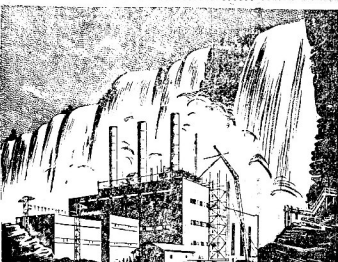

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Twenty per cent of World War II veterans enrolled in schools and colleges under the G.I. Bill are preparing for careers in only three fields—Agriculture, Business and Engineering.

Of the veterans engaged in on-the-job training, 40 per cent also are learning to fill positions in only three fields—mechanics and repairmen, managerial occupations, and jobs in the construction trades. These figures were disclosed in a Veterans Administration study of the principal training courses of 1,809,122 veterans in schools and colleges and 392,988 in on-the-job training.

Several thousand United States residents who served in the Canadian forces during World War II have not yet applied for benefits provided by the Canadian government, according to the Canadian Department of Veterans Affairs. The benefits are for World War II service and consist of war service gratuity and readjustment credit. Gratuities amount to \$750 for each 30 days of service, with an additional 25 cents for each day overseas. This money is not given to the veteran but is paid out by the Department of Veterans Affairs in Canada on the veteran's behalf for specific purposes. Eligible veterans now living in the United States may use this readjustment credit only for the purchase of veterans' insurance in Canada.

Eligible veterans who have not already received war service gratuity or readjustment credit from the Canadian government, should contact the Canadian Department of Veterans Affairs, at Ottawa, Canada.

Former School Orator, War II Victim in Battle, Returned to Home Grave

Last rites for Robert Leslie Rummels, who was killed Dec. 16, 1944 at Kesternick, Germany, were conducted Saturday afternoon from the church where he had attended from boyhood. The funeral was conducted by the Rev. M. C. Yates, A. C. Harlowe and M. C. Harlowe.

Burial, with military honors accorded by Floyd Post, American Legion, and Walter Karr Bowling Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, was made in the May cemetery, the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home directing. A son of Mrs. Parnell Harris Rummels and the late William Pierce Rummels, he was born March 24, 1922 at West Prestonsburg and was killed at the age of 22 years.

Robert was graduated from Prestonsburg high school with the class of 1939 and received his A.B. degree from Berea College in 1943. As a student he distinguished himself as a leader and speaker. In 1942 he was winner of the Men's Kentucky State Oratorical Contest and represented Kentucky in the National meet at Northwestern University. He was a member of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. At Berea College he was official announcer of all athletic events, president of the Public Affairs Forum, a member of Tau Kappa Alpha, Phi Delta and Beta Beta Beta. He was also interested in athletics and in 1942 won second place in the mile run at the Kentucky state track meet.

He was inducted into the army on March 5, 1943 and assigned to the Medical Corps. Later, he volunteered for infantry service and received training at Camp Buckner, N.C., and Camp Pickett, Va. In 1944 he was sent with the Lightning Division to the European theater of war and participated in the fighting in Holland, Belgium and Germany. During the Battle of the Bulge his company was assigned to capture and hold the town of Kesternick, Germany, through which ran the German supply line. Cut off from his unit, it was subjected to heavy fire. He was killed instantly by a grenade.

He was a member of the Prestonsburg Methodist Church, an active member of the Methodist Sunday School, and was president of the Big Sandy Young People's Methodist League.

He is survived by his mother, one brother, William P. Rummels, and many relatives and friends.

Grab It, Prestonsburg— If You Can!

THE recent letter to the editor of this newspaper written by N. M. (Bud) White, suggesting the Dervey reservoir as a source of water for Prestonsburg, has attracted wide attention locally, and deservedly so.

If water from the lake which unpopulated John Creek is to form can be made available to this or any other community, how disappointed upon the liquid filth that is the Big Sandy river, the remedy should be immediately and which that of few communities in the country could excel.

The possibility exists, it is said, that the auxiliary to the present water plant serving Prestonsburg will be located, being conspired to get water where Prestonsburg will not be drinking its own sewage. Yet there is the excitement of all the other communities above Prestonsburg which must be doctored, and doctored carefully, for human consumption, regardless of any new site along the river.

The Johns Creek lake would provide an abundant supply of water fit for drinking purposes, and the water Prestonsburg would use would not affect the level of the reservoir. If permission for its use can be procured, failure of Prestonsburg to grasp the opportunity, even if the initial cost is rather heavy, would be not unlike expressing a preference for swill over water from an unsifted mountain spring, simply because swill is cheaper.

Committee in Senate Ups Dewey Dam Fund To Insure Completion

The Senate Appropriations Committee recently approved an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to complete the Dewey reservoir project in this county.

This figure is \$263,800 more than that allowed by the House Bill. Completion of the dam is expected this year. The big concrete job is expected to be completed within the next month. After that will come the construction of the dam tenders' quarters, installation of operating machinery, surfacing of the road across top of the dam, and general mopping-up operations.

Contract for removal of graves from the reservoir area has not yet been awarded, but this is expected soon. The contractor will be required to begin work within 10 days of the issue of a work order and the job is to be completed within four months.

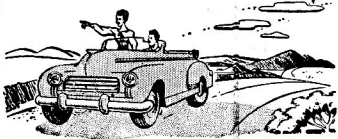

AUDUBON—THE SPORTSMAN'S ARTIST

No man has loved American wildlife more than John James Audubon. It is this affinity of his with the wilderness that makes him important to us today. The lessons he learned from experience still have a real value for the sportsman of today.

He was actually a creature of the forest rather than a studio artist or scholarly naturalist. According to historical writer Moran Tudor, he shared his secrets. Not even the Indians knew our wildlife any better.

There was nothing in his appearance to suggest the artist. Deerskin and leggings were his dress. He possessed great physical strength and less energy. He was an excellent marksman; hunting quail and grouse was his favorite sport. The only meat he thought worth eating was game—especially venison.

Audubon was a sportsman's artist. His pictures had money to sell for England and feel. His great fame today makes us forget the obstacles he had to overcome in securing their sale. We forget that this was the work of a penniless enthusiast. To get his pictures, he roamed the American wilderness for years, and at a constant risk of life and limb. He thought nothing of walking 200 miles to draw a single picture. But none of these things mattered to him—danger or privation or discouragement.

He was born in 1785 on what is now known as Haiti. The call of the wilderness came early to him, and his boyhood was filled with a single passion: he wanted to hunt, to sketch birds, to be a taxidermist—to him.

By now a definite plan was forming in his mind. He wanted to make a book of pictures that would show every kind of American bird. And in order to do this he would have to see them all; to visit swamp and prairie, forest, river and Gulf. His wife encouraged him.

Twenty years passed on the frontiers before he amassed enough pictures and money to sail for England to arrange for their publication. "Birds of America" brought Audubon fame. But all during the years when his scores of numbers were published, he was still working to make it better. Harassed by the fear that it might be incomplete, he went everywhere in search of additional water birds.

Sometimes his work was bitterly criticized by rival naturalists and ornithologists. But this didn't disturb him much. All that interested him was to be in the woods again. The way that Audubon figured was that there was always something for him to see and learn. If it concerned the outdoor life, that was enough for him.

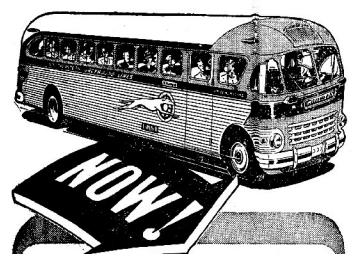

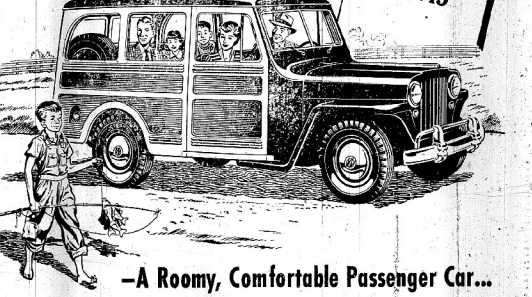

4 tsp. lard or shortening 4 tsp. fat
baking powder 2 T. milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness, dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon greased baking sheet. If crumbly biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (350° F.) for about 10 minutes.
