Hospital Here Loses Its Bid To Use Beds

The Comprehensive Health Planning Council of the Kentucky Department for Human Resources, has disapproved an application from the Highlands Regional Medical Center, Prestonaburg, to reclassify 25 skilled nursing beds to acute care.

reclassify 35 skilled nursing beds to acute ears proposal was deferred at this time because the council's Committee on Acute Care Hospital Needs is making a study, after which definitive recommendations will be made. Upon competion of the study further consideration of the application will be given. (The 25 skilled nursing beds at the hospital here are not in use and by the Council action may not be used at this time when there is a shortage of acute care beds.)

This action was taken after a public review of the project conducted in Lexington, Feb. 12.

Both the proposal and application are subject to the provisions of Section 1122 of the Social Security Act. Flu Increase Sharp In East Kentucky

In East Kentucky
FRANKFORT, Ky.—Eastern Kentucky has shown the sharpest increase in flu cases; reporting 8,740 new cases to the Department for Human Resources for the week of Feb. 15.
Kentucky now has 21,017 new cases of flu since the last reporting period, with all six regions showing an increase. Western Kentucky, the hardest hit in the state last week, reported an addition 7,545 cases. South Central, the hardest hit two weeks ago, showed an increase of 3,045 since the last reporting period. North Central has the fewest reported cases of all the regions, but showed a 14-case increase.





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

Most of the home remedies for animal ailments were based on fire, water, smoke, pepper, salt, hog grease, herbs, and physical force, according to Dr. Bill Wise, Extension specialist in veterinary medicine at the University of Kentucky. College of Agriculture, For instance, when a horse or cow suffered snakebile, the wound was treated with a salve by frying Balm-of-Gilead buds in lard.

Then, if a horse was beset with the "heaves," it was forced to breathe in the smoke from a bucket of burning sumac leaves. For colic, the horse was thrown, tied down, and its belly whipped with a wetrope. If that failed, a strong drench of boiled blackoak bark was administered.

wet rope. If that failed, a strong drench of boiled blackash bark was administered. If a horse had a "blemish," it was treated with hot tallow rubbed on well with the thigh bone of a buffalo. If such a bone wasn't available, the bone of a cow was supposed to work about as well. For botts, the remedy was a drench composed of sorghum, water, and pulverized tobacco leaves. The theory was that when the drench reached the animal's stomach, the intestinate animal's stomach, the intestinate sorghum, get sick on the tobacco, and then were dispelled by digestive action. A dose of fried dirt dauber grubs and a bit of hard riding or work was supposed to cure distemper.

Ailing hogs were dosed with lye drained from the ash hopper, and sick cows had they talls "pilt" a kn'ig and the gash filled with pine tree resin. In later years, when turpenine became available, it was substituted for the resin.

available, it was substituted for the resin or "rosum," as it was called. Also, to keep cows from giving "bloody milk," the pioneers were very careful not to kill a toad.

To stop bleeding from a wound, a mixture of spider webs and charred duck feathers was applied, and when a calf took the "scours," it was given a strong dose of ozoe made by bolling the inner bark of a whiteoak tree. do with the strong of the strong the strong dose of ozoe made by bolling the inner bark of a whiteoak tree. Modern technology, he adds, has not quite caught up with a lot of the old ways of doing things so there's just no way of knowing for sure.

Dr. Wise, of course, does not recommend any of these old "kill or cure" remedies. He merely lists some of them to give an idea of veterinary medicine as practiced in the good old days.



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

Canebrakes Furthered Settlement

In this day and time we think of the hollow-jointed arundinari gigantee (wild cane), largely in terms of fishing poles, corncob pipesterns, beansities, pongunater of the control of th

settlement of Kentucky and other states in the lower Mississippi and Southeastern regions.

Early chroniclers left behind tales of vast canebrakes measuring "three miles wide and hundreds of miles long." So dense and so tall were these growths that they formed all but impenetrable jungles and provided perfect sanctuaries for animals and fugitives of all kinds. Many a tale exists of pioneers, including Daniel Boone, escaping death or capture by the Boone, escaping death or capture by the Boone, escaping death or capture by the Charles of wild cane.

In those days, scouts were sent out to locate canebrake growths, indicative of fertile soil, as possible sites for pioneer estellement. Another advantage of settling near a large canebrake jungle was that from late autumn until early spring it provided the main forage for deer, elk, and buffalo that provided much of the meat for pioneer tables By the same token, leaves of wild cane made forage for pioneer livestock. Even pioneer hogs fared well by rooting out and eating the canes rhizomes during switer aid there was little doubt that many a pioneer even, cow, horse, and mulk was saved from starvation by the green leaves of wild cane during winter.

Gov. Carroll Says Allocation On Waste Treatment Too Little

Gov. Julian Carroll is petitioning the federal government for a more realistic allocation of Kentucky's share of waste treatment construction money impounded by the Nixon administration more than a year ago.

Kentucky's apparent share of some \$4 billion to be realised is insufficient, says Carroll, if the state is, to meet a concruction timetable set out by the Federal structural Protection Agency (FPA).

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
Kentucky's share is .66 per cent of the 4h billion total, of \$26.4 million. The money is to be released for construction work during the 1976 fiscal year.
But, according to Kentucky Natural Protection Secretary John Stanley Hoffman, needs surveys required by the EPA were conducted in the state and show that 50 million of the money is needed in Kentucky. That is 1.3 or 1.6 per cent of the 45 billion.
Carroll is asking federal EPA Administrator Russell Train to distribute the money on the basis of findings of the current needs study.

Officers Issue 2,039 Citations


