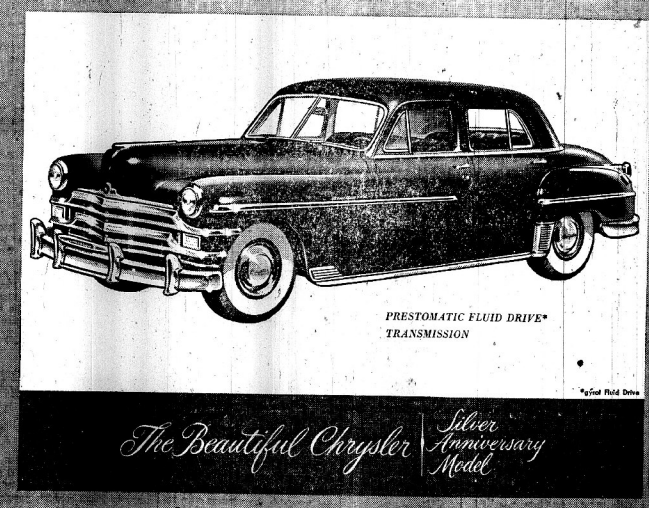

Highway Department Says Scholarship Applications To Be Received in April

The State Highway Department announced last week applications for its student-employee scholarships will be received through April.

Highway Engineer D. H. Bray said 58 applications already have come in for the 18 scholarships which the department values at \$500 each. Graduates of accredited high schools are eligible.

Examinations will be held May 2 in the department's district offices at Bowling Green, Flemingsburg, Louisville, and Somerset; May 3 at its office at Elizabethtown, and May 4 at its offices in Lexington, Covington, Paducah and Pikeville.

A University of Kentucky committee will choose two young men from each district to be enrolled at the College of Engineering. They will be classed as highway department employees and will be associated with its laboratory work on the University campus.

The scholarships will cover a six-year period. At the end of that time the students will have completed a course leading to a bachelor's degree in civil engineering and will have had three years of highway-engineering experience to their credit.

Little, who's accused of the shotgun slaying at Weeksbury of Herman Mack and of the shooting and wounding of Paul Fray at the same time, had not applied for bail up till Wednesday.

Upon Judge Hill's decision to hold Daniels in jail, his counsel demanded an early trial, and the date for the hearing was set for April 25. The trial will, in all probability, be held at that time, although Edward L. Allen, who was employed by the victim's family to assist in the prosecution, is now a hospital patient and may not be able to take part in the case.

director for the group, said the sheriff also had instructed counsel to take steps to see counties comply with the law which provides that the counties pay for sheriffs' automobile expenses.

A majority of counties were reported to have failed to pay such expenses. It was estimated that automobile expenses average about \$120 a year.

The sheriffs also approved the filing of a brief by their association in support of Jefferson County Sheriff Ross Dickson's attempt to collect a fee of 4 per cent instead of 1 per cent for collection of Jefferson county Board of Education school taxes.

The sheriffs contend Dickson is entitled by law to such a fee, although Jefferson circuit court held the provision invalid. The question now is before the Court of Appeals.

Sheriff Thomas Fitzpatrick, Covington, and Gilbert Wallace, Edmon-ton, said steps also would be taken to have the County clerks put addresses on tax bills given to the sheriffs for collection.

It was pointed out that in a majority of counties notice of tax bills due it, were not given until they became delinquent. If notice was given before the bills are due, it was said, the taxpayer would take advantage of discounts and avoid penalties.



The department noted the new law provides minimum pay of \$2,400 a year for county tax commissioners. It encourages all persons interested in the job to take the examinations.

1939 and 1940. Estimated cost of the canalization project, he said, is \$83,000.

Wells pointed out, also that the people of the area depend almost entirely—either directly or indirectly—upon the mining and shipping of coal. Their mines, he said, are, and have been for many years, a marginal industry. Marginal, not because the coal is not abundant and of the best quality, but because it costs them \$2.75 to ship a ton of coal to Cincinnati by rail, whereas it costs the mines of the Kanawha river valley in West Virginia just 80 cents to ship a ton of coal to Cincinnati via the canalized Kanawha river and the Ohio.

Dr. O. W. Thompson, Pikeville president of the Association, quoted government survey statistics to the effect there is enough high-quality coal in the Big Sandy area to maintain high mine output for five years or more. And he added that if the coal could be brought out of the mines now so difficult of access, the region not only would prosper from the shipping of coal but also from the attracting of industries to Pikeville, Prestonsburg, Paintsville, Lenoir, Cathey, and other towns and cities in the surrounding area.

The project was approved three years ago by the army engineers and the Secretary of War. And during the 79th Congress, authorization was included in the rivers-and-harbors bill brought to the House floor. There the project was deleted, the only item in the omnibus bill singled out for defeat. Association members say that was because of the opposition of the railroads and of some Congressmen from other states—including West Virginia—who felt they would be protecting their own areas by killing the project.

William H. Webb, executive vice-president of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, told the group that the Big Sandy project was "one of the best in the United States" and that it had a top priority on that organization's list of recommended projects.

Congressmen who spoke at the dinner and pledged support were Brent Spence, Tom Underwood, Noble Gregory, Joe Bates, Carl Perkins and Frank Chaff.

E. E. Hedrick, of West Virginia, attended the dinner but left before the Congressmen were called on to speak. He said that he, of West Virginia, did not say whether he was for or against the project, but he cautioned members of the Association that 79 cents of every tax dollar is going for payment for the last war and the current defense program, leaving this year "there is very little chance your project will get through this Congress."

Dr. Thompson replied that the Association members felt they would be successful, because culmination of the project would aid in the nation's industrial defense plans.

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Ohio River Cities Stress Water Sanitation

Cities on the upper reaches of the
Ohio river and its tributaries are
showing an unusual recognition of
the importance of pollution con-
trol, Henry Ward, Kentucky com-
missioner of conservation, reported
following a meeting of the Ohio
River Valley Water Sanitation Com-
mission at Pittsburgh.

The city of Pittsburgh and 126
other municipalities in Allegheny
county, Pa., are cooperating in a
joint program to build a sewage
treatment plant, Ward said.

"The Pittsburgh area recognizes
its obligation to cease dumping its
raw sewage and industrial wastes
onto the cities downstream," Ward
said. "Kentucky cities need to ad-
vance their own programs to co-
operate in the Ohio river pollution
control plan."

Ward was elected vice-chairman
of the commission, which is com-
posed of representatives of eight states
in the Ohio river basin, Joseph L.
Quinn, Terre Haute, Indiana, was
named chairman, succeeding Hun-
son Biery, of Cincinnati.

Former Knott Sheriff Succumbs Wednesday

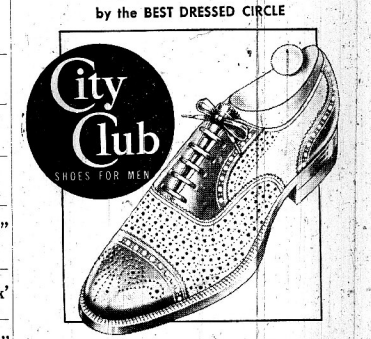
Galloway L. Napier, former Knott county sheriff and prominent farmer, died Wednesday night at his home in Hindman following a long illness.

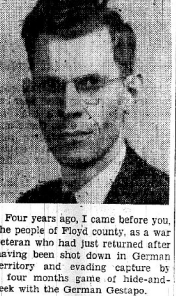

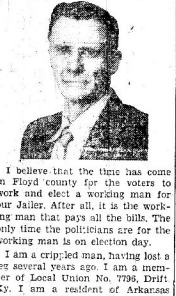
