made by a UCN official on the basis of all unproved labor having membership in that union, having skilled workers with the AFL organization. Another report said contractors had asked UCN officials if they could provide them with qualified men who already are members of their union and that they were told they could not.

The situation at Price is viewed as presenting the UMWA through its United Construction Workers and District 50 in particular conflict with the AFL at a time when John L. Lewis, UMWA leader, was reported to return to the American Federation of Labor fold.

A President William Green reported to the AFL executive council that a meeting with Lewis two weeks ago Green had indicated earlier that the union with the mine workers would have been devoted primarily to the fight over repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act.

But one top AFL leader said that Lewis was anxious to come back to the organization "on any terms" now because of the influence of his own contract showdown with the coal industry. July 3, Mrs. Mary Lewis, wife of Lewis, said she was power again in the AFL, these influential men predict.

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Those who say Lewis is making overtures think he wants to become head of the AFL on retirement of 75-year-old Green, a former mine worker, who has held the post since 1922. Lewis never true has denied any such ambition.

But members of the AFL executive council who previously were willing to make peace with Lewis now say they will fight any return to power in the federation of the mine leader.

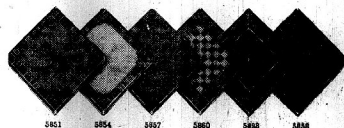

### Gathering of 1,000 Attends Rites Held For Victim of River

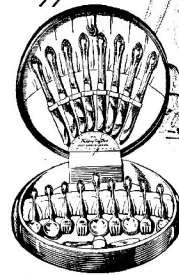

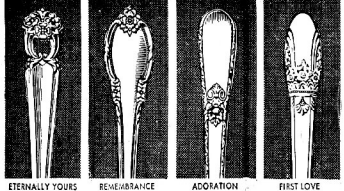

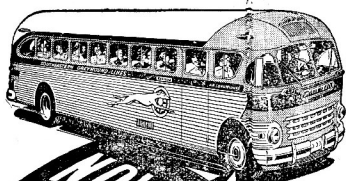
### Sudden Seizure Claims Retired Miner at Emma

## Rites for Cpl. Clark, Shrapnel Fire Victim, Held on Abbott Creek

Last rites for Cpl. John Clark, who was killed on March 22, 1949, by a shrapnel burst during the fighting for the Rhine river in Germany at the age of 19 years, were conducted Sunday afternoon from the Community Church on Abbott Creek, with American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts according to military honors.

The veteran's body was first buried in the U.S. military cemetery at Henri Chapelle, Belgium. His body was returned to this country Saturday.

He was a native of Bayside, Tenn., and spent most of his boyhood at Springfield, O., and there was employed by the Crowell-Coker Publishing Co. and Bauer Brothers. His survivors include his mother and step-father, Edward Gibson, of Prestonsburg, a sister, Mrs. Ernest Baldridge, Lima, O., a brother, Philmore Clark, and one half-sister, Dollie Clark, both of Wooten, Ky. Also surviving are his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Collins, East Point, and Mrs. Jane Clark, Wooten, Ky.

Officiating at the funeral were the Revs. H. C. Church and Dan Gibson. Burial was made in the May cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

## GRAYSON TO EST. STATE COPS

Frankfort, Ky., May 25.—State police announced today Grayson has become the 118th Kentucky city to invite the organization to exercise its powers within the city's boundaries. There are 147 Kentucky cities of the first five population classes in which the state police can function only upon invitation.

Grayson is a small town in the south of the state, approximately 200 miles from the capital.

Up to now, the school building was blown from its foundation. The nearby home occupied by Worley Ratliff and owned by J. C. Martin, was literally blown away, leaving Ratliff and his son, Jimmy Patton, lying unharmed on the floor, the only part of the structure remaining.

On Saliers Branch, less than a mile away, barns of Zeb Onley and Willie Sparkman were blown away, and a tree crashed through the roof of Lee Prater's store.

Over the county, orchards were badly damaged, roads temporarily blocked by fallen trees, power lines out.

In Prestonsburg, four breaks in power lines were reported, roads were partially stripped and lesser damage caused.

Roof of a home owned by Grace Webb at Allen was ripped off and blown an estimated 200 feet. At Gibson on Left Beaver Creek, a young couple saw their preparations for housekeeping come to wreckage as the wind blew their home from its foundations and tumbled it down the hillside while they slept.

Knott county had similar experiences, it was reported here. The school at Lark's Lane, on Jones Fork, was jostled from its foundation and badly damaged.

One death resulted in the state from the storm, and that in Pulaski county. Damage elsewhere included: Pulaski in Lee county—A house torn from foundation; fences, trees, other property scattered over the countryside.

Richmond in Madison county—Radio tower at state police district station damaged.

Witt Springs, in Bell county—Willie Lutes and his mother, Mrs. Nannie Lutes, 80, injured when their house wrecked. Other property damaged. Storm hit there Saturday.

Irvine, in Bell county—Grandstand of ball park unroofed.

Lee and Outley counties—Wide-spread crop and property damage caused by heavy rain followed by freakish winds.

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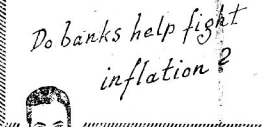

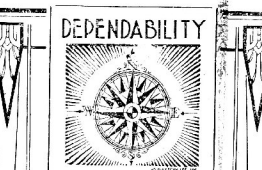

**PLANS HEARD TO LOWER COST AND IMPROVE MAINTENANCE**

**Floyd County Highway Men in Meeting at Pike**

Plans for improving maintenance operations on Kentucky highways, in line with proposals issued recently by Highway Commissioner John A. Keck, were discussed in Pikeville Monday with supervisory personnel of the seventh district.

Maintenance Director M. F. Johnson, Equipment Director W. A. Timmer and District Engineer M. L. Parker outlined methods of cutting maintenance costs in the field and providing a more efficient maintenance program.

Both titles aims were strongly called for in a recent speech delivered by Commissioner Keck at Frankfort. A recording of the entire speech was played at the meeting.

"The record of the Commissioner's statement is being presented to the supervisory personnel of every district because we want you to know exactly how he feels about your job," Mr. Johnson said. "This business of maintaining Kentucky's highways is not a job, it's a responsibility. It's not a job to be done by a few men in the central office for only one. Poor maintenance is not only a poor service to the public but a waste of public funds."

"Every necessary piece of equipment will be provided for every operation," Mr. Timmer assured the group. "What we do not want, however, is idle equipment. If a bulldozer or a loader is needed in an adjacent county and is not being used where it is stored, we want that piece of equipment placed in operation where it is needed. It is better economy for good business to have idle equipment anywhere unless we have no immediate use for it. Make every piece of equipment you have earn its keep."

District Engineer Parker expressed appreciation for the opportunity afforded the district personnel for a discussion with central office representatives of the vital maintenance program, and assured every cooperation on the part of the district to provide improved maintenance operations.

Each year I have been in office, we have met our debt obligations as they came due, and I assure you, every year I am your County Judge these debts will be paid until this county is debt-free.

Right now, Floyd county has over \$300,000 in the bank, placed there in a sinking fund against this county debt. With sound business handling of the county's financial affairs, this debt will be paid within another four years. Many of the bonds against the county, now drawing heavy interest, could be retired at this time but, unfortunately for us, they are not callable.

All this I point out to show why the individual needs of communities in the county—roads, bridges, and other improvements—cannot be available immediately, no matter how much you or I may want them.

Permit me to add: I intend to run a clean race during this campaign. I have no ill word to speak of any opposition I may have. I want the people simple to know the facts and to consider me as their servant strictly on my merits. I promise you courteous and faithful service and an honest administration. Did I seek your support on any other grounds, I would not merit your votes.

Over the state, 415 persons took all or part of the examination, 263 persons successfully passed and have been mailed certificates; 152 persons either failed or did not complete the examination.
