#### **Producers Alerted** To Disaster Pay

Producers in Floyd county are being alerted to the disaster payment provisions of the 1975 feed grain program administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Producers may become eligible for prevented planting and low yield payments. Prevented planting means that the farmer is unable to plant because a severe natural disaster, or other disaster condition beyond the farmers' control striking at planting time, prevented him from planting at anytime during the planting period. Low yield is when a disaster services the potential yield of a crop after plan-ting.

yield is when a disaster seriously affects the potential yield of a crop after plan-ting. If the producer is prevented by a disaster from planting an acreage of annual nonconserving crop at least equal to the sum of his wheat and feed gran aliotments, he may quality for a prevented planting payment. Invo yield payments apply only to program crops of corn and grain or the sum of his wheat and feed gran aliotments, he may quality for a disaster tradely dartons and the sum of reduces the potential yield substantially below normal. If a disaster prevents a farmer from planting his crop acreage or severely damages a planted program crop acreage after planting, he should im-mediately report it to the ASCS office He should not plow under, graze, hay or otherwise destroy evidence of the crop damage unit specifically advised by the control ASCS office that he may do so. 




