These contests have been sponsored by the Kiwanis club in cooperation with the Boy Scouts of America. Thus, said the managers of the contests, came Tuesday night—no place to show, no contestants, no crowd, no show.

The managers, Franklin Moore, Eugene Brown, and Max Burns, praised the reception and cooperation of the amateurs in conducting the amateur events in the other Floyd communities prior to the Betsy Layne incident.

230. County Clerk, \$750. Also uncollected are the tax levy figures: 30 cents per \$100 valuation on real estate and personal property; 20 cents per \$100 on same property for the bond fund; \$150 poll tax; 20 cents on each \$100 cash value of bank deposit; 1 per cent of the market value of crude oil produced in the county; 2 per cent on forest lands for fire protection service.

W. J. May, cashier of The Bank Josephine, was re-elected county treasurer at a salary of \$75 a month, and he also was employed for \$150 to represent the county in the settlement with the Sheriff.

A Playground and Recreation Board, originally set up last December by the Board of Commissioners, met on Tuesday night under a Kentucky statute for the benefit of a recreation project at Drift. It was reorganized with the appointment of five men to the board on Tuesday night. The Board was created to receive and collect funds and to perform necessary acts to acquire land, construct, operate, maintain, supervise and dedicate a playground at Drift for the public use and benefit.

Named to the Board were: George L. Moore, McDowell school principal, for a one-year term; W. L. Reed, J. C. Cook, R. W. Ankrom and Roe Turner, all of Drift, for terms of two, three, four and five years, respectively.

Might Picket Them

MONDAY morning, Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill laid off the grand jury of the Floyd circuit court that he had been handed a list numbering between 20 and 30 Floyd county residents who have procured federal licenses to sell whiskey.

Those who heard this announcement doubtless arrived at two conclusions:

These who have gone to the expense and trouble to get federal licenses either are now selling whiskey in dry Floyd county or are "fixing" to; and they regard the federal government with enough fear and respect to take steps which remain within federal law but at the same time wangle a figurative thumb at state and county law.

Names of these being known, it would appear that if law enforcement officials still can find no means of pinning onto them their guilt, they might take a page out of the book of organized labor and throw a picket line in front of these 20 to 30 places of business.

Ridiculous, that suggestion? The whole situation borders on the ridiculous.

What We Drink

COMES to mind the recollection of a farmhouse where, years ago, there were a number of "work-hands", rough, tough youngsters who could endure a lot. They could put the shoulder, all day long, to a cant-hook, and come in at night in a frolicsome mood. They would drift sawlogs with the snow flying, come in with their clothing frozen, pile up before a log fire, thaw themselves out and let their garments dry on them. And there would never be snafus the next day out of one of that hardy bunch.

But when a dead dog was found in the well, one morning, these fellows acted like sissies. Their nausea was audible for yards.

We say they acted like sissies, because we are comparing them with us folks of today: with men, women and children who drink water from the Big Sandy river and other streams of the section. Why, that water is little better than doctored sewage; it is water mixed with the stinking spew of a hundred sewers and the putrefaction of countless dogs, hogs, cats and other animals. And we are not nauseated, are we?

Let one of our modern water "purification" systems—Prestonsburg's, for example—fail for one hour without that failure being detected. Can you imagine the epidemic that would be certain to result?

We who are dependent upon polluted sources of water live, every minute, in much the same position as that of a community nestled in a valley below a mighty dam which could break at any moment, without warning.

And we will continue so to live, or to die, until a public consciousness is so aroused to the facts that the people and those who as officials serve the people put a stop to this criminal business of water pollution.

The Festival Points the Way

LAST Saturday's Music Festival here should have proved to the faint-hearted that Floyd county can successfully stage, if it wants to do so, a Sesquicentennial celebration this year.

The originality of the nine floats representing the county's schools, the color and smooth operation of the Festival as a whole, is proof positive that in the schools themselves, and among their patrons, are sufficient industry, initiative and talent to make this proposed Sesquicentennial, the observance of the county's 150th birthday, highly worthwhile.

If those who worked so hard and so effectively for the Festival could be joined by others whose abilities not

yet have been dedicated to such a county-wide effort, the result would be one of those finer things we dream of for Floyd county but which we do so little toward realizing.

Well, at least we have the Festival. It is encouraging to know Floyd county's girls and boys will be back next year with their pageant of beauty and symphony of sound.

But it isn't so comforting to know that we have only a few short months left for the Sesquicentennial, and that it isn't a thing which will come again ever.

Samuel D. Maggard, 74, Prominent Knott Man, Is Victim at Hindman

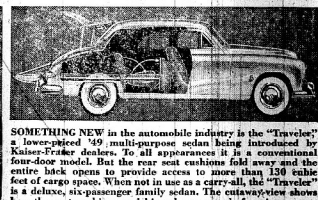
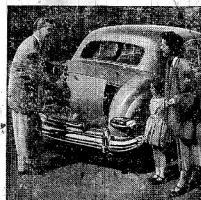

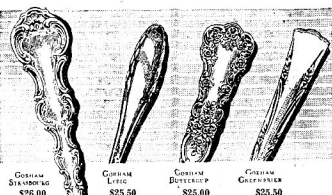

action against her spouse.

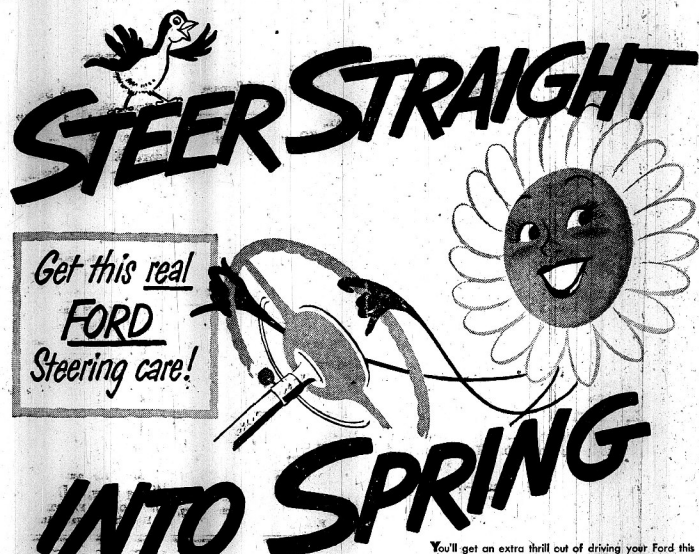

Warning Is Issued On Late Tax Reports

Prestonsburg, Ky., April 4—If your state income-tax report is not filed by midnight April 15 you will be subject to a penalty. In issuing this statement today, the State Revenue Department also said collections from this source up to March 15 were about \$1,000,000 above last year, and that the number of returns received were up 75 per cent.

In any cases where validity of the judgment is questioned on this ground when the case is first called for trial can the grand jury's indictments be nullified, it was said. These in which trial has begun or completed are not affected by the fact that a non-paying citizen acted as a grand juror.

Judge Hill's instructions to the grand jury Monday morning were brief and were devoted, mainly, to the liquor traffic. He prefaced his remarks on the liquor question with the statement that as he entered the courtroom a short time earlier, he had been handed a list of between 20 and 30 residents and clubs of this county who had procured federal license to sell liquor. "It looks like somebody is dealing in whiskey," he said.

"You even find empty bottles—dead soldiers—all around the courthouse," he commented. Yet, he admitted, the task of getting at the bootlegging business is difficult. "A year ago," he added, "98 witnesses were summoned and only two indicted." He said that some forget, some deal only with strangers. It's hard to find people who will tell the truth.

An ardent conservationist, the judge, as on all court-opening occasions, admonished the grand jury to investigate the spreading of forest fires. "It is such senseless destruction," he said, "to burn decaying vegetation on the hillsides and to permit the fire to destroy young timber." He informed the grand jury that the spreading of forest fires may result in two forms of indictment, one for careless destruction, the other for willful destruction, the other a felony.

UK DISPLAYS GRID POWER

At Paintsville Saturday; This May Be "The" Year Long Awaited By Fans

Fighting for blood and the bread and butter of their team positions, the University of Kentucky Wildcat football players gave fans of this section a close first-hand insight to college football at Paintsville Saturday night as the White blasted the Blue team, 26-6, in an intra-squad exhibition.

The close insight, provided by the proximity of spectators to players on the small high school field, was also a preview of Wildcat prospects for the 1949 season.

Newcomer quarterback Vito Parilli lived up to advance notions as a triple-threatster with his spectacular passing and accounting for other gains as he set up two White TD's in a very businesslike manner. His kicking which wasn't required Saturday night, speaks for itself on his record last year as a freshman.

The longest run was the 39-yard scamper by Wilbur Johnson, a Paducah product, who sparked the third-quarter surge by the Whites.

Webb scored after carrying the ball to the six on a 28-yard run.

Bob Goin, who operated on the line in earthquake fashion, convinced the fans that he was one of Kentucky's biggest gains in many a day as he shook the ground in shaking out the opposition.

Dopey Phelps, who was set down considerably last year when he was benched, showed definite signs of recovery by providing some good second quarter action with runs of 12 and 15 yards. Lawson, who got the lone Blue touchdown, Ulniski, Genito, Clark, Martin and numerous others promised sanctions with their action last Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant has a good reason to anticipate a very successful year.

Action was rugged enough to convince fans that college football playing is not all play as three men were knocked out and another, Brooks, was hauled off the field in an ambulance. Although later examination revealed no serious injury.

B.—Attempt to secure compulsory physical education and training of children in the schools of Prestonsburg.

C.—Promote and secure co-operative action between the city of Prestonsburg, Prestonsburg city schools, Lions Club, Eagles, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Woman's Club, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Kiwanis Club and other organizations within the city, to establish an adequate recreation center, with proper supervision, available to all children of this community.

D.—Support and arrange sports exhibitions and events in season, and promote public interest and attendance of such events.

E.—Promote a program for the development and training of our youth, with a view of "Selling" athletics, rather than buying them.

Average Fisherman Pays 91.88 Cents per Fish

A creel census of 4,782 fishermen from all sections of Kentucky by conservation officers, released this week by the Division of Game and Fish, at Frankfort, shows that the Commonwealth's Isaac Watkins made an average of 14 plus fishing trips during the year at an average cost per trip for each rod-and-reel addict of \$2.49, or a total year's expenditure of \$35.49 per man.

This, however, does not include the "between the trip" money spent on new equipment and other incidentals of preparation.

The census also revealed that each fish cost the angler 91.88 cents each. Each fishing trip was a little more than five hours long and the average take netted 2.71 fish per trip which, at the estimated \$2.49 per trip, results in the statistical summation of each fish.

Fishermen in Livingston county had the highest take in the state with each trip being almost four hours and the take per trip coming to 12 and one-half fish.

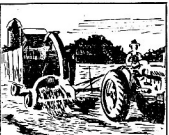

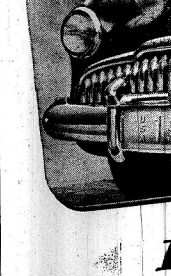

U.K. Professor Says Teacher Shortage To Remain Acute

Kentucky's teacher shortage is likely to remain acute for many years in the opinion of Dr. Charles R. Spain, head of the University of Kentucky's Bureau of School Service.

Dr. Spain, in a recent report released by the bureau, writes that "only a sharp improvement in the real income of teachers, better working conditions and the acceptance of teachers to lead normal lives" will induce enough young people into the teaching profession to adequately staff the state's schools.

In the very near future, the U.K. educator says, Kentucky will need 24,000 teachers—5,000 more than the present number—to take care of the steadily increasing enrollments. A difficult achievement, he writes, when it is considered that the state currently is training only enough teachers to replace the average annual turnover which ranges from 1,100 to 1,500. Only two-thirds as many young people are preparing to teach now as in 1941, Dr. Spain added.

Most decisive step in remedying the present shortage, he pointed out, would be a boost in the salary scale. Average annual salary of Kentucky teachers in 1947 was \$1,884.76, whereas the national average was \$2,250. Worse still, the state is ex-

pected to drop further below the national average this year.

Acceptance of the right of teachers to lead normal lives also would induce more young people to enter the profession, Dr. Spain declared. So far as we can see, teachers leading normal lives we will continue to have a shortage of teachers during economic depression when people must accept any kind of employment available," he explained.

The University of Kentucky professor also blamed undesirable living conditions in many Kentucky communities as another factor in the present teacher shortage. Well-trained teachers have experienced the conveniences of modern living, he said, and few of them are willing to accept positions where these conveniences are not available.
