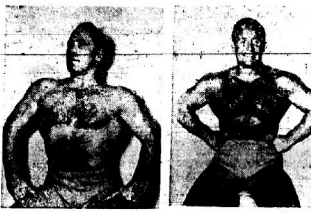

## College Offers Workshop To Fictionists and Poets; Professionals to Attend

Writers of the best manuscripts submitted during the second annual Morehead State College Writers Workshop, July 26-30, are assured publication of their stories, articles and poems.

Plans for the Workshop, open to all residents of Kentucky and a surrounding area, include the publication of a magazine containing outstanding material written by student members of the two-week session.

The staff for the Workshop, only one in Kentucky, will include Robert P. Tristram Coffin, Pulitzer prize-winning poet, Katherine Anne Porter, one of America's outstanding writers of short fiction, James Still, poet, short story writer and novelist from Hindman, Ky., whose short fiction has appeared frequently in the yearly O. HENRY and BEST SHORT STORIES anthologies; and the Owsen, former writer for the Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL.

Student writers may attend for either week of the Workshop, or for the entire period. It was announced that fiction and poetry will be emphasized the first week and fiction and non-fictional prose the second. The general schedule for both weeks includes individual conferences between student writers and professional writers in the mornings; group discussions of original manuscripts in the afternoons; and a series of evening lectures on writers and techniques of writing.

Dining and living costs, lower than those of any other comparable workshop in the nation, have been kept at a minimum in order to encourage the development of writing talent in Kentucky. James McConkey, workshop director, said. Tuition is \$10 a week, dormitory fee \$250, and meals will be available in the cafeteria for approximately \$6 a week. The session offers college credit, if desired.

Registration or further information may be obtained by writing the director.

TO ORGANIZE WASHINGTON—The Federal Civil Defense Administration announced a reorganization of time regional offices, closing those at Seattle, Wash., and Cleveland, Ohio.

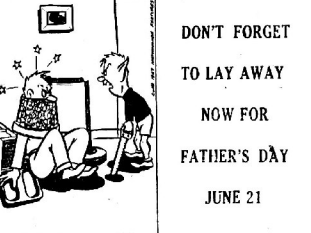

# Two-State Commission Is Sought for Breaks

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 26.—A suggestion that Congress authorize the states of Kentucky and Virginia to establish an interstate commission to develop the Breaks of Sandy as a tourist attraction was made here today by Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward.

He said it is his opinion that Congressional approval is necessary before the two states could take such action. The recommendation followed a visit to the Breaks of Sandy last week by the 11th Governor's Tour, and a referendum by Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby of Kentucky's interest in the development of the area.

"The U.S. Constitution provides that one state shall not, without the consent of Congress, enter into an agreement or compact with another state," Ward said. "Under this section, it is my opinion that Kentucky and Virginia could not jointly enter into a compact to develop the Breaks of Sandy without the sanction of Congress, even though both decided they desired to do so."

Ward said he has written to U.S. Senator Earle C. Clements, who was one of the leading advocates of development of the Breaks when he served as Kentucky's governor, and to U.S. Representative Carl Perkins recommending that Congress pass the necessary legislation authorizing the states to act. The Kentucky portion of the Breaks lies in Pike county, which is in Congressman Perkins' district.

"The legislatures of both Kentucky and Virginia at their 1952 sessions directed their Departments of Conservation to make studies of the Breaks and report their recommendations to the 1954 sessions," Ward said. "On the basis of my own belief that the Breaks fit into Kentucky's plan to develop the tourist and recreation industry, I am prepared now to make a recommendation that the General Assembly authorize the creation of an interstate commission with authority to develop the Breaks."

He said that Virginia officials are desirous to co-operate with them.

"It would be most difficult for Kentucky to act alone to develop

the Breaks, inasmuch as the greater portion of the scenic gorge created by the breaking of the river through the Cumberland mountains lies in Virginia," Ward continued.

"The area logically is one which should be developed by both states, or by the federal government. It is my opinion that eventually the Breaks of Sandy and the area between Elkhorn City, Ky., and Haystack, Va., should be taken over by the National Park Service as a part of the national parkway system."

Ward also suggested that an effort should be made to bring about an agreement on an appropriate name for the area between interested persons in Kentucky and Virginia.

"Kentuckians call it Breaks of Sandy, but Virginians say it is Breaks of Cumberland," he pointed out. "Actually the stream which cut the 1,000-foot deep gorge through the mountain is the Sandy Fork of the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River. The confusion existing over the name isn't helping its Breaks development."

Ward said that if Congress passed an enabling act, it would be necessary for the state legislatures of both Kentucky and Virginia to pass legislation providing for their co-operation and setting forth details under which they might act jointly.

Sterling junior, sophomore halfbacks Max Mason, Rockmart, Ga., and Bradley Mills, Lynch, Ovensboro's Tom Fillion, a senior back at fullback again and Bill Wheeler, soph tackle from Pikeville.

## Highway Death Rate Reported Up Slightly

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 25 (Sp.) —Deaths on Kentucky highways came at a slightly higher rate for the number of miles traveled during the first quarter of 1953 than during a similar period in 1952, but at a lower rate than during all of 1952.

A report just released by the Department of State Police shows that highway deaths occurred at the rate of .88 for each 100 million vehicle miles traveled during the first three months of this year, as against a rate of .85 for the first quarter of 1952. The rate for all of last year was .94.

State Police officials do not see the increase over early 1952 as significant but believe it may be only the result of better accident reporting. Some death reports take months to reach here but reporting is generally better than it was a year ago, they point out.

There were 173 traffic deaths during the first three months of this year and 165 for the same period of 1952. Vehicle miles traveled in Kentucky through March, 1953, totaled 1,949,000,000, against 1,931,000,000.

The mileage figures are compiled with the use of a formula employed by the National Safety Council and taking into account the amount of gasoline sold within the state. The gasoline miles are determined by tax figures.

Through May 20, the police reported 277 deaths for 1953, compared to 288 for the same period last year.

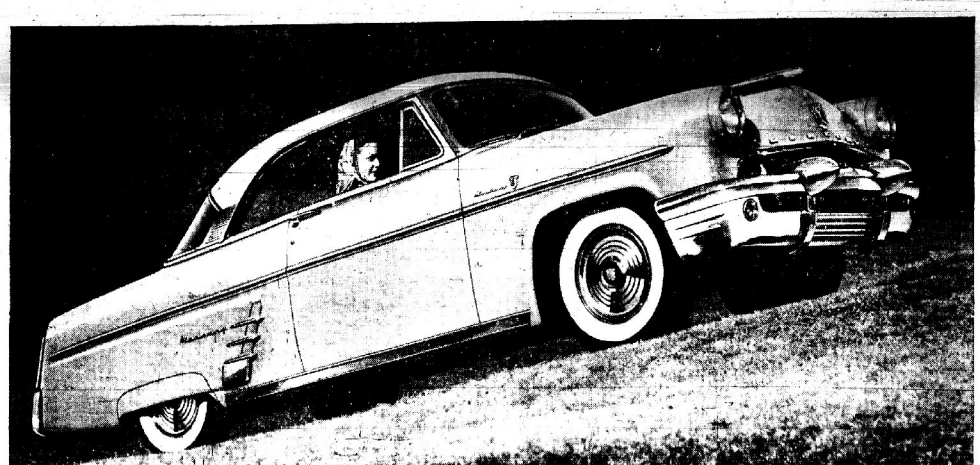

**GARDEN NEWS**

**SWEET POTATOES**

IT IS TIME TO GET SWEET POTATOES STARTED. The best variety is the Virginia Heart. It is as the name implies, it makes only a small bush over the hill for early tending and digging. The flesh color is uniformly deep orange, and the quality aspect, the net root variety is the "regular" Porto Rico may be used, or that earlier variety, Nancy Hall.

It is important to use only stock known to have been produced from tubers treated for blackrot. This is the disease that results in storage loss. To avoid soil stain or scurf, which are these skin-deep blotches that later become "dry rot" in storage, the following should be observed. In a 6-pound paper sack put several tubers of sweet potatoes in the sack, and shake until the tubers adhere to the sides and ends in large enough quantities that it can be seen.

If there is such a thing in the garden, a "poor" age, should be chosen, two or three years away from manuring. If the land has been manured recently the excess amount of nitrogen will prevent the development of good quality potatoes. The other plant foods, phosphorus and potash, should be high, especially potash. Lime should be low, as sweet land tends to make only strings.

It is best to choose some place outside the garden that meets with the above requirements, and use one of the following fertilizers: 2-12-12 or 2-16-16 at the rate of 1 lb. per bush; or 1-10-10 at the rate of 1 lb. per bush. The rows should be about 35 inches wide, and the slips set 15 inches apart, when setting as above.

No insect or disease control measures should be taken, except that sometimes spraying is needed because of "beetle" or "beetle" on the slips before growth can start. The remedy is dusting with DDT or Malathion as soon as plants are set.

Tending sweet potatoes is simple, requiring merely weeding the hills with a hoe until the leaves of the potatoes take over and shade the plants.

When the vines are used, use no advantage at all in selecting land that was too rich.

## Floyd County Historical Notes

A letter from James Taylor Adams, of Big Laurel, Virginia, under date of May 8, in regard to his ancestor, Thomas Lovelady, the Revolutionary soldier, is of interest. As noted with the collection of the from Mr. Adams' letter an error in necessary data. He writes:

"Anne's mother, Andersen Hatfield, was a Vange and I believe that she was a sister of Jim Vance, who was killed in the spring of '86 by Frank Phillips, who the papers reported at the time, crawled up to a saw shot-Vance dead after he had been wounded. My father practiced medicine at Prestonsburg then, but was at Frankfort in the Senate and brother and I had his office, and recall very distinctly what the papers reported, and they were true."

"I am rather under the impression that Jim Vance was a son of Elder Vance, who was hanged for killing of Lewis Horton, and Jim was an old man when he was killed. So he was a son of the Elder Vance, who seemed to be a law abiding man, till his trouble came up. Jim Vance had a cousin, Wes Vance, who lived at the mouth of Dry Creek, who owned several thousand acres of land on Right Beaver, who married a sister of Bowling Hall, who died and later married a Turner from Left Beaver. Wes Vance who lived and died in Prestonsburg was his son."

"One person, I have never been able to find out about, is Rosanna McCoy. No one seems to know anything about her. I have a novel with a sketch of six women: Mrs. McCoy, two daughters, Mrs. Hancock, and John Vance's wife and daughter. Not much truth in it. Very truly yours, Lee Stewart."

"While I have no way of proving that this man is in error, I believe that he is wrong insofar as his wife dying soon after he made the settlement in Lovelady Gap. Both J. M. Stewart and J. M. Addington, recognized authorities on the early history of this region, state that Thomas Lovelady was an early settler in Lee county and that he established himself there about 1790. While I doubt the date, I have no way of disproving it. This I know (and it is borne out by his pension declaration on file in Floyd county courthouse) Thomas Lovelady was a settler in the Revolution in early part of that struggle from N. C. and resided for a second term, during latter part of the war, while residing in Washington county, Va., which covered what is Lee and Scott now."

"The Thomas Lovelady's wife dying soon after he made his settlement at the gap which bears his name. If he lived alone, he had no children and I know that he had at least one child by his first wife and it is through this daughter (whose name is unknown to me) that I am descended. I believe that she married a Johnson and that her daughter married a Rodgers because James Lovelady's daughter married a Roman and that they were the parents of Thomas Roman (or Davis). I do know that somewhere back there a Johnson is my ancestor, somewhere through the Rodgers-Duncan-Davis line."

"There is a movement afoot to organize an association of the kin of Benja Davis here in near future and maybe then we will get all this straightened out."

### State Highway Traffic Shows Gain in April

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 23 (AP)—Traffic on Kentucky highways showed a gain in April of 4.6 per cent over April, 1952, according to the monthly traffic survey of the Department of Highways.

The survey showed that truck and bus traffic increased 10.7 per cent over April of last year.

Fourteen permanent recorder stations spotted over the state help count the traffic and the Department of Highways has portable counters out most of the time.

Traffic last month was 181 per cent of that for the average month of 1941, the year of the highest traffic count before World War II and the heaviest used on Kentucky traffic surveys. Truck and bus traffic last April was 129 per cent of that for an average month in 1941.
