



# Our View It just doesn't add up

**It just doesn't add up** Even though its ultimate effect will be to reduce air pollution, something really situks about the 30 percent reaviornmental surcharge" Kentucky Power is seeking from the state Public Service Commission. Mentocky Power is asking the PSC to allow it to be-bin billing customers for the cost of improvements to the Big Sandy power plant, just north of Louisa. If ap-proposal will see customers paying an additional '30 percent on their electric bills, to pay for the nearly \$1 billion installation of a scrubber at the plant. We won't quibble with the necessity of the upgrade. Kentucky Power is facing a federal consent decree that it lower the plant's emissions of nitrogen dioxide and sulfur dioxide or stop burning coal altogether. Consid-ering that coal burned at the plant accounts for up to 500 coal mining jobs in the region, the loss of coal at the plant would be an economic hardship Eastern Ken-tucky could ill afford. What really sticks in our craw is how the state law authorizing the surcharge is written. According to the law, Kentucky Power is entitled to recoup not only the entire cost of the scrubber's construction, as well as op-areasonable rate of return" on the investment — in this case, 10.5 percent. We couldn't argue against Kentucky Power receiving


"reasonable rate of return" on the investment — in this case, 10.5 percent. We couldn't argue against Kentucky Power receiving a return on its investment, if the utility was using its own money. But it isn't. Consumers are paying con-struction and operational costs, and Kentucky Powér will reap a profit on their investment. If anyone should be entitled to a return on the cost of the scrubber, shouldn't it be the customers who are paying for it? In addition, the scrubber will not be the salvation of the Kentucky coal industry, as it is being billed. Yes, al-lowing the Big Sandy plant to completely. That's because, buried deep in the documents associated with the en-vironmental surcharge, is a hint of Kentucky Power's plans, once the scrubber is operational. Currently, the Big Sandy plant exclusively burns Ken-tucky coal, because of its low sulfur content. Once the-scrubber is operational, however, the plant will be able to mix in high sulfur coal from places like Pennsylva-nia and Illinois, and the utility has already signalled a desire to do so — at a 50-50 mixture — because the cheaper high sulfur coal will allow the utility to save 8 percent on fuel costs.

We would call this a corporate giveaway of the high-est order, but it is much more pernicious than that. Kentucky Power's customers, the vast majority of whom cannot afford this gargantuan rate hike, are being asked to sacrifice their money and their jobs, so that the util-sty can profit even more. This environmental surcharge is nothing short of a robbery of John Q. Public, and it is fully sanctioned and blessed by Kentucky state law. So, let's see ... Kentucky Power gets a 10.5 percent return on a \$1 billion scrubber shouldered entirely by customers, and an 8 percent fuel savings to boot. For this, the utility and its shareholders are not being asked to sacrifice one thin dime of their substantial profits. Customers, on the other hand, get a 30 percent hike in their electric bills, beginning in January 2016. Any way you add it up, this is a bad deal for Kentucky Power's customers.

Even so, that doesn't undercut the importance of other legislation also set to become law, and as my col-leagues and I prepare to wrap up the 2012 Regular Session on Thursday this week, there are more than a few of these bills that deserve mention. Several, for example, will improve public safety, with two of the more prominent tackling the deadly rise of synthetic drugs and meth. To cut back on the former, the House and Senate agreed to broader the definition of these drugs, so that it will be much tougher for underground the definition of these drugs, so that it will be much tougher for underground the drug formult. This bill will had cruck down on those selling these poi-sons – often referred to as bath salts or synthetic marijuana – with poten-tial penalities ranging from prison to forfeiture of their property. Together, this twin approach should give serious pause to any reputable store owner considering getting into this shady market.

The legislature's plan to limit meth, meanwhile, is designed to keep pseu-doephedrine out of the hands of those that manufacture the drug while not hindering lawabiding citizens who depend on this medicine, especially during allergy season. The hope, of course, is that we can stop the dramatic rise in labs that have gotten smaller- and more portable in recent years. You could be rich or poor, old or young, but I would bet you and I have something in common: somebody, somewhere is going to tell us that out blood levels of vitamin D are too low. It seems like everyone I meet these days has been

meet these days has been told the same thing: "You meet these days has been told the same thing: "You need to take more vitamin D." For a while, I was pre-scribed these little green gel capsules of vitamin D that reminded me of fire-files, for some reason, and I was a little worried that they might make me glow in the dark, because each one of those contained 50.000 IU ("international units") of vitamin D. There's no doubt about it, we do need vitamin D, which helps the body use calcium and phosphorus to build and maintain strong bones and teeth. Vitamin D can be formed in human skin by sun-light, but when you aren't getting that much sun, you need dietary sources of the vitamin

of the vitamin. But how much enough? New scien But how much is enough? New scientific information has led gov-ernments to reevaluate the adequate intakes of vi-tamin D and calcium, with the result that new Vita-min D Dietary Reference Intakes were issued in No-vember 2010 by the U.S. Institute of Medicine.

Want a quick rundown? For children aged 1-3 years, the recommended

dietary allowance (RDA) of vitamin D per day is 600 IU, and the tolerable upper intake level (UL, the maximum you should take) is 2,500 IU per day. For children avad 4.8 the maximum take) is 2,500 IU pc. For children aged 4 years, the RDA is 600 II and the UL is 3,000 I hand the UL is 3,000 I For children aged 4-8 years, the RDA is 600 U, and the UL is 3,000 UU. For children and adults aged 9 to 70 years, the RDA is 600 IU, and the UL is 4,000 U. For adults over 70, the RDA is 800 IU, and the UL is 4,000 IU, and the UL is 4,000 IU, flyou're pregnant or herating and args. 14 to IU. If you're pregnant or lactating and ages 14 to 50 years, the RDA is 600 IU, and the UL is 4,000 IU.

IU. Now you know how much you should be get-ting—but do you know how much you are getting? The problem is, vitamin D doesn' i just come in a pill that you pop; it's also in the foods you eat and the beverages you drink. As the nutrition experts at the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) have point-ed out, you can't monitor ed out, you can't monitor people's nutrient intakes from their diets without knowing what's in the food they eat! The amount of vitamin

The amount of vitamin D permitted to be added in fortified American foods is regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Ad-ministration (FDA). For example, orange juice and milk contain very little natural vitamin D, so or-ange juice is often forti-fied, and milk is almost always fortified, with vita-min D3. "But wait a minute," I hear you say, "isn't milk

Nature's most complete food?" It's true, milk con-tains calcium, which is good for your body, but calcium absorption by the body requires the pres-ence of vitamin D, which is the main reason why ence of vitamin D, w is the main reason milk was originally main reason why as originally chosen as a foot to be forti-fied with vitamin D. The goal was to prevent rick-ets---a malady from which actor Sir Michael Caine

ARS scientists have been using a high-tech combination of liquid chromatography with ul-traviolet and dual-parallel mass spectrometry to pin down more precisely the amount of vitamin D3 in samples of retail vitamin-D fortified orange juice. Currently, FDA has ap-proved vitamin D forti-fication of fruit juices at levels not to exceed 100 IU in about a cup of 100 precision. percent fruit juice The ARS s

The ARS scientists analyzed 47 commer-The ARS scientists analyzed 47 commer-cially available fortified orange juice samples to determine their vitamin D3 content. Nearly all the samples were shown, by two different analyti-cal methods, to contain more vitamin D than the amount listed on the la-bel. The scientists estimat-ed that more vitamin D

ed that more vitamin D is added initially than the label states to make up

for potentially declining levels while the juice is in storage, so that the prod-uct that winds up in your glass will contain at least the amount stated on the label. So be sure to drink your OJ; just pretend

OJ; just pretend you're hoisting a glass with Sir Michael!

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
