Betty Layne and Allen were called to the scene, and they are credited with preventing destruction of the entire installation. The owner said approximately one-third of the paint was burned and that his loss will range from \$20,000 to \$25,000. The fire was brought under control at about 3:30 a.m., and the firemen saved the coal conveyor system, a coal crusher unit, motor and other equipment.

Mr. Hale said he could not at this time make a statement as to the origin of the blaze. He said he will rebuild the plant.

Two juveniles, one from Baltimore, the other from Lenore, West Virginia, are in jail here after having broken into several places in this and Pike counties. Baltimore authorities are seeking the return of one of the boys to answer to charges there, but County Judge Henry Stumbo said he had not, in view of the number of offenses in which the youth is implicated locally, decided to relinquish the prisoner.

Sale Detective Potter said the youths first broke into the concession stand of a drive-in theatre, near Pikeville, and that they later admitted taking \$185 in cash there. Working downriver, they next burglarized Jones Store at Bancor, taking cash and a radio. They broke into the Williamson Glass Company, operated by R. C. Dear, and stole some tools. These Detective Potter said were apparently used to force entrance to the nearby Hill Concrete Block Products Co., from which cash was taken. They also reported break was at the home on the Ayler road of Russell Dixon, where they stole a shotgun.

The youths told Potter where they had hidden tools taken from Dixon and the shotgun taken at the Dixon home. These were recovered.

(This is the sixth article on the Stephens family compiled from data furnished by Henry Stephens and his son, Edgar P. Stephens.)

(In the first article on the family the name of Baldwin Cederberg was inadvertently omitted as a son of S. B. Osborne and Rhoda Osborne, and grandson of Samuel Osborne and Sarah Osborne Stephens. He married Mildred Stone and they are the parents of James, Paul and Earl Osborne.)

Cynthia Stephens, born in May, 1864, married R. C. (Cob) Fitzpatrick, December 31, 1912. They are the parents of three children: Delilah Fitzpatrick, married Francis Oppenheimer. No children. Woodrow Fitzpatrick married Nora Tussey. They are the parents of one child. Rhoda Fitzpatrick married Harmon Tussey and they are the parents of two children.

After the death of Simon Haywood his widow, Ella, remarried to Oscar Miller. They are the parents of eight children: Delilah, married Marvin Calhoun; Virginia, married Leslie Wallen; Ruby, married Alex Hyden; James, married first Mary Collins and later to Rader; Nora, unmarried; William, married Cleveland, granddaughter of James Cleveland, of Prestonsburg; and Donald, killed in an automobile accident, near Lancaster.

Harrison Stephens, married Rebecca Allen July 19, 1871. They had only one daughter, who married Abe Rader. They are the parents of 12 children.

Asahel Stephens married Gladys Howard; Archer Shepherd married Mary Shepherd; Arville Shepherd married Eva Shepherd; William Shepherd married Helen Harrison; Shepherd married Allene Roland; Wheeler, unmarried; Elizabeth married Asahel Rader; Rebecca Shepherd married Richmond Shepherd; Dona married Roy Turner; Margaret married Don Tussey; Bertha and Alice died young.

Martha Stephens married Morgan Baldrige, July 24, 1871. They had ten children. Nola Baldrige married John Stephens and they are the parents of six children: Clayborne, married Irene Patton; Mary, died young; Thelma, married John Walker; Morgan, married Mary Ball and was killed in an automobile accident in California; Elsie and Linda are single.

Tom Baldrige married Bertha Polkroy. One son is John Henry Baldrige. After the death of Bertha Baldrige her husband remarried. Lee Baldrige married Amy Prasure and had several children. Dock Baldrige married Flossie Perry. Sallie Baldrige married John Sexton. Minerva Baldrige married John Roberts. Maggie Baldrige married Harry Porter. Della Baldrige married Claude Roberts. Mary Baldrige married Press Truett.

BONUS-AMENDMENT TEXT

SENATE BILL NO. 296, 1958 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky: Section 1. The Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky is hereby proposed to be amended by the ratification of a new section to read as follows:

The General Assembly shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of bonds of the Commonwealth, notwithstanding the limitation of indebtedness in Section 49 or any other section of the Constitution of Kentucky, which shall be in addition to all other bonds of the Commonwealth heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof, as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated SOLELY for the purpose of paying a cash bonus not to exceed \$500 for service outside the continental limits of the United States, and \$300 for service in the continental United States to the veterans, their widows or heirs, or next of kin, of the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict, who were residents of the Commonwealth at the time of their ENTRY into the service and at least six months prior thereto. The General Assembly at the same session authorizing the issuance of the bonds shall levy a tax upon all retail sales at such a rate as will pay the interest upon and retire the bonds in not less than 30 years, PROVIDED that retail sales of FOOD and FOOD PRODUCTS, MEDICINES and CLOTHING may be EXEMPTED from such tax.

NOTICE

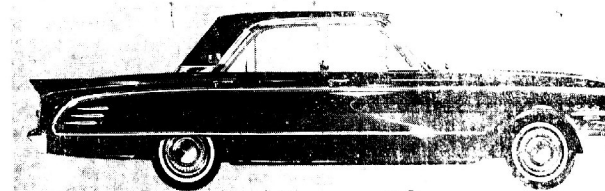

Highway Improvements In Floyd County By the COMBS Administration

Vote for Breathitt--- Continue To Build Roads!

In its first three calendar years through December 31, 1962, the Combs Administration spent a total of \$8,301,301.72 in Floyd County to build and maintain roads.

Floyd County's allocation for rural secondary roads and rural highways for the 1962-63 fiscal year is \$284,630.60. Distribution of rural secondary road funds (2 7 of the 7-cent gasoline tax) is now determined by the Rural Secondary Formula, which was adopted by the Combs Administration in 1961 and then enacted into law by the 1962 General Assembly. This impartial formula guarantees every county a fair share of such funds. Floyd County's 1962-63 allotment under this formula is \$219,775.56. In addition, the State will spend \$64,855.04 this year in Floyd County under the rural highways program.

Under the past administration, only \$131,967.43 was spent in Floyd County for rural secondary roads and rural highways in fiscal year 1957-58. The record shown below was copied from Highway Department files. The "real" truth is far different to what was printed last week by the Chandler forces regarding Floyd County highway construction under Combs.
