SOLID BUT HIGH

While the anticipated bid days of the coming summertime have initiated speculations on building swimming pools here and yonder, we note that the Shelby News from down Shelbyville has offered some "concrete" evidence on fluctuating costs.

We herein cite the Shelbyville case.

Says the News, "In November, 1944, the city voted a \$50,000 bond issue to finance construction of a swimming pool. The pool was to be located here and located behind the high school gymnasium."

The proposed swimming pool for Shelbyville is very similar to one that was built in Lexington in 1948. If you please the city council opened bids submitted by contractors for the job. There were two bids. One bid, just bid, so thought the city fathers, for \$114,490.50, and another still higher for \$133,550.30. These bids, "very, very" fast when the council apparently decided to "reshuffle" for a new deal. Upon offer of the consulting engineer, the city fathers had called another meeting to decide upon a time to advertise for high diving in Shelbyville may be postponed until high prices start nosing diving!

In our own case, here and throughout the Red Sandy area, we have a problem that leaves nothing but the "head swimming." And that is an unsteady state of affairs.

The only swimming pool in this area of 14 counties embracing a population of over 425,000 and our nearest one we might say, "our nearest one" is located at Whitesburg in the southern tip of Floyd county. Primarily built by the Island Soil Corporation for its employees and the constituents of their community the officials have very graciously permitted "outsiders" the use of the pool. But this one pool cannot possibly accommodate the thousands of swimmers in this territory.

Health officials have repeatedly warned the public against bathing in the open streams as unsafe. Swimming is one of the healthiest exercises.

W. VA. ESCAPEE IN JAIL HERE

Facing 13 Felony Counts, Rutherford Tells Guilt Of State Pen Flight

Luther Rutherford, 35, in the Floyd county jail here charged with three counts of grand larceny, confessed to John E. Collins Sunday he was wanted in West Virginia as an escapee from the state penitentiary at Moundsville.

Waiting former extradition proceedings. Tuesday, Rutherford told Judge Collins and County Attorney W. W. Burdette, "I didn't break jail. I just walked out and escaped!" Collins said he failed to divulge any further details of his escape.

He is held without bond pending arrival of West Virginia authorities.

The fugitive was arrested and brought to jail April 16 by Earl Blackburn, Whitesburg policeman, accused of stealing two cars and driving the stolen cars in the Whitesburg area. The Whitesburg officials indicated they would pass their charges in deference to the Moundsville claim on the prisoner.

Walter England, Sought In Shooting of Officers, Apprehended at Tulsa

Pending the arrival of Floyd county officers, Walter England, 27, Martin, is being held in jail at Tulsa, Okla., on a charge of unlawful flight in the shooting of his father-in-law and two deputy sheriffs last November. He is held in lieu of \$50,000 bond after a hearing before the United States Commissioner on the flight charge.

Arrested at a filling station where he had been working since arriving there 10 days ago, he told detectives that he was a fugitive from the state of Oklahoma.

Clements Asks Return Of Man In Shooting

Frankfort, Ky., April 22—Governor Earle Clements issued a requisition late yesterday on the Governor of Oklahoma for Walter England, 27, a fugitive from justice wanted on charges of shooting and wounding two Floyd county deputy sheriffs.

England had been working at odd jobs in several Midwestern states in recent years. He was arrested by Oklahoma officials who said England was wanted by Ohio authorities for parole violation. He was convicted of auto theft first time in 1935, and was sentenced to 20 years. He was paroled at the time of the shooting on the Blacks Branch on November 9 of the past year.

GOP CONCLAVE ENDORSE MEN

Prestonsburg Attorney In Race for Judge Appellate Court

Near 200 delegates to the Republican district convention held at the hotel Monday at the courthouse here unanimously endorsed the candidacy of Edward L. Allen, Prestonsburg attorney, for party nomination for Judge of the Court of Appeals from the Seventh Appellate District comprising 27 Eastern Kentucky counties. The primary will be held on June 15.

The party convalesced also endorsed John Sherman Cooper for U. S. Senator and W. H. Moore for Congress. Both are incumbent in office.

Dr. M. D. Flannery, Pikeville, was elected district chairman and Henry Scott, Pikeville, was chosen as secretary.

Judge James W. Turner, Paducah, and Dewey Daniels, Hazard, were named as delegates to the state convention held in Lexington Tuesday and Wednesday.

John W. Langley, Pikeville, presided during the meeting as temporary chairman.

Judge Eugene E. Siler, Williamsburg Republican, announced, on the same day, that he had decided to run for re-election to the Court of Appeals from the Seventh Appellate District. Siler had previously announced he would return to his law practice instead of seeking office. He said his name had been returned to the ticket.

Siler is serving out the term of the late Judge Alex Ruff, Pikeville Democrat. The race this year is for the full eight-year term beginning next November. Siler has already been elected to the office by the voters of the district. He is a native of Wells, West Liberty, and Republican Elmer Roberts, Campton.

SPARKS BUSES AND DRIVERS IDLE WEEK

Old Contract Terminated, Negotiations Stalled On New Agreement

Buses and drivers of the Sparks Brothers Bus Company remain idle tonight, April 22, a week since the breach between the company and its union drivers April 15. The break in relationship occurred when negotiations between company representatives and the union's negotiating committee with their representative, Charles A. Neal, failed to gain a working agreement to replace the old two-year contract which terminated last Thursday at midnight.

"We didn't strike," a union spokesman said, "and we are out of work due to the lack of a contract. Under the law, as members of the union, we cannot legally work without one."

In a written statement to The Times the negotiating committee said, "We with Sparks Brothers and asked only a fair and reasonable demand in wages and other working conditions but they flatly refused to negotiate a new contract. If and when Sparks get ready to sit down and negotiate a fair contract with the committee, then we will resume bus service on Sparks routes."

The union drivers' negotiating committee is composed of Jesse Wallen, James Leferty, Joe Maynard and the locals president, Bill Allen.

Union spokesmen have not stipulated their demands for publication and the only company comment oblique was by saying that the origin, cause and fullest extent of the damage is not known.

McKinley Sparks, bus company president, was out of town and could not be reached for a statement on the company's position in the matter.

Sparks Brothers buses serve Prestonsburg and Eastern Kentucky by the way of Left Beaver to Wheelwright, through the Right Beaver section in Floyd county, and by Wayland and through Hindman in Knott county to Hazard, the Perry county seat. They also operate a short line from Louisa in Lawrence county to Sandy Hook in Elliott county.

Since the cessation of bus operation on the Sparks lines has not affected other bus lines. The Kentucky-Virginia Stages, partially owned by the Sparks interests, operate in operation from Ashland to Pikeville, Jenkins, Hickory Hill and Grundy, Va. Short lines in the immediate vicinity of Prestonsburg, the Sparks lines, the Short Way Bus Lines, the Local Bus Lines and the City Bus Lines, are owner-operated and not affected by the union lockout.

The contract just terminated was a result of a 90-day walkout pending company recognition of the drivers' union two years ago.

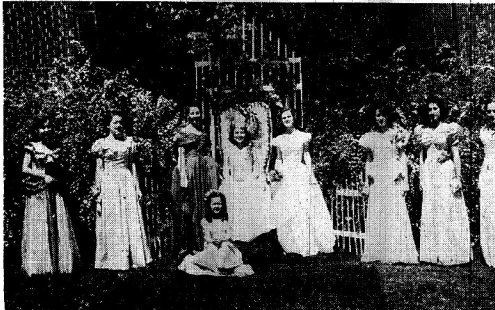

Patrol Nabs Two Alleged Kidnappers

Former Floyd Resident Accuses Two Pike Men; Kidnapped In Ironie

A spree of commandeering vehicles landed two brothers, Earl and Robert Adams, Virginia, in the Pike county jail charged with kidnapping and armed highway robbery and facing FBI charges. They were jailed on complaint of Ray Simpson, 24, of Pike county, who was arrested, a minor at Pike in this county.

The duo were apprehended by chance Tuesday at 4:30 p. m., on U.S. Route 22 near Pikeville, by Capt. Vernon Sanders while he was parked beside the road making a routine traffic check. He noted the fast speeding by, gave chase and forced them to stop. Robert Adams was operating the cab. Simpson said that the Adams had entered the cab in Ironton and forced him to drive them after robbing him of his clothes and money. All three were released in the rear seat.

The officers reported said that the brothers were drunk and a search of the cab produced a pistol.

Highway patrolmen said today that the accused men, some time during the night, had stolen a truck near the mouth of Robinson Creek and abandoned it in Lawrence county before proceeding to the Ohio town. Robert, officers say, was convicted and sentenced to 21 years in penitentiary in the May, 1937, for a Pike county charge. He has been out about three years and is under indictment for attempted robbery in the Pikeville court, in the fall of 1947.

The patrolmen chipped into a fund for cats and gas for Simpson's cab to enable him to return home. The case has been turned over to the FBI for further probe and possible prosecution.

COURT METES 5 SENTENCES

2 Charged With Murder—And Minor Offenses Net Sum of 32 Years

Gibson waived arraignment before the court and entered a plea of guilty to the charge of first degree murder. The penalty was derived from a compromise verdict.

Bas Compton, tried April 21 for murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Mrs. Helen Parsons, Betsy Layne, was given a sentence of eight years.

Brother, Charlie Compton, who was convicted in the Pike circuit court on a charge of venue on the same charge, received a 21-year term, and authorities stated, he is now serving the sentence.

Isaac Keathley received one year on a charge of grand larceny. Mark Hays, found guilty of storebreaking, drew one year, and Sanford Newason was given one year for family desertion.

Floyd county and Prestonsburg will begin observe Monday morning of Traffic Safety Week with the appearance of Officer Irvin E. Hibbs, safety engineer of the Louisville Police Department, who will maintain a safety exhibit booth in the former city police station opposite the courthouse and conduct safety programs at various schools in the county throughout the week.

Today (Thursday) Mayor E. P. Arnold issued a proclamation designating the week beginning April 26 as Traffic Safety Week in Prestonsburg. (See Mayor Arnold's proclamation published elsewhere in The Times today.)

Officer Hibbs, here under the sponsorship of the Kentucky Peace Officers Association, the Prestonsburg Junior Chamber of Commerce, several business men and local groups, has conducted safety programs in Cincinnati, Henderson, Port Knox and Bowling Green.

The school itinerary of Hibbs and encourage is announced by H. D. Fitzpatrick, Jr., safety chairman, as follows: Tuesday—9 a. m. at Allen school; 10 a. m. at Betsy Layne high school; 2 p. m. at Austin high school; Wednesday—11 a. m. at Martin school; 2 p. m. at Martin high school; 4 p. m. at the Prestonsburg grade school; 6 p. m. at the Prestonsburg Keweenaw Club; 7:30 p. m. at the Prestonsburg T. A. A. school.

Assisted by the Kentucky Highway Patrol, the Prestonsburg police department will be on duty during the week.

John L. Lewis' plan for \$100 monthly pensions to retired miners hit a snag today, according to reports emanating from Washington.

Lewis suddenly and without explanation postponed until Monday a meeting of the Miners' Welfare Fund trustees, supposedly called to get the pension payments started.

The delay came after Ezra Van Horn, trustee, said the pension plan agreed upon by Lewis, trustee for the miners, and Senator Bridges (R-Kent), the coal member, is illegal.

A court suit Van Horn filed yesterday asked that Lewis and Bridges be held personally liable for any money spent in violation of the Taft-Hartley labor act.

Miners throughout the coal fields pushed back to their pits today, by mutual consent, 30,000 were available, and 340,000 were on the job.

Thus the strike that started March 15 came to a virtual end with the miners finally hoping to end the proceedings ordered by President Truman. The President told a news conference this afternoon that he was enforcing the Taft-Hartley act in dealing with Lewis.

The mass return of more than 300,000 men to the mines came just ahead of another court case starting tomorrow of Lewis and Federal Judge A. Alan Goldsborough.

Goldsborough already has "dished out" stiff fines of \$20,000 against Lewis and \$140,000 against his United Mine Workers union for failing to obey promptly an "end-the-strike" court order.

The fines were for criminal contempt. The government held up any sentencing of Lewis and the union on civil contempt, a charge on which Monday afternoon court action was taken.

Operators as well as union-leaders expressed confidence the nation's coal production would be 100 per cent Monday, and that the strike would end the miners' work stoppage began March 15 in their pinning.

Rough estimates of the miners' strike losses: West Virginia, less than 20,000; Pennsylvania, 18,700; Kentucky, 5,000; Alabama, Virginia and Tennessee, about 2,000 each; Indiana, 1,500; Utah, 900; Wyoming, 300.

Only 1,000 of the 80,000 Pennsylvania anthracite miners were idle yesterday, compared to 4,300 Wednesday.

Two miners, including the president of a UMW local, were arrested at Grundy, Va., following a spate of non-voluntary stoppings which killed two operators. Two men were injured.

Drunk Driving, Target Of Highway Patrol Drive Slated For Eastern Ky.

"Cracking down without reservation on drunken drivers," declared State Highway Patrol officers here this week in announcing a drive on all traffic violators and operators of defective vehicles.

As a prelude to the drive, the patrol is conducting running road tests now and merely advising without making arrests. Sgt. Ed Craft stated, in speaking for Capt. Vernon Sanders, district head of the force, that the Highway Patrol will be glad to furnish any operator without objection information on operations and required running equipment on vehicles.

All owners of trucks and cars are asked to "please" have their lights, rear view mirrors, tires, brakes, steering mechanism and other possible defects checked because a large percentage of the vehicles on the highway today have defects in direct violation of the law.

"All trucks over seven feet in length must have rear lights on the corners of the bed, three running lights on top of the cab and protected rear view mirrors on each side. On the front of the vehicle, the use of a red light is absolutely forbidden," he continued.

"The Highway Patrol advises the use, instead, of amber, green or blue lights."

During the drive, to be launched within the next few days, the patrolmen will be down on reckless driving and "one-eye" drivers who operate with only one headlight. Traffic accidents have grown to such proportions that something must be done about it, they deem quickly, the officers declared.

Who will appear here in connection with Traffic Safety Week has been a member of the Louisville Division of Police for the past five years as Safety Analyst. A graduate of Northwestern University Traffic Institute; Georgia Technological Institute of Pedestrian Protection and Traffic Engineering and the Federal Bureau of Investigation of Police Training sponsored by the Kentucky Peace Officers Association; was police instructor for the Kentucky Highway Patrol at Camp Breckinridge, associate editor of the Kentucky Peace Officers' publication and a police instructor for some time. He is now a member of the police committee of the National Safety Council, Governors Highway Safety Council and the American Society of Safety Engineers.

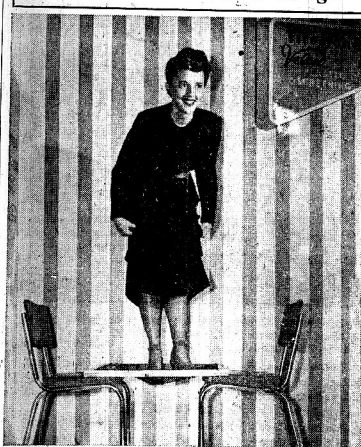

Hall Announces Plan For Floyd Workshop; Registration Is Asked

That emergency teachers may meet the requirements of earning an additional eighth quarter hours of college credit to renew their emergency permits, and in order to prepare certified teachers who have not been in school for a few years to refresh themselves in the methods of teaching and earn additional college credit, application has been made by Superintendent Palmer Hall to the Eastern State Teachers College for a workshop in Prestonsburg this summer. While not yet definitely accepted, the application has been favorably received and will almost surely be accepted if the need is sufficient, Mr. Hall said.

School officials express the hope that the workshop will run at the same time as the first summer term in the colleges in this section. Except where a teacher needs to do a required course for a valid certificate, it will be requested by the Board of Education and the Superintendent that they take the workshop in the county, since the workshop will be built around the actual problems and needs of a teacher in Floyd county schools and will be more practical help to the teacher than most on-campus college courses.

The number of instructors provided, and the type of the course will depend somewhat on the number and type of students enrolled. Credit will be extension (same as correspondence) and will count toward certification or a degree. For those who have taught during the present school term it will count on next year's salary schedule as "current credit."

Eastern State Teachers, it was said this week, would like to make this a big workshop and to staff it adequately. In order that the college may be properly informed, Supt. Hall suggested that those who expect to teach and who will be required to take the course, and that certified teachers who want to take it, register with the Superintendent of Schools as soon as possible. Teachers from neighboring counties will be welcomed and high school graduates who are planning a career in teaching may be admitted. The tuition cost will be between \$20 and \$25.

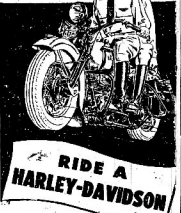

Godbey Urges Correct Social Security Numbers

Floyd counties holding social security cards are advised to check their cards for correct listing of numbers.

Monday, Horace J. Godbey, manager of the Ashland office of the Social Security Administration, announced a campaign to correct erroneous social security records in this area, which do not contain the correct names and numbers as shown on workers' social security cards.

Pointing out that correct social security numbers sometimes are not registered with employers, Mr. Godbey urged each worker to immediately check the number and name on his social security card with that appearing on the employer's payroll record.

Mr. Godbey stressed the importance of correct listing on employer's records, since benefits under the social security law are based on the wages shown on the worker's social security account.

Workers who change places of employment were urged to see that their correct social security numbers and names, as appearing on the card, are registered with their new employers. The best method, it was pointed out, is to show the official social security card to the employer, or to the person in charge of pay rolls. Fewer mistakes occur when this method is followed, Mr. Godbey claimed.

Persons who have lost their social security cards should apply for duplicate cards at the Social Security Administration office. Women who change their names by marriage or divorce should notify the Social Security Administration so that the name on the government's record can be changed also.

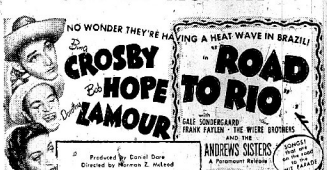

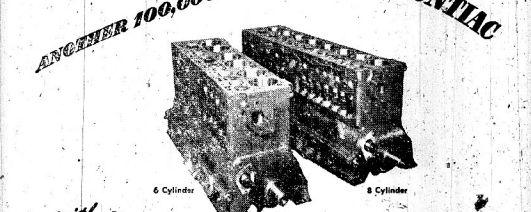

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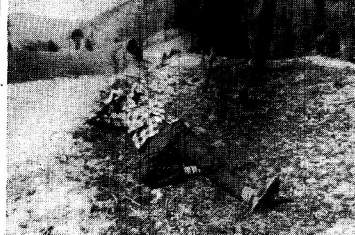

In order that emergency teachers may get the required eight quarters for renewal of their emergency permits and that certified teachers who have not been in school for several years may get a refresher course, application for a five-week workshop, starting about June 3, to be held in Prestonsburg has been made.

Eastern State Teachers College authorities have almost assured us that a workshop will be given by them, the number of instructors and the type of courses to be determined by the number of prospective enrollees.

The workshop will be planned to meet the needs of teachers in this county on a practical basis. It will be of far more value to an inexperienced or untrained teacher than ordinary college courses taken on the campus for the same length of time. Except where emergency teachers have practically finished their teacher course and need to do required courses on the campus they will be asked to take this workshop by the Superintendent and Board of Education. It will be strongly insisted that teachers who have not been in school for several years take the workshop. All teachers not holding a degree are urged to attend. Extension credit which will count toward a degree or certificate will be granted, and for those who taught during the 1947-48 term it will count as current credit on the salary schedule.

Upon the recommendation of the principal and superintendent, high school graduates who are interested in a teaching career may be admitted. Teachers from other counties are invited.

It is especially important now that all teachers who plan to take this course register (tentatively) with the Superintendent at once. We will appreciate, too, suggestions as to the type of course desired. By beginning now transportation "pools" may be worked out. Where number and circumstances make it practical school buses may be used for this purpose with teachers bearing the operating expenses. REGISTER NOW!

Timberland Tax Of 2 Cents Valid, Holifield Opines

Frankfort, Ky.—An opinion upholding a 1948 legislative act authorizing counties to tax timberlands 2 cents an acre for the protection was given by Assistant Attorney General M. B. Holifield Monday.

Holifield pointed out the annual fire-protection tax is not for public purposes, but for a specific purpose. The courts have already upheld special taxes on dogs for sheep protection and special taxes on land for soil conservation and for adjacent road improvements.

The fire-protection tax is in that class, he added.



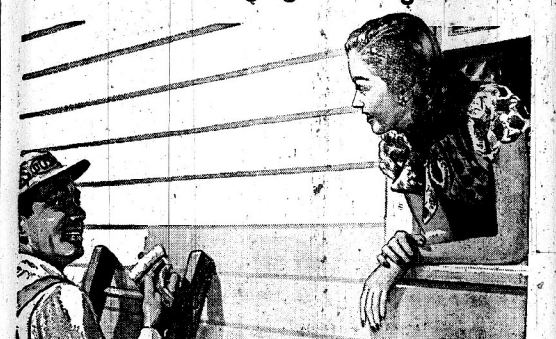

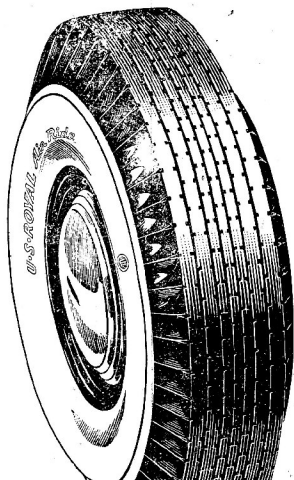
