Some 14,000 residents of Floyd and Johnson counties narrowly escaped loss of gas service for an indefinite period of the period of

Rail Firm Loss In Twin Wrecks Near \$250,000

Two coal train wrecks on successive nights last week in this county caused an estimated \$25,000 damage. Eighteen loaded coal cars figured in a wreck late in the afternoon of Dec. 27 at Minnie, ripping out 360 feet of railway. Cause of the denalment has not been determined.

In the second derailment, the early morning of Dec. 28, nine loaded cars wrecked at Wayland, damaging 225 feet of track. A broken rail caused the wreck,

Some of the wrecked gondolas were twisted and damaged beyond repair. Nobody was injured in either wreck. Last week's wrecks brought to three the number of recent derailments on C. &

the number of recent derailments on C. & O. lines in the county. Thirty loaded cars derailed near here, Dec. 7. Although no official estimate of the damage was available, it is believed the loss here was at least as severe as in the two Beaver Creek wrecks.

The Appalachian Regional Commission, which reportedly is writing off much of Eastern Kentucky, as "not worth saving," is at the same time finding the population growth of this same area a source of "wonderment."

And for the next six years, ARC predicts in a new report, this same

Gains Surprise ARC

section of Kentucky is expected to grow dramatically with 90,000 added to the present population Kentucky lost 1.5 a per cent of its population in the 1890's. But in the first three years of the 1870's it gained 5.8 per cent.

During the 1890's Floyd county lost 13.8 per cent of its population. But from 1970 to 1973 the county gained 10 per cent. The same story, in varying degree, has been written in other eastern counties. The ARC report projects a similar trend over much of the 13-state Appalachian region. It estimates a total population gain of 1.5 million in the region from 1970 to 1890, much of it in the long hard-pressed central mountain and the county of the

Highlands Regional Medical Center this week announced the completion of its first training program for coronary care nursing. Completion of the program enabled the Center to begin receiving patients for the coronary care unit. December 16.

The Unit is equipped with all the life-systalining equipment.

The Unit is equipped with all the life-isustaining equipment used to treat patients suffering from heart disease and is staffed with certified nurse specialists. The training program requires five weeks' intensive study and practice during which a mannequin Arrhythmia

Pickard said more than a third of the Appalachian immigrants from 1970 to 1972 were service men and women returning to civilian life. This has now slowed down and there are some indications in preliminary 1974 U. S. census figures that the overall growth is slowing down, he said.

However, he said he expects current trends to continue until the end of the decade.

Kentucky, Pickard's report said, had Kentucky, Pickard's report said, had the largest amount of immigration in Appalachia from 1970 to 1973, as 27,300 persons moved into the eastern part of the state. Births accounted for an additional gain of 23,200 giving the eastern third of the state a total population of 927,000 in 1973. This is estimated to increase to 1.016,700 by 1980. Growth would likely come in the coal regions and in counties near Winchester, Richmond, Corbin and Somerset. He has not broken down his projections county by county

It's Worth Saving

It is encouraging to learn that the Appalachian Regional Commission has indicated that if now proposes a new program which will include industrial sites, access road construction and more money for coal research.

These three Items are basic to the future of what is known as Appalachia.

At the same time the ARC, if newspaper reports are accurate, relegates a part of the region, including much of Eastern Kentucky, to the provential boneyard. Bill Peterson reported Monday in The Courier-Journal:

"... Under the strategy, ARC funds are concentrated in places that show the greatest potential for growth. Other places, including much of Eastern Kentucky, are written off as 'not worth saving'."

"Not worth saving'—how does ARC, an agency established to save depressed areas from hope-destroying conditions, decide which part of the region is to be forgotten?

Five years ago. Martin county might have qualified. Today, the Appalachian Regional Commission is amazed to find that hat county, which in the 1980-70 decade lost 11 per cent of its population, had three years later gained 11.2 per cent.

Or Floyd, Johnson, Pike, Perry, Knot for half I dozen other eastern counties could have been written off as hopeless as their young people flocked to other sections of the state and nation. But foday they ae yetting their people back from those crowded, crime-ridden cities and their lines of the jobless.

The Times does not ask the Appalachian Regional Commission io invest in impractical ventures here in Eastern Kentucky or in any other section of the region which it was created to serve, but it does ask it, please, to desist from statements which paint with a broad brush a dark picture for Eastern Kentucky a picture which would bear the grim title, "Not Worth Saving."

We suggest that ARC forget some of its dreamy projections and get down to the practical matters of industrial sites, access roads and coal research—and then watch Eastern Kentucky grow.

grow.

After that, it should be our own job to clean up a heautiful land that is a domestic junkyard and an industrial wasteland (as witness junked cars, littered roadsides and farmsteads an strip-mined hills), and so make the areā invitting to the world as well as to those who are native to the land and whose love for it blind their eyes to its imperfections.

Under the sliding benefit scales used for the new pension plans, miners who retire in 1976 will receive pensions slightly lower than miners who retire the scale used for 1977 retirements. However, those who retire in 1976 will receive a \$10 a month increase in 1977 as a hedge against inflation.

Beginning in January, 1976, miners with less than 10 years of service in union mines at the time of their disabling accidents will receive \$125 a month pensions.
