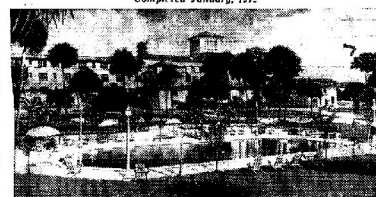

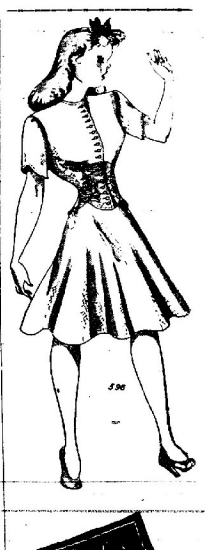

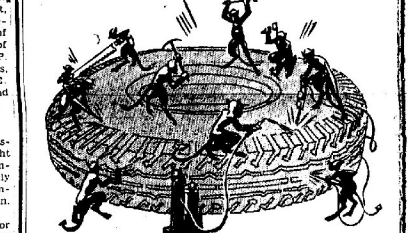

Occupational Questionnaire Designed To Catalogue Men and Their Skills

Frankfort, Ky., April 17 (Sp.)—Every man between 20 and 44 years of age who registered for Selective Service on Feb. 16 will receive an "Occupational Questionnaire" from his local Selective Service Board this month as the first step in an occupational classification being conducted jointly by the United States Employment Service and the Selective Service System. The questionnaire, which is in two identical parts—one for Selective Service and one for the U. S. Employment Service, must be filled out and returned to the Selective Service Board within 10 days after they are received. The local Selective Service Board will keep one part of the questionnaire and send the other identical part to the field office of the United States Employment Service in that locality. The questionnaire asks for information about the registrant's present job and his education; it also asks him to indicate the kind of work for which he considers himself best fitted and whether he is employed at such work at the present time. The questionnaire contains a list of occupations which are important to war industries. Registrants are to check any of these in which they have had training or experience and indicate those for which they are best fitted.

Mr. Praysure, director for the United States Employment Service for Kentucky, said that the employment Service field offices will examine the occupational questionnaires which they receive to determine which men are already qualified or can be quickly trained for work in essential war industries. Those men will then be asked to come to a United States Employment Service field office for a fact-finding interview. Workers possessing skills important to war production, but who are not working in war industry or in essential civilian activities, but who are willing to be trained and transferred to war work will be given an opportunity to do so.

Mr. Praysure stated that the U. S. Employment Service will work with the Selective Service System to provide that service with current information on the need for workers for war production so that these needs may be taken into account in

classifying registrants for deferment or induction into military service. In any individual case the U. S. Employment Service will be in a position to provide the Selective Service System with factual information as to whether the individual possesses a skill urgently needed by the war industries. The Selective Service System will be guided by this information on war production needs in making its decision as to the way in which individuals can best contribute to the war effort.

Applicants who need help in filling out their questionnaires should obtain assistance from their employer or labor union, from any field office of the U. S. Employment Service or from a member of the Selective Service local advisory board for registrants. No fee can be charged for such assistance.

Following this first occupational registration, the same questionnaire will also be mailed to these men during 1940 and 1941 (except those already inducted into the armed forces), and later to those men from 18 to 20 and from 45 through 64 who are still unregistered. Eventually the government will have information on the occupational skills of the entire male population between 18 and 64 years of age—approximately 40 million men.

This will be a task of tremendous size and importance. To accomplish this huge undertaking efficiently and expeditiously will take the closest cooperation of all individuals. We in Kentucky know that we can count on the same wholehearted, interested cooperation of the Kentucky public as has always been given to every activity in the war effort.

being asked, Martin claimed he was not drunk when arrested, but said he paid a \$150.00 fine.

Another indictment naming Hall and Hunley in the arrest of Sudduth Rawlings was accompanied by a statement made by Jim Hill, who testified that "to the best of his opinion," Rawlings was not drunk. The grand jury, in its final report to Circuit Judge Stephens, attributed the reduction in the number of felonies in the county to the work of the courts and enforcement officers.

Explaining the relatively small number of true bills returned during its session, the jury pointed out the great difficulty experienced in "procuring the attendance of witnesses." The jury questioned 114 witnesses. The county's public buildings, including the jail, are well-kept, said the report.

Two murder cases were returned during the week—one a renewal of the charge against Bob Stephens for his years-old crime in the slaying of Stan Hunt, now here, the other naming Pat Smith in the case-slaying at Drift of "Sandrock" Harris, a few months ago.

Other major indictments reported since last week's TIMES follow: Frank Keathley, possession moonshine whiskey; Oma Burke, having a roadhouse open after closing hours; Tony Newsome and Bill Ansell, firing weapons and damaging property of another; Emma Lou Crisp, Zella Barber and Ella Bentley, failure to provide for a poor parent; Slim Ratliff, permitting gaming device on premises; Sam Coffey, carrying concealed deadly weapon.

son will be one-half pound a week. When the individual registers and applies for a sugar ration book, he or she must declare the quantity of sugar on hand. Any individual having more than six pounds will not receive a stamp book but must file application for a book to be issued later.

Two pounds of sugar per person is permissible and a full stamp book will be issued to those not having in their possession more than this amount. One stamp per pound over this amount up to six pounds will be removed from the ration books of those having in their possession more than two pounds.

County Superintendent Hall urged qualified citizens, other than teachers, to attend the meetings and assist in the consumer registration. Many teachers are out of the county, he said, and this presents a situation fraught with difficulties with a shortage of registrars imminent unless patriotic citizens are willing to assist in the work.

PAY REFUND DEMANDED

And City Council Meeting Monday Is Lively One

All was not peace and quiet at Monday evening's meeting of the City Council as Fire Chief Arthur Blackburn was asked to pay to the city \$105 he was said to have collected from the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company for his own services and the use of the fire truck in watering the Middle Creek passenger train at its West Prestonville terminal.

Four members of the Council—R. O. Francis, James Morell, Jr., Curran Clarke and Mrs. F. L. Heitz—insisted that the sum was due the city. Fire Chief Blackburn declined to pay though he did offer to reimburse the city for gasoline used.

The C. & O. had an engine broken down, Mr. Blackburn told THE TIMES, explaining his stand, and, in order to get help the C. & O. came to the water commission and secured water at 30c per 1,000 gallons, then came to us and asked if I would take the old equipment and run water in the tank—which I did. I collected in the neighborhood of \$105. Gordon Francis and James Morell insisted I reimburse the town. I refused. The reason I refused is, I had the Mayor's permission and the approval of the old council which was in office at the time the work was done.

Mayor R. P. Arnold, supporting Blackburn, assumed responsibility for the fire chief's action, emphasizing that the city was being paid the regular rate for water. Heed by the C. & O. that only old hose was used in supplying water to the engine and that it was necessary to "exercise" the fire truck at regular intervals.

In addition to all that, the Council ordered the Second Avenue light leading to the Garfield addition be closed to traffic until state aid in rendering it safe can be procured.

Three unloading zones to accommodate business houses were established on Court street between First and Second avenues. A one-hour parking limit in this section during business hours was established. The penalty for violation of the ordinance is a \$2 fine.
