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# 'Pistol-Toters' Are Disfranchised

## JUDGE CAUDILL, HEART VICTIM WEDNESDAY

**HELD CONVALESCING,  
FORMER JURIST IS  
SEIZURE VICTIM**

Believed convalescing from injuries sustained in a recent automobile wreck, former Circuit Judge John W. Caudill, 55 years old, Prestonsburg, died suddenly early Wednesday night at the Fairview hospital of a heart seizure.

The end came at 7:15 o'clock without warning. During the day, the former jurist's condition had been encouraging. A blood clot in the cardiac region was said to have caused the fatal attack.

News of his passing was first received here with incredulity which, as the report was confirmed, changed to a sense of deep loss on the part of all who knew Judge Caudill.

The victim was born June 17, 1884 on Hollywood, Knott county, the son of the late A. L. Caudill and Mrs. Martha Thornsbury Caudill. Educated at Bowling Green, Ky., and at Transylvania College, Lexington, he for a time was a teacher and editor connected in school work with a newspaper in which he remained interested throughout his life. In this work he was prominently identified with the Caney Creek Community Center at Pippasburg, Knott county.

Judge Caudill and family moved to Prestonsburg in 1923 and here he became engaged in the practice of law. He was elected Circuit Judge in 1923 and was one of the most influential members of the Democratic party in this section of the state. Meanwhile, he was a leader in the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, being past grand master of Kentucky Odd Fellows and a representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the World.

For years he had been a member of the Baptist Church here, taking an active part in church and Sunday School work. Kind, generous to a fault, unassuming, he held the friendship of thousands of persons in Eastern Kentucky as well as elsewhere in the state.

## DISTRICT OFFICE CHANGE SEEN

**PRESTONSBURG BIDS  
FOR HEADQUARTERS  
OF STATE AGENCY**

That the district office of the Kentucky state re-employment service may be moved from Pikeville to Prestonsburg within the next few months is highly probable, it was said here today.

Work toward effecting its removal was started a few weeks ago by County Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., and recently it was unofficially reported that the move is being given favorable consideration.

For the office to be brought to Floyd county the county and the city of Prestonsburg will be required to furnish office space. At a recent meeting of the Prestonsburg Co-Operative Business Association, the group agreed to pay \$25 a month on office rent. The county, it was said, will pay the remainder.

Transfer of the office to Prestonsburg will bring approximately a dozen families here. During February alone, it was said, 4,000 persons applying for jobs visited the Pikeville office.

County Judge Hill emphasized the need to be effected by the change in location of the office. He pointed out that the district extends as far as Morgan county and that those applying through the re-employment service from that section would be saved 60 miles of travel to and from the office, if it is brought to Prestonsburg, which is centrally located in the district.

Judge Hill also declared his intention to carry the fight before Vesp Barnes, state re-employment director, if necessary in order to procure the change.

## ALLEN TO GET NEW SCHOOL

**\$30,000 STRUCTURE  
TO BE COMPLETED  
BY SEPTEMBER**

A modern brick grade school building containing eight class rooms and an auditorium seating 400 and which will cost approximately \$30,000, will replace the present wood structure at Allen, it was decided by the Floyd county board of education at a regular meeting in Superintendent Town Hall's office Saturday.

The old building has been condemned by the county and it will be demolished by N.Y.A. labor and the usable materials will be salvaged for the construction of smaller school buildings. The new structure will be placed on the site of the present building and it is expected to be ready for occupancy by September.

At the same meeting the consolidated teachers were paid their seventh-month salaries, which amounted to more than \$22,000.

Superintendent Hill was authorized to have prepared plans and specifications for a combination auditorium and gymnasium for the District consolidated school. It will be a 400-odd-foot wood structure.

As a means of giving the Turkey Creek rural school a more central location for the convenience of pupils, the present building will be moved up the creek about a mile, the board also decided.

## SQUIRES OKEH SEWING UNITS

**ALLEN LAND DEAL  
IS POSTPONED  
BY COURT**

Far from refusing to sponsor the Floyd county sewing centers of the WPA unless changes were made in regulations refusing employment to women hitherto unemployed at gainful occupations or to women without sufficient educational qualifications—a move threatened Feb. 29—the Floyd fiscal court called Monday upon the Works Progress Administration for the establishment of two more such projects, one at Bosco and the other at McDowell.

Sympathizing with a widow who appeared before the court, Feb. 29, and made a plea for help for herself and her children after she had been refused WPA sewing employment because she had not previously held gainful employment or because she did not possess the equivalent of an eighth-grade education, the fiscal court, the same day, adopted a resolution threatening to withdraw its sponsorship of such WPA projects unless the educational and previous employment provisions of the WPA's regulations were removed or amended.

Since that date sewing centers have continued to operate. At Monday's meeting of the court also saw three of the county's Magistrates attempting to purchase from W. N. Martin, Allen, a site for the proposed building which would house the certifying agent's office, county road machinery, the WPA culvert manufac-

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## Oliver H. Stumbo, Jr., Dies at Pikeville At Age of 21

Oliver Hanson Stumbo, Jr., 21-year-old son of former Circuit Clerk O. H. Stumbo and one of Prestonsburg's best-known young men, died at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, a victim of Bright's disease.

He first became ill shortly after Christmas, and after receiving local treatment, was taken last week to the hospital.

Mr. Stumbo was educated at Kentucky Military Institute, Culver, and the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. He had a host of relatives and friends here and throughout this section. His mother, Mrs. Anna Jones Stumbo, to whom he was devoted, died March 30, 1938. Surviving him are his father and grandfather, J. B. Jones, Prestonsburg.

His father remains in a serious condition at the Paintsville hospital as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile wreck.

Funeral rites will be conducted Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Stumbo home, the Rev. W. B. Garfield, minister of the Rev. A. C. Harlowe. Burial will be made under the direction of the Arnold Funeral Home in the Weddington cemetery here.

## JUDGE GIVES ROAD REPORT

**IMPROVEMENTS NOTED  
IN PROGRAM  
BY HILL**

In a statement issued this week, County Judge E. P. Hill declared Floyd county's road building program a success. The statement follows:

"The condition of the farm-to-market roads in Floyd county has been greatly improved in the last few years that business in Prestonsburg, and other buying centers has shown marked improvement. The roads have stayed in fair to good condition during the entire winter which was very severe. Roads have been constructed in all sections of the county by the WPA in co-operation with the fiscal court. This is an outstanding feat of road construction and reconstruction since a few years ago only a small portion of the population of Floyd county could reach Prestonsburg except in the dry summer months.

"The extensive WPA program could not have been possible had it not been for the co-operation and support of the fiscal court and county officials. Floyd county has more men working than any other county in this section, due to the large amount of sponsor's contribution made by the fiscal court, which is the determining factor for the number of men employed by the WPA. Besides improving the roads in the county, this program has given work to approximately 900 workers, who could not find employment otherwise. The employment of needy workers has not only helped them individually, but has increased the buying power in all communities until business in general has been improved.

"Much of the equipment and material needed for road construction are furnished by the county, and Floyd county has furnished these items which include a 13-4-yards gas shovel, a 55 h.p. anglezeder, two tractors and graders, three air compressors and four trucks, and is negotiating for two more. Also the county is discussing with the Rural Highway Department the possibility of using some of their equipment in this connection.

The truck, which was loaded with 15 new sawed logs, eight cases of packages and cans of smoking tobacco, seven pounds of chewing tobacco and several cases of whiskey and all of which is believed to have been

## JUDGE INVOKES FULL PENALTY OF THE LAW

**FIVE MEN, 1 WOMAN  
HIT IN COURT'S  
'CRACK-DOWN'**

Five men and a woman, convicted in the Floyd circuit court last week on charges of carrying concealed deadly weapons, caught the full blast of the court's "crack-down" on "pistol-toters."

Not only were they given fines ranging from \$50 to \$75 and jail sentences of from 10 to 20 days—they were disfranchised for a period of two years.

Discussing the court's drive against the carrying of deadly weapons, Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., said enforcement of the disfranchisement clause in the law would be consistently invoked by him, and that second offenders will be given a penitentiary sentence of from one to five years, if convicted.

Judge Stephens added that all drunken drivers, upon conviction, are being disfranchised for a period of one year.

Convicted of gun-carrying: Leonard Cordell, Paul Smith, Clyde Robinson and Tella Hale each received a \$50 fine and ten days in jail; Sam Bolen was fined \$75 and sentenced to 20 days in jail, and the case against Green Lawson was set for September 1. John M. Reiff Friday was fined \$25 and sentenced to ten days in jail on the same charge.

The charge of incest against Ray Toller, Wheelwright, was dismissed Tuesday afternoon, after the testimony given in court by his daughter differed greatly from that which she had presented before a grand jury several months ago.

Convicted on a charge of grand larceny, an indictment for which was returned by the grand jury last Thursday, Sam Dunkin and Harley Thurman were each sentenced Saturday to four years in the state reformatory.

Named in a joint indictment with Sherman Taylor on a charge of storehouse breaking, Loney Spaulding and Tylus Hall pleaded guilty and were each sentenced to a year and a day in the state reformatory. A bench warrant was issued for Taylor, with bond fixed at \$1,000.

Other convictions and charges follow:

Evrett Collins, cutting and wounding \$300 fine and six months in jail; J. B. Ford possesses liquor, \$50 fine.

Birth Registration To Be Tested By Census Bureau

The U. S. Census Bureau, in conjunction with the State Health Department, is planning to make a test of birth registration in the state covering the four months period, December 1939, January, February and March, 1940.

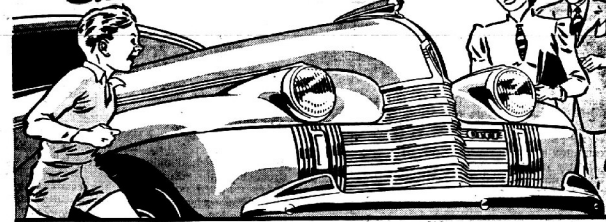
The tests will be made in connection with the census enumeration, which started April 2. The census enumerators will fill out a special card for each child born during this four months' period and these cards will be checked in Washington with copies of all birth certificates filed with the Bureau of vital statistics of the state health department.

In his way, every birth that occurred in the state during these four months which was not registered will be ascertained and located. Every unreported birth thus discovered will be investigated to learn why it was not registered by the attendant.

All parents are requested to report to the local registrar any birth occurring in the family during this period and which they have reason to believe has not been reported for registration. To make this test complete, it is necessary that the death of any child born during this period be likewise reported to the local registrar.

## BEAT "RETREAT"!

THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES stands indicted of having enlisted the support of a United States Senator in a cause which does not exist.

After we had troubled Senator Allen W. Barkley with considerable correspondence, after Mr. Barkley had communicated with F. C. Harrington, Commissioner of Works Projects, and after Commissioner Harrington had, in turn, consulted George H. Goodman, state WPA administrator for Kentucky—after all that, it was learned that THE TIMES had conveyed to Senator Barkley a swell piece of fiction.

Maybe THE TIMES had no business stepping in where it was not invited, anyway. But we thought we had, and so we propose to publish here our own "Blue Book" of the matter.

All this began with THE TIMES' interest in those women of this county who need work on sewing projects but who have been denied such employment on the unreasonable grounds that they had no previous work history, no gainful employment before they applied for WPA help, or that they lacked sufficient educational qualifications.

So when the Floyd fiscal court, on February 29, caused to be entered upon its records a resolution promising to withdraw its support from sewing projects unless this ruling was changed, THE TIMES thought it saw an opportunity to be of service to the "forgotten women" of the county.

Believing that the fiscal court meant "business," we promptly wired Senator Barkley, as follows:

"Fiscal court here withdrawing support sewing projects protesting WPA educational and work history ruling. Can regulation be changed? No good mother whose work has been only that of housekeeper and homemaker can qualify."

ify under present regulations. Please advise, our expense."

Employer advised Barker gave assurance of his willingness to co-operate. And he did with the result that, on March 12, Commissioner Harrington wrote him:

"This will acknowledge the receipt of your letter of March 8, 1940, enclosing a telegram sent to you by Mr. Norman Allen, editor of The Floyd County Times, Prestonsburg, Kentucky, regarding the employment of women on projects of this administration."

"Information in this connection is being obtained from the State Works Projects Administrator for Kentucky, Mr. George H. Goodman, and upon the receipt of his report further advice will be forwarded."

We were getting along fine, up to that point. We at least still cherished the hope that somebody was doing some serious thinking about the injustices being wrought by the ruling which demanded of a needy widow that she must possess the equivalent of an eighth-grade education, or must have had previous to her period of need, lucrative employment before she could work on a sewing center.

Yes, we had hopes.

But, on March 30, came the following word from Commissioner Harrington to Senator Barkley:

"The State Administrator for Kentucky, Mr. George H. Goodman, advises that the projects question were not closed but are all operating at the present time . . ."

And so THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES became known as a liar.

And so the fiscal court retreated from a position which was highly defensible in the mind of every man or woman who believes that human need is not predicated on past opportunity, who holds that women and children can suffer, sans education and a "work history," as deplorably as those who have the better things of life. Nor was the court's position untenable. It could, at least, have appealed to the reason of those in power before surrendering. Men made these WPA regulations, you know—Congress didn't—and so it is quite possible that these in authority might have been persuaded to change this ruling.

Those WPA officials in Washington might have been persuaded to step over to the State Department and ask one of the world's greatest statesmen, Cordell Hull, if his mother or grandmother could have qualified for work on a sewing center. That Tennessee "hill-billy" might have helped us convince them that the mothers and grandmothers of thousands of his countrymen, if suffering, are as richly entitled to work and eke out an existence on a WPA sewing center as are those former millworkers, ex-stenographers, and tradeswomen and all their kind who are in need.

Oh, well! The whole thing seems to have been a miserable misunderstanding from the time the regulation was defined in Washington till this hour. Drummer-boy, beat a retreat for THE TIMES, too!

## EARL JARRETT AGAIN NABBED

**MAN FREED HERE BEING HELD IN KANSAS**

Earl Jarrett, alias Earl Martin, alias Earl Howard Martin, who was held here in June, 1935 for Oklahoma officers as an escaped outlaw, last week was back in the toils of the law—this time, in Salem, Illinois.

Here, he was released when Oklahoma authorities made a belated arrival to claim him; at Salem, last week, he was being held while authorities were seeking extradition papers from the Illinois governor.

An old field worker, and known in Illinois as Howard Martin, the fugitive was said to have admitted to authorities that he had escaped from the McAlester, Okla., prison while serving a life term for the murder of a policeman.

Following his prison break, Jarrett was first arrested at Pikeville by Floyd county officers and Pikeville policemen, then jailed here. At the hearing held here, it was testified that he had married Miss Nell Lowe, Pike county teacher and member of a well-known Mayflower, Ky., family, had been steadily employed as a driller in the Eastern Kentucky gas field and was a good citizen. When Oklahoma officers failed to arrive here to claim the prisoner, Circuit Judge John W. Caudill granted his release on a habeas corpus proceeding, in the absence of documentary evidence of his guilt. He was described, during the hearing, as "friendly, likeable and a good citizen."

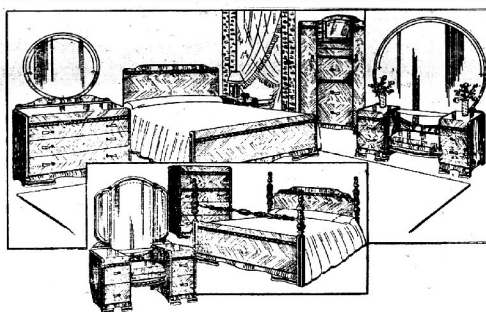

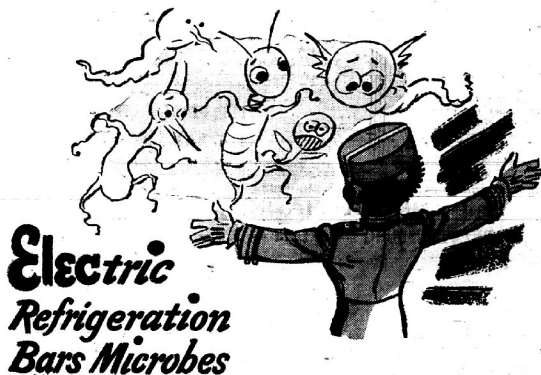

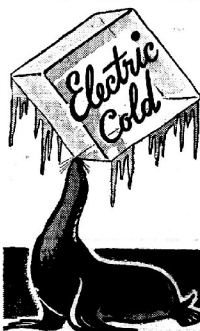

## GRAVE OF MOSE STEPP, REVOLUTIONARY VETERAN WHO LIVED TO BE 120, FOUND IN MARTIN COUNTY

Inez, Ky.—A road crew, working near Laura, Ky., has unearthed the grave of Mose Stepp, Revolutionary War veteran and Indian fighter, and believed to have been the oldest man who ever lived in Kentucky, it was learned here today.

The crew of men, working in a field, uncovered a time-worn headstone which bore the following inscription:

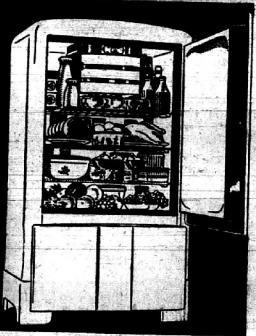
