en route to the mines. Minor trouble was reported at the mines a few days ago.

A church member for several years and formerly a teacher, Mr. Spears was one of this section's best men. He was born on Johns Creek at McCombs, Pike county, January 4, 1887, and had hundreds of relatives and friends in Floyd and Pike counties.

Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor Spears; four daughters and one son, Mrs. Angeline George, of Betsy Layne; Charles, Lenore, Betty and Madge Spears, all of Boldman. He also leaves five brothers and one sister: R. B. Spears, Coal Run; Lefe, Jeff, Ballard and Roland Spears, and Mrs. Zettie Blackburn, all of McCombs.

Funeral services were conducted from the old Spears home at McCombs, Revs. Isaac Stratton, of Banner, and G. W. Roark, of Prestonsburg, officiating. Burial was made in the family cemetery.

Largest Floyd County
Child Health Meeting
Is Held At Weeksbury

The largest Child Health Conference and clinic ever held in Floyd county was held at Weeksbury on Wednesday, May 1, the Koppers Coal Company, in co-operation with the Provident Life and Accident Insurance Company, and the Floyd County Health Department sponsoring the clinic.

Following is a list of officials, physicians and nurses who were present and assisted in the clinic: Thomas E. Lightfoot, general safety director, Koppers Coal Company, Pittsburg, Pa.; L. M. Webb, vice-president, Provident Life and Accident Insurance Company, Chattanooga, Tenn.; H. H. Huddleston, division manager, Provident Life and Accident Insurance Company, Williamson, W. Va.; Dr. M. L. Gunn, eye, ear and nose specialist, Harlan, Ky.; Dr. R. T. Humphries, orthopedic surgeon, Logan, W. Va.; Dr. J. C. Nash, Koppers Coal Company, Coxton, Ky.; Dr. R. L. Johnson, Pikeville Clinic, Pikeville, Ky.; Dr. U. W. Massie, Koppers Coal Company, Weeksbury; Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director, Floyd County Health Department, Prestonsburg; Dr. Yale Rogers, Wheelwright.

Nurses present were Miss Maudie Stone, of Wheelwright; Miss Catherine Curry, Montgomery, W. Va.; Miss Hazel Parsons, county health department; Miss Martha Troll, county health department, and Miss Florence Houghton, social service worker, Pittsburg, Pa.

The clerks and other workers in the clinic were recruited from the following ladies of Weeksbury: Mrs. U. W. Massie, Mrs. Finley Roberts, Mrs. Yale Rogers, Mrs. Cora Osborne, Mrs. Rola Chaffin.

The clinic was conducted in the camp's safety room, booths being arranged for each physician and nurse. The patients on being admitted were

given a number and directed to the desk of the clerks who made out the history charts, then directed to a room where they were weighed and measured, then to the doctors for a physical examination, then to the dentist for examination of the mouth, then to the eye, ear and nose physician for examination. If they had any symptoms of bone disease, they next visited the booth of the orthopedic surgeon, then to the desk of a nurse, who advised the patients regarding treatment and care, and distributed literature, then to booth of a nurse where they were immunized and vaccinated.

In all, 170 children were examined, 10 adults were examined for tuberculosis, and 11 crippled children were examined; 64 were immunized against diphtheria, and 58 vaccinated against smallpox. More than 1,000 pieces of literature were distributed.

Arrangements were made by the coal company to have a photographer present to photograph the waiting crowd, the individual booths, and a group picture of all officials, physicians nurses and clerks was on the steps of the clubhouse. A bountiful dinner was served by Miss Maudie Stone, and workers and furnished free by the coal company.

Mr. Lightfoot, the safety director, in speaking of the clinic, announced that "We are conducting these clinics at each of our 20 camps in Kentucky and West Virginia. While they cost a lot of money to conduct them, we have found by experience that the money we spend for public health is the best money we spend, that money spent for public health is not an expenditure, but an investment, and we expect to continue this work."

SEVEN JAILED IN
BIG WHISKY HAULC. and O. Depot at West
Prestonsburg Burglarized; 144
Pints of Liquor Taken

Seven West Prestonsburg men were jailed here early Sunday morning as suspects in the theft of 144 pints of legal whisky from the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company depot at West Prestonsburg between 12 o'clock Saturday night and 4 o'clock Sunday morning.

Of the seven, four were released as innocent of the theft. Edral Herd, Ernest Harmon, Ollie Hall and "Sweet Tooth" Blackburn remain in jail, though Blackburn is held on a charge of stealing coal from a common center and not as being implicated in the burglary and robbery of the depot. Edral Miller, Wardie Miller and Crit Hurd were released after investigation showed, it was said, they took no part in the theft.

Harmon and Herald confessed, Policeman Jim Meade said Tuesday, to breaking into the depot, while Hall admitted getting the liquor. Entrance to the depot was gained by the men.

TRAIL COMPLETION
HERE IS PROMISEDRoute Through Upper
Prestonsburg To Be Changed,
Officials Say

Re-routing of a part of the unpaved sector of the highway at the upper end of Prestonsburg and paving of this strip of road is seen as a federal project which may be undertaken within a short time, it was said this week following a visit of Highway Commissioner Turner, of Jackson, here a few days ago.

In letters to County Attorney Forrest D. Short and Mayor A. C. Carter last week, District Engineer E. P. Moynaver has indicated that this work will be done as a federal project, if necessary right-of-way is procured. The project will be completed at a cost of \$20,000, it is estimated.

While Mr. Turner was here last week routing of the highway so that it will follow the street at the rear of J. N. Harris' property and turn back onto the present route at the corner of E. H. Davidson was approved. This route would eliminate one hazardous corner-like curve, and would entail the purchase of right-of-way over only one lot, it is said.

week.RELIEF ALLOTMENT
FOR FLOYD COUNTY
IS ABOVE \$36,000Floyd Direct Relief Case Percentage
Lower Than in
Pike, Figures Show

27 PROJECTS WORKING

Floyd county's work allotment from the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration for the five weeks from Friday, April 26, to Thursday, May 30, amounts to \$38,072, it was announced Saturday by J. S. Murphy, area administrator, Pikeville.

The direct relief allotment for this county for the same period has not been learned, but it is believed that the appropriation for Floyd county will approximate \$5,000.

The \$32,072 allotted this county for work relief will be spent on the 27 projects on which work is now being done, unless new projects are approved during the month. A total of 2,656 families are on relief in this county at this time, all of whom are working with the exception of 645 on direct relief. In Pike county, for which a \$31,059 work relief allotment has been made for these five weeks, there are 2,782 families on relief, with 1,080 of these on direct relief. Pike county has 38 work projects going, it was announced.

In March, George H. Goodman, state relief administrator, spent for general relief, while the overhead expense was 17 per cent of this amount. In addition \$227,909 was expended in earmarked funds for special purposes for which the overhead was charged against the general relief program.

Work relief in March increased by \$144,851 while direct relief decreased \$55,497. This proportion, Mr. Goodman pointed out, is a direct effort on the part of the Kentucky Emergency Relief Administration to immediately fall in line with President Roosevelt's new work program, which is intended to reduce to a minimum direct relief.

Maggard-Fields Store, the new store at Prestonsburg, opens Saturday morning in the Hotel Elizabeth building. Both Mr. Maggard and Mr. Fields are experienced, successful merchants, and their opening here is expected to introduce to Prestonsburg one of the most varied stocks of merchandise to be found in this section.

First Soft Ball Game Is Played Here Monday

The first soft ball game ever played here was staged Monday afternoon when the juniors of Prestonsburg high school defeated the senior class team. This new sport was introduced in the high school by C. V. Watson, athletic coach.

Soft ball is one of the country's most popular sports, and almost every town on the Big Sandy now has its league. An effort is now being made here to organize a soft ball league, either from the various Sunday School classes or from the personnel of business houses of Prestonsburg.

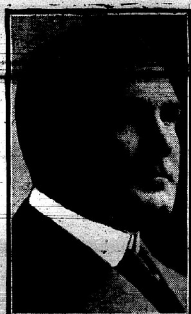

THE GARDEN

CULTIVATION

By JOHN S. Gardner,
College of Agriculture

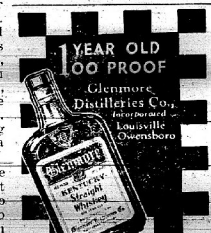
Second only to its fertility, in
importance, is the manner in
which a garden is cultivated.
Many gardens are worked too
much, worked to death, in
fact. A far more general mis-
conception of a cultivated
garden is that it must show
that it has been "gone thru,"
its surface scarred with deep
wounds, and these, the closer
to the plants, the better that
deep working is harmful, the
droopy appearance of the vege-
tables attest. Besides, labor is
wasted.

All that cultivation can do,
and does do, is to remove weed
competition. Weeds compete
with vegetables in the matter
of plant food and moisture.
The larger they are permitted
to become, the more serious is
this competition; obviously,
then, the time to remove them
is while they are still small,
while their roots are simple
and lie shallow that is to say,
while only a shallow stirring
of the soil sues, or if fact a
mere shaving of the surface.

Cultivation should leave the
soil surface level. Although it
is admitted that one way to
discourage small weeds is to
draw a ridge or a hill of earth
over them to smother them, a
better way is to uproot them
or to remove them and main-
tain the surface level. "Hills"
or ridges expose extra surface
to sun-evaporation and lower
the water table, perhaps be-
yond root-reach. Inasmuch as
most vegetables are prized for
their high moisture content,
the harm that may come to

them through hilling is ob-
vious.

The tools to use properly to
cultivate a garden are a few in
number. In fact, there is only
one—a hoe. If the time-hon-
ored hand-hoe is the tool its
blade should be so adjusted
that when the handle is held
in the most comfortable posi-
tion, its blade lies flat or tip-
ped slightly downward. If a
garden plow is to be used the
attachments should be the
"beet-knives" edged steels by-
ing flat with the surface with
the surface of the soil when
the plow handles are held, as
the user finds the least tiring.
If a horse-drawn cultivator is
to be the means, it should be
one fitted with "sweeps," large
sized "beet-knives." With any
of these, scraping the soil be-
comes almost automatic, the
weeds are uprooted, the sur-
face is left level, the vegetable
roots are left undisturbed, an
ideal situation all round.
