NEGROES ASK INTEGRATION

In Knott-Co. Schools; Carr Creek Elementary Only School Involved

A group of Knott County Negroes filed a suit in the United States District Court Tuesday asking immediate integration of all schools in the county. The suit said there has been no integration in grades 7 to 12, but that grades 1 to 6 are still segregated. It was filed on behalf of 14 Negro elementary students.

Beckham Combs, Knott County School Superintendent, said the suit involves only one school—Carr Creek elementary school.

Combs said no action has been taken on integration of the school because it would involve a change in the county's school system. He said no such expansion should take place until they find out more about the location of the proposed Carr Creek dam.

The dam, Combs said, probably will necessitate raising the present school building.

Of the 14 Negro children have been "prohibited by the Board of Education from attending the several elementary schools in the county located throughout Knott County, all of which the defendants have set aside and designated for the exclusive attendance of white students."

It also said the plaintiffs, except for one student, live close to other elementary schools which are attended exclusively by white students, but are assigned to the all-Negro school, the suit adds.

The all-Negro school, the suit adds offers "inferior schooling and training" and is "old, dilapidated, poorly equipped, and abandoned by the county board and its members, including Combs and Chairman Laird Watts."

Combs said other schools are in the county, but each had to be expanded first to take care of the increased number of children.

"This is not a matter of integration, but a matter of consolidation," he said.

All of the plaintiff children live in the community of Redfox, which is near the Carr Creek school, Combs said.

Surviving are three brothers, Leonard Blair, East Point; Everett Blair, Leander; Rex Blair, West Van Lear; three sisters, Cora Howell, West Prestonsburg; Ida Whitaker, East Point; Ida Litteral, Greenup.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Sunday, July 28, at the Whitaker Free Will Baptist Church with Claude Preston and Dewey Conley as officiating ministers. Burial was in the family cemetery at Leander.

A SCOUT'S-EYE VIEW OF EUROPE AND THE JAMBOREE

BY WALKIE MAY

Five boys from Floyd county are in Marion, Greece this week participating in the Boy Scout World Jamboree. They are part of a 62-member contingent from the U.S.A. who will join 14,000 boys from 76 countries for 10 days of Jamboree activities, August 1-11. The American boys are divided into eight groups which are visiting Europe, Switzerland and Italy, both before and after their Jamboree in Greece. The following contain excerpts from letters written by one Floyd county boy, Walter May. (Editor.)

"We arrived today (July 23) in London and the temperature was depressingly hot. I was tired, for I had ridden the expected two hours of sleep.

"We left Eindhoven Airport in New York City at 11:30 p.m. and by the time we arrived in London six hours later, it was late morning. We visited the Lord Baden Powell house, the birthplace of the Scout movement. I got some nice pictures and bought some more.

"At Charles Dickens' Old Curiosity Shop I bought a set of small pictures which I hope will be useful as well as ornamental. We saw the cathedral at Oxford University but had to hurry there, too, because they were planning a banquet.

"Yesterday, I slept through breakfast and lunch and was one of the people who caused the tour to be late. I slept on the bus some, too. We traveled a good 120 miles.

"On the flight from London today, I had a bunch of us jumped up and yelled, 'I'm from Ken-a-nuckey' and took a lot of pictures. I had bought 'I toured' Lucerne in a motor coach this morning. Saw the Lion of Lucerne among other things. Our ride up a mountain. There are four intervals because a cable car does not reach the top. I also took a ride on Lake Lucerne on a pedal boat which Gary Goble and I rented. I had bought a bone which we blew and the sound of it carried us up.

"I bought a watch for \$8.95, a 2 1/2 U.S. currency. It is waterproof, antimagnetic, 23 jewels, the works, including a day indicator. I am all packed for Athens. We leave at 7:06 in the morning. I'm ready to go to bed, and I'm about to starve to death. Boy, how I'd like to have three hot dogs and a chocolate milk shake! So dirty Greece has been hot, and dirty. Some of us walked down a street toward the Acropolis, but the smell was so bad we had to turn back. Of course, that is merely one section of Athens. The rest is pretty nice.

"We have seen the Acropolis of Corinth and the ruins of Old Corinth. We went to Mycenae, The Epidaurus Theatre, which we visited, is the best preserved amphitheatre in Greece. Its acoustics are really great.

"When they have a large group like us come, I believe that they take the local residents out and put us in. The dresser drawer has someone's clothes in it and there is a pair of old shoes under the bed.

"Tomorrow we go to the Jamboree, Jamboree Camp, Aug. 1

COLOR BARRIERS DROPPED IN 8 KENTUCKY CITIES

Frankfort, Ky., August 5 (Sp.)—Restaurants, theatres, and other public places in Paris, Campbellsville, Elizabethtown, London, Richmond, Owensboro, Paducah, and other cities have voluntarily dropped color barriers, following Gov. Bert Combs' fair treatment plan.

A true color chain operation throughout the state informed Martin that some outlets began serving Negroes at lunch counters over 10 months ago. All were "open" at the time of the fair services order in June, the firm's spokesman said.

The Kentucky manager of a national restaurant chain has suggested that local managers serve all patrons without discrimination. The manager, who made the suggestion early in June, commented, "The executive order was what we needed all along."

Lexington, Campbellsville, Frankfort and Hopkinsville have also formed human rights councils since the order was issued, Martin said.

In most of the cities, businessmen got together and agreed to the open-door policy. A Negro leader in Elizabethtown praised the local chamber of commerce for scrupulous about desegregation of hotels and restaurants.

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Prominent Letcher Man Victim At Whitesburg; Former Coal Operator

A former Letcher county coal operator, who figured prominently in an income tax evasion case in the 1950's, was shot to death Tuesday of last week near Whitesburg.

The coroner, Mrs. Archie Craft, said Sam J. Bates, 51, was killed during an argument with Edward Darrell Rowe.

Mrs. Craft said Rowe, 24, told this story:

Bates had collected \$100 from him last Thursday under the pretext of paying Rowe's room on the river from being raided by police.

Two days later, the "eddy" was raised, and Rowe was fined \$500 on a charge of selling liquor in dry territory.

Rowe said Bates returned to his home Tuesday and wanted more money. When Rowe refused, Bates slapped him and Rowe fired at him once with a revolver.

Bates was released from prison in 1957 after serving a term for income tax evasion. He had been convicted on charges of swindling payment of \$20,000 on income from the mine he once operated at Whitesburg.

He was a son of the late Robert (Boh) Bates, who was instrumental in the founding of Knott county which was separated from Letcher.

Gamma Globulin Allotted To Counteract Infections Affecting Many In State

Frankfort, Ky.—Gamma globulin, a blood fraction which fights certain diseases and infections, will again be available to Kentuckians through the State Health Department during the 1964 fiscal year. The American National Red Cross is allotting the Red Cross 11,296 cubic centimeters (cc) of gamma globulin this year.

The first quarterly shipment of the allotment arrived this month. In addition to this amount, Kentucky usually purchases between 3,000 to 4,000 cc of gamma globulin each year to meet needs beyond that of the Red Cross allotment. Counties buy this, when necessary, with local funds to supplement the Red Cross supply.

The gamma globulin is available to protect household contacts of hepatitis, pregnant women exposed to German measles during the first three months of pregnancy and to prevent rubella (red measles) in children up to two years of age. Last year it was obtained for more than 13,000 Kentuckians exposed to hepatitis, more than 1,000 pregnant women, and for approximately 3,000 children. This gamma globulin may be obtained through the county health departments.

About 127 of the 2.5 million pints of blood collected annually by the Red Cross is processed into fractions, of which gamma globulin is one. This is then distributed on the basis of population and amount of blood collected in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Gamma globulin is sent to county health departments by the Kentucky State Department of Health when cases requiring it are reported. The Red Cross places no restrictions on the medical use of gamma globulin; it supplies except that no charge be made for the material.

The continuance of the gamma globulin distribution by the Red Cross depends largely on the financial support of the public and blood donations. Through local support of the bloodmobiles throughout the state, greater quantities of blood may be collected in Kentucky, thus the state a larger gamma globulin allotment for the fiscal year.

Educational TV Heads Appointed, Announced; Program Purpose Told

Frankfort, Ky., August 5 (Sp.)—O. Leonard Press has been appointed executive director and Donald Riewer, the state's first director of the Kentucky Authority for Educational Television. It has been announced by Dr. Roy H. Taylor, Auditor of the state.

The association between Press and Stewart will continue one of nearly four years at the University of Kentucky in Lexington. Press has been head of the Department of Radio, Television and Films and director of the U. K. Broadcasting Service since September, 1958. Stewart has been technical director of the University service since October, 1960.

Educational television will supplement the regular classroom instruction. Its main purpose is to make available to even the smallest and most isolated schools top-flight instructional aids for the teacher and laboratory facilities, many of these schools cannot afford. Use of educational television will be entirely up to the local school districts.

Press, 41, a native of Lowell, Massachusetts, has been on the staff of the University for 11 years, having joined U. K. in September, 1952, as program supervisor. He has also served as program consultant to the National Educational Radio and Television Center in New York and Ann Arbor, Michigan, and to the National Association of Educational Broadcasters in Washington.

He has been vice-chairman of the Kentucky Authority for Educational Television since its organization last year. This year he has been a consultant to the U. S. Office of Education regarding the Educational Television Fielding Act.

Stewart, 29, a native of Jenkins, Kentucky, was chief engineer for radio station WBLG in Lexington prior to joining the U. K. He was graduated from the University in 1960 with a degree in electrical engineering.

Offices for the Authority will be housed temporarily in a U. K. building until a permanent structure is completed on the campus. Test operations are planned for next spring or early summer, with full-time programs scheduled to start in September, 1964.

Ten transmitter stations are to be built. They are to be located at Ashland, Covington, Hazard, Madisonville, Pikeville, Somerset, Bowling Green, Lexington, Morehead and Murray. In addition, it is expected that the production and transmitting facilities of the Jefferson County Board of Education at Louisville will be tied in with the system.

LIVESTOCK REQUIREMENTS

The State Department of Agriculture requires all cattle shown at the state or county fairs to be tested for brucellosis within 14 days before the show. This regulation is for the protection of the farmers. Many high priced cattle are shown and without a brucellosis test, a buyer would be easy for an animal with tanks to spread infection to several herds.

This regulation will apply to the Floyd County Fair. No cattle without a clean testing record will be allowed to be unloaded at the fair grounds.

The state will provide testing service to the farmers. For this service call Roy Cook (Telephone number 277-2463).

If all farmers owning stock this year would participate in this livestock fair, this would be the best fair in the history of the county.

Several new homes have been built in the county this year. Each of these homeowners are now faced with the problem of establishing a lawn. Too often this is passed over lightly. A little seed and care and a beautiful lawn is the result. It is scattered in hopes of having a beautiful lawn. This usually does not happen. To establish a new lawn requires some advance planning and several hours of work and money.

Anyone expecting to seed a new lawn should plan to complete the seeding before October and preferably during the first two weeks of September.

The first step is to have a soil test made to find out how much lime, potash and phosphate is needed.

Then after the lawn is grade, add a three-inch layer of fresh sawdust or ground corn cobs or similar organic matter. Then add the fertilizer recommended from the test plot plus 100 pounds of ammonia nitrate per 1,000 square feet. The extra nitrogen is to help decay the sawdust. Follow this by using a rotary tillage and mix the sawdust with the top six inches of soil.

Settle the soil by watering with sprinklers. A thorough soaking is needed at this time.

These steps should be completed as soon as possible. Then in September cultivate the surface of the lawn enough to roughen it, remove any weeds which have grown, and sow your grass seed.

If the lawn isn't seeded by October 1, it would be best to either sod, or to seed annual ryegrass and wait until next September to seed.

STRAWBERRY WEED CONTROL

Strawberry growers are now facing a critical time in their patches. Corn fields are now "laid by" and some strawberry growers feel their strawberry patches can now be forgotten. This is not so. Corn grass is now reaching ideal growth conditions. The weather is hot and strawberries are not growing fast enough to offset competition. Probably more strawberry fields are lost between August 1 and frost than in the spring.

Another problem a few growers have faced is over cultivation. The strawberry runners must take root and be allowed to spread out and make a wide row. To do this, the cultivation must be pulled in and not plowed too close to the berries.

Craig Sewers is still the best weed control material for strawberries. This material is very effective if used properly. Most reports of failure are usually because the material is improperly used. Follow directions on the packages, or obtain our leaflet explaining proper use.

LaRue Schools Recognized For Physical Education

LaRue county schools were recognized for physical education by the National Physical Education Association in a survey conducted last year. The President's Council on Physical Education is a representative body of schools and colleges all over the United States, and its results in LaRue county were "dramatic evidence of what can be accomplished by action and enthusiasm even where there is a shortage of facilities and leadership."

The LaRue county school system is headed by former Morgan county Superintendent of Schools Ova Hasey and husband of the former Miss Irma Wicker, of Wayland, Mrs. Hasey is chief clerk of the superintendent's office.

Statistics showed that when the first fitness tests were given to the children in LaRue county, 47 percent could not pass the minimum tests, but after six weeks only 15 percent didn't pass. They



added that after 15 weeks the percentage unable to pass was down to nine.

In the overall survey, the council said that during that 1962-1963 school year, four out of every five children passed a minimum test of strength, agility, and flexibility as compared to two of every three children tested in 1961.

While there have been big gains in physical-fitness programs and the number of children participating, the council cautioned that more must be done. It said California is the only state requiring daily participation by every student in a physical education period. It said 50 percent of public school pupils in Grades 4 to 12 have no program at all.

The council went on to say they will begin aiming at the adults now. Despite the gains, the report said, the United States "still has a long way to go to match foreign countries in physical fitness programs."

Still, it said, "Today's school children are spending more time in physical fitness programs and are measurably stronger and in better condition than the school children of a few years ago. A significant trend also is noted at the college level. The decline in the physical fitness of entering freshmen apparently has been checked and reversed."

The council operates under the direction of C. B. "Bud" Wilkinson, President John F. Kennedy's consultant on physical fitness and football coach at the University of Oklahoma.

Scholarship Plan Made For Over-Age Children In State Institutions

A scholarship plan for vocational training of older children in state institutions has been announced by Richard J. Cledenen, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Child Welfare.

Cledenen said the new plan calls for sending selected children 16 to 18 years old to the Mayo Vocational School at Paducah and West Kentucky Vocational School at Paducah. Funds are available to meet their expenses of enrollment and living at the schools, Cledenen said. He estimated the cost at about \$600 a year for each student.

To start the plan, \$4,000 is available, the commissioner reported. He said this is more than enough for 12 scholarships. Eight of these would go to selected children at the Kentucky Children's Home, and the others to youngsters at Kentucky Village, the State Reception Center, and the Bartley State Camp for Boys, with allotments varying by need.

The money is to come from Social Security payments, matron survivors' benefits, which a number of dependent children receive. A portion of these payments goes to the account of the beneficiaries and a portion into a pooled fund of the institution which shelters them.

Another source of scholarship money is the Kentucky Children's Home Corporation, which is a department of the commonwealth. It has funded R. C. H. nearly 70 years ago. The corporation board has announced a grant of \$1,000 to pay tuition, fees and incidentals for K. C. H. children in high schools, junior colleges, and vocational schools.

State-Chartered Banks Show Resources Upiped; Commissioner Comments

Frankfort, Ky., August 5 (Sp.)—Kentucky's 27 state-chartered banks showed an increase of 8.3 percent in total resources on June 30, compared with the same date last year, Banking Commissioner H. A. Rogers has reported.

Rogers said the increases showed "a vigorous climb well above our expectations."

The 1963 figure is \$1,982,807,021 for June, 1963, compared with \$1,338,385,328 on June 30, 1962, an increase of more than \$443 million.

Percentage increases for June 1963 over the preceding year was 8.5 percent, Rogers said.

Total deposits in June, 1963, were up \$161 million over last year. The biggest jump was in the time deposits which reflect the higher interest rates now being paid. Rogers said. Time deposits rose from \$358 million to \$417 million over the 12 months.

Demanded deposits showed a significant increase, from \$721 million to \$796 million this year.

Total capital accounts of the institutions were \$263.5 million this year, compared with \$148.5 million last June. But increased deposits lowered the percentage of total capital to 10.44 percent from 9.86 percent last year to 9.26 this year.

Rogers explained this means the banks have 9.26 percent in total capital over 10 percent deposit, a ratio still well above the national average.

In addition to Kentucky's 27 banks, Rogers said, there are 1,000 banks in the United States under federal regulation. The latter include "national" in their names and are licensed in various states. These banks are not included in the report by Rogers.

WHAT'S GOING ON IN FISH & WILDLIFE

by MINOR CLARK, Commissioner Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources

A lure that is good for casting but may be poor for trolling, since it will have little or no built-in action and must be given action by the user. This "includes out" of good trolling lures the plastic worms and lures now so deviously popular for casting, as well as some others. Which, of course, isn't saying that they won't sometimes catch fish when trolled.

A nonweedless lure is certain to hook more strikes of most species than will any lure that is weedless in one or more words, catch more fish for you in a day, perhaps including the big one that didn't get away. So it's often desirable to use a nonweedless lure when it's practical; that is, when you don't have to reel in too often to take off a weed.

Still, some of our best lures come in weedless line. Some are so effective that I use them as they are, even in open water, says Jason Lucas, Angling Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. With others, you can instantly press down the weedguard to render it impervious in any way—and later, when it's needed, put it back up just far enough above the hook point to avoid hooking weeds.

Many lures, trolled at the right speed, impart a steady twitching or bobbing motion to the rod tip, but even the tiniest weed will stop this; so a casual glance at the rod will tell you if the lure is performing properly.

In most fresh water trolling, the depth at which an underwater lure runs is governed not by a sinker
