> Kentucky now has a few halfway houses-places in town where patients may come to visit during the day or perhaps live while they are making a gradual readjustment to living in the community. This step back into the community should take only a few weeks to a few months.

All of the state hospitals-Central State in Lakeland, Eastern State in Lexington, Kentucky State in Danville and Western State in Hopkinsville-now have follow-up clinics which are held at the hospitals or in communities scattered throughout the hospital districts. Patients are expected to return to these clinics on schedule for help in their adjustment, to change dosages of medicines, etc. Family doctors and public health nurses help in these tasks, and when these people are available, the former patient may be spared long trips to the clinic. Records and recommendations of the hospital staff are available to help in the follow-up program.

If it should be necessary for a patient to return to the hospital e may do so at any time. If it does become necessary, the patient usually comes back, voluntarily, for a short time. Then he goes home again whenever he is ready. In those instances when a patient has been declared incompetent by a court upon being sent to the hospital, he must go back to the court after he has received his certificate of discharge to be restored to full citizenship. Restoration is a court proceeding which is quite simple, but it must be taken care of before any major business, such as buying or selling real estate or cars or getting married or divorced can be considered legal.


