FIRE DESTROYS FOUR HOMES

At Lancer Saturday; High Wind Causes Blaze To Spread

Flames starting in the baking of a "hot cake" on a kitchen stove spread four homes at nearby Lancer Saturday night. There was no insurance on any of the homes destroyed, it was said. Mr. Meadows, working at a defense plant, had stored his furniture in his home.

Fire chief Arthur Blackburn sustained a burned hand when a gust of wind whipped flames from the Marshall residence onto him.

SCHOOL MEN SEEK HIGHER TEACHER PAY

Constitution Cited By Hall in Asking Special Session

Following up the petition of the Kentucky Education Association calling on Governor Kern Johnson to call a special session of the General Assembly to increase the salaries of Kentucky's "unpaid" teachers, county school superintendents of this section joined school officials of the state this week in either calling on the Governor in person or transmitting to him their views by letter.

James A. Cawood, K. E. A. president, called the situation critical. He said half the schools may not local districts pay a scale sufficiently high to discourage teachers from taking other jobs.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction John W. Brooker, asked to comment on Cawood's prediction, said the latter's percentage may be a little high for the entire public school system.

But, Brooker added, he will not be surprised if from 1,500 to 2,000 of the state's 4,000 one-room schools fail to open this fall for want of teachers. Many two-room schools, likewise, may not open for the same reason, he declared.

County Superintendent, Town Hall wrote Governor Johnson, pointing out that the state is obligated by the Constitution to provide an efficient system of public schools. Mr. Hall's letter follows:

The retail price of fluid whole milk (sweet milk) in Floyd county is controlled by Kentucky Milk Price Order 36 which follows: 1 gallon, 64c; 1 quart, 16c. If the retailers or dealers choose to do so, they may sell at lower prices. Price Regulation No. 329 applies only to prices paid to producers.

This and half-pints of milk may be sold only to hotels, restaurants and like institutions for consumption of.

Mr. Hall said nothing more is known this week than last about origins of the fire which destroyed the 16-room brick school to ruins. Janitors at the school said they "might have left a stove on in the principal's office" but the fire started in the side of the building in which that office was located.

The superintendent said he did not believe the blaze was of incendiary origin.

RUSSIAN SOCIALISM WAXES

The Russians are doing more than "reversing the direction of Nazi military movement." They are also reversing certain important political and social directions.

Americans in Russia now report the reappearance of shoulder insignia on the officers of the Red army—for the first time since the dark days of the Revolution.

In those days, officers who supported the Bolshevik movement threw the epaulettes from their uniforms as a mark of democracy. Those who failed to do so were regarded as enemies of the Revolution, and in some extreme cases, mobs attacked them, drove nails through the epaulettes into their shoulders.

There is also a change in official awards or decorations, indicating that the Bolsheviks seek for heroes of the past is vanishing. Three of the most coveted decorations of the Soviet Union today are the award of "Nevski," who was a 13th century prince, and the awards of "Suvorov" and "Kutuzov," who were Czarist generals at the time of Napoleon.

Also the St. George's cross, which would have been torn from the breast of a soldier a few years ago, has made its reappearance at official functions.

The U. S. public has the impression of modern Russians as dressed in coarse, formless clothing, but reports from the USSR today state that Red army officers dress with much punctilious to make American officers look shabby by comparison.

LITTLE AID TO CHINA

Just back from Chungking, General "Bert" Arnold, chief of the air forces, gave a glowing report to Secretary of War, Henry H. Arnold, regarding Chinese resourcefulness in battling the Japs. He was amazed and full of praise for Chinese ingenuity in repairing planes, landing in cow pastures and conserving fuel.

As far as General Arnold is concerned he would like to send the Chinese a lot more planes—though in the past he has not been too keen about it. (Incidentally, one reason for sending him to China was to win him over to the Chinese cause.)

However, despite Madame Chiang Kai-shek's graceful appearance here, despite the President's enthusiasm, despite the President's public statements, China is not going to get anything much in the way of supplies.

Reasons Listed.

Reasons are: (1) the impossibility of opening the Burma road now with the monsoon season only a few weeks off; (2) the absolute necessity of cleaning up Africa and preparing for a drive against Hitler in Europe; (3) Chinese political situation, which requires too many aims for personal armies.

Some war weapons will be down over the Himalayas, but not much more than in the past.

SECRET RUMI PLAN VOTE

The vote of the board of directors and means committee on the Rumi plan was secret, but inside fact is now, it had a chance of getting more than five votes.

The flood of mail reaching committee members, at first favorable, turned round and showed conclusively that the country was against outright postponement of taxes. Underlying sentiment expressed in the mail was that although the plan was hurt it was unfair to postpone too much of the war cost to the next generation.

Also the committee became more and more convinced that the Rumi plan was largely cooked up for the benefit of top brass in industry and that taxes were forgiven one year, it would mean shifting a much greater burden to lower income groups to make up the deficit.

This, they concluded, was just what Mr. Rumi's wealthy clients wanted.

CURE FOR TYPHUS

By way of London has come word that the Germans have evolved a cure for the dread disease typhus. If so, it is a discovery meaning the lives of thousands of men in the eastern front. In 1918 "Typhus" was responsible for more lives than machine gun fire, and from time to time it has ravaged the Balkans, Russia and eastern Europe ever since.

The German cure was discovered by a Dr. Van Nieuwkerk and is a combination of vitamin and plasma. U. S. Public Health officials have their fingers crossed regarding the cure, but British medical circles seem to be favorably impressed.

CAPITAL CHAFF

General Eisenhower has sent word to Washington that there are too many news correspondents running around North Africa.

Budget Bureau has prepared a plan for consolidating all picture-making branches of war department—signal corps, air corps, special services, and strategic service.

Minutes

The proceedings of the Floyd County Board of Education are recorded in the minute book furnished by the Department. The minutes are read, approved and signed by the chairman and secretary. The board orders are in legal form. The records contain a list of county board members, the time of their election, qualifications, and tenure of office. Teachers' and teachers' certificates record and teachers' salary record are complete. Teachers are paid according to the salary schedule and the monthly reports are of record in the office.

FBI Police Conference To Be Held Mar. 16 At Paintsville

The Federal Bureau of Investigation will hold a quarterly police conference at the Paintsville country club, Paintsville, from 2 m. to 4:30 p.m. EWT, Tuesday, March 16. Police agencies from the following counties will be invited to attend this conference, which is one of a series being held during March throughout the state of Kentucky and the entire nation under the auspices of the FBI: Floyd, Elliott, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin, Morgan, Pike and Wolfe.

Instruction is given at these conferences to local law enforcement agencies who are requested in some instances to make investigations as to the proper investigative technique for example, in the handling of Selective Service cases, espionage, sabotage, and other internal security investigations.

Circuit Judge J. P. Bell, Paintsville, and Capt. E. L. Smith, superintendent of police training, Kentucky State Highway Patrol, Frankfort, will be the principal speakers on the program in addition to instructional work to be given by a representative of the FBI.

The principal topic to be discussed by the FBI at this conference will be the use of the FBI technical laboratory in connection with internal security and criminal investigations, and this discussion will include the use of blood tests, firearms examinations, glass fractures, hairs and fibers, charred wood, document exhibits, tire tracks, footprints, secret writings, moulage, and development of latent fingerprints.

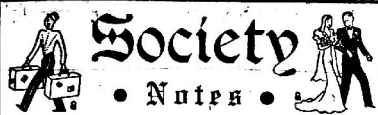

"The state of Kentucky has fallen far short in appropriation of funds necessary to provide an efficient system of public schools as required by our Constitution. We are not unmindful of the fact that small sums of money have been added to the school funds from time to time, but we all know and will readily admit that more money is available and can be appropriated for public schools now! The state of Kentucky could and should appropriate four million dollars on a per capita basis for use in the school year 1943-44. Every day and week, we are losing our best teachers because of low salaries paid. We need leadership and action, rather than excuses.

"The Floyd county school system and its 360 teachers urge you to assume this leadership, and call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of appropriating extra money for teachers' salaries for the ensuing school year."

The action now under way has been under discussion in K. E. A. circles since the January meeting of the board of directors at Louisville. Meanwhile, the Eastern Kentucky Education Association, meeting at Ashland, adopted a resolution calling for a special session of the Legislature to raise teaching salaries to a parity with the increased cost of living.

The Ashland resolution points out that a special session could appropriate supplementary salaries out of the cash surplus now on hand. Treasurer Ernest E. Shannon's net cash balance, as of close of business Feb. 27, was \$8,665,971. The anticipated surplus at close of this fiscal year, March 30, has been set at \$3,500,000 to \$5,000,000.

Cawdron's action is not an isolated example of unrest within Kentucky teaching circles. Franklin county, in response to demands, has raised teachers \$18 a month. City teachers at Newport have requested a raise of 1 per cent. Teachers at Ashland have voted a salary increase of \$1200 salary standards. A salary increase at Lexington became effective March 1. It will amount to \$24,000 a year.

Only eight states pay lower teaching salaries than Kentucky. The average salary of teachers, supervisors and principals in this state is only \$826 a year, according to the National Education Association.

George L. Evans, director of finance for the Department of Education, has calculated the average annual salary of county school teachers at \$611; independent districts, excluding cities of the first four classes, \$827; and cities of the first four classes, \$1286.

Governor Johnson, citing the fact that 50 cents out of each of the state's general fund dollars already is set aside for education, said there is not enough money available to raise teaching salaries to the level of war wages.

"I am sorry what we are doing for them is not enough," the Governor said.

The Governor added that other state employees are underpaid, when their salaries are considered in comparison with war wages.

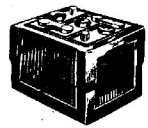
