
The bill was passed by the House, but Hall said the bill is currently "stuck in the quagnire of the Senate."

Prestonsburg man died last
week after allegedly refusing
to leave his burning home during an altercation with police.

The body of Phillip Anthony Horn, 58, was removed from the burned home after firefighters extin-quished the flames on April 22. According to reports, the "Mr. Horn told officers he wanted them to kill him and then set his.home on fire," said Trooper Mike Goble, spokesman for the Kentucky State Police. "Mr. Horn had told neighbors that he wanted to kill himself and burn his horne, and tried to borrow a handgun from his neighbor after having an emergency protective order served against him and approximately 20 firearms taken from his possession by Floyd County deputy sheriffs."

According to Goble, officers believed they heard a shot from Inside the home.
"Firefighters at the scene feared being shot at by Horn due to Horn's threats, and officers for the scene heard." cers first on the scene heard Horn fire what they believed was a guishot inside the resi-dence," Goble said. "After the fire was extinguished, a body

believed to be Mr. Horn was recovered by the Middle Creek Fire Department."

An autopsy has been sched-uled to find out the official cause of Horn's death, and the cause of Hom's death, and the incident is currently under investigation by Kentucky State Police Detective Ben Cramer and Floyd County Deputy Coroner Chuck Hall. 

Because, you know, there had to be that first person who noticed the milk and thought to himself that he may as well have a swig.

And then there's the chicken egg. Think about from where it is that an egg originates, and then deposited. Just what was is that this person was thinking that told them, "Yep, that looks like breakfast to me?"

And there's a myriad of other mysteries I could point to. Like, how did someone figure out how to make bread? Think about it, you can't just throw some stuff together and make

bread. You have to have a particular formation of ingredients, such as leavening agents and the like, before you can make a loaf of bread. Someone much more inventive and perceptive than myself is no doubt to receive credit, but is seems to me, if we can figure out that cow's milk and chicken eggs are good for us, and that a certain formulation of certain ingredients will get us bread, why is it that after more than 200 years of running our country than 200 years on the same than 100 years ago, and now our leadership in the state legislature can't even figure out a compromise on the budget. In effect, what Sen. David Williams has done by forgoing new debt is creating an increase in spending, because Gov. Beshear will most certainly call a special session before July to get a budget deal done. And what all of these so-called "leaders" in state government continue is an environment where we thumb our noses at the Kentucky Constitution, which requires the legislature to, pass a budget, yet it's like they'd rather duke it out. And for now, they're all too far in to relent and do the right thing. After all, they may look weak politically if they do.

Well, I say who cares? Gov. Beshear is right. We did expect the legislature to pass a budget before last Thursday, and their failure to do so is

a slight to the people of Kentucky. Since when did the pride of a few overrule the needs of the many? It's kind of like those milk and egg questions. No one knows the answer for sure, but it sure as heck didn't end in

It would be nice, for just once, that out legislators, all of them, go to Frainkfort and put the best interests of Kentucky well ahead of their own political careers. Sure, it may mean the end of a political career rotwo, but isn't it better to end that career knowing you've done something to further. Kentucky's, agenda, rather than your own career?





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
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Gilliam inks with Lady Bears

Lindley was chosen by the Philadelphia Eagles in the fourth round, the 105th overall pick, and Conner was tabbed by the New York Jets in the fifth round, 139th overall, as the NFL Draft wrapped up 5 Saturday.

Lindley and Conner join defensive tackle Corey Peters (third round, Atlanta) as UK's selections in the draft, Additional Wildcats are expected to sign as free agents. A total of 17 Kentucky players have signed NFI. contracts over the past two seasons.

Spawning season is upon us and time for some great fishing

FRANKFORT – Crappie spawn when the dogwoods bloom, the old saying goes. The white bass un when the redbuds burst out in spring. Old, grizzled anglers claim they can smell when the blueginawn in a plond.

These old sayings about when fish move shallow to reproduce aren't too far off the mark. The jury still out on whether someone can smell bluegill in a pond, but knowing when certain species spaw:

A crappie study in Missouri demonstrated Kinman's wisdom. The study found crappie began building nests when daylight starts to average a little over 13 hours. Crappie stop building nests when the sunlight lasts slightly longer than 1412 hours a day. This corresponds with crappie initiating the spawn when water temperatures reach the low 60s and continuing until it reaches the low 70s.

Many Kentucky reservoirs are now in that temperature range. Black crappie are in the shallows at Kentucky and Cave Run lakes, preparing to spawn. White crappie are nosing their way around the shallows at Green River Lake.

In the future, time your crappie trips to match sunlight of 13 to 14 hours a day with water temperatures in the 60s. This should put you right in the middle of the spawn.

The redbuds are in full bloom and anglers will find white bass staging in the headwaters of Barren River, Herrington, Taylorsville, Green River, Lake Barkley and other takes in Kentucky. White bass first begin migrating to the headwaters of reservoirs and toward locks and darns on the Kentucky and Ohio rivers when the water temperatures reach 50 degrees. When water temperatures hit the high 50s to low 60s, the white bass spawning runs begin. White bass in runs provide some of the best fishing in Kentucky.

to low 60s, the white bass spawning ruins begin. Think the stack of the water on a hard bottom. One female white bass can release as many as 500,000 eggs. White bass abandon their eggs and provide no parental care to their young. The abandonment triggers poor reproductive success. Water temperatures vary widely throughout the state right now. Anglers report recurs quite a mixed bag of hybrid striped bass and white bass at Herrington Lake. White bass are now running in the headwaters of Barren River Lake.

A good rain and increased flow into these lakes would further increase the white bass run. Check the fishing reports on Kentucky Fish and Wildlife's Web site at fw.ky.gov for the status of the white bass runs.

ass runs. As spring melts into May, the bluegill and redear sunfish, also known as "shellcrackers," mov oward the banks. In ponds and lakes, bluegill spawn in such shallow areas that anglers can easily se

toward the banks. In ponds and lakes, bluegill spawn in such shallow areas that anglers can easily see their whitish huben-sixed nests.

Bluegill and redear sunfish start making nests when water temperatures reach 70 degrees. They may spawn all the way into mid-June.

Redear sunfish spawn around the edges of weedbeds once water temperatures reach 62 degrees. Spawning stops once the water warms to 68 degrees. "Redear spawn a little earlier than bluegill," said Gerry Buynak, assistant director of fisheries for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "They should be getting interested right now," Bluegill can't resist white, yellow or black feather Popeye-style jigs tipped with a wax worm east under a bobber and worked just over their nests. Redear sunfish devour the same rig cast along weed-lines.

lines.

A small, yellow, curly-tailed grub also works well for these fish. The next six weeks is the best time of the year to fish for bluegill and redear sunfish.

Crappie, white bass, bluegill and redear sunfish are making their spawning moves right now. It's time to take advantage of the best fishing of the year.

Deadline to apply for elk hunt approaching: Just a few days remain before the April 30 deadline to apply for Rentucky's 2010 elk hunt.

With a traditional 90 percent success rate among bull elk hunters and a low application fee of \$10 for one of the 800 quota hunt permits being issued this year, thousands of hunters from across the United States are expected to register in the coming days. Kentucky's elk herd numbers approximately 10,000.

"There's a real excitement among hunters about Kentucky elk." said Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

mately 10,000.

"There's a real excitement among hunters about Kentucky elk." said Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commissioner for Gassert. "We issue more than twice as many elk permits as the rest of the eastern United States combined. This is the chance of a lifetime."

Kentucky accepts online applications only through its Web site, fw.ky.gov. The drawing is open to residents and non-residents. Last year, more than 46,000 people from every state in the country applied for a Kentucky elk hunt, including 28 from Alaska and one from Hawaii.

"People don't realize how exceptional Kentucky-elk hunting is coming into it," said Karen Waldrop, wildliffe director for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildliffe Resources. "Afterwards, they tell me the hunt-far exceeded their expectations."

Kentucky's modern elk herd is the result of a major restoration program that began with the release of seven elk from Kansas in December 1997. More than 1,500 elk from seven states were released into Kentucky's modern elk red in the relocation project ended in 2002.

Kentucky's elk have a diverse genetic mix due to the varying sources used for the original transplants.

plants.

"A recent genetic study shows that Kentucky elk tend to be a bit bigger as far as body weight than their western counterparts," said Tina Brunjes, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife's big game program coordinator, "Kentucky's mild winters and long growing season are working well for elk."

The good news for hunters wishing to fill their freezers with meat; Kentucky will issue 600 cow elk permits this year. The state will also issue 125 permits for mature bull elk and 75 permits for spike bulls through its quota bunt drawing this year.

As the elk herd ages, Kentucky's record for a bull with non-typical antlers falls nearly every year. The current record is a 7x7 bull taken off public land last October. That bull scored 372 6/8 in the Boone and Crockett Club scoring system.

This may sound like an idea straight out of "Plan 9 from Outer Space," but it's perfectly legitimate. It's actually healthy and natural for human beings to emit gamma rays. At the ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Tesas, a gamma ray device known as a "whole out a half-dozen complex instruments that are used for the specialized job of determining body fat and lean, known collectively as "body composition."

The idea is to bring all these tools together to produce a new generation of "body comp charts" that could become as much a fixture as the BMI charts or height-and-weight charts now in pediarticians' offices. These new tables would give parents and medical professionals an improved way to determine how a particular-child's growth pattern compares with that of healthy, fit youngsters of the child's age, height, weight, gender and ethnic background.

Speaking of background, there's a lot to creating this type of body-comp chart. The researchers have to find and fine-tune the best technologies for acquiring thousands of measurements from many healthy young volunteers, and then analyze those measurements to create the charts.

That work has taken well over a decade, but the research team says it snow only about two years away from issuing the preliminary body-compatbles based on data from normal, fit black, white and Hispanic youngsters in the Houston area.

Still wondering about those gamma rays? Here's how that fits into the equation. Camma rays are emitted by potassium, and most of the potassium in your body is in the miscles. So this means the specialists can use gamma ray measurements to develop an indi-
