will be approved soon." General Lloyd said.

The first applications approved and the amounts they will receive are for the counties of Clay, \$17,835; Johnson, \$2,561; Knott, \$30,061; Lawrence, \$3,972; Leslie, \$106,816; Leitch, \$60,080; and Perry, \$19,364; the cities of Cadetbury, \$1,286; Cumberland, \$1,760; Harlan, \$40,829; Johnson, \$7,319; Manchester, \$12,221; Smithland, \$1,534; and Whitesburg, \$4,732; and the county school districts of Knott, \$1,529; Clay, \$2,274; Bell, \$5,589; and Johnson, \$2,875.

General Lloyd said that the aid money will be used for work such as repair of roads, streets and bridges, schools, clearance of debris and health and sanitation. The applications were processed through the State Civil Defense headquarters in Frankfort to the Region II unit at Olney, Maryland, of the Office of Emergency Planning.

Altogether, 52 applications totaling \$3,300,248 were made for Kentucky's applications. The largest single request was the \$873,446 of the State Department of Highways for repairs. The largest county application was the \$714,684 sought by Pike, a severely-hit area. Almost all of the requests are from Eastern Kentucky.

The application total included 15 counties, 14 cities or county school districts, the Floyd County Elk River Water District, the State Department of Health, Highways, and Education, the education category, several county and city school-district requests of less than \$100 minimum were combined into one unit.

The county applications pending are from Floyd, Harlan, Harlan, Henderson, Knott, Maudlin, Martin and Pike. City requests still to be approved are from Barbourville, Elizabethtown, Paducah, Pineville, Uniontown, Prestonsburg, Pineville, Paducah, Pikeville, Martin and Neen.

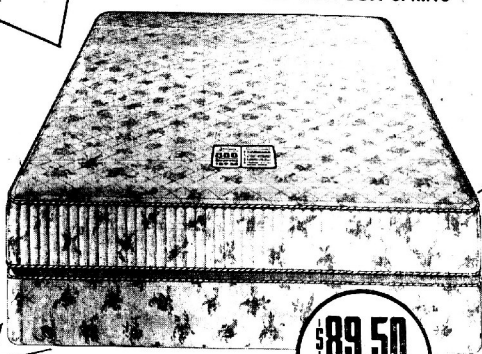

The Leader reporter quoted Sheriff Hale to this effect:

"Take a week or so ago, when they raided those 66 places, ABC men were in here a week before the raids. They got their warrants, and they and the State Police made the raids without ever telling me about them," Hale said.

The sheriff said that he and his seven deputies patrol the county night and day. "But we can't get suspicion warrants from the county judge or the magistrates, so all we can do is try to keep trouble down."

He said that the Combs organization had opposed him when he won election to the General Assembly and that it had opposed him when he successfully ran for sheriff.

"They've always been against me," he said. "But there's no person at so time has ever brought a warrant in here and that I didn't get straight up and go serve it."

Col. James Huxes said that the State Police would cooperate with any law enforcement agency that made the request.

"If Sheriff Hale asked for our help, we'd give it to him," Huxes said.

ABC Chairman Harold S. Moberly said that Hale has never asked for assistance. "If Sheriff Hale or anyone else asks for our help, we'll certainly give it to him," he said.

POWDERY MILDEW DISEASE

Lexington, Ky. — Powdery mildew disease often attacks such crops as corn, wheat, alfalfa, clover, alfalfa, lupine, flax and grain in the late summer or early autumn, notes E. M. Johnson, U. S. Ag Experiment Station plant pathologist.

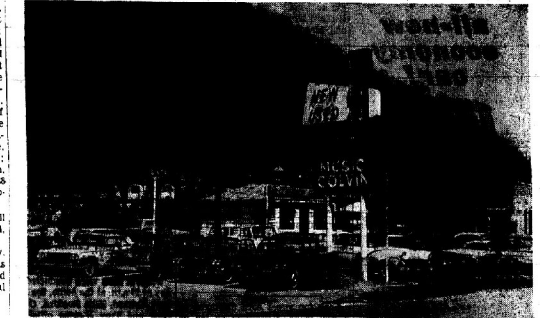

What's Going On in FISH & WILDLIFE

When the difficult midsummer fishing begins varies not only with latitude and altitude, but can be very different in two lakes alongside each other, says Jason Lucas, Angling Editor of Sports Illustrated Magazine. One may be shallow all over, easily warmed by the air; the other may have many deep spots, perhaps with those fine, sudden drop-offs from comparative shallows, water weeds along their edges. If you can avoid the former kind in midsummer and fish the latter.

What if the only lakes available to you are very shallow? You might do well on bass by fishing, after say, about ten at night with a surface lure. Most anglers have a strong preference for mainly-black lures for night fishing, and perhaps bass do, too; anyhow, I think them always at least as good as those of any other color then—and topwaters perhaps always best at night for bass in a shallow lake.

Walleyes are even more inclined than bass to feed at night, maybe that's why their eyes look that way. Theoretically, they too are supposed to strike well on topwaters at night, but I've personally found mighty few occasions when they would; I could practically always catch fair success on underwaters.

Most of pike in warm water? Frankly, I expect to catch but few, and small ones then. Spring is the time to get most pike, including some good ones, and very late fall.

Barkley Statue Planned For Kentucky Capital Rotunda at Frankfort

Frankfort, Ky., July 29 (Sp.)—A life-size likeness of Allen W. Barkley will join Abraham Lincoln, Jefferson Davis, Henry Clay and Dr. Ryham McDowell in a place of honor in the State Capitol rotunda. The bronze statue of Barkley, for which the 1960 General Assembly appropriated \$20,000, will arrive this month from Italy where the casting was made. The statue will be unveiled this fall.

Walter Hancock, of Gloucester, Massachusetts, executed the statue. "The Veep," it will stand on a base of Vermont marble. Barkley, a native of Paduch, died in 1936 at the age of 77. His political career, which spanned over half a century, began with a judgeship on Macraeken county and reached its apex when he was elected vice-president in 1948. Barkley was first elected to the U. S. Senate in 1927 and later served as Senate majority leader.

And while begging for safety in the fields, let us also remind that at the time of squirrel hunting, often the fields and the woods are dry and are a tinderbox for fires. Fires must be started, and contrary to the belief of many, they must be started and controlled in this manner they may be able to assist in reducing the tremendous costs levied each year by forest fires.

Indications are that the squirrel population this year is about average. There'll be enough for good hunting. Don't spoil this hunt by an accident and don't destroy your hunting terrain by a forest fire.

EXPLOITATION VIEWED AS THREAT TO REGION



A young Ashland medical student at the University of Kentucky Medical Center, Lexington, last week completed four weeks of studies in Floyd county and departed Monday for Iran.

Richard Geist, 24, medical school senior, had the special project here of studying the organization of health services and resources, and the review and examination of 50 indigent rheumatic fever cases. He was particularly interested in those cases where the patient was on antibiotics.

Pointing out that his class was the first to go through the new medical center at Lexington, he said the work he did here was unique and was set up to give the student a working knowledge of community health services.

He was impressed with the job being done by the Floyd County Health Department.

"The Floyd county health service is doing a good and adequate job," he said. "The department has a tremendous overload of work but is coming through nicely."

The studies in Iran are being financed by a fellowship grant from a drug firm. He will do the same work in Central Iran as he did here. The Asian work will take 10 weeks.

Deep in the southeastern section of the state, near the Virginia border, the people are as divided as they were 100 years ago during the Civil War. But this time the split is over the causes of the almost-annual devastating floods in the region.

Wednesday night, a special WTAS News television documentary spelled out the ravages of uncontrolled, mechanized logging, large-scale strip mining and forest fires in Eastern Kentucky.

The hour-long "WTAS Reports" showed films of extensive damage in a number of mountain counties and warned that, if critics are right, "We have less than a decade to halt these practices that are threatening to turn southeastern Kentucky into a desert within our lifetime."

The documentary, "The Ravaged Mountains," dramatized the effect these practices are having on the area's spring floods in the area.

Leader of the group opposing strip mining was Harry M. Caudill, former state representative and ardent conservationist. This group contends that in a single generation the filling of rivers caused by land erosion as a result of this mining process could cost the state and federal agencies millions of dollars.

On the other hand, strip mining operators contend that the land can be reclaimed. William B. Sturgill, of Hazard, formerly of Prestonsburg, and president of the Kentucky River

Potter Urges Support Of Youth Employment, Conservation Bill

Police Chief Bill Potter this week issued an appeal to the people of this community to lend their support to President Kennedy's Youth Employment and Conservation Bill, sponsored by Senator Robert Humphrey, which was passed by the Senate and is expected soon to be before the U. S. House of Representatives.

Potter said, "Common sense and justice compel establishment of this program which will give many thousands of currently unemployed young persons a chance to find employment, to be paid for their services, and to acquire skills and work experience that will give them a solid start in their working lives."

"Provisions in this legislation provide a practical means of attacking the high school drop-out problem and the juvenile delinquency associated with that problem."

Young men and women no longer in school constitute already 18 percent of the total unemployment, although they comprise only seven percent of the labor force. Idle youth create a host of problems.
