Endorse Gasoline Coupons
To eliminate black marketing in gasoline, OPA is requiring all gasoline coupon holders to endorse coupons as soon as they receive them.

When a new automobile license number is obtained, it is unnecessary to re-endorse each coupon, but the old number must be cancelled from the cover of the ration book and the new number written in with ink or indelible pencil.

During the week of March 6, OPA will make a check of all gasoline coupons in the possession of motorists to see that they are properly endorsed. Failure to have every coupon endorsed is a ground for revoking gasoline rations.

Investigation of the 16 gasoline stations in Lexington last week by the District Enforcement Officers revealed that only one coupon was not endorsed according to the regulations when attached to a gummed sheet. This denotes a marked improvement in the handling of these ration documents by the holders.

RATIONING AT A GLANCE

Processed Foods
Blue 10-point stamps A, B, C, D, E and F in Ration Book Four will be good for processed foods from Feb. 27 through May 20. Green stamps K, L and M in the same ration book may be used for processed foods from Feb. 27 through March 20. Blue tokens and one-point stamps may be used as change.

Meats, Cheese, Butter, Fats, Canned Fish, Canned Milk
Red stamps A, B, C and D in Ration Book Four will be good for meats from Feb. 27 through May 20. Red stamps D, E, F and G will be good March 12 through May 20. Brown stamps Y and Z in Ration Book Three will be good through March 20. Red tokens and brown one-point stamps may be used as change.

Sugar
Stamp 30 in Book Four good for 5 pounds through March 31. Stamp 40 good for 5 pounds canning sugar through Feb. 28, 1945.

Shoes
Stamp 18 in Book One and No. 1 airplane stamp in Book Three good for one pair each until further notice.

Gasoline
Stamp A-10 good for 3 gallons through March 21. B, C, B-1 and C-1 stamps good for 2 gallons until further notice. B-2 and C-2 stamps good for 3 gallons until used. For your protection against the black market, the rationing rules now require that every car owner immediately write his license number and state on all gasoline coupons.

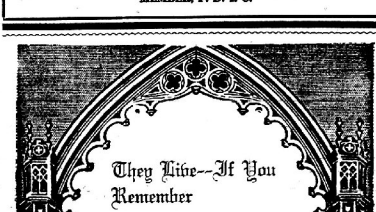

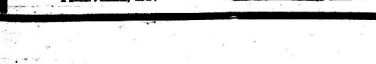
