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SPECIAL HELP IN VOTE CASE

Asked by Mr. Stephens; Four State Attorneys Listed in Speculation

Lexington, Ky., June 15—The names of four prominent Kentucky attorneys were put at the top of the list today in speculation over the possibility of outside counsel helping the government prosecute the Bourbon county election-trad case.

U. S. Attorney General Tom Clark confirmed in Washington he had received a suggestion from U. S. District Attorney Claude P. Stephens here that special counsel be used in the case to assist him.

Quoting an authoritative source, The Lexington Leader listed the four attorneys whose names had been offered for the assignment as: Mr. Brown, III, Louisville, former U. S. District Attorney for the Western district of Kentucky; Jesse K. Lewis, Frankfort, former assistant state attorney general; Robert Meredith, former state attorney general; and Charles Dawson, Louisville attorney.

The leader said an organization now in the process of forming would add that objectives of the organization and the nature of its proposed operations could not be determined immediately.

Edward P. Prebaker, Jr., formerly closely associated with high school officials, and his Lexington law partner, A. E. Funk, Jr., son of the present Kentucky Attorney General, were indicted by the May grand jury on charges of conspiracy in connection with the case.

Vote tabulators found 245 forged ballots in 11 Bourbon county precincts during the November 1948 general election. The case is set for trial July 5.

State Police Exams To Begin July 11th

Competitive examinations will be given, beginning July 11, for applicants to the Kentucky State Police, Commissioner Guertie Crowe announced last night.

The deadline for all applications is June 30. Application blanks are available at all district offices or at headquarters in Frankfort. Information may be obtained from any proper of one of the district offices. Time and place of the exams will be announced later.

Applicants making the highest grades on the examinations and meeting the qualifications on the Kentucky State Police will be given an interview following the exam. New graduates of the county are finished and it is determined which applicants made the highest grades. All men will be hired on a competitive basis.

Starting salary for a trooper is \$70 per month. He is given a new uniform, a new car, vacation time and sick leave with pay.

Qualifications for becoming a trooper state that he must be a citizen and resident of Kentucky, of good moral character, not less than 21 nor more than 35 years of age, at least five feet, nine inches in height, weigh not less than 150 pounds, and possess a high school diploma or its equivalent. Credit is given for experience in police administration or law enforcement work.

I am not a politician who will shake your hand and hug your neck or make wild promises in order to get your vote. I am just a veteran who is trying to do a good job for the people and do a vice which will permit me to go to sleep at night knowing that I have wronged no one, but feeling that I have contributed something to the betterment of my country.

The teachers of Floyd county who came to me to have their retirement papers filled out and acknowledged did not pay, although according to law I should have collected at least one dollar from each of them.

I have turned over to the Floyd County Fish and Game Club the hunting and fishing licenses so that they might be sold in various places convenient to the public. I permitted the Club to retain a major share of the fees, thus contributing hundreds of dollars each year to help it protect and increase game and fish reserves in Floyd county. Floyd county stands near the top in the sale of hunting and fishing licenses as a result of my cooperation with the Fish and Game Club.

No person has ever been charged by me for waiting a deed, regardless of how far I have gone out in the county to take the acknowledgment. All blank deeds, mortgages, bills of sale, and every other blank form have been furnished free of charge to the public and never have I charged or permitted anyone to charge for them. I have paid the postage on all deeds, other documents and automobile licenses mailed from this office. That service alone saves the public hundreds of dollars a year.

We spend hours each day looking up deeds and mortgages and other public records for people and never make a charge for this service.

We acknowledge and place the county seal on thousands of papers for veterans, miners, teachers and old people and never do I charge, although you all know the law says that I shall collect fifty cents for each time I use the seal.

People, I have tried to comply with the law in all respects and have been frank and honest in dealing with you and in handling your business, thus looking to your happiness and making your protection. I have examined each paper you have lodged for record and have advised you if I saw anything wrong.

I have handled the elections for the last four years as straight and as honest as possible, giving advice and fair treatment to all parties concerned. I believe the public appreciates the fairness and rapidity with which the votes have been counted during my term of office. All past elections as well as the coming ones have been and will be handled with strict impartiality on my part.

Never has any veteran been charged for having his discharge records filled out. I have paid thousands of dollars in salary to persons to record these discharges without remuneration to myself. I have furnished hundreds of free copies of discharges to the Veterans Administration and no man has ever paid more than one dollar for a copy of his discharge from this office, for his personal use, although at least sixty-two other counties in this state charge one dollar and fifty cents for this same service. It was necessary for me to charge this one dollar fee for this work, as permitted by law, to help defray the cost of hiring typists for this work.

I have conducted my private life in a sober and dignified manner so that you, the public, could be proud of me as a public official. When I have told you anything, you know that I have told you the truth. I may not be a "Back-Slapper" or a "Smooth-Tongued" politician but I have served you with complete honesty and truthfulness.

Friends, you don't owe me a thing for the services I have performed, but you do owe yourselves every effort possible in selecting the person who you know will faithfully and honestly serve you as your County Clerk. This is perhaps the most important office in the county in its effect on your personal life and well-being because here are recorded the deeds which protect your title to your home; the marriage records which protect your rights and titles to property; your voting records which insure the exercise of your birthright; and virtually every document concerning your happiness and welfare. 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GRAVE WORK TO BEGIN SOON

In Johns Creek Area; Work on Dam at Dewey Now 97 Per Cent Done

An official of the Greenbrier Farms, Norfolk, Va., firm which has the contract for removal of graves from the Johns Creek reservoir area, was at Johns Creek Wednesday and beginning of the task of transferring approximately 800 bodies to new graves is expected to be started within the next few days.

The firm was awarded the contract on its bid of \$44,444. Bodies removed will be reburied in two cemeteries, one at Auxley and another on the Auxley road. The contract also covers erection of tombstones at the new graves.

As this project was almost ready to be started, Winston Ford and Arvie L. Buford, contractors on relocation of highways in the reservoir area, were in their second week of work.

The dam itself stood 97 per cent complete last week. Purchase of property rights from landowners in the area remains probably the biggest job yet to be done.

Road construction along the western shore of the lake to be formed by impounding of Johns Creek extends from German down to the mouth of Clark Branch. No provision has been made, however, for road construction from that point on to the dam itself, approximately a mile away. This is seen as a job for the county to do; otherwise, there will be no highway connection with the dam from the Floyd county end.

Removal of graves is to be completed within four months after work is started.

So it quotes others when it reports one bit of railroad testimony to the effect that the Big Sandy division passenger trains are important to the C. & O.'s well-known George Washington.

We're not going to argue with anybody about that. Instead, we simply want to let the members of the Kentucky Railroad Commission again pay a visit to the Big Sandy valley. Let them, first, board the George Washington, enjoy its cleanliness, its diner and other conveniences.

Then let them step straight from that train at Ashland to the train up Sandy. If, by the time they have been jerked and jolted from one stop to another as far as Prestonsburg, they are not convinced that that Sandy River train isn't more convenient to a cattle train than to the George Washington—so help us, we'll refund their money.

Moreover, we'll buy them a return ticket home by whatever method of transportation they prefer.

Now Is the Time

THE lake-to-be on Johns Creek can be not only a mecca for fishermen but also a splendid recreation spot for persons of all ages.

But it will be no Norris or Dale Hollow or anything approximating any of the TVA lakes. The valley it will fill is comparatively narrow; the lake itself will be only a dozen miles, or thereabouts, in length at pool stage.

Because of its narrowness and of its importance to vast section until now denied recreation on a lake near home, it follows that speedboat is a sport for which the reservoir will not be a d a p t e d. Hair-Breadth Harry tactics in powerfully low boats will not only inconvenience those who follow the more sedate sport of fishing but will also actually endanger the lives of women and youngsters seeking leisurely enjoyment in boating.

Whoever has the authority—and the temerity—to do something about it, should without further delay establish a limit on the horsepower motors to be used on the lake. This should be done, now, for three reasons:

1. It is not practical to permit motors of unlimited size to be operated and to seek to cut speeding by speed limit enforcement. Water traffic cops are not quite the thing needed.

2. Those planning the purchase of motors should know how powerful the motor to be allowed on the lake.

3. Those who now have over-size motors should be given an opportunity to dispose of them before the lake opens.

If it is to be a recreation spot for all, lake steps now to curb the few who would send others rolling in the backwash of their motors.

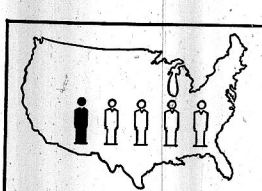

BOUNTY ON SCALPS, WASTE OF MONEY?

After more than 200 years of bloodletting and scalp-collecting, most conservation experts agree that it's a waste of money to set a price on the heads of foxes, coyotes, weasels, wolves, certain kinds of hawks and owls, mountain lions and such assorted villains. In fact, there is increasing evidence that most of these are not villains at all, but are beneficial except in isolated cases.

Nevertheless, the bounty system continues—principally because of two powerful factors: pronounced public opinion, especially among hunters, in favor of bounties; and an unhappy knowledge possessed by conservation officials that some predators sometimes must be controlled somehow, even if the bounty system doesn't seem to be the right method.

According to Outdoor Writer Bill Wolf, there isn't any good, factual evidence to prove that bounties materially reduce populations, or ever have done so except in small local areas. Nor is there any evidence that most of the animals and birds turned in for bounties wouldn't have been killed anyway by trappers, sportsmen and farmers.

Michigan has had unhappy experiences with bounties. From 1939 to the present, it has paid more than \$1,500,000 in bounties on wolves, coyotes, and other animals—and the coyote has increased nearly, thank you.

One of the few good things about the bounty system is that it is the hunters' money going down the drain, not the general taxpayers'.

Predators have been quite happy under the Pennsylvania bounty system which started in 1938. Gray foxes are increasing and expanding their range. Red foxes have thrived under the system. There has been no noticeable decline in weasels, destructive hawks and owls.

The answer adds up to the same: bounties apparently do not control predators. However, predators must be controlled at times, and if the bounty system doesn't work, what will?

States are now trying to educate their citizens to accept the logical solution—intense local war, where needed on predators by professional trappers and exterminators, plus the education of farmer-trappers in the same sort of work.

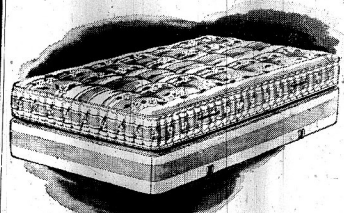

He was pinned beneath the truck but was quickly extricated. He suffered a long gash on his throat but continued to his home after first aid at the Prestonsburg General hospital.

Scouts To Open Summer Camp, June 30, At Camp Arrowhead; Changes Described

Camp Arrowhead, Boy Scout camp of the Loudoun-Pike Council, Boy Scouts of America, will open for the 1949 summer camp, Thursday, June 30.

Camp Arrowhead, which is perhaps the outstanding project of the 15 counties comprising the Loudoun-Pike Council, has long been a place of interest and adventure for the hundreds of Scouts in the Council. Several changes will be made at the camp this summer to improve the program and sleeping facilities. This will include china and silverware, cooking utensils, athletic equipment including softball, volleyball, tennis ball and horseshoes, new tent platforms, new handicraft building and new float or ramp for the waterfront.

The central staff has been completed for some weeks and promised to be one of the strongest ever serving at Camp Arrowhead. Acting as athletic director and responsible for the program will be Edward J. Dillon, field executive of the Virginia area, a professional Scoutmaster for three years and a graduate of the national camp training school. Serving as provisional scoutmaster, scoutkeeper and campfire director will be Arthur Wrightson, new field executive who is now attending the national training school at Mendham, N.J. Mr. Wrightson is an Eagle Scout and has had considerable experience as a Scout leader. Waterfront director will be Eagle Scout Delbert West, now a student in Wilmington College. Mr. West has had five years experience in Scout work and is a graduate of the Scout national aquatic school. Handicraft director and in charge of the national camp fraternity, Order of the Arrow will be Eagle Scout James Owens of Paintsville, now a student in Pikeville College.

Special activities features for this year will be a morning Scoutmaster program, offering Scout campers a chance to learn in practically any subject, with emphasis to be placed on outdoor requirements. The morning swim period will be on the instruction basis, with the aim of the waterfront director being to teach every one to swim who can't swim and for those who can, to become more proficient. Following the noonday meal a variety of activities will

be offered, including handicraft, leathercraft, metalcraft, archery, rifle shooting, Indian bowmanship, rope work, whip-cracking and other skills. Following this activity period, the entire camp will participate in wide games such as gold rush, scavenger hunt, adventure trail, capture the flag and others. The afternoon swim will be a free period with the big idea being to have as much fun as possible. Following "retreat ceremony" and supper, the troops will participate in athletic competition, to be followed by campfire with songs and stories.

Reservations are already beginning to come into the office and all troops are urged to register as soon as possible in order to be assured of a camp site during the week of their choice. Following the Scout camp, which will terminate on July 27, Camp Arrowhead will be made available to the Girl Scout organization for a two-week period, to the Christian Church group under the leadership of the Rev. H. J. Farmer, of Elkton City, for one week, and to the Methodist Youth Fellowship for the following week-end.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

Maybe you have been wondering why in the two years and nine months you have been getting my weekly pieces I haven't written much about Henderson, my home town. Well, I've been waiting for the community to do something big enough at least to lead off with one major achievement to which I could hang a general story.

Now I have it. Toward the end of the late war the federal government built a \$600,000 hospital at Atkinson Park. The hospital was supposed to be for military use, perhaps because it was only 20 miles from Camp Breckinridge. But, whether the government had a good reason for spending \$600,000 for a hospital in Henderson is neither here nor there.

For two years the hospital was leased to the county and city jointly. Under political management it ran rather poorly in the end and it ran up to the government to dispose of it and up to the community to acquire it.

Recently the city and county did what they could to help financially and the Methodist Church proposed to take over the hospital and operate it if the public would raise \$68,000 to put the institution in the clear. The climax of the story is that the people went down into their jeans for the \$58,000 and \$12,000 more.

Henderson's fine health center, also built by the government, will be owned and operated by the county and city jointly.

The Henderson Lions Club furnishes free examinations and free glasses for every underprivileged child in the city and county, regardless of race or religion. The money for this work is raised mainly by selling sight seals once a year.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce bought equipment for a free dental clinic and operates it in conjunction with the Health Department. This clinic serves all underprivileged children in the city and county. Much of the money for this project is raised with an annual Turtle Derby held in the high school stadium. The dentists of Henderson serve the clinic free of charge.

The Jaycees also equipped a large playground known as Goodfellow's Field, for softball and other sports, which led to the establishment of other playgrounds in the city.

L. Allen Rhoads, district governor of the Lions, and active member of the Jaycees, tells of many other projects, educational and recreational, that the two service clubs have sponsored, but there is not space enough for all of them in this article.

many, said the operators' choice for the job is Harry M. Moses. Moses is president of H. C. Fyke Coke Company, U.S. Steel Corporation's coal producing subsidiary.

The Southerners would like to reach an agreement before they are faced with accepting one made somewhere else.

Neither Moody nor Owens, who heads the miners' bargaining team, would comment on widespread reports that a move is under way to name a "czar" or "coordinator" for the coal industry and that Northern operators are in favor of the plan. "Any comment at this time would be premature," Moody said. He added that the Southern association has not been approached for its reaction to such a move.

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway announced Tuesday that shop employees and track crew doing programmed work would remain at work during the coal mine shutdown this week, but that approximately 3,700 trainmen and others directly concerned with train operations would be furloughed over the system.

Train operating personnel will be laid off gradually as hauling from the mines stops.

Physicians Agree Epidemic of Polio Possible This Year

An epidemic of infantile paralysis is statistically possible in Kentucky this year, doctors agreed at Lexington this week.

The doctors, gathered in a meeting, said that a record number of cases already are planning adequate treatment facilities. Refresher courses in treatment for doctors and nurses are included.

The preparations "have been prompted by a trend showing the disease usually moves in cycles, hitting a record year of the United States every four to six years."

This cycle is not always accurate, the doctors said. Some areas have had epidemics in two consecutive years. Some have gone much longer than six years.

The last serious epidemic in Kentucky was in 1944, when 759 cases were reported. Medical authorities are working on a possibility the cycle may bring an epidemic this year, the fifth since the last widespread outbreak.

SNOW BISCUITS

2 1/2 c. soft butter
4 c. sugar
1/2 c. salt
1/2 c. baking powder
1/2 c. milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball, and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to a thickness of 1/2 inch. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If cruddy biscuits are desired place about one inch apart. Otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 15 minutes.

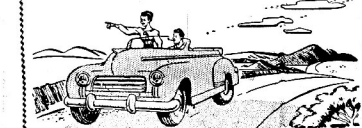

WATER STUDY PLANS MADE

State, Last in Nation To Begin Study; LaViers On Policy-Making Body

Frankfort, Ky., June 11—Kentucky has become the 48th state to start a planned study of water resources. Federal and state geological officials met here yesterday in the offices of the Agricultural and Industrial Development Board and agreed upon the program.

The board has ordered the help of five other state agencies to make the study. They are the Departments of Agriculture, Conservation, Health, Highways, and Mines and Minerals. The state will put up \$60,000 and the federal government will match that with \$60,000 to finance the study.

The study will cover surface water flow and control, ground-water supplies, and the chemical content of water in Kentucky.

George W. Hubby, director of the A. & I. Board, announced the agreement on the water project today. Objectives of the study are to provide flood-control data, locate wells for farmers, protect city water supplies from pollution, give the highway department information on underground water, and give industries seeking to settle in Kentucky any water resources details they want.

J.V.B. Wells, Washington, chief of the Surface-Water Branch, U. S. Geological Survey, said Kentucky's plan stacks up about average with other states financially and better than average on integration and cooperation among state agencies.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

BY EWING GALLOWAY

Maybe you have been wondering why in the two years and nine months you have been getting my weekly pieces I haven't written much about Henderson, my home town. Well, I've been waiting for the community to do something big enough at least to lead off with one major achievement to which I could hang a general story.

Now I have it. Toward the end of the late war the federal government built a \$600,000 hospital in Atkinson Park. The hospital was supposed to be for military use, perhaps because it was only 20 miles from Camp Breckinridge. But, whether the government had a good reason for spending \$600,000 for a hospital in Henderson is neither here nor there.

For two years the hospital was leased to the county and city jointly. Under political management it ran rather deeply in the red, and it was up to the government to dispose of it and up to the community to acquire it.

Recently the city and county did what they could to help financially, and the Methodist Church proposed to take over the hospital and operate it if the public would raise \$58,000 to put the institution in the clear. The climax of the story is that the people went down into their jeans for the \$58,000 and \$12,000 more.

Henderson's fine health center, also built by the government, will be owned and operated by the county and city jointly.

The Henderson Lions Club furnishes free examinations and classes for every underprivileged child in the city and county, regardless of race or religion. The money for this work is raised mainly by selling ditch seals once a year.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce bought equipment for a free dental clinic and operates it in conjunction with the Health Department. This clinic serves all underprivileged children in the city and county. Much of the money for this project is raised with an annual "Turtle Derby" held in the high school stadium. The dentists of Henderson serve the clinic free of charge.

The Joyce, a well-known playground known as Goodfellow's Field, for softball and other sports, which led to the establishment of other playgrounds in the city.

Allen Rhoads, district governor of the Lions, and active member of the Joyces, tells of many other civic, educational and recreational, that the two service clubs have sponsored, but there is not space enough for all of them in this article.

RIGHT & LEFT BEAVER CREEK SECTIONS HIT

By Recurrent Epidemic Leaving Arms Sore And Hands Limp

Martin, Ky. (Sp.)—With numerous right arms in slings this week and the supply of liniment running short, both the Right and Left Beaver Creek sections of the county are in the throes of a strange ailment which has hit the county in a comparable degree four years ago. Although the affliction does not defy diagnosis, the medical profession as yet has not come forward with a definite cure.

The two most common symptoms of the malady are extreme soreness of the right arm and the tendency of the right hand to grasp any object which comes within its range. Frankly the hand, evidently because of overwork, falls limp and doesn't return to normal until the first week in November. Usually these symptoms are accompanied by a sore shoulder, induced by repeated enthusiastic puts on the back. Strangely enough, only adults are subject to the attacks, with persons under 18 being immune. As far as can be determined it appears with striking regularity, starting in early summer and reaching its worst in the first few days of November. Then it subsides, only to break out anew four years later.

The epidemic usually starts at the county seat in a somewhat quiet house and gradually spreads through the county. For some reason it is not in cases where the line is not clearly defined adult citizens of adjoining counties have reported mild attacks.

Carriers of the malady are said to be candidates for the various county offices and one physician diagnosed it as Political Fever. Another insists that it is merely the old-time Candidate's Handshake, sometimes akin to St. Vitus Dance. He recommends that any person of voting age upon seeing a probable candidate approaching with outstretched hand, turn a quick about-face and head for the tall timber. He also suggests alternative measures which might possibly counter-attack the epidemic, one of which is for the potential victim to welcome the candidate with the casual announcement that he, too, is running for the same office. If this fails, touch him for a \$10 loan. There are other variations to this method, the principal one of which involves posing as a Puller Brush man or insurance salesman.

As far as is known, only two adults escaped the ravages of Political Fever when it struck the county four years ago. One boy-fetted it over the county line three jumps ahead of a candidate for Constable and remained in Knott county until after the election was over. The other held up in an abandoned coal mine on Ground Hog Day and didn't come out until Thanksgiving.

The candidates, because of strict training, are able to cover more ground than Dostpach husband-hunters on Sadie Hawkins' Day and only the very best of foot are able to outdistance them. For potential victims, both men and women, who desire to evade this affliction by the spry method it is suggested that they come down to Martin and get themselves shod with a pair of comfortable, long-wearing City Club or Veto step shoes. At the same time it wouldn't be a bad idea to fit up the children with nationally advertised Weatherbirds. Protect their feet now and when they become of voting age they will be able to keep out of the way of aspirants for public service, thereby saving their right hands from being hopelessly maimed or mutilated.

Candidates, we're just kiddin'! Come in and get yourself a pair. They won't guarantee that you'll be elected, but your feet will give you a routing vote of thanks for putting them in comfortable shoes as good as the best, at a cost cheaper than your wife's vote.

of redemption of fallen man.

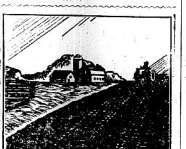
The first recorded sacrifice in

world but was made manifest in
these last times for you. (I Peter
1:18-20).

perfect law and a just law upon
Mount Sinai. Israel broke this law.
The broken law demanded the eternal
damnation of Israel. To look
upon the broken law without blood
is to face wrath. God said, "When I
see the blood I will pass over you."
To remove the blood from God's
