'Kidnapped' Boy Reported Found

The mystery surrounding the disappearance of a Paintsville street last Friday evening of a nine-year-old boy was apparently solved Tuesday afternoon with the announcement by Paintsville police that the boy is now with his mother, according to her attorney.

The report did not say where the mother, Mrs. Dorothy Howard, and her son now are. Her last known whereabouts was Dallas, Texas.

The boy, Paul Edwin Howard, of Thelma, was snatched up by two men while he was riding his bicycle near the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Alice Howard, of Washington avenue, and was spirited away in a van. Witnesses did not immediately report the abduction, thinking one of the men was the boy's father, Harrison Howard.

The men believed to have abducted the boy were later seen at Louisa with a woman.

The FBI had joined Paintsville authorities in the investigation in the case. Two John Doe warrants were issued last Saturday, but is not known at this time if prosecution will follow. The parents of the boy were divorced last April when the father was given custody of the child. His father and he have been residing in or near Paintsville since that time.

Teenagers Tell Ky. Officials Needs for Traffic Safety

More than 120 teenagers from 12 eastern Kentucky counties gathered at Jenny Wiley State Park last week to tell state traffic officials what is wrong with their traffic safety and enforcement programs.

Contrary to the popular notion still held in some quarters that youth are both reckless and irresponsible in their handling of an automobile, they came away from the conference sounding more like a group of concerned legislators than an undisciplined band of speed-hungry hotrodders.

The conference was the first of eight such sessions being sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Transportation (KYDOT) and its Office of Highway Safety Programs to encourage more student involvement in finding better ways to reduce the state's rising traffic death toll.

After a short address by Bennie Maffei, KYDOT traffic safety coordinator, who told the teenagers that 4,000 drivers involved in fatal accidents last year were under the age of 18, the students broke up into smaller groups to discuss drugs and alcohol, traffic enforcement problems, driver education and licensing programs.

Among the major recommendations agreed upon by the students at the conclusion of those group discussions were:

—KYDOT should beef up its highway enforcement program by hiring more officers to stop violations of the state's weight limit law by coal trucks "that are ruining our roads";

—Special judges should be appointed to hear drunk driving cases in order to prevent any influence being brought to bear on the court by way of political or other personal connections with the accused;

—Every applicant for a driver's license—regardless of age—should be required to complete a formal driver education course before obtaining a license;

—Motor vehicle inspection procedures should be tightened;

—Driver re-examination should be

made a state requirement at least once every four years until age 18, after which drivers then would be re-examined every two years.

Wolfe county senior Sonja Senter, representing the group on alcohol and drugs, also urged that the state recognize the need for more education on drugs and alcohol at the elementary school level.

She also argued for revision of the state's driver learner permit examination to include more emphasis on drugs and alcohol.

Karen Belcher, a junior from Elkhorn City High School and spokesman for the discussion group on traffic enforcement, said her group also favored raising the speed limit on four-lane highways from 55 to 60 m.p.h., but lowering it on some secondary roads and putting a stop to the practice by some courts of reducing "original traffic charges."

Her group also called both for raising the requirements to become a police officer in Kentucky and making those requirements uniform on a statewide basis.

The group on driver education programs, represented by Judy Lowe, a senior from Millard High School, indicated a need for more emphasis on hazardous driving techniques in driver education classes and said that student drivers should be allowed more time behind the wheel.

Among other recommendations offered by the group on driver licensing programs was a suggestion, offered by Steve Walters from Pikeville High School, that the state implement a "classified drivers' licensing program" which would restrict anyone holding a learner's permit only to the operation of automobiles and motorcycles.

Maffei said that all of the recommendations made at the Jenny Wiley meeting will be considered for inclusion in a final report to be forwarded to Gov. Julian Carroll after the last conference, now scheduled for Nov. 17 at Louisville.

Students attending the conference at Jenny Wiley State Park came from schools in Johnson, Martin, Magoffin, Wolfe, Floyd, Pike, Breathitt, Lee, Knott, Owsley, Perry and Letcher counties.

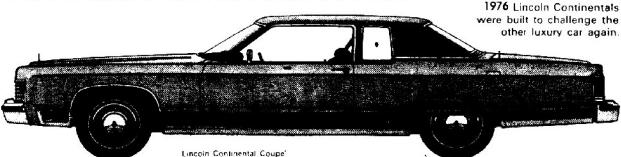

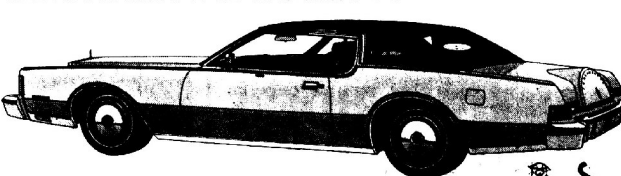

Rural Road Fund To Help Abbott Flood Situation

Gov. Julian Carroll last week announced the addition to the Floyd County rural secondary and program of two projects which will materially benefit the Abbott Creek section.

One project involves raising the present grade of the Abbott Creek road KY 144 in two places where the road is flooded during high water and some residents are temporarily isolated. One section of the highway to be raised is 3 miles from the junction of the road with KY 1428 about 1.5 miles in the vicinity of the former Alex M. Spradlin home. The other is at Short Branch.

The second project will be the channeling of Abbott Creek 3.4 miles west of the KY 1428 junction, between Cannel Coal Hollow and the former Jim Hill home. This work is designed to correct flooding conditions during periods of high water.

Cost of the work has not been estimated. The new projects will be paid for from the \$200,000 already allotted Floyd county for rural secondary road aid during the current fiscal year.

Floyd County Man Has Job Of Housing Students at ECU

RICHMOND, Ky.—Jack Hutchinson is in charge of more than six thousand beds, but he doesn't have much time to lie down and rest.

The Floyd county native is the new director of housing at Eastern Kentucky University, and his big problem is the whole student body—where to put them. Not that this problem is entirely new to him. Until his present job, he was director of men's residence halls.

Eastern this fall found itself in a situation facing most colleges and universities. Because of inflation and job shortages, more and more youths sought the less expensive facilities provided by campuses, causing massive overcrowding in dormitories.

This rather awesome situation automatically faced Hutchinson when he was appointed to head Eastern's new Division of Housing which is responsible for putting a roof over the heads of men and women students, married students, and a large number of the faculty.

Although Eastern has the largest number of beds for students of any university in Kentucky, Hutchinson's office was swamped this fall semester by applications for rooms. On one day during registration, he said, 131 students appeared without room reservations; the next day there were 45 additional ones, and throughout the period they continued to come.

"We still have about 400 students who are the third person in a dormitory room designed for two," he said.

Dr. Thomas D. Myers, vice president for student affairs, said Eastern is housing more students on campus than any other university in the state. He pointed out that the resident head in each dormitory has a master's degree in counseling and that men's and women's dormitories have recreational programs headed by qualified directors to keep the throng of students occupied when they are not studying.

Probably the most difficult job of the new division headed by Hutchinson so far has been providing living and study space for the overflow of students in the resident halls. But the Board assigned the Division enough functions to keep it busy even after the last student to apply has been tucked snugly into a room.

These functions are the assignment of housing units and contracts and the maintenance and the operation of the units, which are included in these facilities.

One of the tasks assigned to the division by the Board is "to exert appropriate efforts to maintain full occupancy of all housing units." So far, this has been Hutchinson's easiest task, but it

could become more difficult if college enrollments across the nation begin to go down.

Hutchinson, who has been at Eastern since 1968, formerly was a teacher and assistant coach in basketball and baseball at Martin High School, where he graduated after playing varsity basketball for four years. He attended Alice Lloyd College, earned the BS degree at Pikeville College, and the MA at Eastern. His parents are D.M. and Loretta Hutchinson, of Martin.

During 1968-69 he was resident director at ECU's Commonwealth Hall. In 1969 he was named director of men's residence centers. His wife, the former Betty Sue Webb, of Allen, teaches the fourth grade at Waco Elementary School. She is a graduate of Eastern "with high distinction." The Hutchinsons' daughter, Mary Anne, is a senior at ECU's Model Laboratory School.

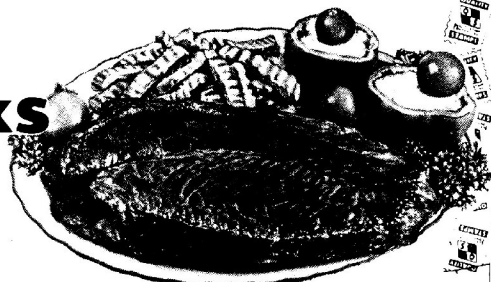

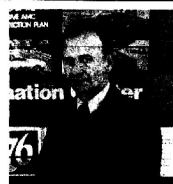

Consumer Comments

A car that looks good doesn't always run "good." When buying a used car, there are two laws you should be familiar with in order to help you make the best deal.

One of these laws is part of the Motor Vehicle Information and Cost Savings Act. This law requires that the buyer of a used car be provided with a written statement of the registered mileage on any car under 25 years old. This statement must include the odometer reading at the time of transfer, the date of transfer, the seller's name, address and signature. Also, the make, body type, year, model, vehicle identification number and the last plate number of the vehicle must be included. If the seller believes that the information available is not accurate, the disclosure statement must state that the actual mileage is unknown—so ask him if he believes the information is correct. Remember, he must provide a statement certifying that he is complying with this law and is aware of his liability under it.

Repairing, servicing or replacing an odometer is not prohibited as long as the mileage shown on it afterward is the same as before. If this is not possible, a notice must be placed on the left door frame showing the mileage prior to the repair or replacement.

The law prohibits disconnecting or resetting an odometer for the purpose of altering the mileage reading. Operating a vehicle with a non-functioning odometer is prohibited if there is intent to defraud.

A Kentucky law also aids the consumer buying a used car. This law requires motor vehicle dealers to provide you with the name of the previous owner of a used car upon request. Be a wise purchaser—always contact the previous owner prior to buying a used car in order to obtain information about the car's condition.

Floyd Teacher EKEA President; Bell Is Speaker

More than 400 public school educators were told Friday that teachers are "America's best last chance" to avoid an "instant replay" of the fall of the Roman Empire.

Tommy Bell, Lexington attorney and a referee in the National Football League, challenged those attending the 52nd annual convention of the Eastern Kentucky Education Association at Morehead State University to return to their schools and become leaders for the free enterprise system, respect for authority, religious beliefs and truth and integrity in all matters.

Keynote speaker for EKEA's general session at Morehead State University, Bell urged the teachers to be models for young people who receive poor direction at home and from corrupt public officials.

"We must demand fiscal responsibility, respect for law and order and honesty from those in public life," he stated.

Bell said Kentucky should require that a course in free enterprise be offered by every high school. On the welfare system, he said:

"We've gotten to the point where kids don't believe in Santa Claus but their parents do."

In an earlier address, Dr. Lyman V. Ginger, state superintendent of public instruction, declared that the first dedication of every classroom teacher should be to fundamental learning skills. He called for more support of vocational education, special education and opportunities for the gifted child.

Dr. Ginger also urged that standards of academic performance and discipline be maintained in all schools.

Eugene Blackburn, a teacher at Betsy Layne High School, assumed the presidency of the 18-county association. Frank Wells, a teacher in Johnson county, was named president-elect.

—Passed a resolution calling on the KEA Board of Directors to reconsider its decision to pay a salary to Mrs. Billie Pope, KEA president.

—Defeated the move to demand the recall of three KEA officers because of the Pope situation.

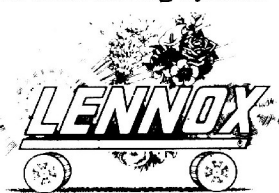

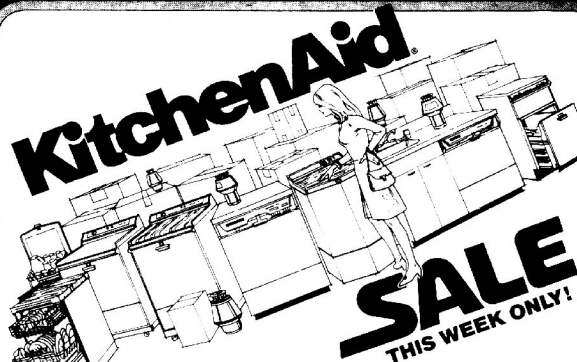

Attorney General's Opinions

Dero G. Downing, president of Western Kentucky University, asked if WKU's board of regents could grant tenure to a faculty member not recommended for that tenure by the university president. Downing further explained that the faculty member in question had been recommended for a one-year appointment not to continue beyond the 1975-76 school year. The Attorney General's office replied that a faculty member of a state university may only be employed or granted tenure upon the recommendation of the president of the university.

Jim Blincoe, of Owensboro, asked if a write-in candidate need follow the same regulations or laws of major party candidates, such as filing with the secretary of state or state registrar. The Attorney General's office concluded that any candidate must follow the reporting and advertising requirements of the Corrupt Practices Act if he receives contributions or makes expenditures toward a campaign, or if such is done on his behalf.

C. Ivan Payne, Kentucky Board of Barbering administrator, asked if the board's 1975 barbering regulations are strong enough to allow barbers to give permanent waves. The Attorney General's office found that the legislature does not include permanent waving, marcelling or finger waving in the statute defining barbering.

Therefore, since the barbering board's judgment and power does not preclude that of the legislature, the regulations are void insofar as they attempt to include permanent waving into the statute's definition.

Rep. Thomas B. Givhan asked if a person may be indicted and charged solely on the basis that he is known to be a persistent felon, whether or not another felony charge is pending. The office of the Attorney General held that a person cannot be sentenced as a habitual criminal as an independent offense, that this would violate the Fifth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution. However, recurrent offenders may be subject to heavier punishment when another felony is committed.

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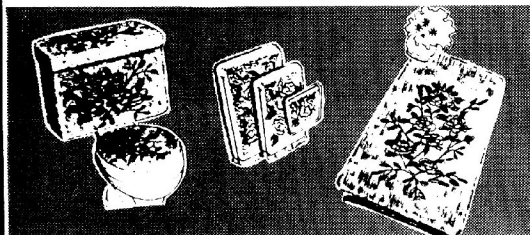

Objections Raised at Hearing On 'Deep Mine' Reclamation

Frankfort, Ky.—Since coal operators are being forced to live by the letter of the law, they want the letter to be more reasonable. At least that was the consensus of the representatives of mining operations who testified at a recent public hearing on proposed regulations governing the surface effects of deep mining.

For instance, Paul Patton, president of Kentucky Elk Horn Coals, Inc., and Chapparral Coal Corp. called for more reasonable regulations.

"The division of surface mining reclamation for some reason is now insisting that the reclamation regulations be enforced to the letter of the law, so write something industry can live with," said Patton. "If detailed regulations are to be enforced, they must be reasonable so that we can accept them and live with the letter of the law."

Some of the language was colorful, but the scenario was typical as Kentucky moved forward in its year-old effort to become the first state to adopt all-inclusive regulations governing the surface effects of deep mining by holding the recent public hearing on the proposed regulations.

As is typical for public hearings on proposed environmental regulations, few persons had much good to say for the regulations. Some said they had gotten better as they had progressed through many changes on their way to this hearing. Some said they had become unbearable.

As is usual in discussions of environmental regulations, industry representatives generally said they were too tight. The citizen groups said the regulations were too lax.

Now, it is the job of the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection (NREP) to weed through the volumes of testimony, answer each comment and revise the regulations in light of the testimony. That should be a large undertaking since some of the witnesses took issue with most of the sections in the 26-page package of regulations.

Most of the testimony represented the coal industry—several officials of coal companies, representatives from the Kentucky Coal Assoc., Coal Operators and Associates, and Pikeville Coal Operators. Testimony from citizens' groups came from the Citizens League to

Protect Surface Rights and the Cumberland Chapter of the Sierra Club.

A law passed by the 1974 Kentucky legislature requires NREP to adopt regulations for the reclamation of surface land disturbed by deep mining. Two previous drafts were rejected by a legislative review subcommittee last winter. In April, John S. Hoffman, NREP secretary, hired the New York consulting firm of Ford, Bacon and Davis, Inc., to draw up a new set of the regulations.

The proposed regulations presented at the recent hearing were largely based on the consulting firm's proposals. Myles Walsh, of Ford, Bacon and Davis, explained some of his firm's work in drafting the regulations at the end of the hearing. That work included research collected in England.

Many of the complaints made at the hearing dealt with what coal representatives said were unrealistic time limitations—particularly a 120-day deadline for submission of reclamation plans and a one-year deadline for complying with the new reclamation requirements.

Coal representatives said exemptions granted for only one year would discourage development of new mines. Bonding was said to be too high and the cost of complying with the regulations was called prohibitive by owners of small mines who said they would be driven out of business.


Some said the regulations exceed statutory intent by including provisions such as those concerning air and water pollution. Others said more of those types of provisions should be included.

In a colorful delivery, one coal operator said miners were being hit with government regulations the size of Sears & Roebuck catalogues. The department's answers to the comments raised at the hearing may fill a volume nearly that size.

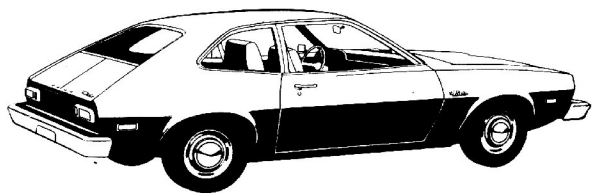

The Judicial Amendment

By ALBERT DIX

"It's time to restructure our courts to meet the needs of the 20th and 21st centuries, to avoid a crisis before it is on us."

This was Court of Appeals Chief Justice John Palmer speaking to a group of citizens meeting in late 1973. They had gathered to discuss and make recommendations on a total reorganization of Kentucky's courts.

Palmer was speaking for a unified, four-level court organization similar to that in effect in overall of the states in the United States. He was speaking for the state in effect in overall of the states in the United States.

He was expressing the sentiments of Kentucky citizens groups, lawyers and judges who, for the past five years, have been discussing the Commonwealth's judiciary and how best to reorganize it to cope with its growing case load, and to provide the citizens of the state with better overall justice.

All the reorganization sentiments and statements have been distilled into an amendment which will appear on the November, 1973 ballot.

Should the voters run counter to form and accept the constitutional changes here is how the state's courts would be structured.

Established in Kentucky would be a Court of Justice, an all-encompassing judicial system divided into a Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, Circuit Court and District Court, in that order from the top to the bottom.

The Supreme Court would be the "Court of Last Resort," consisting of seven judges elected for eight-year terms from the present Court of Appeals districts; the judges would select one of their members to serve as Chief Justice for a four-year term.

It would have strictly appellate jurisdiction. A majority of the justices could decide a case.

The Chief Justice would become the executive head of the judicial system of Kentucky, the head man. The "back" would go to the Supreme Court in the Commonwealth would be his ultimate responsibility.

He could assign any active or retired judge to hear a case anywhere in the state; he would establish uniform rules of procedure. Trials in Harlan county would be carbon copies of those conducted in Hickman county. The process of justice

would be equalized across the state. He would submit the budget for the Court of Justice to the General Assembly, and plead the case for it among legislators and Governors' all money for the judiciary in Kentucky would come from the state treasury.

It would be the Chief Justice's responsibility to move the lower courts out of garages, back rooms and grocery stores into lighted, odor-free, functional courtrooms.

As Chief Justice he would be a part of the case decision process, to help him with the multitude of administrative details he would, in all probability, hire a chief court administrator.

In Illinois, Judge Roy Gulley is the chief administrator and it is to him the Chief Justice turns for help in keeping over 1100 court jobs filled, and accounting for between \$50 and \$60 million in yearly fines and court costs.

The Court of Appeals, this would be a new, intermediate court, established to take much of the appeals burden off the present Court of Appeals.

It would consist of 14 judges, two elected from each of the Supreme Court districts for eight-year terms. It, too, would have appellate jurisdiction and could be authorized to review, directly, decisions of state administrative agencies.

Court of Appeals judges would select one of their own to be Chief Justice and, in addition to his court duties, he would administer the affairs of the Court.

The 14-member bench could divide itself into separate panels of not less than three to decide cases appealed to it. The chief judge would examine the decisions of separate panels to make sure they don't conflict.

Kentucky had this intermediate court prior to the constitutional revision of 1891, but the framers of that document felt only one appeals court was needed and thereby dumped all appeals in the lap of the present Court of Appeals.

The case load of today's Court of Appeals has doubled in the past 10 years, from 600 to 1200 cases. On June 30, 1973, its backlog of more than 1,000 cases meant at least a four-year wait for the litigants involved to get a final decision.

In Maryland, the state Supreme Court hears about 150 cases a year, all broad constitutional issues, the framers of the

proposed amendment anticipate. Kentucky's Supreme Court will experience the same thing, thus having more time to devote to researching and studying major items of litigation and sweeping constitutional questions.

Circuit Court would be held in each county, the Circuit Court districts in effect at the time of the amendment's adoption, meaning judicial circuits. The number of judges, who would be elected for eight-year terms, in each district on the effective date of the amendment would remain the same.

It would be the court of original jurisdiction, basically the court where most legal questions are argued for the first time.

District Court would be the lowest level of the four court system but in many respects becomes the most important. It is the "court of first impression," according to Judge Thip Fairbanks, circuit judge in Maryland, "where almost 90 per cent of a state's legal issues begin and end."

District courts would take over the duties of the various local level courts which presently exist. One would be held in each county. The Circuit Court districts would also become judicial districts and each district would have the same number of district judges as it does circuit judges.

In any county in which no district judge lives, the chief judge of the district is charged with appointing one or more trial commissioners to do that work.

A commissioner would have to be a resident of that county and be an attorney "if one is qualified and available," the amendment explains.

In a few Kentucky counties there is only one lawyer, or none, and he could not represent clients and sit on the bench at the same time. The words, "if one is qualified and available," make it possible to appoint a district judge who is not an attorney, someone perhaps "learned in the law" but not a member of the Bar.

District courts would have limited jurisdiction and would, in January, 1978, be organized and take over the judicial duties of police courts, county courts, magistrate's courts, etc.

County judges and magistrates would continue as elected administrators of their county governments, giving up only their judicial functions.

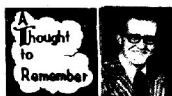
Circuit clerks would continue to be elected as they are today but would handle the records of both circuit and district courts.

The grand jury was back in session for one day, Oct. 8. Meanwhile five admitted bootleggers who implicated Sheriff Melvin and Trial Commissioner Bob Stafford have taken polygraph (lie detector) tests and Stafford, who had earlier agreed to submit to the same test,

Denying guilt, Stafford was quoted as vowing he would take a lie detector test to support his testimony. But when time came Oct. 8 for the tests for the official and his accusers he declined to make the trip to Frankfurt. Commonwealth's Attorney Rice says Stafford went the next day to Frankfurt and there procured from a former polygraph operator a statement to the effect that Stafford would be unable to take the test because of health problems. Stafford has cited a heart murmur and prescribed tranquilizing medication as reasons for not being able to undergo the test.

Meantime, results of the polygraph tests given the five who accuse the officials are awaited.

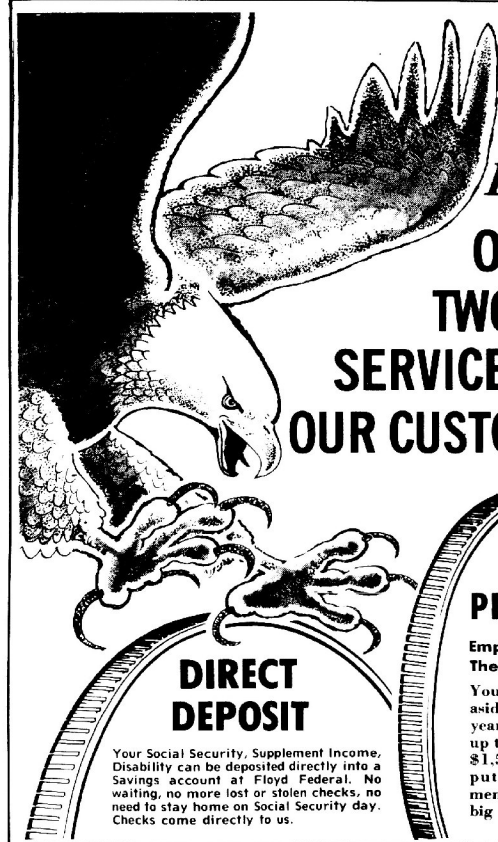

Foresters Seek Improved Timber

FRANKFORT, Ky.—Forests in Kentucky's future will be the theme of the sixth annual Governor's Conference on Forestry scheduled for Oct. 23-24 at the Phoenix Hotel in Lexington.

Among the topics to be discussed will be tree improvement, growing more and better trees faster, timber stand improvement, the maintenance of existing forests and urban forestry, according to Harry Nadler, director of the division of forestry of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.

Conference speakers will describe methods for establishing, cultivating and harvesting forests and show how to protect Kentucky woodlands from neglect and poor management.

A Ray Shirley, director of the Georgia Forestry Commission, will explain how the rapid shift in population from farm to city in the past two decades has affected the growth of trees in urban areas. Discussing the need for urban forestry programs, he will explain how and why the Georgia forestry agency established its program, which is considered one of the most successful in the country. An urban forestry program, according to Shirley, will help solve such general urban problems as fertilization and the preservation of shade trees.

Other speakers will focus on two separate aspects of timber stand improvement: the selection of the proper species and the selection of area sites based on the cost of operating and expected financial returns. Ways to increase the future value of trees by increasing their quality and the cultivation of black walnuts will also be discussed.

The conference will also feature some forestry exhibits, including modern logging equipment, a display from the University of Kentucky's School of Forestry depicting training for both professionals and technicians and modern forestry management techniques being used by state and federal forestry agencies in Kentucky.

Tourist Season Climax Seen With Visit of 'Gypsy' Entourage

Eastern Kentucky is admittedly tourist hungry. But Johnson county had some visitors recently which it was so anxious to rid itself of that its officers graciously escorted the callers, all 41 of them, to the Floyd-Johnson line.

The visitors, who were first described as gypsies, later as Italo-Mexicans, caused little stir in this county. The whole kit and kaboodle of them rented nine rooms of The Plantation Motel, near here, and spent the night, then departed, heading south.

A report to the effect that they tore up the motel rooms was denied by the Plantation manager. "They messed some of them up a bit, but no more than some other people do," he said. Nothing was taken from the rooms.

The Paintsville Herald gave this account of the movements of the callers while they were in Johnson county.

A traveling group of Mexican-Italians decided Friday evening to temporarily settle in Johnson County, unsettling law enforcement officials in the process.

Nine car loads of the "gypsies" stopped off at Florene Davis' grocery at Sitka, swarming through the store, and allegedly taking a number of items from the shelves. When the uproar was over the gypsies had paid for two bottles of soft drink and two penny balloons.

Feeling that there was a quantity of her merchandise taken without payment, Mrs. Davis telephoned the Paintsville Police Department to warn of the group's pending arrival in the city, according to official reports, Mrs. Davis had overheard one of the group saying they were going to O'Bryan's Market, located on Route 29 ByPass.

Patrolman Charles Arms was dispatched to O'Bryan's and stopped four cars bearing part of the entourage. Three cars, it was later learned, continued to the top of the Starline hill where they awaited the delayed portion of the group.

O'Bryan's manager, tipped off by a phone call from Mrs. Davis, refused the gypsies entrance to his store and the group was returning to their route when patrolman Arms arrived on the scene.

The quartet of vehicles was stopped near the mini-park on the ByPass. Following procedure, Arms requested assistance and was immediately joined by patrolmen Chris Haney and Doug Wallen. The officers began an escort of the vehicles to City Hall with the "parade" later joined by two more of the gypsy cars.

Sometime during the parade to City Hall, Paintsville police chief Ross Spears, Kentucky State Police Trooper Ken Deboard, Johnson County trial commissioner Bob Stafford and County Attorney James A. Knight were called. Everyone apparently arrived at nearly the same time.

The troop had been stopped, Spears said, because of Mrs. Davis' report. The official "charge" was suspicion that a felony had been committed.

At City Hall, the group was ushered into the second floor meeting room and a search of their vehicles began. Immediately, the group poured out into the streets and started harassing the officers.

Chief Spears said that the harassment was a "front." He said that the women were wearing double aprons and full dresses that could be used to conceal many items and that the police were trying to search the cars first and would then search the individuals.

When the gypsies learned that they would be personally searched, several of the women in the group offered the growing crowd of spectators a look for themselves. They pulled their dresses up above waist level to reveal that there was nothing concealed beneath them, not even undergarments.

They began a dance, of sorts, and a chant of "You wanna look?" that was planned for the occasion.

A Spanish speaking family, from Paintsville, was brought to City Hall to serve as interpreters, since the gypsies denied any knowledge of the English language. Their ability to grasp the language improved remarkably, however.

Another parade was formed and the entourage headed south to the county line.

Officials in Prestonsburg were telephoned to expect the group. It was later learned that the gypsies decided to spend the night at the Plantation Motel, just north of Prestonsburg. Several rooms in the facility were reportedly a little worse for wear when the group moved on the next morning.

After consulting with law enforcement officials and news media representatives in northeast Kentucky, Chief Spears said this week that gypsies were an organized group that traveled about harassing store owners and flirting with the law.

"In nearly every place they have been, 'been the same," he said. "They know just how far they can go and what is going to happen to them."

"Hopefully," he added, "someday they will pick on a town that has a jail big enough for all of them. But they would do the same thing after they got out."

The band was numbered at 41, not counting small babies. They have, reportedly, "visited" Greentown about two years ago, and the town of West Liberty. Most of them carry the family name of Perlov with one exception. One unit of the group is named Perlov.

Chief Spears said that there were only eight men in the group with the remainder women and children.

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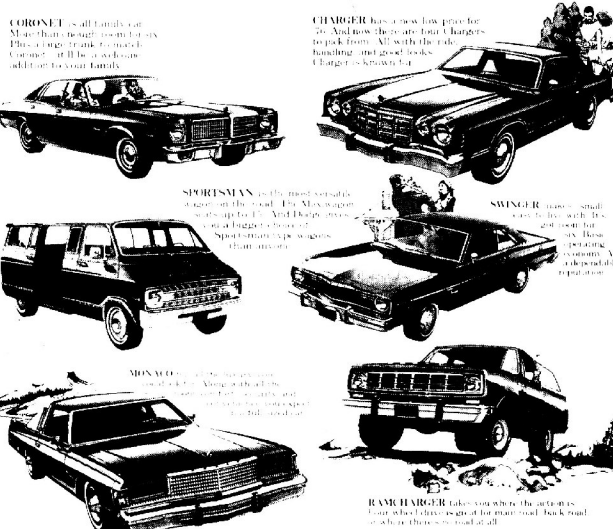

Posthumous Honor Accorded Floyd Native, Aviation Pioneer

The late Frank Mayo Fairchild, Floyd county native, has been selected as a member of the OX-5 Aviation Pioneers Hall of Fame.

The posthumous honor was conferred at the National convention of OX-5 Aviation Pioneers of America held in San Antonio, Texas, October 9-11. In recognition of contributions to the establishment of the air industry, The Wright Brothers (Orville and Wilbur) and Charles A. Lindbergh received similar awards on this same date.

Mrs. Fairchild, the former Margaret Gaines, who was prior to retirement with the Greater Cincinnati control tower, was in San Antonio to accept the honor for her late husband. Formal ceremonies will be held next May when she will unveil the Frank Fairchild nameplate on the Hall of Fame plaque in the Glenn H. Curtiss Museum at Hammondsport, N. Y.

Mr. Fairchild, who was a native of Allen was known in the Greater Cincinnati area, where he lived and worked for years, as "Mr. Aviation". He was prominent in all matters pertaining to aviation whether it be directing and coordinating courses of study, supervising instructors under his jurisdiction, assisting the City of Cincinnati and the Chamber of Commerce in Airport site selections and planning, or whatever facet of aviation. He was a member of the Ohio Wing of the OX-5 Aviation Pioneers of America.

Mr. Fairchild was born in Floyd county July 6, 1900. At the age of 16 he enrolled in East Texas Normal College, after which he entered Berea College, where he spent four years. While at Berea he became interested in auto mechanics, a field took him to Cincinnati, where in 1923 he attended the McSweeney Auto and Electrical School. Upon graduation, he was asked by Mr. McSweeney to go to Chicago and assume the duties of superintendent of instruction for the new McSweeney Auto and Electrical Chicago-based school.

It was then he became interested in aviation and started flight training at the site of the present Chicago Midway Airport. He had been a pilot since 1924. Returning to Cincinnati, he established his own flying school on a part of what is now Lunken Airport. Instruction included aviation ground school courses authored by him. In 1929 the Cincinnati Board of Education was considering adding an aviation department to its vocational education programs and asked Mr. Fairchild to assume this phase of training. He spent 5 years with the Aviation Department of the school and retired in the Fall of 1934.

When Lunken Airport was preparing for a city-operated control tower, Mr. Fairchild prepared for this also. His was the first tower operator certificate issued for Lunken Tower.

Fairchild used the Cincinnati Tower for his base of operations on week ends and in spare time in order to expedite the opening of the tower by the City, and officially represented the City of Cincinnati in negotiating with the Air Traffic Control Section of CAA for the establishment of an Air Route Traffic Control Center in Cincinnati. He also prepared air traffic control study material and recommended to the Cincinnati Board of Education that their Aviation Vocational High School include courses in airport and airway traffic control. This was officially adopted by the board in 1940. As well as conducting aviation courses in his own Aviation Department, he instructed War Training Service (WTS) and Civilian Pilot Training (CPT) college-level students at the University of Cincinnati and St. Xavier University in Cincinnati. His school was selected by government and military personnel to train students sent in groups from other states.

"Too young for World War I and too old for World War II," as he said, he served

his country with a great degree of personal satisfaction, knowing his students would leave his school with an aviation background that would carry them thru any part of aviation to which they might be assigned during their tours of duty with the Air Force. He was one of the first to join in the Civil Air Patrol Squadron on Lunken Airport and subsequently became its commanding officer. He was promoted up through the ranks to colonel.

When the armed services selected the Wright Aeronautical Plant in Cincinnati to build aircraft engines for Air Force aircraft, the Aviation High School was selected to train the civilians who would be building these engines. This phase of aviation training under his principalship ran 24 hours a day preparing Wright Aeronautical employees to assume the responsibilities for which they had been selected.

The first pilot from Floyd county, Mr. Fairchild had his own landing strip on the family farm near Allen, and often flew from Cincinnati to his childhood home.

Many times he would bring two or three other pilots and their aircraft with him over holidays. Many still speak of sitting on hillsides above the landing strip and watching in awe the performance of a plane.

Mr. Fairchild died Dec. 21, 1972 at his retirement home, built on a hill overlooking his flying field, near Allen.

For instance, as this writer was asked the other day, what causes the leaves of a dogwood to be a brilliant red white at the same time an other dogwood not 20 feet away keeps its leaves a dark green until killed by frost? Then why does the same sassafras tree turn purple one year, yellow the next, and maybe the next, show no color at all? Why do some apple trees bloom for the second time in October, and why is the blue haze that cloaks the mountains so pronounced during this month?

Where does a woolly bear caterpillar think he is going and how does he know when he gets there? The same question applies to wild geese, ducks, warblers, and wood thrushes. Also how does a gray squirrel know which side of a buckeye is poisonous? Plant scientists say all parts of the meat of a buckeye are of the same chemical composition. Yet only half of buckeyes found in squirrel woods are eaten by these critters.

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Tallent Likes GW Prospects With Eight Lettermen on Team

Maytown's Rob Tallent begins his record year as head basketball coach of George Washington University, Washington, D.C. in a happy frame of mind. He has a new gym and eight lettermen among his 14 players who began practice last Wednesday.

"We probably have more experience this year than we've had since I've been here," says the former, Colonial, All-American. "We'll be as strong or stronger in every position with the possible exception of the center spot," he adds. And that speaks highly for a team that finished with a 17-10 record a year ago that included the best regular-season mark (17-8) in 19 years.

Reasons for Tallent's optimism include the return of his younger brother Pat, a 6-3 sharpshooting guard and GW's All-American candidate, and a 6-7 forward, Jayland Harper, who had to sit out last season because of back surgery. Harper appears fully recovered.

Tallent and Harper are both five-year players, who are getting an extra year of eligibility due to injuries. Tallent had knee surgery two years ago. Along with returning starters Greg Miller, 6-6 forward, John Holleran, 6-4 guard, and Les Anderson, 6-4 forward, the Colonials sport a great deal of experience.

"Pat Tallent had an outstanding junior season last year. He led the Colonials in scoring with a 20.3 average, led in assists with 85 and shot 48.9 percent from the field. He was named by the Eastern College Athletic Conference to the All-ECAC team and Basketball Weekly

named him to their first-team All-Atlantic Coast team. He has become only the 13th player in GW history to score 1,000 points in a career and only the second to do it as a junior. He led the Southern Division of the ECAC in scoring and was an All-Tournament selection at the Poinsettia and Presidential Classic. Anderson is one of the most exciting players to come along at GW in years, Tallent says. A 6-4 leaper from Washington, D.C., he plays in the mold of David Thompson and has recorded a 37-inch vertical jump. As a freshman last year, he started the final 17 regular-season games, and GW won 14 of them. Despite all the talent at the guard and forward spots, it is in the middle where GW's fate most likely will lie. Kevin Hall, 7-2, 230-pound junior, inherits the pivot from 6-11, Clyde Burwell, who graduated. Hall has grown an inch and added 20 pounds since last year and appears ready to move in as a starter.

Kevin appears a lot more aggressive this year," says Coach Tallent. "He improved tremendously during last season and had some very good games for us. His second half against West Virginia when he scored 12 points and got 10 rebounds showed the kind of player he can be."

The schedule is a tough one with the likes of Maryland, Wake Forest, Pitt, Duquesne, Cincinnati, Virginia Tech, West Virginia, Georgetown and American U. to contend with, but 15 games will be played at the Smith Center, including nine of the first 12.

The next meeting of the Club will be at the Weeksby Community Center, October 27 at 5 p.m. All persons interested in handicrafts are invited to attend meetings.

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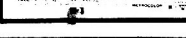
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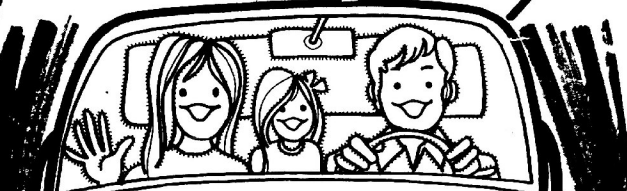

Interim Committees Have Some Bills Ready for Session

Lawmakers, both old and new, will come to Frankfort next year already knowing what many of the key issues facing them will be, thanks to the work of interim legislative committees.

More than 500 meetings of committees and subcommittees during the past 14 months have produced proposed legislation on dozens of subjects. Here is a rundown of some of the key bills that have been approved for preflight for the session, which begins January 6:

The Interim Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources has approved a bill to implement a 1965 amendment to Kentucky's Constitution requiring that the assessment value for taxing purposes of farm land be based on the land's agricultural value rather than its potentially greater value as a site for commercial or residential development. The bill would base tax assessments on a farm's gross income producing capability, which would vary with the size of the farm.

The Interim Committee on Appropriations and Revenue approved a school financing bill which would implement a concept known as "power equalization." The bill would guarantee that any school district in the state could raise the same amount of money per pupil as another district, up to a certain level using the same property tax rate, regardless of differences in property values. If property values limited the amount a poorer district could produce, the state would make up the difference between the amount raised per student in that district and the amount the same tax rate would have produced in the wealthiest county-wide district.

The Interim Committee on Cities, which visited more than 60 Kentucky communities during the interim, approved legislation to create eight regional transportation authorities throughout the state. The bill also would require the state to help local communities to qualify for federal mass transportation funds.

The Interim Committee on Education

approved a bill that would require the Department of Education to establish accountability standards for public elementary and secondary schools.

The committee approved another bill to establish regional day schools for youngsters with hearing problems and one to implement career education programs throughout the state.

The Interim Committee on Health and Welfare approved a bill to set up a general assistance program for individuals who need emergency assistance and do not qualify for other public benefits.

The Interim Committee on Judiciary approved legislation to eliminate minimum markups in the sale of alcoholic beverages and minimum prices for milk.

The committee also approved bills to compensate crime victims, establish small claims courts in Kentucky and revise the state's arbitration, probate and eminent domain laws.

The Interim Committee on Labor and Industry approved a bill that would require manufacturers to replace or refund the purchase price of any vehicle found to have a major, non-correctable defect during the first 12 months or 12,000 miles.

The Interim Committee on State Government approved a bill which would assure public access to virtually all government records not specifically closed by law.

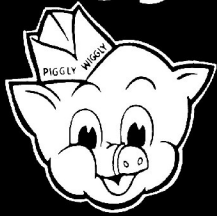

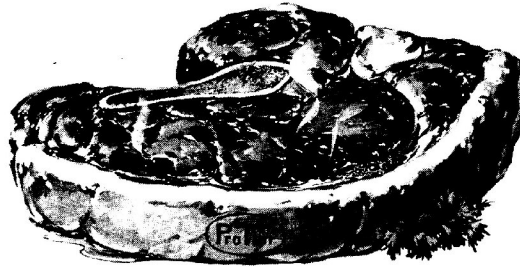

REAR-WINDOW GUN RACKS for pickups can be handy, but they can also encourage theft, shorten the life of firearms and perhaps even cause a brush with the law. The best policy is to use these racks only while transporting rifles and shotguns to and from the hunting field or firing range.

Those gun racks which fit over the back window of pickup trucks are handy gadgets, but there are potential problems associated with their use, particularly if rifles or shotguns are kept in them all the time.

For one thing, the guns are too conspicuous, inviting anyone with a larcenous bent and a facility at opening locked doors to make off with your favorite firearms. Guns are highly prized booty among thieves because they are usually easy to sell for a good price. Leaving rifles, shotguns or other sporting equipment in an unattended vehicle, even a locked one, is an open invitation for a good ripping-off, especially if the firearms are in plain sight.

And living in the cab of a pickup is hard on the guns themselves. Dust and road dirt will stick to the oily surfaces of a gun, not only causing a gummy mess, but also creating increased wear on moving parts if particles of grit get between the metal surfaces of the action.

Guns left in a rear-window rack are also subjected to extremes of temperature which can prove harmful over the long run. Remember how your car windows steam up in winter? Well, the same condensation (created by warm, moist air from the heater striking cold surfaces) forms on guns, too—not only on their exterior, but also in the barrels and actions. Moisture leads to rust, and rust, as every sportsman knows, is the firearms' number one enemy.

It's also possible that the summer sun could damage the finish of the stock or forearm. Have you ever seen old furniture with the finish cracked or crazed? That's caused by sunlight and excessive heat—conditions which guns are subjected to in a closed vehicle on a hot day.

Another problem with habitually carrying guns in a pickup truck is the possibility of finding yourself unable to enter an area (a campground, for example) where firearms are prohibited, or even of inadvertently violating the law.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is conducting a stepped-up campaign this fall against illegal night deer hunting, an activity which has grown alarmingly in the past several years. Conservation officers will be making a number of night patrols, in many instances aided by aircraft surveillance. Any suspicious-looking light in the observation area will be investigated.

According to state law, it is illegal to cast the rays of a spotlight or other artificial lighting device from a road or into any field or forest while having a firearm in possession. This law was enacted to help control poaching, allowing wildlife officers to make an arrest without having to witness a suspected poacher actually take or attempt to take a deer or certain other game animals.

But what if someone is using a light for some legitimate purpose and has a rifle or shotgun within easy reach, say in a pickup rack? To avoid arresting those not involved in illegal poaching, law enforcement officials of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources would like everyone to know about this law.

The best way to avoid possible trouble is, of course, not to carry guns in a pickup rack except when transporting them to and from the hunting field or target range.
