### A Job for More Than Hands

IT IS highly doubtful if there is a street corner or a country store in America that is not at this very moment populated by one or more men who will break down and confess that they, personally, could rid the land of Communism.

"Why, get rid of the blankety-blank Communists, throw 'em in the can till most grows on their backs or send 'em back to Hoosha—that's all you have to do," they will with super-sapient tell you.

That is the natural thing to say, but it isn't as easy as this simple, direct action.

Getting rid of Communism is a more delicate matter than the imprisonment or banishment from these shores of known Communists. Even if that were all that is to be done, this phase of the fight could conceivably result in a loss of some vital part or principle of our government.

And if that should result in our own land is cleared of Reds at the cost of some of our own liberties, we share the defeat.

This country cannot afford, in its protection of the Bill of Rights, to deny freedom of speech and assembly to individuals or groups, simply because their ideas are not generally accepted. Once this is done, America will go on one big witch-hunt. Men and women will be persecuted for the slightest variance from the beaten path of political thought. Already, there is a tendency among the more inarticulate to classify those who disagree with them as "Communists."

Known Communists can be dealt with, and some already have been handled accordingly. But Communism, its insidious infiltration into the minds of men and women, its undercover threat to democracy and freedom are things which cannot be wiped out, literally, as with a brush of a giant hand.

The fight, then, is our common battle. The schools

and churches have a serious duty and so has the press. Greater service must be rendered by our government itself and those who shape its policies. For, by making this government serve the people, by making this government a shining example to all the world, government itself will go far to make the world forget Communism.

Unfortunately, this is a fight that cannot be impetuously fought and won. There is more than physical action to be taken.

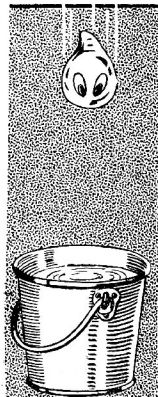

## WITHERS SAYS 'NO BOARD'

### Highway Head Squelches Rumor 9-Man Commission To Be Restored in State

State Highway Commissioner Garrett L. Withers made it plain last week there will be no board of Highway Commissioners.

"And that's the last time I want to say anything about it," he added. He pointed out the General Assembly adjourned without setting up a board and said Governor Earle Clements recently had told a group in Lexington he did not favor a board.

The commissioner explained he was setting out his position because of renewal of rumors that he intended to resign. He said the decision to go back to the former nine highway districts, in place of seven during the previous administration, had no connection with any board.

Withers said that actually he and engineers in his department believed more than nine districts would be better. He indicated that at some future date the number might be increased by dividing some of the nine larger districts. The public administration service after its survey last year recommended 15 districts.

"Our department engineers believe nine district engineers can know better what roads to build than seven could," Withers said.

Declaring, "I'm not going to build any 'political roads,'" the commissioner said the appointments of district and assistant district engineers were made on recommendation of a group of engineers. They included Mack Galbreath, head of the Princeton office of the Federal Public Roads Bureau, he added.

Withers said he expected to rely on recommendations of his district engineers. They are in the field, he explained, and in position to know what should be done.

Withers said the previous administration had contracted for half of the work to be done this year with federal aid. That left only approximately \$4,500,000 more in federal funds for Kentucky to match until Congress makes another grant, he added. There has been talk that Congress will not make another grant in time for 1949, he said, but so far nothing definite has been done. Kentucky has been setting \$9,000,000 annually from federal road funds.

## KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

During its recent session the General Assembly passed and Governor Clements signed many progressive pieces of legislation, but there were apprehensive moments when public money looked like something the people didn't have to work for. The most notable example was a \$4,000,000 appropriation for investigating the public school system of the state by committees. After reading some comment of mine on this appropriation in the Henderson Gleaner, A. J. Lynn, head of a Louisville auditing firm which bears his name, sent me this interesting letter:

At the very most, \$300,000 would have been a sufficient amount to have audited and examined all the books from the educational point of view of every one of the 120 counties in the state.

"In November we made a thorough audit of the financial records of the Harlan County Board of Education for the year ending June 30, 1947. Our bill did not exceed \$800, the records were in good condition, we checked all sources of income and made a fairly thorough examination of what went with the money. Harlan county, as you know, perhaps has one of the largest school budgets of any county in the state which amounted to slightly over \$1,000,000 last year.

"One more point in connection with the Harlan county schools, an outfit from Chicago had looked to me to go for political smear purposes for the year ending June 30, 1947. Our bill did not exceed \$800, the records were in good condition, we checked all sources of income and made a fairly thorough examination of what went with the money. Harlan county, as you know, perhaps has one of the largest school budgets of any county in the state which amounted to slightly over \$1,000,000 last year.

"The School of Education at the University of Kentucky had made a splendid survey during the year which was very helpful, educationally speaking, and was of some assistance to us on the financial side and then to cap the matter a very progressive step was taken by the teachers themselves in the county, many of whom spent the summer making a survey and the preparation of a three or four hundred-page typewritten book which I understood was good enough to be used in the Teacher-Training courses at Eastern State College, Richmond."

According to Mr. Lynn, the auditing job shouldn't cost more than about \$100,000. Of course, an overall study of the school system would involve \$250,000, maybe less.

The appropriation of the \$4,000,000 does not make spending of it mandatory, hence a fine opportunity for Governor Clements to save 80 per cent or more of the sum and use the rest of it for other worthwhile purposes today.

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## Sniff To Address Mining Convention

L. D. Sniff, mechanical and electrical engineer, Consolidation Coal Company (Ky.), of Jenkins, will address a special session on mine maintenance at the 1948 coal convention of the American Mining Congress to be held in Cincinnati, O., April 26-28. He will discuss "Power Distribution for Mechanical Mining."

The convention program will feature discussions of progress in coal production and preparation methods, application of law and improved equipment, supervisory and management problems, the future outlook for coal, the effect of the Marshall Plan upon the coal industry, and industrial application of atomic energy.

Approximately 2,000 mining men from all United States coal producing areas are expected to attend this meeting.

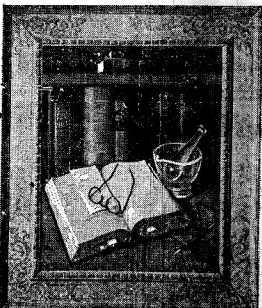

## OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Veterans needlessly take the chance of losing their money and their insurance protection when they mail cash to pay premiums on National Service Life Insurance policies, Veterans Administration warned.

A number of NSLI policyholders continue to send cash to VA branch offices to pay premiums. Early in March, the VA Branch Office in New York City received an envelope with \$1,700 in \$100 bills, to be applied to a veteran's insurance account.

VA pointed out that a veteran, making his insurance payments in cash through ordinary mail, has no way to prove he made the payment in the event it fails to reach VA. Failure to receive the money leaves VA up in the air but to keep the policy. Veterans are urged to use money orders, postal notes (with the reverse side filled out in full), or checks for NSLI payments, and also to use the yellow envelopes furnished by VA in mailing the payments to the appropriate VA branch office.

Student-veterans who are enrolled in colleges during the regular school year and want to take summer courses abroad under the G.I. Bill must meet certain requirements to qualify for such study.

The veteran first must obtain a letter of acceptance from the VA approval foreign school he plans to attend.

Next, he must secure a supplemental certificate of eligibility from his VA regional office.

The student then uses his letter of acceptance and his supplemental certificate as evidence in securing from the Department of State the necessary passports and visas authorizing his travel to the foreign school. The individual veteran must pay all transportation costs.

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Veterans Administration recommends that the summer course be taken in an approved school in a foreign country served by an Attaché of Veterans Affairs assisted by the Department of State. These countries include Great Britain, Mexico, France, Switzerland, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Belgium. The presence of these officials expedites payment of subsistence allowances, tuition and other allowable fees, VA explained. The records of veterans taking summer courses in these nations will not have to be transferred from the United States.

Records of student-veterans selecting any other country for summer study must be transferred to that nation. Such transfers take considerable time and often result in lengthy delays of subsistence and other payments, VA said. Should the veteran decide to remain in the foreign school for the regular academic year, the Attaché for Veterans Affairs in that country will request transfer of his records from the United States at that time.

Veterans may obtain information on foreign schools approved by VA by writing their VA regional office or the director of Registration and Research, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education Service, Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D.C.

## SPORTS AFIELD

By TED KESTING

The secret of good fly casting lies in the back cast. According to Jason Lucas, well-known authority on angling matters, the mastery of this simple step is of utmost importance in achieving fly-casting competence.

"Take a natural stance with the elbow hanging limply at the side—where it should remain in making casts of ordinary length—grasping the rod with the thumb lying parallel with it.

After a preliminary cast, when your rod is at a 45-degree angle or half-way between the water and straight up, speed up smoothly and without jerk, until the rod reaches its maximum speed and stops suddenly when it is straight up over your head.

The simplest way to get this right every time is to try to toss the line straight up into the air over your head. If you do that, you will automatically begin the movement in time, and end it with the rod vertical. Of course, the line does not go straight up, but trying to make it do so will keep it high on the back cast as it must be.

In actual practice, the rod does go back a trifle behind the vertical position. But the only way to keep it from going too far back is to attempt to stop it at the vertical. If it

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goes back a shade more your cast is ruined.

Watch your wrist at the finish of the toss. If you permit it to go back even slightly, it will allow the rod to go back too far and spoil your back cast. If you try conscientiously to toss the line straight into the air over your head—just back—wait, glow and the rest should automatically take care of themselves.

If you always remember to try to toss the fly straight up, you will cast well enough to catch plenty of fish.

That important phase before the cast is a step many fly fishermen overlook. They move always make it too short, or refuse to pause at all. Remember, begin the back cast with the rod no higher than half-way up; end it with the thumb part of the rod no farther back than "one o'clock"; and pause until the line is almost straight, but not falling below the horizontal. When you've got all that, you'll be well on your way to becoming a fly-casting master.
