## PROTEST PLAN TO QUIT DAMS

Association Resolutions Reiterate Determination To Push Canal Project

Resolutions protesting the decision of the U. S. Corps of Engineers to abandon the Big Sandy locks and dams except Dam No. 1 at Cattelburg were adopted by the Big Sandy Valley Association at its meeting in Paintsville, Sunday.

The resolutions, prepared by Ex-Congressman A. J. May, also demanded the secretary's determination to continue its fight for "full and complete" cancellation of the concrete and masonry industry with adequate capital. The resolutions pointed out, "stands ready to aid and provide for use, or said to be necessary, for the carrying of the vast resources over said canal to a ready, waiting market, which is 'ready, waiting' and are not carried from one of said products, many of which are critical war materials, because of excessive transportation cost."

Proposed abandonment of the present locks and dams was described in the resolutions as an "artificial" which is "based, ill-considered and unfair to the people and the economic and industrial interests of the Big Sandy area."

## DEATH CLAIMS MARY ALLEN

Well-Known Woman Dies After Two-Year Illness; Rites To Be Held Friday

Mrs. Mary D. Allen, widow of Martin Taylor Allen and member of a prominent Floyd county family, died at 2 a.m. Wednesday at the home here of her daughter, Mrs. E. B. Humphreys, after an illness of two years. She was 70 years old. Although she had suffered for many months, and had recognized the gravity of her illness, "Anti Mary" as she was familiarly and affectionately known to hundreds of Floyd county people, had with characteristic courage refused to admit her growing weakness to others and had been confined to bed only a few days.

Mary Sells Davidson Allen was born Nov. 1, 1871, the daughter of Greenville R. and Laura Collier Davidson. She was married to Mr. Allen, 1892, to Martin Taylor Allen, who at one time was Sheriff of Floyd county, and who died in September, 1912. The death of her husband left her with four small daughters, and the energy and cheerfulness which she meted out to her children, and the problems in those earlier years and as long as the lived evoked acquaintance.

She was a member of the Presbyterian Church since its organization in Prestonsburg, and was a member of the Order of Rebeccahs and was also a member of the Order of Eastern Star. She worked for many years with Prestonsburg, and in this connection, together with her friendly nature, made her possibly Floyd county's best-known woman.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. C. L. Huttschiller and Mrs. E. B. Humphreys, and a son, E. B. Humphreys.

## KY. CHAMBER TO AID MOVE IN LAWRENCE

For Plant To Convert Big Sandy Valley Coal Into Gasoline Product

Hope for a new source of community of Big Sandy valley coal has been with the report that out of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce has been enlisted by Louisa Bessie, J. D. Adams, Henry Marc, D. E. Chaffin and C. R. Marshall. Temporary injunction was granted with a bonding to be held in circuit court later on the petition for a permanent stay of action. The plaintiffs alleged the City Council authorized no tax assessment, failed to set a tax rate and that no assessment was made for other years.

Robert L. Vinson, director of the Louisa Business Men's Association and a cousin of Chief Justice Fred Vinson, said he believed the community's bid for the plant which, he said, would employ upwards of 1,000 men.

While the plant operation itself might not employ men outside the Lawrence county area in appreciable numbers, the coal it would use for the production of gasoline would come from further upstream from Louisa and this would directly benefit the coal fields of the county. The Louisa site is considered more attractive than locations further upstream because of the larger volume of water there where the two forks of the Big Sandy converge. Two sites, each 10 to 25 acres, have been offered the Bureau of Mines, Mr. Vinson announced.

## PLAN SCOUT CAMP ROAD

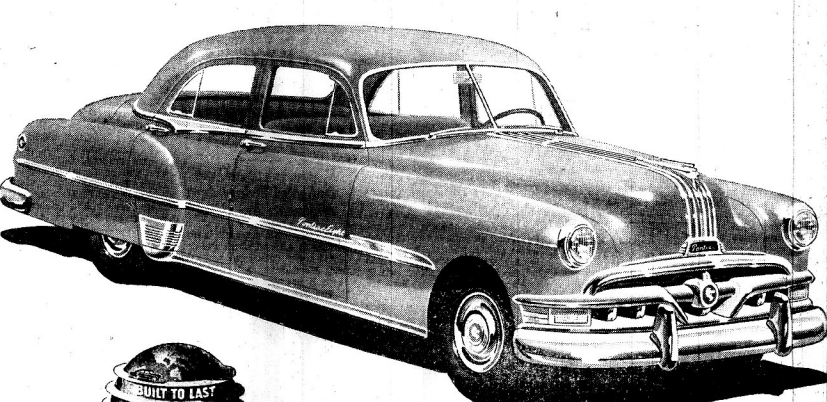

**IS YOUR CHILD STARTING SCHOOL THIS YEAR?** Most rural schools will begin July 23rd. Others will begin a few days later. Many parents are not sure whether their young child is eligible to enroll this school year—whether he must do so. Please note the following points:

(1) Children who have reached their 7th birthday must enroll and attend.

(2) Children who have or will have reached their 6th birthday by September 1st may enroll in the rural schools which begin this month. If the parents choose to enroll these children, they must attend regularly, under the school law.

(3) Children who do not reach their 6th birthday on or before September 1st shall not be enrolled nor taught by any teacher in the rural schools which begin prior to Sept. 1st.

Why does the law forbid children who are not 6 years of age by September 1st to enroll and attend school? This law is to protect the physical and mental health of the child. It has been found that the average child is not ready to do all of the things that he will be expected to do in the first grade in school until he is at least six years of age. Many children are not really ready for these activities until after they are six or seven years of age. Many children suffer severe mental and physical strain and acquire a hatred for school that may not be overcome for many years if they are forced into activities for which they have not sufficiently matured.

By sufficient testing it may be determined just when each individual child is ready to begin school. But it would be impossible to test all children accurately and some average point had to be established. This the legislature has determined by law. Superintendents and teachers who enroll and/or permit children who are not of legal age to attend school are in violation of this law, and may be doing the child serious harm.

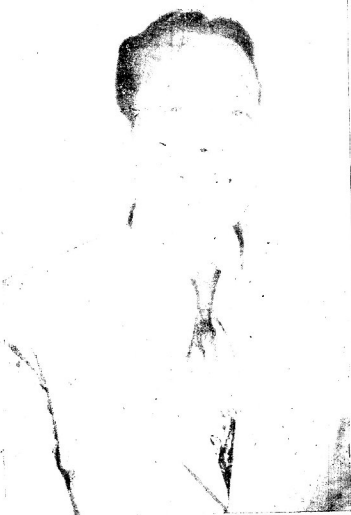

### Dams Not Feasible Here? Then Can They Be There?

CANALIZATION of the Big Sandy river would affect the fine river bottoms of the valley little, if at all, and the project would "pay for itself." Yet the Corps of Engineers now balks at it because of the increased costs of materials and construction.

On the other hand, the Engineers favor construction of flood control dams on the Licking river which would inundate thousands of acres of fertile farming land in a dozen counties and would result in no dollars-and-cents return on the costly investment.

Considering these anomalous engineering and economic theories, one wonders how economic ratios are arrived at by the engineers, and why.

W. E. "Snooks" Crutcher, editor of The Rowan County News, in the following editorial discusses the two projects:

The United States Senate has created so many committees like that probing the RCP and the Kefauver group that we suggest they might do well to appoint one to investigate the proposed Licking River dams and the opposed Big Sandy canalization.

They would find that big business, principally railroad companies, is operating behind the scenes to thwart the dams on the Big Sandy. Only because there is that members of Congress themselves would be involved, for pressure is apparent.

As to the Licking River dams the investigation would disclose that Cincinnati and Ohio Senators and Congressmen are doing everything they can to eliminate four or more Kentucky counties possessing some of the finest farming land in America. Surveys disclose that the canal on Big Sandy would be self-sustaining on large scale, opening up river traffic to America's greatest bituminous coal field. It would give Big Sandy, always best, competitively because of high freight rates, a chance to compete with other coal producing regions. And, it is to be found that members of the Congress from Pennsylvania, the Kanawha valley of West Virginia and other coal producing regions don't want the canals on the Big Sandy.

The Big Sandy dams are feasible but have met a bitter and unrelenting fight from big business.

The Licking dams, on the other hand, are being pushed under the guise of flood control, to give Greater Cincinnati a source of pure drinking water. The counties of Bath, Fleming, Bracken and Harrison would practically be exterminated while others to Rowan and Morgan would lose a large portion of their farm land. Army engineers will not listen to any proposals for a series of low dams and are only awaiting an opportunity time to re-submit the proposal calls for impounding the water to capacity during flood seasons and dropping it during dry seasons.

The Licking is a lazy stream meandering through the eastern part of the Bluegrass section of Kentucky; the Big Sandy is a mountain river and the loss in farm land would be negligible if the canalization comes. Yet, there is evidence that Congress will eventually dam the Licking and there is no indication that the money will be forthcoming for the Big Sandy.

The people of the Licking and Big Sandy valleys have made their voices heard but the opposing forces are only awaiting the time when the preparedness program lag and Congress is in the mood for "internal improvements" appropriations. A travesty of the public's interest is in the making.

## Farm NEWS and VIEWS

By HAROLD B. RICE, Floyd County Agent

LATE POTATOES—On potatoes just up, swarms of black fleas beetles will be found working. Their injury is puncturing the leaves with many the holes. In themselves these holes may not appear as being injurious, but taken together they represent quite some leaf surface loss, and being left surface means losing potatoes.

Dusting with 3 or 5 per cent DDT dust stops this insect and, as well, the leaf hopper that is responsible for later drying up of the leaves, again curtailing the crop. Two more dustings, 10 days apart, may increase the crop over half, as against plantings on which these insects are permitted to have their way.

Further, here is a reminder that late blight may cause potatoes to die down when the crop has just started to set on. For blight insurance, at least two sprayings should be given with any of the coppers heretofore recommended for blight of potatoes. The first is given when the blooms buds are made; the second, 10 days later. Even though there is no specific blight, the "ionic effect" of sprayed-on copper will repay the expense many times over.

BEAN BEETLES—On what has been done toward controlling the earlier generations of this pest depends on how serious it will be on beans now. The third batch of peas is now being laid, and careful watch should be kept. Dusting with 3-4 percent or, better, 1 percent rotenone should be done immediately any are seen. Otherwise the "fall beans" soon to be planted

will suffer, sometimes quite badly. Fortunately, in extremely hot weather, the percentage of Mexican bean beetle eggs hatching is low, but not too much of that should be taken for granted.

TOMATO BLIGHT—As this is written, the first authentic report on tomato blight has come in. In this instance, dusting was done rather than spraying. From his own experience, the writer can say that unless the blight signs are severe, a very thorough spraying (drenching, in fact) can stop the blight, but at best there must be a gap until the blooms there are can make ripe fruit. Much better to have sprayed from the start, however.

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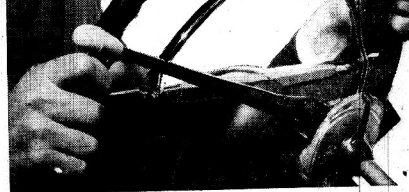

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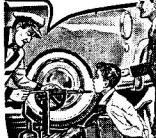

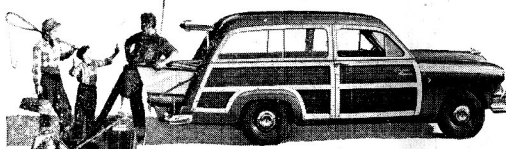

## New Topographic Maps Ready To Distribute

Frankfort, Ky., July 26 (Sp.)—  
Work on Kentucky's topographic  
mapping program is 30 per cent  
complete, although only four per  
cent of the maps have been pub-  
lished, it was announced today by  
Phil M. Miles, chief of the Maps  
and Minerals Division of the State  
Agricultural and Industrial De-  
velopment Board.

This announcement came as new  
topographic maps were being made  
available for part of Jefferson, Ox-  
ham, Bullitt, Spencer and Shelby  
counties. Military maps have been  
converted to civilian type in the  
Camp Breckinridge area in Union,  
Henderson and Webster counties.

Each of the maps covers approxi-  
mately 60 square miles of area and  
show roads, streams, rural houses,  
wooded areas, pipelines, principle  
electric transmission lines and any-  
thing of a landmark nature. Prin-  
ciple buildings within a town such  
as schools, courthouse and factories  
are also shown.

The purpose of the maps is to  
give basic information as to the  
location and character of the area  
covered.  
The maps are published by the  
U. S. Geological Survey under a  
co-operative arrangement between  
the state and federal governments.  
They are on sale at the U. S. G.  
D Board office here or the U.S.G.S.  
in Washington at 20 cents each.

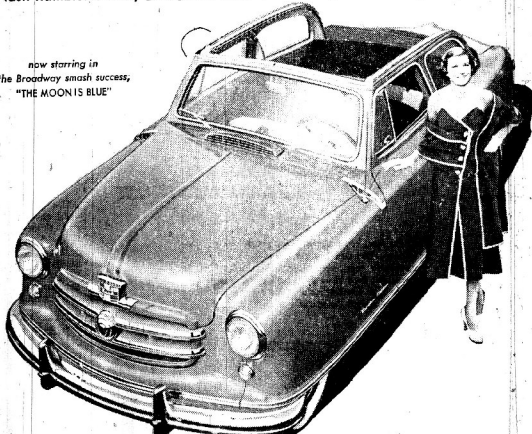

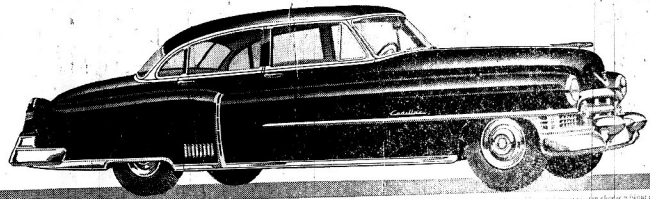

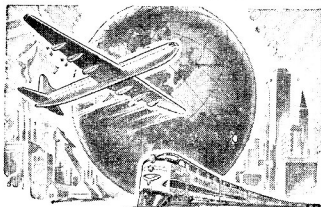

### Five Floyd Students Enrolled at Pikeville For 2nd Summer Term

Pikeville, Ky., July 19 — Four young women and one man from Floyd county are among the 39 students who enrolled last week for the second term of summer school at Pikeville Junior College.

Six Kentucky counties and the states of West Virginia and Virginia are represented in the group, according to an announcement today by President A. A. Page of the college.

Two thirds of the number, including four of the Floyd Countians, are registered in the teachers' course at Pikeville, preparing to become public-school teachers. Nine of them are expected to be in the graduating class of about 35 at summer commencement August 10.

All this summer's graduates will receive their diplomas in the teachers' course, which will make them eligible to receive the Provisional Elementary Certificate, awarded on completion of the minimum training required of a legally qualified teacher in Kentucky.

Curtis Jarvis, Radcliff, is one of the eight GI students included in the group, Dr. Page said. Six of the veterans are registered for their first college work, and five are taking the course which leads to the teachers' certificate.

The Floyd county students at Pikeville are Mrs. Ruth Akers, Lackey; Garnett L. Cox, Garrett; Joan Hall, Bypro, and Virginia O. Rath-Baldrige, East Point, also is enrolled in the teachers' course at the Pikeville school.

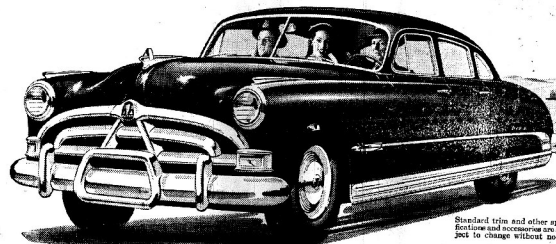

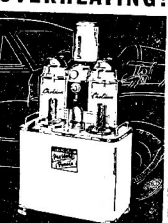

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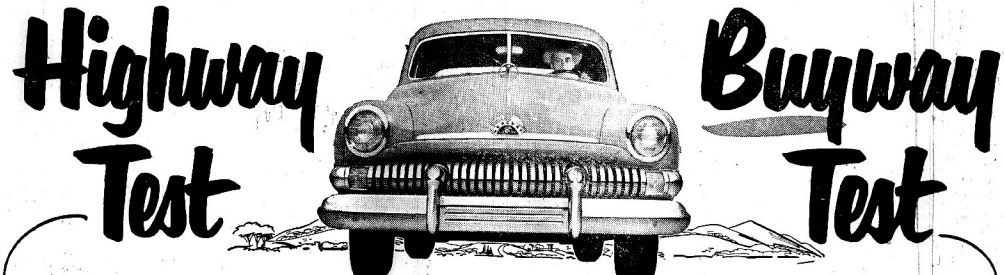
