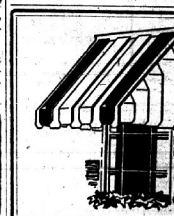

Christmas Day, Mrs. Ed Burke was kind enough to remember us with copies of COLLIERIES MAGAZINE, vintage of 1904, and a copy of the COLLIERIES-JOURNAL'S IL-LUSTRATED MAGAZINE of about the same date.

We always appreciate such thoughtful gifts, and never fail to find the contents of these old publications interesting. There were, for instance, an announcement of the Wright's success at Kitty Hawk ("indeed there is something new under the sun"), and how this contraption even flew into the wind and kept it up, non-stop, a distance of three and a half miles; an article by Misspaula's John Sharpe Williams blasting "Cupidism" and advising us to "tend to our own business"; and an editorial praising William Randolph Hearst and his presidential ambitions.

And these advertisements! There, of course, were the wireless news cars, the scene of elegance, perfect paragon of beauty—and every one so sporty with tops down, off or put up there in the best plan. And finally my eye alighted on an ad which guaranteed to make you from two to four inches taller, and I think back on my lost opportunities. Just think, had I been born a few years earlier and read Collier's Magazine back in 1904, I might now be tall and hump-backed.

Collier's all the more interesting was the announcement made only last week that this landmark on the American publishing scene and its sister publication, WOMAN'S HOME COMPANION, have jointly passed on.
