For one such dream-come-true, the Beaver-Elikhorn Water District, already has water flowing from its plant at Allen through 82 miles of mains, all the way to the upper sections of both Right and Left Beaver Creeks. It is believed to be the most extensive water district development in terms of miles in Kentucky. Phase I of that glant undertaking is complete and has been in operation a year. It has approximately 900 customers at this time and expects to have between 1,200 and 1,500.

Application has been made for ad-ditional funds to run water mains from the mouth of Brush Creek on KY 80 up that valley and across the mountain to the town of David and down the Left Fork of Middle Creek to the Buckeye vicinity.

That extension is regarded as almost certain to be made. In the same project 200 or more additional meters to residences some distance removed from present mains are planned.

The cost of this water project will be \$2,970,000, of which \$2,232,000 it a federal grant.

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

# Strip-Mine Law Will Help At More Than One Point

At More Than One Point

The Times is not alone in its belief that the proposed federal strip-mine bill will not be destructive to the coal industry, whatever President Ford may say.

Among those who share this conviction are Congressmen Carl D. Perkins, Seventh district Democrat, and Congressman Tim Lee Carter, Fifth district Republican. Both represent coalmining areas, and both spoke last week with refreshing candor on their support of the legislation.

By way of endorsement we reprint their statements, in part. Said Congressman Perkins:

"This legislation would be the salvation of the coal mining industry and not—as some mistakenly believe—a detriment to it would save Appalachia, while allowing responsible mining to continue there and in other areas of the East. And it will prevent the wholesale destruction of the Great Plains area of the West, preserving a tremendous source of badly needed food . . . This bill will affect those who don't care—and it should."

Declaring he would be for the bill if a Presidential veto override is necessary. Congressman Carter said, in part:

"Eastern Kentucky has been ravaged by strip-mining and I have made my position clear—even in Harlan county. If it can't be reclaimed, it shouldn't be mined."

Some environmentalists have opposed the legislation on the grounds that it is too weak to serve the purpose of really controlling surface mining and protecting the land and water resources. But we maintain that the bill gives the federal government needed power to take over enforcement in those cases when the states fail to enforce. And it is obvious that, although some strip-mine operators are in compliance with reclamation provisions, not all are being required to meet the full requirements.

Freshman Congressman Carroll Hubbard, Jr., First District Democrat, makes the valid point that the bill will really help Kentucky coal interests. He referred to coal companies threatening to move, or actually moving, from Kentucky and its "strong" reclamation requirements to other states where the requirements are not so stringent. Said Hubbard: "By putting some regulation on other states that are not as stringent as Kentucky, this bill could even enhance production in Kentucky because we won't have any more of this interstate blackmail." The legislation protects Kentucky coal in another way. It will curb wholesale mining operations in those rich So foot seams out west which. If fully developed, could kill the coal market for areas such as Eastern Kentucky.

Some farsighted Kentucky coal men have supported the federal strip-mine law, and that threat of western coal may be one of the reasons.

# New Dye Technique Developed by USDA

NEW ORLEANS, La.—Housewives who like pretty towels may soon find a wide variety of fancy multicolored towels on store shelves as a result of a new invention of U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) scientists who have the consumer in mind.

Traditionally, dyeing has been used to enhance the style and beauty of cotton textiles. It is far less expensive than weaving multicolored fabrics, and the colors go deep into the fabric unlike the surface effect of printed fabrics.

Now scientists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service (ARS) have developed an entirely new dyeing technique that adds another dimension to imparting colors to towels and other cotton textiles such as denims and twills.

The technique allows dyeing one side of a fabric one color and the other side an entirely different color. It even allows patterns as simple or as complicated as the designer makes them.

The new technique is a spinoff from the side of the colors of the designer makes them.

combination of course available.

Moreover, modifications of the procedure, such as weaving treated with untreated yarns, and making designs on the fabric surface with the dye resisters, offer virtually unlimited combinations of colors and designs.

The dye-resisting chemical treatment is an inexpensive, modified wash-wear formulation. Those portions of the cotton fabric treated with the formulation are completely resistant to the activity of the reactive cotton dyes used in the research. Although the reactive dyes are used in the finishing industry, the research is now being turned to adapting the process for use with the vat dyes which are in more widespread use than the reactive dyes because they are less expensive and offer superior color and light fastness and crock resistance.

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

# Consumer Comments

By ED W. HANCOCK
A Kentucky consumer recently noted that the warranties on some appliances are so short that they run out by the time you get home from the store! Although you get home from the store! Although this may be an exaggeration, there have been a lot of problems with warranties. To deal with the warranty problem, a new law was passed by the Congress, signed this year by the President, and will be effective as soon as the Federal Trade Commission puts forth specific rules.

The new law has two basic goals: to The new law has two basic goals: to make manufacturers provide consumers with straight-forward and meaningful warranties (and to back them up) and to strengthen the Federal Trade Commission's capacity to protect consumers against other unfair and deceptive practices. The new law does not require all consumer products to have a warrantie But if products do carry warranties, the warranties provided by manufacturers must meet certain standards.

Under this new warranty law, a written Under this new varranty law, a written warranty must be labeled "full warranty" or "limited warranty." A "full warranty" "neans that the warranty warrantes. A "full warranty" means the warranty meets minimum federal standards for standards. Minimum standards for standards, Minimum standards for standards, Minimum standards for capitating defective products at no charge and within a reasonable length of time, and giving a refund or a new product or part if the item cannot be repaired after a reasonable number of attempts.

What are a reasonable number of at-tempts? That's for the Federal Trade Commission to decide. In the coming months, they will determine this question and put forth other specific rules for

## '75 Ag Conservation Program Announced

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced a 1875 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) designed to encourage the application of enduring soil and water conservation practices on the nation's farms. The ACP will be funded at the \$190 million level authorized by congress. This level will include funds to finance the Long-Term Agreements (LTA's) signed under the Program.

Agreements (LTA's) signed unger the 1974 Bural Environmental Conservation Program.

The 1975 program will offer both annual and long-term conservation agreements to farmers at cost-shares from 50-75 percent of the cost of carrying out approved practices. Under long-term agreements, cost-sharing will be scheduled over a period of from 3-10 on a Conservation Farm Plan approved by the loal Soil Conservation District.



# **Broad Form Deed Appeal Briefs Filed**

FRANKEPORT, Ky—A, 1974 law undermining the broad form deed does not violate the contractural rights protected by the Kentucky and federal constitutions because it is a valid exercise of the state's police power, the state contended yesterday in a brief filled in the Court of Appeals.

This was the predominant argument in the 49-page brief filed by the Department for Natural Resources and Entertain Constitution of the Appeal of a Franklin circuit decision which declared the law unconstitutional.

Four Knott county landowners who intervened in the lower court case on the side of the state also filed a 44-page brief with the Court of Appeals. Their brief emphasized arguments contending there is a socio-economic necessity for the law. The law, often referred to as House Bill 9, was struck down by Franklin Circuit Judge Henry Meigs in January on the ground that it violated the contractural rights of the state and federal constitutions. The statute requires the landowner's consent before a strip mine permit can be issued.
