A modern school-building program might well include facilities for housing all school activities, including shops and home economies buildings, as well as living quarters for teachers and custodial employees, where conditions warrant."

GYM CLASSES IN EXHIBITION

50 Pupils In 12 Even's
To Show Phys-Ed Skill
At Martin School, May 11

Approximately 50 physical education students will stage a 12-event demonstration featuring an exhibition boxing match, performances on the trampoline and various acrobatics and drills at the Martin high school gym beginning at 8 p.m., May 11.

Donal "Boss" Halbert, Martin coach, who will be in charge, announced this week the almost two-hour show is for the purpose of showing the parents and public in general that something else besides just basketball takes place in the school gym. "No admission will be charged," he said.

Competitive games will be staged by the boys and girls divided into two platoons. Pete Grigsby, Jr., captain of the boys and Georgeanne Rook is captain of the girls. Both are freshmen.

The athletic program at the school, in its second year, under Halbert, is described as "The American movement" developed from the German and Swedish movements and adapted from the army's basic calisthenics. It includes competitive games and training in skill, coordination and endurance. Halbert described his physical education program as one designed to develop the body as well as the mind of the pupil, which is in keeping with the Quaker policy of educators. The State Department of Education requires all schools to carry on a similar program.

The schedule, instituted at Martin by Halbert, is composed of two lecture periods and three workouts or participation classes in the gym each week.

Halbert, a lieutenant in the army during the recent war, was physical training and athletics director at Brooks General hospital and stationed at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas.
