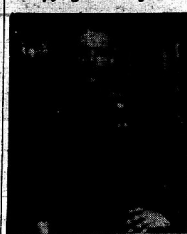

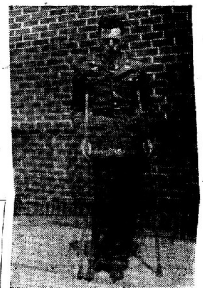

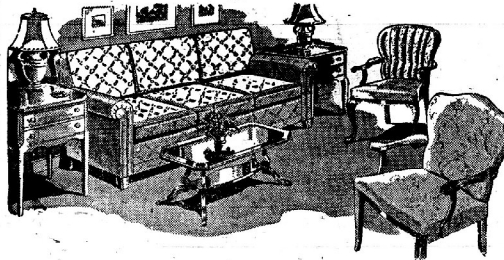

The location of all poles or conduits shall be made under the supervision of the proper board or committee of the city government.

(b) The right, privilege and franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the ordinance granting such franchise.

(c) The grantee of such franchise shall save the city harmless from any and all liability arising in any way from negligence in the erection, maintenance or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

(d) Whenever the grantee of this franchise shall begin the erection of any lines or other equipment, it shall promptly and diligently prosecute the work to completion and leave the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places where such work is done in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

(e) Whenever in such franchise, either the city of Prestonsburg or the grantee of such franchise is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors, or assigns, or either, and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in such franchise shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of said city or said grantee, whether so expressed or not.

(f) The grantee of such franchise may make such rules and regulations governing the furnishing of said electric energy as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee.
