Except for salary expenses, which can be cut in instances scattered here and there, where shall the cuts be made? The schools need more money, not less. The same is true of roads. The major phases of state government need full financial support.

What is the answer? New taxes? Who would suggest a higher income tax or a stiffer levy on real estate and personal property? Why not a sales tax which would collect on the basis of our spending and would affect all, not just a part of us?

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Kentucky Is Not a Poll Tax State, But...

KENTUCKY is not a poll tax state, we are reminded, but most of its counties, including Floyd, exact that tax of all who will pay. The collection of the tax is left within the discretion of the counties themselves. And so exists a tax law which is more inequitable even than Kentucky's ill-starred dog law. For the dog tax law affects nobody in Floyd county while the poll tax is collected from a part of the people while others ignore it. On top of that, the poll tax provides double or treble taxation for some.

To get down to cases, only the owner of property pays the poll tax. To go through the involved process necessary to collect the \$1 tax from those who do not own property is a labor the collector cannot justify, and so only a part of the people pay this part of the tax load. Moreover, those poll tax payers who reside in an incorporated town such as Prestonsburg with an independent school district will pay not only the county but also the city and the school district this per capita tax.

Judge Asks Cancer Fund Support; 10,000 Persons To Suffer Cancer, Claim

County Judge Henry Stumbo this week called for full support of cancer control activities during April which he proclaimed as "Cancer Control Month."

The proclamation pointed out that one-fourth of all the people of the county will eventually develop cancer. This is based on statistics which reflect cancer incidence throughout the state and nation. In Floyd county this would mean that at least 10,000 local residents will eventually have cancer, unless a big change is made in the statistical trend.

The Judge's proclamation said cancer had reached such proportions that a concerted effort by everyone is necessary to combat it and pointed out that nation-wide efforts to focus attention on cancer will be made during April.

The text of the proclamation follows: "WHEREAS, the people of this community have demonstrated on many previous occasions their ability to meet crisis with action and

"WHEREAS, it is statistically true that one-fourth of all the citizens of Floyd county eventually will develop cancer, unless new methods of protection are devised without delay, and

"WHEREAS, the health and lives of our people has reached proportions that demand concerted action by everyone with their time and their financial support, and

"WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has authorized the President to designate April as a special occasion for taking cognizance of this problem, and

"WHEREAS, a vast, nation-wide effort is being made through government agencies and by volunteer public organizations to concentrate attention on the disease cancer at this time, and

"WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society will conduct its annual crusade to educate the public and raise funds during the month of April,

THEFORE, I, Henry Stumbo, County Judge, do hereby ordain and proclaim the month of April as: CANCER CONTROL MONTH and FURTHERMORE request that all citizens of this community observe this occasion and lend their support to the American Cancer Society's 1953 crusade.

THIS IS A BIG CAT

This matter of communities setting up censorship boards to pass on what you and I shall read goes much deeper than what we see in it more to improve the morals of the country.

Anybody who has had a taste of the sort of literary trips they set before the public these days will agree something is needed, but this is a cat the belling of which is a difficult and delicate task. If censorship could be achieved sensibly, hitting only those works which are injurious for the pure sake of prurency, we would say, "Well, with your hatchet," but censors are as human and as full of errors as writers and book publishers, and they could go off on a literary witch-hunt.

If your board of censors sits down to expunge every reference to sex, every phrase which calls a name a name, it's going to rip into books which as a whole have solid merit. For instance, you could lift out of context certain passages from the Bible and Shakespeare which, without the wisdom, truth and beauty of the whole, would make the most blasphemous modern treat a violent shade of red.

On top of all that, there is a danger that the world's genius for expression might be shown into a straightjacket through the same kind of thinking that at one time would have had Kitty Foyle, for instance, banned from the book stalls. (Dig up a copy of Kitty Foyle, of years ago, and see if you think the would-be censors of that day were right.)

It's a big problem, this business of trying to get only the good and the beautiful before those of us who can read. Perhaps it would be wiser to educate us to look for the good and the beautiful and so to have an instinctive contempt for the abominable.

Personally, I'd like to do a bit of book-burning, myself. I can think of dozens of magazines and books devoted, per se, to sex, crime and other vile activities, sure, but I still say, I might save a few matches by exposing myself and mine to good books first, thus cultivating a taste for something better than those things we're inclined to think only the will purify.

Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY F. SCALF

In the "Licking Valley Courier" (West Liberty), March 28, appeared a reference to the Webb family. Irma Webb, regent Morgan county, chapter, D.A.R., wrote the "Licking Valley Courier" and it is here excerpted as being of possible interest to readers of The Times.

"The James Webb family history begins with James Webb, an Englishman, who came to America before the Revolution. He was in the War for Independence as an aide de camp to General Washington. At the battle of White Plains he was shot through the head and fell on the field for dead. He recovered from the wound, however, and subsequently followed his son Benjamin to Tether County, Kentucky. Jas. Webb married a sister of Daniel Boone's mother. Another son, James, Jr., married a Pennington and moved to Lawrence county in the early 1820's."

James Taylor Adams, a prominent geologist and historian of Big Laurel, Virginia, spoke last summer to the annual reunion of the Craft-Webb-Adams family of Eastern Kentucky. It is partly recorded here.

"So far the first record I have of our branch of the Adams family is in the year 1774 when Spencer Adams was bondaman for Jacob Adams in Rowan county, North Carolina. Rowan county was later to give part of its territory to form the new county of Wilkes; and it was in that part of Rowan that the Adams lived."

The first official record I find of our people is around 1720 when they took up lands on Roanoke River. There were John, Spencer, Benjamin, Charles, William and Jacob, all of whom we presume to be brothers. Then in 1765 we find Elizabeth Adams, daughter of Old John, and Archibald Craft married and the bondsmen for this wedding was Elizabeth's uncle Jacob Adams. Following this the court and church records in Wilkes county are cluttered up with Adams activity."

In the year 1783 the South Fork of Roanoke River Baptist Church was constituted and the first matter of business after organization of the church was completed, was the admission of John Adams and wife by experience and baptism. Spencer and his wife joined about six months later by letter; and about the same time Henrietta, Benjamin Adams' wife, was also a member.

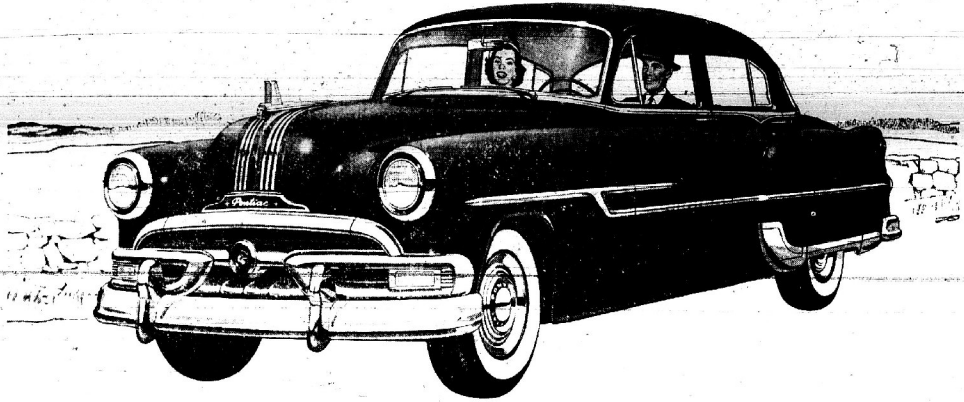

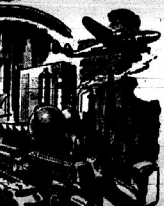
