STEPHENS ASKS
TIGHTENING OF
LEGAL WORKSENJOINS GRAND JURY
TO SECRET AS
COURT STARTS

Instructing the grand jury upon the opening here Monday of the April term of the Floyd circuit court, Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., called upon jurors and officials for a tightening of the enforcement machinery, a cutting away of all dead weights, to the end that "as certain as a law is violated, punishment must come."

To the regular oath administered to the grand jurors, Judge Stephens added the words "and that you will keep secret all proceedings, evidence, votes and everything that is done before you."

This part of the oath, he explained, was for the jurors' own protection, and "is . . . to keep outside influences from interfering with your work."

"I expect you to do this to the letter and report to me any one who attempts to talk to you about what is going on in the grand jury room."

"If I should lay the present crime wave to any one cause above others, I would say it was 'dis-interest' of the good people," Judge Stephens added, laughing out at the attitude of the jurors, which he described as in effect saying, "Let George do it, I might hurt some body's feelings, he might be a friend of my brother's wife's third cousin and, therefore, I will do what I can to permit him to escape the just penalty of the law; I have property."

Commenting upon "corruption in high places," he stated as one of these grafters and political highlanders, if there be any, in this district and county.

It was pointed out that several thousands of dollars will be saved to the taxpayers as a result of the fiscal court's action, taken since the last court adjourned, in reducing the cost of relief commodity deliveries. The fiscal court was commended for its action. Judge Stephens also noted the publication of the County Board of Education's financial statement, adding that the fiscal court had its financial statement in preparation for publication.

POST REWARDSEEK CONVICTIONS
FROM FIRES,
BLASTS

A reward of \$10 was offered by the Floyd County Fish and Game Association at its meeting here Tuesday night for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person in the county guilty of starting destructive forest fires and dynamiting fish. At the same time the association appropriated \$30 for the purchase of seeds for cover and feed for quail. This fund was augmented \$14 by individual contributions of members present. County Agent S. L. Sobell, J. B. Clarke and Joe Hill were named a committee to distribute the seed to farmers interested in game preservation.

County Judge E. P. Hill introduced a resolution calling upon Governor Johnson to appoint for service in Floyd county a full-time warden, or if this service is unavailable, at least a part-time warden. The club voted unanimously that the resolution be adopted, copies to be mailed to Governor Johnson, Major Brown, head of the Division of Fish and Game, and Dr. O. T. Thompson, Pikeville, chairman of the State Fish and Game Commission. Judge Hill pointed out to the club the fact that Floyd county sportsmen last year paid more than \$1,400 for hunting and fishing licenses.

The meeting, second of the year, attracted sportsmen from all sections of the county--more than 50 being present. Roe Turner, secretary-treasurer, reported that the associ-

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PROSECUTOR,
EX-OFFICIALS
ARE INJURED

Two former Floyd county officials, Ex-Circuit Judge John W. Caudill and Former Circuit Clerk O. H. Stumbo, were seriously injured and Commonwealth's Attorney John Allen was less seriously hurt Thursday night in an auto wreck near Zel, Ky.

Stumbo and Caudill remain in the Paintsville hospital, each suffering broken right thigh. Stumbo also is said to have suffered a crushed pelvis. Commonwealth's Attorney Allen was able to return to his home near here Saturday.

The wreck took place on "Deadman's Curve," scene of numerous accidents, and within two miles of where Judge and Mrs. Caudill were injured previously in a collision. Slippery condition of the highway as a result of rain during the night is said to have caused the car, driven by Allen, to skid and plunge over a culvert. Harry Lee Leslie, fourth member of the party, escaped with minor bruises.

The isolation of the accident scene and lack of telephone communication forced rescuers to return those injured to West Liberty, where medical attention was lacking. The three injured men then were taken to Paintsville in a passenger car, arriving there at 1 a. m. Friday.

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CHILD KILLED
BY AUTOGRAND JURY PROBES
DEATH THURSDAY
AT NORTHERN

The grand jury of the Floyd circuit court this week was investigating the death of eight-year-old Peggy Shannon May, who was struck and instantly killed by a car parked on the north side of the highway, near the home of her grandmother, Mrs. Amanda Turner, of Northern.

Harry Bierman, Ashland, driver of the death car, contends that the child's death was unavoidable. He is quoted as saying that the lot stepped from behind a car parked on the north side of the highway, directly into the path of his auto, and that he did not see her until too late to prevent the tragedy.

Other witnesses of the tragedy said the child was dragged a distance of more than a hundred feet and that the salesman's auto did not stop until it had traveled approximately 300

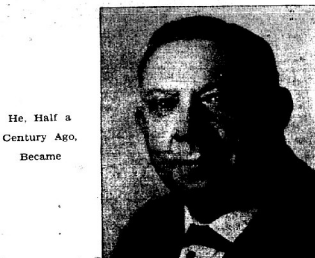
As a mere boy, he cut corn on Beaver Creek for the late John H. Preston. For the noble sum of 2 1/2 cents per bush to pay for a primary Arithmetic and Geography, his first and last schoolbooks. "I've always believed that if I'd have gone another month to school, and learned to say, 'No,' I would be worth a lot more today," he will tell you.

His store business at Drift, where he has been thus occupied for the last 17 years, isn't such a far cry from his life occupation of "trading." At the age of 17, he traded a seven-jewel Elgin watch and \$15 which he'd earned by working at the lordly pay of 35 cents a day for an old, saddle-sore, away-make her "hot peart." JAGGERS LAUDS
FLOYD SCHOOLSSTATE DIRECTOR
TELLS HALL
OF OKEH

"I have never been more impressed with a county school program than I was with yours," County Superintendent Town Hall was told this week in a letter from Dr. R. E. Jagers, state director of teacher training and certification, who was the principal speaker at the dedication of the new Martin and Maytown school buildings last week.

Dr. Jagers, who visited several schools with Mr. Hall Friday, complimented the county education program upon the many new buildings and the work being done by principals and teachers. "Mr. Jagers," he said, "I am a teacher after teacher indicated to me that you not only have attractive buildings but you have co-operating, conscientious, competent groups of teachers and principals who have high qualities of leadership, and pupils who show evidence that they have come from homes interested in education to schools which can develop them," he added.

Praising the high degree of friendliness of the pupil-teacher relationship and the absence of restraint in the schools they visited, Dr. Jagers expressed his opinion that these qualities do not come about unless something significant takes place within the school.

Eight of the ten Floyd county high schools have been given ratings of "A" and the other two, because they have not enrolled the necessary number of students to warrant the rating, were

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COURT EXTENDS
FARM, HEALTH
PROGRAM

Continuation of the work of both the Floyd county health department and the county agricultural agent was quickly voted by the fiscal court in session Tuesday, and appropriations were made to cover the county's part of salaries for the two agencies.

The county agent's appropriation was fixed at \$12,000 payable monthly. The health department will receive \$2,250 from the county.

Levies totaling \$150 on each \$100 worth of taxable property were made by the court, with a poll tax of \$1.50 on several purposes, and \$1 for common schools being levied.

County levies made are: 20c per \$100 of taxable property for the sinking fund, 50c per \$100 for the general fund, 10c per \$100 for the fund for the poor, 70c per \$100 for common school purposes. The levies are the same as those of last year.

A levy of 1 per cent of the market value of all crude oil produced and sold in the county also was made for the benefit of the general fund.

Taxes for the various consolidated school districts this year will be paid on the following levy per \$100 of taxable property:

MARTIN HELD
IN SLAYING
OF CLARKOFFICER AND MINER
IN DRIFT SHOOTING;
WICKER IS VICTIM

One man dead and two others probably fatally wounded in the toll exacted in the county within the week by bullets, while a fourth man, a Knott countian, was killed under cover of darkness within a scant half mile of the Floyd-Knott line, near Lackey. John Calvin Clarke, 52, World War veteran and well-known Knott countian farmer, died Friday morning at 2:30 o'clock at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, of a bullet wound suffered shortly after noon of the previous day.

Across the line in Knott county, Bill Wicker, 31, restaurant-owner, was instantly killed Saturday night.

From Drift Monday afternoon late, two other bullet victims--Deputy Constable Dave Hall, 35, and Thomas Jones, 27, miner, were taken to Martin hospital, suffering possibly fatal wounds.

Harold Martin, 17, was jailed here Thursday night by Magistrate Daniel Akers and Deputy Constable A. J. Akers as the slayer of Clarke, his uncle.

Saturday, young Martin implicated Johnny Clark, son of the slain man, and Walker Hall in the slaying. On his statement made to County Attorney Forrest D. Short, warrants for the arrest of Clark and Hall were issued by County Judge Hill, charging them with aiding and abetting Martin in the slaying.

Golden Clark, wife of the victim, told authorities that the younger Clark and Martin came to the Clarke home Thursday, around noon, and that when her husband reproached his son, telling him that he would have to stay at home and work and obey him or leave Martin, Clark and Martin then came to the home. A brief argument between Martin and Clark ensued, with both youths being ordered to leave, it was stated.

After the two had departed, Martin returned armed. Mrs. Clark and she asked Henderson Hall to try to get Martin to leave, and Hall told authorities he did this but that Martin pulled a knife on him. As the argument continued, Clark and Martin were opening onto the porch and fired two or three shots, one of which passed through Clark's body from side to side. Mrs. Clark testified, she said Martin then backed down the lane, his gun pointed toward her.

home with his bride's parents, but this offer he courteously rejected, explaining that "No house is big enough for two families."

So to Turkey Creek Mr. and Mrs. Turner went and there, ignoring the warning that "the land is wore out," reared a farm owned by Isom Moore for \$20 a year. The home they outfitted with home-made furniture. And they worked—worked hard. Sometimes as late as 11 o'clock at night in his "new ground" Bill Turner toiled. And he sold corn, every year of the five he spent on Isom Moore's "wore out" acres. By Christmas of 1908 he had saved \$1,300, and with this he bought from John G. Turner his first piece of property—a tract of 140 acres on Sizemore Branch, a tract which he still owns.

From that good day to this, W. J. Turner has been working, saving, trading and buying. Now he is Floyd county's largest individual taxpayer in the matter of dollars and cents. As for weight, he tips the scales at 350 pounds. And today he will walk two miles just to trade cows with a neighbor.

And he's still working. From 12 to 16 hours a day. Not because he must, nor because of a desire for more wealth, but merely for the wholesome reason that he enjoys "dealing and trading" with folks.

"I have never wanted a half-day's work in my life on whisky," Mr. Turner says. Yet he is no teetotaler. He doesn't use tobacco. He is always ready and willing to donate to the relief of the needy. Every day, scores of men and women come to him for sound advice or financial aid; very few go away dissatisfied. The goodwill of children he respects very highly, and often expresses the belief that an ounce of reasoning is worth more with a child than a pound of punishment.

Looking back from his lowly start, Big Bill advises the young fellow starting out that "Nothing risked is nothing gained." Yet he would emphasize to youngsters the importance of hard work, honesty and the sound policy of spending less than what you earn.

All three of his sons, Ernest, Raymond and Roe, are also merchants. Of his four daughters—Maggie, Mollie, Mrs. Wm. Martin and Mrs. Bill Arrowood—two are teachers.

And the man who was wise enough to take sound advice, even from a drunk, isn't a bit "high-hat" today. If you have some advice worth passing along, he's always ready to lend an ear.

Any farm operator who does not have the opportunity within the next few weeks to work out a farm plan should notify his local committee man or the county office that he wishes to do so. In order to qualify for payment under the 1940 farm program, the farm plan must be filed in the county office on or before April 15.

About Skidding

When wet road surfaces reduce the traction of the tires, when a vehicle rounds a curve at too great a speed, when defective brakes are suddenly

applied, when tires are unable to firmly grip a wet or muddy pavement or loose sand or gravel, then a driver may expect to skid.

Although there are more skids and thus more accidents in winter, the month to month toll of fatal accidents from skidding varies but little. Experience shows that in bad weather, drivers are on the alert and guard against them, to the end that relatively few serious accidents are reported. Conversely, when motorists least expect to skid they travel at higher speeds. Then if a skid occurs, it results in a serious crash.

Skidding is an essential element in the cause of many car accidents. During the past four years, four of every 100 drivers involved in accidents were thrown from their intended direction of travel by skids, and of every 100 accidents were caused by operating too fast for the existing condition of the road surface prior to the collisions.

All authorities seem to agree that the way to prevent a skid is to expect it and deal with it before it happens. The use of the brake and the speed at which one travels are leading factors in keeping out of trouble. So the first requisite is to maintain well-adjusted and well-balanced brakes. The second is to drive around curves or on slippery roads at speeds which should make braking unnecessary. A brake that locks or drags will throw a car out of control even on dry pavement, and on a straight-away and to brake on a curve or brake suddenly on an unrelaxed road surface is poor driving. When rounding a curve, brake before reaching it, enter at a slackened speed, but accelerate slightly as you round it. When necessary to stop on slippery pavement, leave clutch engaged and apply brakes carefully, touching them only lightly and intermittently. When starting on an extremely slippery surface, place the

gear in second and slowly, very slowly, and carefully engage the clutch.

Unless a car is traveling at an exorbitant rate of speed as it goes into a skid, it need not be fatal. If one keeps cool, keeps a firm grip on the wheel, and steers into the skid, one is skidding, he can straighten out of it.

Skids often end in collision with fixed objects, other motor vehicles, railroad trains, and pedestrians, and severe damage may result. Or a skid may end in an overturned vehicle with serious injury to the occupants. Questions, therefore, arise as to who is liable because it is so easy to blame it "on the skid." For one's own protection, both to one's body and one's pocketbook be alert to skids! A skid may be a sufficient explanation to disown a charge of negligence but nevertheless, a driver may be made to bear any loss that is sustained.

"DARKNESS"

Darkness greatly complicates the pedestrian problem.

The man on foot tends to make the mistake of believing that he can be seen by the driver at a greater distance than is actually possible. The lights of the car make the vehicle easily visible to the pedestrian at a distance, but the pedestrian is not seen by the driver until he is relatively close. This is true even under the most favorable seeing conditions. If rain, snow, fog or other conditions reduce the driver's visibility, the pedestrian can be seen only at a surprisingly short distance ahead.

The hazards of the pedestrian at night also vary according to the road illumination, car lights and pedestrian clothing. By wearing something white or carrying a lighted lantern, the man on foot conceivably increases the distance at which he can be seen.

The tendency of pedestrians is to place too much faith in approaching drivers. The pedestrian thinks that the motorist can see him and will automatically slow down to let him pass. But thinking isn't enough—you've got to be sure.

Drivers aren't any better mind readers than pedestrians, and it is often difficult for them to know just what the pedestrian's next move will be. So be a little more considerate of the motorist when crossing the streets and walking along the highways, especially at night. A motorist has just as much right to expect the pedestrian to observe the rules of traffic as the pedestrian does the driver.

Inasmuch as adult fatalities occur chiefly at night, it can be emphasized that the person who goes walking after dusk on the highway should protect himself by making sure of being seen by motorists. To walk on the highway at night in all dark clothing is sheer folly. The things that can be done by pedestrians to increase their visibility include: Carry a flashlight or lantern; wear a white shirt, coat, suit, pants, dress or shoes; hold a white handkerchief conspicuously open; knot a handkerchief on the arm; carry a newspaper.

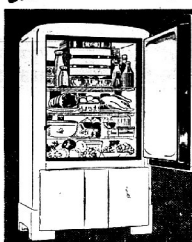

feet from the spot where the child was struck.

The victim had alighted from Robert Waddie's auto, headed up the Beaver highway, and had walked around the rear of the car to cross the road on route to her grandmother's home when struck. Coroner Elliott Prater said Bierman's brakes required pumping twice before "laking."

The child's skull was crushed and death was almost instantaneous.

Surviving the little victim are her mother and many other relatives. Funeral rites were conducted Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. C. C. Newsome, of the Methodist Church, Maytown, officiating. Burial was made in the family cemetery at Northern, under the direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

Martha told County Attorney Short that, after he and young Clarke had left the home, Clarke and Earl accompanied him to the home of Sam Adams and John Martin and procured the pistol from which the fatal shot was fired. He said the other two men encouraged him to return to the Clarke home and awaited his return from the lethal mission.

Hall was arrested and jailed here, but Clarke had not been apprehended Monday afternoon.

The drift fray is said to have resulted from Deputy Constable Hall's attempt to arrest Lee Edward "Boss" Daniels, kinsman of Jones, on a charge of drunkenness. As Daniels resisted, according to the report received here, Jones appeared in the crowd which gathered, told the officer that he could not arrest Daniels and opened fire.

The grand jury, following an investigation of the shooting, returned indictments against Thomas and Curt Jones, Deputy Constable Hall and Daniels, charging each with shooting and wounding. Incorporated in the shooting and wounding indictment against Jones and Daniels was the charge of aiding and abetting the shooting and wounding of Hall.

The officer in the Beaver Valley hospital where he was said to have a "fighting chance" to recover from five bullet wounds which penetrated both lungs, his liver, one leg and his side in two places. Jones, shot two times, one bullet entering his right side and emerging near the spine, the other entering his left side and lodging in his hip, was said at the Martin General hospital to have a "fair chance" of recovery.

During the melee Bill Elliott, deputy game warden, was slashed about the throat.

Bill Wicker, a brother of Mart Wicker for whose slaying Cluett Messer and Policeman Alvin Slone Lackey are to stand trial this month, was shot while sitting in his restaurant, opposite the Stumbo Memorial hospital. A rifle bullet passed through the glass partition of the restaurant door, struck Wicker in the back of his head and, exploding, almost decapitated him.

The wife, small daughter and others were in the restaurant when the shot was fired. It was said here, identically, the gunman has not been established. John Sturgill, a resident of the vicinity in which the shooting took place, was quoted as saying he saw a black coupe turn on the highway, a short distance above Wicker's restaurant, and stop at the scene of the shooting.

A man was said to have been seen as he leaped into the car, which dashed away.

Wicker is said to have expressed fear of a violent death.

Surviving are his widow and several children. Funeral services were conducted from the home Monday, and burial was made in the family cemetery on Jones Fork, with the Arnold Funeral Home in charge.

Calvin Clarke is survived by his widow and the following children: Eunice, John Lee, Beatrice, Reva, Russell, Kenneth, Barbara and Palmer Clarke, all of Brannan's Creek; one brother, Lee Clarke, Cincinnati; two sisters, Mrs. Clara Combs, Lexington, and Mrs. Victoria Adkins, Pauley, Ky.

Funeral rites were conducted Sunday from the home, the Revs. S. O. Rice and Johnny King officiating. Burial was made in the family cemetery under the direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.
