At McDowell the first P.T.A. meeting was turned into a rally for the amendment and an enthusiastic crowd of more than 500 parents heard Charles Clark, principal of Garrett high school, explain the benefits to derive from the change. The Association voted unanimously to repeal of Section 138.

At David next Tuesday evening the Parent-Teacher Association will sponsor an open meeting at the school gymnasium. Speakers will be County Superintendent W. O. Turner, Charles Clark, of Garrett, and possibly Wayne Ratliff, principal of Wheelwright schools. The public is being urged to hear the discussion.

Chester Patton, president of the David P.T.A., said the group there has officially added to the drive to move for amending the Constitutional section. "It" said Mr. Patton, "the slogan, 'Kentucky's greatest asset is its people, is to have any real meaning, the youth of Eastern Kentucky must be educated by modern standards'."

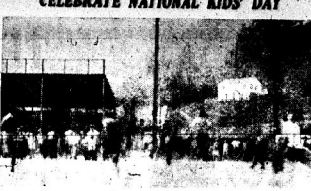

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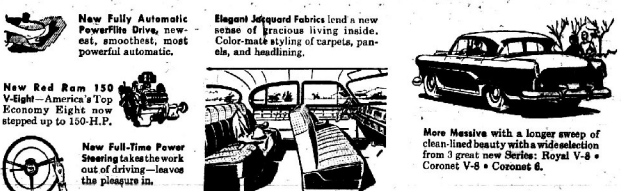

pose any duty upon fiscal courts to make repairs or improvements on any particular road or roads. It places upon the county the duty generally to keep its roads in repair and to appropriate the money that is available for that purpose, but it is within the discretion of the fiscal court to determine the road or roads which shall be improved and the time and method of such improvement.

Other major indictments filed by the grand jury during the last two days of the term follow:

Jenkins Defeats Prestonsburg, 24-7

The Prestonsburg Black Cats lost their second football game in five starts last week by falling before the Jenkins Cavaliers 24-7 in a conference game that was marred by 235 yards in penalties.

Prestonsburg offered little resistance to the running of football Bobby Collier and halfback Burton Bradley, who gained yardage at will and kept Jenkins deep in Black County throughout the game.

Jenkins scored before the game was three minutes old. Prestonsburg had taken the opening kickoff on the ten and failed to gain in three downs. Then Chester Humphrey booted to the 42-yard-line.

Collier moved the ball 20 yards in three plays and quarterback Raymond Ricketts passed to end Frank Aubrey for ten yards on the two, from which point Bradley scored in two plays. Ricketts attempted kick was blocked.

A fumble on the Black Cat 20-yard line set up the second Cavalier touchdown four minutes later and Collier tallied three yards out after Ricketts had whipped 20 yards to end Bobby Brannan.

The Black Cats then made one of two first downs in the half, but poor offensive line blocking and virtually no pass protection for quarterback Lowell Hughes made any advance impossible from the Cat's 41-yard-stripe. A fourth-down attempt was a complete fiasco and Jenkins started their third touchdown march on two long gains by Bradley and Burton and a 15-yard penalty. Ricketts picked up the six-point on a four-yard punt before the half ended just before the clock.

The last half was an exchange of clipping and roughness penalties, and neither team could score in the off-schedule third period. Prestonsburg started a march from midfield and advanced to the Jenkins 16 on Hughes' 13-yard run and 20-yard aerial to halfback Jeep Alexander, but the third Black Cat fumble killed the threat.

Midway the final period, Jenkins ran the count to 24-0 as Ricketts fumbled the ball into the end zone and Col. Irvin pounced on the owl for the marker. Seven seconds later, Jenkins scored on a 35-yard pass interference—had put the half in scoring position.

Halfback Clifford Goble saved a shout on the 10-yard line by romping 80 yards to pay dirt against the Jenkins snarl, who were right at the line as coach McKenna failed to move in the other three. Alexander plunged over for the extra point.

This writer has made an investigation of this latest outrage against the people of Floyd county and a confidential source who is thoroughly acquainted with the value of these Water and Gas Works and knows what he is talking about, has informed this writer that he would not give more than \$25,000.00 for the whole outfit.

Henry Stumbo as Chairman of the Fiscal Court on Page 258, Order Book 6, sold to the Beaver County Water and Gas District, the operation of this disgraceful scheme, wherein one of the promoters has already boasted that he made \$60,000.00 out of the deal without leaving the City of Prestonsburg. Under the signature of Henry Stumbo for and on behalf of Floyd county, Henry Stumbo agreed that this outrageous project "WILL BE CONTINUOUSLY OPERATED AS A REVENUE PRODUCING, UNDEBTAKING, AND THAT IT WILL FIX OR CAUSE TO BE FIXED, SUCH RATES FOR SERVICE FURNISHED BY SAID PROJECT."

On Page 257, Order Book No. 6 of the Floyd County Fiscal Court Order Book HENRY STUMBO made the taxpayers of Floyd county liable in the following words, and I quote from Section 7 on said page, "FLOYD COUNTY AGREES WITH THE BOND HOLDERS, THAT FLOYD COUNTY WILL FAITHFULLY AND PUNCTUALLY PERFORM OR CAUSE TO BE PERFORMED ALL DUTIES WITH REFERENCE TO SAID PROJECT."

The promoters of this money-making scheme evidently figured that an investigation might be made and in order to protect and save guard their vast profits, placed Section 9 in the contract with the county which reads and quote, "THAT IF IT SHALL EVER BE HELD BY ANY COURT THAT SAID AGREEMENT IS INVALID, IT IS AGREED BY THE COUNTY THAT THIS PROJECT SHALL BE IMMEDIATELY OPERATED BY THE COUNTY, and THAT THE COUNTY WILL IMMEDIATELY BRING INTO EFFECT ALL THE AGREEMENTS HEREIN PROVIDED FOR ON BEHALF OF AND FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE BONDHOLDERS."

This same man, Mr. Henry Stumbo whose name is signed to 230 \$1,000.00 Bonds as County Judge of Floyd county, Kentucky, told the people during the months of 1952, at a time when he was being sued for failure to pay into the Treasury of Floyd county sums due and long past due, that the charges were just politics and an effort to smear him and he had printed in The Courier-Journal that the Taxpayers didn't have a leg to stand on; yet several months after that, namely, in April, 1953, both Henry Stumbo and the Treasurer of Floyd county took the witness stand and under oath testified and admitted that Henry Stumbo on the 5th day of January, 1953, paid into the County Treasury the approximate sum of \$2,000.00 which the law prescribed that he should have paid into the County Treasury at the end of each month for the years 1950, 1951 and 1952. 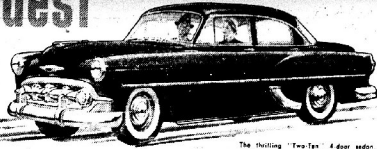

Payment of Judgment May Be Made, Tis Said, To Paintsville Drivers

Paintsville, Ky., Sept. 26 (AP)—Attorney J. W. Wells said today that he believes the town of Paintsville will pay off a \$4,000 judgment against it in a few days to get rid of an attachment tying up about \$20,000 in municipal funds.

The attachment was obtained earlier this month by 33 taxi drivers. They were trying to force the town to pay them the judgment awarded earlier this year for erroneous collection of license fees.

A hearing on the town's motion to discharge the attachment was scheduled for today, but did not come off. Wells, a special attorney hired by the city to handle the case, said there probably will be no hearing on the city's motion.

A legislative act in the early 1940's prohibited municipalities from collecting license fees from tax operators who already had State certificates. Paintsville was not immediately aware of the act and continued to collect fees for some time.

The taxi drivers brought suit to recover the amount of fees which were collected through error and were awarded the judgment. When

the town failed to pay it, they got the attachment.

Paintsville was allowed to meet its municipal payroll, however, by agreement of both sides.

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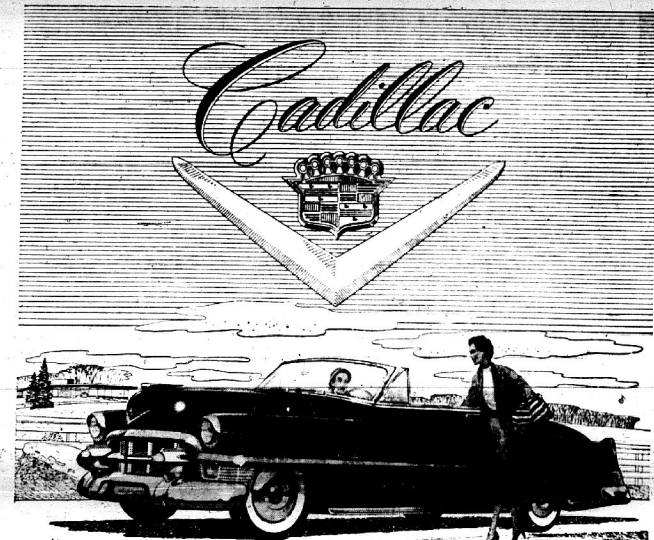

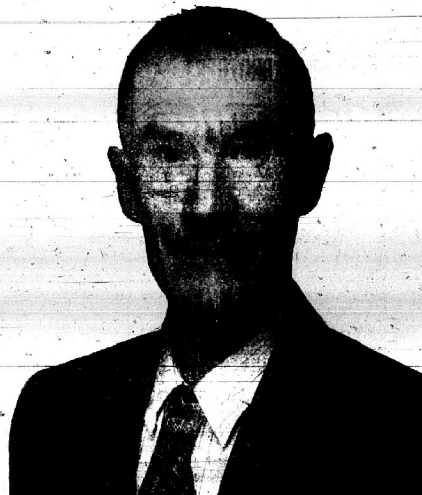

The first published history of Perry county will be on sale at Hazard, Saturday, October 3. Written and published by the Hazard Chapter, D.A.R., and compiled by Mrs. Bessie Tubert Johnson over a period of three years, the book is well footnoted with sources of information quoted at the conclusion of each family history.

Dr. Thomas D. Clark, noted Kentucky author and critic, and head of the University history department, in his review of the history says, "The kind of work which the authors have done in this book is not only a real service to Perry county and Kentucky but it will long serve as a useful source for people who seek information of the Kentucky mountains. . . a good history."

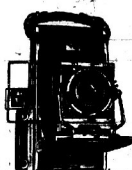

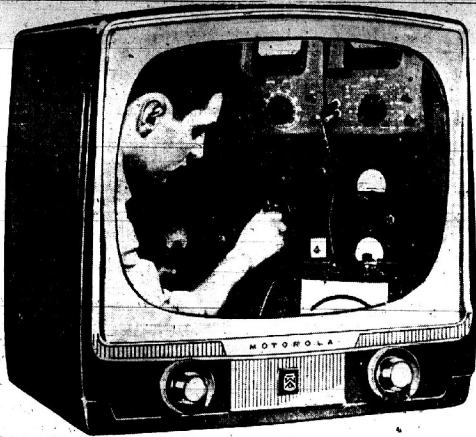
