

Adrian Blackburn scoring 19 points, missing only one shot during the afternoon and playing the best all-around game of his career. His performance was such that inquiring spectators were surprised to learn he had not had college basketball experience. Tommy Blackburn scored 14 and Ray Turner, improving with every game, hit for 13. Every man on the team contributed and contributed heavily on both offense and defense.

Off to a slow start in the championship tilt against Glasgow, the Ramblers trailed, 9 to 4, with five minutes gone, but the half ended with them on top, 35 to 25, and the same ended, Prestonsburg 58, Glasgow 47. Adrian Blackburn repeated his afternoon performance with 19 points, Sturgill, T. Blackburn, the Holmes, Turner, Roark, Oppenheimer and Craft—all fought brilliantly, with disaster in the form of fouls facing them, and wound up the contest by playing a possession game.

The championship's handsome trophy was on display here this week, and each of the 10 members of the team received a miniature gold basketball. After the championship game, State VFW Commander Wilson and Quartermaster Carraway were hosts to a banquet at the Kentucky hotel.

To defray expenses of the team at the tournament, Prestonsburg business people contributed \$15.

## Inland Almost Ends 17-Year-Long Legal Bout with Receivers

Inland Gas Corporation looked last week to final removal of its troubles from the courts after 17 years of legal wrestling with creditors and receivers.

When Ben Williamson, Jr., Inland trustee, dropped a plea last Wednesday in federal court in Lexington for reorganization of the firm and its allied companies, the last of 23 flat volumes of complicated legal material was bound and filed away.

Judge H. Church Ford will determine whether the reorganization is workable. That appears to be the final phase of the monstrous proceedings.

Inland first became entangled with creditors, receivers and bankruptcies in 1950. Intervention by several other gas and supply companies, many of them now defunct, resulted in a series of pleas and petitions that created a mountain of confusing legal matter.

Williamson said Inland had decided settlement totaling \$9,561,808 during the history of its legal battle.
