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## LINE TO OPEN LETCHER-CO. COAL FIELD

22.5-Mile Extension To Begin at Wayland; Coddell Gets Contract

Construction of a single-track, standard-gauge line, extending 22.5 miles south from Wayland to coal lands in Letcher county, will be started soon by the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway, President Robert J. Bowman announced Monday.

Contract for all grading, masonry and drainage in connection with the extension has been awarded to the Coddell Construction Company, Winchester, Mr. Bowman said.

The extension, estimated to cost \$4,221,000, was sought by the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company, Inc., of Pennsylvania, and awarded to the Interstate Commerce Commission last Jan. 24. The ICC certification stipulated that construction start no later than May 1 of this year and be completed by Sept. 1, 1948.

The new line, connecting with the C. & O. Elkhorn and Heaver Valley subdivisions, will serve an area of 48 square miles in Wayne, Knott and Letcher counties. It is estimated this area contains nearly 200,000,000 tons of recoverable coal. Prestonsburg Consolidation Coal Company controls approximately 25,000 acres of coal lands in Knott and Letcher counties, and it was in connection with this property development that the extension was proposed.

The extension is expected to increase 1,500,000 tons per year by 1951-1952, and increase over the next five years to 2,000,000 tons per year.

According to the application filed with the ICC, the single-track line will extend from Wayland to a point near the forks of Indian Creek, Letcher county. The company has proposed that it be developed as soon as rail service is available, will be located near the mouth of Razor Lake Branch of Rockhouse Creek in Letcher, the application said.

This is the second extension to be undertaken by the C. & O. in coal fields in the state. The first, a 14-mile extension from Jenkins in Letcher county to Wadesville in Wayne county, was begun last July to serve coal lands in Wayne county. The extension is expected to be completed by 1951-1952.

location of the Clinchfield Coke Corporation on Meigs Fork. This operation is expected to yield more than 1,000,000 tons of bituminous coal yearly when fully developed.

Tunnel work is being done by the Western Construction Company, of St. Louis, and Codel Construction Company handled the grade work at the Jenkins end.

Although installation of large coal operations along the Floyd county sector of the new railway is problematical, rail facilities supplied are considered almost a guarantee of coal development in a small scale above Wayland in the form of numerous track mines.
