# Abolishing local **PVA office will** hurt taxpayers

Editor: The Governor's Commission on Quality and Efficiency has discussed the idea of abolishing the 120 elected county Property Valuation Administrator's (PVA) with regional assessors appointed by the Revenue Cabinet. Regional PVA offices could re-

quire property owners to travel 80-100 miles to receive services such as valuation discussion, filing home-stead disability exemptions, or assisstead drability eventytions, or assis-tance with completing personal prop-erty fast returns. 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



This is called the "4:30 Burning Law" and is intended to pre-vent forest fires. The law also says that all outdoor fires are in be at-tended until extinguished and proper precations are to be taken to prevent their spread into the forest. "Forest fires do many millions of dollars in damage to the forest-based economy of Kentucky. Forest fires are something we cannot afford," said Mark Matuszewski, director of the Kentucky Division of Foresty.

How many people have a 104-year-old brother?" A second thing this group shares, and which they share with the nuns in Snowden's study, is a lifestyle con-sistent with longevity. None has had any significant history of smoking, they are not heavy drinkers (though some occasionally take something for "medicinal purposes"), none is obese (defined by Wekstein as 10 pounds above ideal weight), they drink very little caffeine, and most aren't red-meat eaters. Monoiber important attribute, found by both Snowden and Wekstein, is that this group of the oldest old is very future-oriented. One of the mea in Wekstein's study, for example, was writing his autobiography at age 102. "All of these centenarians had definite plans for the modus ahead." Wekstein asys. "They weren't just sitting around waiting to de." Webstein dust persons 25 years of age and over now constitue the most randow of "11K Sciones & Yue!"

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



# NAR supports flood insurance reform act

A major overhaul is necessary to revive the federal flood insurance program, according to PatCampbelli-White, vice chamman of the Public Policy Committee of the National Association of Realtors, who testi-fied before a U.S. Senate panel re-

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field before a U.S. senate paner re-cently. "One of the biggest problems its only a small percentage of eligible property owners carry flood insur-nee." Campbell-White sind "Expe-cially in areas with infrequent flood-ing, many owners/un' insure against flooding or they allow their policies to lapse," she added.

In testimony before the Senate Subcommittee on Housing and Ur-ban Affairs, Campbell-White said NAR supports the National Flood

Insurance Reform Act of 1993 (S 1405) because it would increase par-ticipation while preserving property rights of individual owners. In addi-tion, it would discourage overbuild-tion in their firsk areas ing in high-risk areas. Under the bill, flood insurance

would not be available for non-mov-able residential construction in 30able resolution construction in 30, and 60 year crosson zones determined by the Techeral Tancegeney Manage-ment Agency (14PAA), in consulta-tion with state and local governments. "However, property owners would have the right to build at their own risk or obtain private insurance, whether it is in a coastal crossion zone or an inland Hocoplain," she said. While existing structures would remain eligible for federal flood in-surance in the 30- and 60-year ero-sion zones, new additions that make existing structures non-movable and mey commercial structures within the

new commercial structures within the 60-year zone could not participate in the program.

the program. "Another advantage to this legis-lation is lenders would be prohibited from making leans without a flood insurance policy, whether it is tederal or private." Campbell-White said "This will increase participation in the program, spical risk across a wider pool of policy holders and besore the overall level in the pool of funds," she added.

The legislation also would require notice to affected property owners, public hearings in affected local com-munities and an appeals process for owners whose property is designated to be in a mapped crossion zone. "NAR believes locat communities are in the best position to determine the wissest allowable uses for property within their jurisdictions, so it's important

for FEMA to work with these communities," she said Property owners in some lower risk areas pay the same federal insur-

risk areas pay the same federal insun-ance premiums as people in high risk erosion zones for comparable cover-age "NAR believes future revisions of this program should include risk-haved insurance premiums."
