

Government pensions may reduce Social Security benefits

"Governmentemployees planning to retire soon should be aware that their Social Security benefits may be reduced by their government pen-sion," said Jim Kelly, Social Security District Director for the Big Sandy Aces.

Social Security benefits are generally reduced for people who also receive a pension from a job where they did not pay Social Security taxes.

Anyone can get a free estimate of his or her future Social Security ben-efits by filling out a request for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Esti-mate Statement available from any Social Security office. However, Kelly cautioned government employ-ces that their estimate may not accur-rately reflect their actual benefit. "That's because Social Security cannot calculate other pensions at the time an estimate is issued," he said. "However, when a person actually files for retirement benefits, information he or she provides about other pensions is included in the computation process and benefits are reduced accordingly."

The estimate statement Social

The estimate statement Social Security provides includes a section, "Government Pensions and Social Security Benefits," specifically designed to alert government employees that "..., your Social Sectiff's benefits and those to your spouse maybe lower than the amounts shown on this statement." People who want a free estimate of their benefits should contact Social Security for the request form. Government employees should also ask for the free factsheet, "A Pension From Work Not Covered By Social

ask for the free factsheet. A rension From Work Not Covered By Social Socurity," which explains in detail how the adjustments are made and should help the reader determine any reductions to make to his or her esti-



Higher unemployment benefits ahead for some Kentuckians

Some newly laid-off Kentuckians may receive higher unemployment insurance benefits starting in July as a result of a healthy and improving Unemployment Insurance Trust

A sufficient trust fund balance is so welcome news for Kentucky's imployers who will be spared higher nemployment insurance taxes as

For eligible Kentuckians who file For eligible Kentuckains who file new claims beginning July 6, the maximum weekly amount will increase from \$217 to \$229 for up to 26 weeks of unemployment compensation. The hike also will apply to any federally authorized extension of unemployment insurance benefits.

"Our trust fund has actually increased to the control of the contr

"Our trust fund has actually in-creased this year because of the fed-eral Emergency Unemployment Compensation (EUC) paid to some laid-off Kentuckians," said Depart-ment for Employment Services Com-missioner Margaret Whitet. "People have the option of draw-ing their EUC benefits before their regular unemployment benefits. De-pending on their situation, some records receive more money from

pending on their situation, some people receive more money from EUC or choose to get EUC benefits first because it has a withdraw deadline, whereas regular benefits do not. "As a result, the state's trust fund has been spared, because some people will find a job before they draw all of their regular benefits. This has helped us build the trust fund back up from the loss we had during the recession in 1991," she said. Kentucky employers also benefit

the toss we had during the recession in 1991. '8s eaid.

Kentucky employers also benefit because they will remain in the lowest tax schedule. Unemployment tax rates are set each year based on the trust fund's balance at the end of the previous year and the average wage of the state's insured workers.

Since the year-end balance of \$363,866,550 did not fall below the designated level of \$350 million and the average weekly wage of insured workers increased from \$394 in 1991 to \$416 in 1992, the state remained in the lowest tax schedule and maximum weekly benefits rose. mum weekly benefits rose.

In 1992 Kentucky averaged 31, 582 weekly beneficiaries as compared to a weekly average of 38, 270 in 1991.



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

MISTAKE? DULL HOOKS
Formore than 20 years, Guy Eaker
has watched bass anglers make the
same mistaker fishing with dull books.
"I'm amazed." says Eaker, a
former fishing guide and now a fulltime bass tournament competitor and
member of the Evinnude Outboards
Pro Staff. "I've watched fishermen
use hooks that were so dull and rusted
you could break them with your fingers, so you know they would never
hold a bass."

Many of the pros actually change books on their lures almost as often as they change fishing line. Eaker takes boxes of new books in various sizes with him to each tournament, and checks his hures after each day of competition. If a hook appears the teast hid dull, it gets replaced.

On the water, he keeps a special file in his tackle box so he can sharpen books that may get dull after continually running through rocks, brush or other heavy cover. "It really its not practical for non-tournament fishermen to change hooks the way we do," says Eaker. "but it is important to make certain the books are sharp. There are many different types of sharpening stones and flies available, too, and all of them are easy to use." What's unportant when sharpen. What's unportant when sharpen.

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





Kinnie Wagner-Southwest Virginia Badman

Kinnie Wagner, one of the notorious bachmen from southwest Virginia, and an uncamp statent in shooting fire arms which led to an early career as a circus trackshootor. Unfortunately the misuse of his talent led to a lifetime on the wrong side of the law. Wagner was borna at Speer's Ferry, in Scott County, Virginia, in 1903. His circus work enabled him to see many, states, before he was arrested.

He escaped from jail receiving wide-spread attention when he shot and killed a Deputy Sheriff who attempted to recapture him. Although a reward was posted, Wagner was not heard from for over a year.

Vacation scams hit the Bluegrass

Have you recently been told that you've "won" a vacation? The Better Business Bureau of Central and Eastern Sentecky, Inc., warns that such claims may not be true.

Just ask Metanie Smith of Morehead. She registered for a free vacation while watching a parade in Pikeville. Within days she received a call from Vacation Break Cruises of Boca Raton, Florida.

"My flancee (gave) them my credit card number to (reserve) our tickets. They inform (od) us that we must pay 549 each for taxes and \$199 each for a reduced rate vacation," wrote Metanie Smith in a letter to the Better Business Bureau. Metanie filed a complaint with the Bureau after realizing that not only was she being asked to pay \$500 for her "free" vacation, but she could have obtained a vacation to the Bahamas at a lower price through a local travel agent.

Ms. Smith and the Easterlings are not alone. Each year thousands of Kentucky residents register for vacations at fairs, expositions and special events. Most times the promoters of the vacation drawings are merely out

to SELL their products, vacation certificates.

"More often than not, everyone registering for the vacation gets a call from the promotional company within a few days," explaints BBB Director of Operations Charlotte Carver, "Orten the registration boxes make no claims that a free prize is offered, but register for a vacation has certain implications that we are conditioned to hear. Many of the registration blanks state that nobody receives a free vacation but rather that you are registering for an option to buy a vacation certificate. Unfortunately, few people have the time or patience to read the fine print."

To receive a vacation certificate, registrants are usually asked to release credit card numbers or other confidential financial information to the solicitor. This allows the company selling the certificate so fore contain hidden fees, limitations and conditions such as requiring the recipient.
