TWO COAL TIPPLES DAMAGED IN COUNTY

LABOR TIF NOT BLAMED IN EXPLOSION

McDowell Tipple Blast, Harold Mine Fire Come Only Few Hours Apart

One Floyd coal tipple was blasted by a heavy charge of explosives Monday night, and another was partially destroyed by fire.

Officers expressed doubt that any current labor dispute led to the dynamiting at 10:30 Monday night of the Columbia tipple of the Turner-Eckhorn Coal Company on the Bill Hall Branch at McDowell. They said they had not been asked to investigate the fire which broke out at the Little Mud Creek mine operated by E. W. Hale, of Harold. An old grudge may have motivated the McDowell explosion, they surmised.

State Detective Chester D. Potter, who with Deputy Sheriff Samuel Hale investigated the McDowell blast, said a charge of possibly 10 to 15 sticks of dynamite had been tossed into the hopper of the tipple, blowing off the roof of the coal chute, the end of a supply building and moving the chute on its foundation. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

The blaze at the Hale tipple was discovered at about 11 o'clock Monday night. Fire departments of (See Story No. 2, Page 8)

WORK FINISH DATE IS SET

Amphitheatre Completion At Park Seen in August; Local Fund Effort Next

The amphitheatre, now under construction in Jenny Wiley State Park by Akers and Akers, contractors, will be completed in August, it is said. Plans call for the presentation of a play on the life of Jenny Wiley, now being written by the nationally-known playwright, Paul Green.

It was at first planned to present the play in September but this will probably be impossible, it is said by spokesmen for the Jenny Wiley Drama Association. Much work remains to be accomplished other than the theatre construction. Chief of these tasks is the raising of \$12,000 in local funds which is the very minimum required to start production of the play. Efforts to raise the money will start immediately after the May 28 primary.

Leaders of the Wiley family in Kentucky and adjoining states are planning a reunion of descendants of the famous borderland heroine and Indian captive in September but definite date awaits completion of the shrine projected by the state at her grave at River, Johnson county. The work was initiated three years ago but work was stopped last summer by the highway department and has not been resumed.

The first legislature under Gov. Combs appropriated \$1,500 for a marker at the heroine's grave. This was erected and a fence started. The state bought land near the cemetery for a parking area and drew plans for development.

FESTIVAL TO PORTRAY TRADITIONAL CULTURE

Floyd county is to have its first Homespun Arts Festival next month.

The period, June 17-22, has been set as the date of the Festival, which will be held at the Floyd County library here under the sponsorship of the library's board of trustees.

Decision to sponsor such an event to preserve and encourage the traditional culture of the county was made by the library board at its meeting, Monday of last week. Since that time the cooperation of leaders in the various phases of the arts has been enlisted, and enthusiastic support has been offered.

The programs and activities of the week will be arranged by a festival committee composed of interested and qualified artists, writers, musicians and other citizens of the county.

The Library Board and the Festival committee have agreed that the purpose of the Festival shall be "to preserve and to encourage a greater appreciation of the traditional culture of the county; to promote a greater interest and participation in both the creative and the performing arts; and to provide an opportunity for sharing the artistic abilities and achievements of Floyd countians with other Floyd countians and an interested public."

Each night of the week will be devoted to one area of the arts. The program for each evening will be arranged by a committee of qualified persons in a particular area of effort—art, instrumental music and folk-dancing,

gospel singing, poetry and storytelling, and folk-singing. Each program will be presented at the library, with the larger events to be on the lawn in front of the library.

Any Floyd resident, with talent or ability in any one or more of the specified areas is eligible, and is urged, to present themselves for consideration by the committee or committees in the areas in which they would take part. The emphasis will be on an adult or young adult participation, but any age is acceptable if qualified by talent.

Works selected for exhibit will be of four classes: painting, drawing, sculpture and crafts. Crafts will include hand-made items, such as woodcarvings, weaving, pottery and ceramics enamelling. There will be three ribbon places for each class. All paintings and drawings must be suitably framed or matted. Entries must be labelled accurately with name of artist, age, address, and name of work (if any). Each entry must be sent to the library, where, if it is selected, it will remain on exhibit for the entire week. Each person who submits an entry will be responsible for getting his or her work to and from the library, before and after the exhibit. The deadline for entering is June 7. BOARD TALKS NEW POLICY

Action Is Deferred To Bar Political Speaking In Schools

The question of whether or not candidates for governor are to be allowed to speak at school hours during school hours was discussed at length at the Floyd County Board of Education meeting here Saturday afternoon.

Following the meeting a statement was issued expressing the thinking and decision of the board.

"The board discussed at length the matter of formulating a definite policy regarding the appearance of political dignitaries on the school campuses during school hours," the statement said. "Superintendent Charles Clark expressed the viewpoint that he was strongly opposed to any statement of policy which might prevent such appearances until after the May 28 primary election because there are two candidates for governor who may want to appear sometime before the election and he felt they should be granted the same courtesy granted (See Story No. 4, Page 5)

QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY DEWEY DRAW DOWN

Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources biologists learned during netting operations carried on at Dewey Lake last winter that the impoundment has a "very good" adult black bass population.

So reported Ferd Holtmann in an article on the Dewey Lake Draw-Down, published in the current number of HAPPY HUNTING GROUND, official magazine of the Department.

Mr. Holtmann's article follows, in part: The Dewey Lake Draw Down project, which began the first of November and terminated in mid-March, answered many questions for Fish and Wildlife biologists. Although the initial program was labeled as an "Experimental Crappie Removal," much useful information was gained about all the fishes of Dewey.

Technically, the Dewey Lake project had two phases, one prior to the draw down and one during the low water stage. Original plans called for the removal of an overpopulation of small, stunted crappie. During the three months of this program, April through May of 1962, it was discovered that enough crappie could not be taken in the nets when the lake was at normal level. Biologists then came up with the idea to draw the lake down and remove rough fish as well as the small crappie. The crappie remained the main objective, however, since at one time Dewey's crappie was good. Recently, however, the crappie population had reached proportions that overcrowded the lake and stunted their growth.

The lake was drawn from the 645 mark to the 620 level, which left water only in the old Johns Creek channel. This concentrated the fish in a much smaller area and the 18 nets used harvested a good sampling.

The drawdown had a threefold purpose:

- 1. To net out small stunted crappie and all rough fish possible. 2. To expose as much of the lake bottom as possible, in order that it would be refertilized. 3. To concentrate fish in a small area and take more in the nets.

Bad weather caused the loss of five weeks during the netting operation, consequently, not as many fish were taken as had been hoped. Yet, the fisheries learned many things of Dewey Lake and its inhabitants. Firstly, they did not expect to find nearly so many suckers as they did. They also found longnose gar in the lake and these were not believed to be present at all. Thirdly, the fisheries men learned that the white bass population was fair, even though the anglers had not been catching any. This also proved that the white bass stocking program of the past five years was successful. It was likewise found that the near two million walleye that had been stocked did not survive. Not a single walleye was taken in the nets. Finally, as expected, the netting confirmed that the adult black bass population was very good.

All bass and catfish, regardless of size, taken during the project were returned to the lake unharmed. The biologists did not

take any game fish or edible panfish—just those that fishermen themselves would have disposed of.

The crappie taken in the nets averaged 5-7 inches in length and biologists hope that the average will now rise to 8-13 inches since the population will not be as heavy and competition for food will not be as great.

Whether the lake was refertilized won't be known until it is completely refilled. Usually the lake remained very clear the year "round. If the water turns a deep blue or green color then biologists will know the lake was refertilized and that plenty of nutrients were washed into the dry lake bottom during the draw-down project.

When the impoundment is refilled the Department will also stock it with white bass, black bass and threadfin shad. This will serve as a supplement to the already good bass population.

Approximately 7,000 fish that totaled nearly 2,500 pounds and represented 16 different species were netted during the project. The greater percentage of the fish, 34 per cent, were white crappie. Sucker, bluegill and gizzard shad constituted 52 per cent. The surprising factor, however, was that one-half of the total weight taken was suckers.

BIDS SOUGHT ON SIX ROADS

State Road Funds To Finance Highway Work up for Letting

Bids on six Floyd county highway projects will be received by the Kentucky Highway Department on May 24, Henry Ward, commissioner of highways, announced Monday. All work will be financed entirely out of state road funds.

One group advertised for letting May 24 is slated for bituminous concrete surfacing. These roads are the Brandy Keg-Johns Creek road (Ky. 304) from 200 feet south of Ky. 1499 to 300 feet north of that route, a distance of .055 mile; the Johns Creek-Stratton Branch (Ky. 1499) road from Ky. 304, extending northwest 1.491 miles; the Johns Creek-Stratton Branch road from Ky. 1499, extending 25 mile northeast.

Another bituminous concrete surfacing project slated for letting May 24 is .159 mile of Lake Drive (U.S. 23) in Prestonsburg from Patton street to Dingus street.

Bids for grade, drain and bituminous concrete surfacing are asked for the same date on a project to correct slides on the Prestonsburg-Auxder road. The project will begin approximately 1.4 miles north of Prestonsburg and extend about 4 mile north, then begin 2.8 miles north of Prestonsburg and extend approximately .8 mile north.

The sixth project is for grade, drain and traffic-bound surfacing on the East McDowell-Mud Creek road, starting at rural highway 1028A at East McDowell and extending east a distance of 3.006 miles.

EXCESS FEES PAID COUNTY

County Clerk Robinson Pays Treasurer \$5,118 On First Year of Term

County Clerk C. Ollie Robinson made news, if not Floyd county history, at Monday's meeting of the fiscal court. He reported that he had collected fees for 1962 which are \$5,118.93 in excess of the constitutional limit, and told the court he was ready to refund to the county that amount.

Told that the refund should be made to the county treasurer, Mr. Robinson's check was mailed Tuesday to the treasurer.

"We had this amount in excess fees, it was the county's, and the county certainly needs the money; so it just naturally followed that I refunded what was due," Robinson commented. "I hope the office will have as much every year to go back into the county treasury."

The refund made Tuesday covered the first year of Robinson's term of office.

SIX STREAMS UNDER STUDY

Martin Flood Project Report Being Readied, Beaver Creeks Studied

Detailed studies of six Eastern Kentucky streams, including three in this county, have been scheduled by the U. S. Corps of Engineers, and the general mood of official Washington is for greater expenditures and accelerated action toward flood control.

Col. Harrington W. Cochran, chief of the Huntington district office, Corps of Engineers, wrote Congressman Carl D. Perkins recently that both Right and Left Beaver Creeks and Johns Creek above Dewey Lake are slated for detailed studies after a preliminary investigation had been made of their adaptability for flood reductions by snagging and clearing. Miller's Creek, Shelby Creek and East Fork of Little Sandy River also are scheduled for study.

Specific reports, Col. Cochran said, are being prepared on local flood protection at Martin. Such a report on Rockcastle Creek, Martin county, is nearing completion. Damage surveys, high water and stream-bed profiles, along with channel sections, are being completed on Beaver Creek and Pond Creek.

President Kennedy recently approved a shift in funds recommended for the Corps of Engineers in 1964, in order to speed up flood control projects in this area. Congressman Perkins said. Construction on the Fishtrap Reservoir will get an additional \$250,000, bringing the total for that project to \$9.5 million (See Story No. 5, Page 3)

FRIDAY ENDS MARCH FLOOD RELIEF WORK

1,169 Apply for Aid In County, Roe Says; Cooperation Praised

The American Red Cross closed its emergency field office here last Friday after having spent a total of \$364,411.90 to help Floyd county's flood disaster victims.

Thus ended the work begun in this county as soon as the March floodwaters which invaded hundreds of homes and businesses had subsided. Thirty-six Red Cross workers from New York, Virginia, Georgia, Texas and Wyoming had since that time worked alongside Floyd Red Cross Chapter members and volunteers to meet the needs of those who could not help themselves.

The 1,169 applicants for assistance outnumbered those of the 1957 flood, but the Red Cross outlay in cash was greater in the earlier disaster. This year's expenditures and accelerated action toward flood control.

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Now It's Our Turn

With all this spent by the Red Cross for Floyd county citizens, and the Red Cross standing by to help when the next disaster strikes, here or elsewhere, attention of Floyd Chapter this week was turned toward trying to solicit from the county's citizens and businesses enough money to meet its Floyd quota of \$6,370. As of Monday evening, only \$2,200 had been subscribed.

"Floyd county will be given an opportunity to show what its gratitude amounts to," commented one volunteer worker. "The Red Cross fund drive will be conducted, house to house."

Nine organizations and 82 individuals are recognized by the Floyd County Chapter of the American Red Cross for outstanding service in the weeks following the March 12 flood, according to Chapter Chairman Mrs. F. L. Heinze.

The nine organizations are headed by the Floyd County Rescue Squad. These men not only served in the emergency period, providing help with rescue and foods and supplies, but they continued to help (See Story No. 1, Page 8)

lion. Funds for construction of the North Fork of Pound Reservoir will be increased \$500,000, bringing the total to \$1 million.

Senator John Sherman Cooper said recently that the Corps of Engineers had informed him that it has available \$40,000 from previously appropriated funds for review work in the Big Sandy River valley.

Cooper said the money would enable restudies of such projects in the Big Sandy River valley as Hays and Paint Creek Reservoirs, local flood protection for Martin and communities along Beaver and Pend Creeks; in the Upper Kentucky River valley, Line Creek and Walker Creek Reservoirs and local flood protection at Hazard, Whitesburg, Neon and other communities; in the Upper Cumberland River valley, Martin's Creek Reservoir and local flood control protection at Harlan, Middlesboro and other communities.

"These projects were not approved by the Corps in their last report," Cooper said, "but I believe that many of them can now be approved on the basis of the damage incurred during the recent floods."

Cooper said that another request he made in his resolution and letter to the President was that funds be made available for dredging. "The Corps informed me," he said, "that it has funds available for dredging if its studies show that such dredging would be of value."

"When the Appropriations Committee considers its regular appropriations for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1963, I will press for funds," Cooper said, "to speed up construction of dams now under construction or ready for construction."

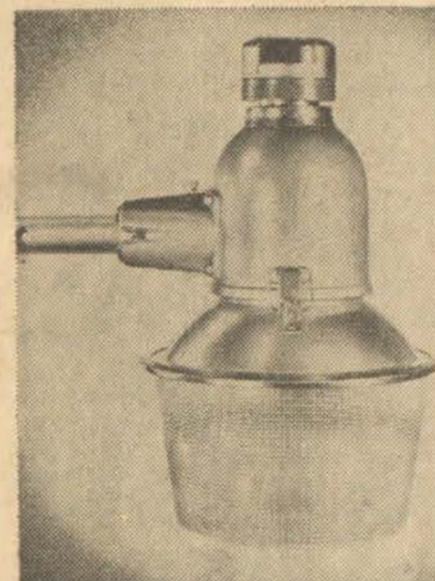

"Happy" Chandler, who has been openly campaigning for the office for some time, now.

The answer is simple. Labor could not support Ned Breathitt! Ned Breathitt is an intelligent, personable young man, but his LABOR RECORD does not entitle him to labor's support.

It has been our experience that we should judge a candidate ON WHAT HE HAS DONE WHEN WE NEEDED HIM! RATHER THAN ON WHAT HE SAYS WHEN HE NEEDS US!!

On Tuesday, April 24, the Kentucky Labor News will celebrate its 20th anniversary of being "Kentucky Labor's Official Voice."

We care little for election eve courtships. We have a long memory, and we assume that a man will perform in the future as he has in the past!

Ned Breathitt served in the Legislature for three terms. In 1952: The only "hot" labor bill was an intra-state "Wagner Act" to allow the Industrial Relations Department to hold elections to determine the bargaining agency for employees not covered by federal law. This followed the long strike at the Brown and Kentucky Hotels for union recognition. If such a law had passed, intra-state recognition of strikes of this kind would not be necessary. House Bill 340 was before Ned Breathitt. HE VOTED AGAINST LABOR, against the bill.

1956 session on Senate Bill 219, the Teachers Tenure Bill, and H. B. 191, amending the unemployment compensation act so that workers could draw benefits if not actually engaged in the strike that caused their unemployment. Breathitt voted WRONG on House Bill 279, changing the unemployment compensation act so as to disqualify a large number of unemployed.

In 1958: House Bill 125. A 50c minimum wage bill. Breathitt voted RIGHT. House Bill 176. "Right-to-Work" law. Breathitt voted RIGHT on an attempt to take this bill from committee. House Bill 215. This bill would subject all workmen's compensation claims to the Court of Appeals, causing delay in processing of cases. BREATHITT VOTED WRONG ON THIS IMPORTANT BILL. THE BILL PASSED, BUT WAS VETOED BY GOVERNOR CHANDLER AT THE REQUEST OF THE KENTUCKY STATE FEDERATION OF LABOR.

HOUSE BILL 369. This bill increased unemployment benefits from \$23 to \$32 a week. It was bitterly fought by labor's enemies. There were FOUR VOTES TAKEN IN THE REGULAR SESSION OF 1958 ON THIS BILL. ON EACH OF THE FOUR VOTES TO PROVIDE A FOUR DOLLAR INCREASE FOR UNEMPLOYED FAMILIES, NED BREATHITT VOTED AGAINST LABOR!

LATER IN THE SAME YEAR, A SPECIAL SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE WAS HELD AT THE REQUEST OF THE KENTUCKY STATE FEDERATION OF LABOR, GOVERNOR CHANDLER PLACED A BILL BEFORE THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO HELP THE UNEMPLOYED. IN THE SPECIAL SESSION, THIS BILL—NOW KNOWN AS SENATE BILL 7—WAS BEFORE NED BREATHITT FOR HIS VOTE. FOR THE FIFTH TIME IN NINETY DAYS, NED BREATHITT VOTED AGAINST THE BILL TO RAISE UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS TO \$32 A WEEK!!!

Our twentieth
Breathitt voted right on House Bill 51, amending the Common Carrier Act to allow truck drivers the right to refuse to cross picket lines. Breathitt voted "right" on our bill, H.B. 41, to make Election Day a state holiday. And, he voted right on H. B. 370 to increase workmen's compensation benefits. Breathitt also voted right in the

House Bill 278. This bill would have allowed private industry to condemn property by court action to build conveyor lines. Bitterly opposed by railroad unions. BREATHITT VOTED FOR THE BILL, AGAINST LABOR AND THE BILL PASSED. THIS BILL WAS THEN VETOCED BY GOVERNOR CHANDLER AT THE REQUEST OF THE RAILROAD UNIONS AND THE KENTUCKY STATE FEDERATION OF LABOR.

LOWELL HUGHES COMMENTS ON ATTEMPTED SMEAR

Lowell T. Hughes made the following comments in regard to a handbill and to a political advertisement appearing in the May 2, 1963, edition of The Floyd County Times:

"I have worked for the Department of Revenue and I am very proud of having done so. I have earned, through hard work, all of the money which I have received from the State. I preferred to work my way through college and that is exactly what I have done. I am sorry that some people think I wasn't entitled to do so and that my doing so should be held against me.

"I think it is obvious to everyone that this is just the typical Chandler routine. Mr. Chandler and the people of his philosophy that support him do have a claim to fame, they are noted for their reputation of deceit and half-truths. I do not intend to attack any of these people personally, but you know who they are. I think my comments in regard to the handbill will serve to justify and bolster these reputations.

"I would prefer that my comments not be taken as a rebuttal or denial of the handbill. I regret even having to give the handbill and advertisement the benefit of comment. However, as is so often the case when you are dealing with the kind of people who surround Mr. Chandler, it is necessary to point out facts which they have conveniently ignored.

"The handbill and advertisement contain a complete, outright lie. They say that I was in school during the whole period referred to and that the records will show just that. In fact, and it would be no problem whatsoever to establish, during twelve full months which they make reference to I was not even in school.

"They talk about my being a full-time law student but conveniently neglect to point out that this only means that I spent twelve hours during the work-week attending classes. They deliberately failed to mention that I worked an adjusted work schedule so that I could make up the twelve hours a week. They conveniently failed to mention that it took me three years to graduate because of my work instead of two and one-half years. They conveniently failed to mention that I also worked my way through four years of undergraduate school. They conveniently failed to mention the other thousands of students who have worked their way through college.

"All of these deliberate omissions are typical of the type of persons who have associated themselves with the handbill and advertisement. Another thing which they neglected to do was to actually challenge the fact that I did the work. There is an explanation for their failure to do this. The type of work that I was doing required that I contact people personally and to prepare reports in regard to these conferences. In addition, in most instances I obtained the persons' signature on the reports. There are copies of all of this work on file in both the Lexington office and the Frankfort office. Once again, there is no problem in establishing this fact. I think this explains why they did not actually challenge the work.

"I wonder why the handbill wasn't even signed. Of course, the advertisement had to be signed before it could appear in the newspaper. If these people are sincere in their efforts, what is this man's name doing on the advertisement? Why didn't someone who is a somebody in the Chandler organization sign the advertisement? Could it be that they were so ashamed of the ridiculousness of it that they refused to take the credit for it?

"I think enough of the facts which were ignored have now been pointed out and no further comment is justified. The assertions are so ridiculous that it makes you wonder what their purpose was. My guess is that their purpose was to draw attention away from the things which we have been reading in the newspapers; the things which evidently are true because when they are asked to comment about them they refuse to do so.

"I would like to point out that one of my real regrets is that I haven't had more time to devote to the gubernatorial campaign. The issues of a campaign have never before been so clearly defined for the people of our section of the state. We heard Mr. Chandler's promises when he was making the 1955 race, and we saw what he did for our section after he was elected—NOTHING. Contrast that record with the Mountain Parkway, the new lodge at the lake, the new junior college, the new schools in the county and the overall advancement of our educational system. When the contrast is made it is obvious that the right-thinking people of our section of the state must support the energetic and youthful Mr. Edward T. Breathitt."

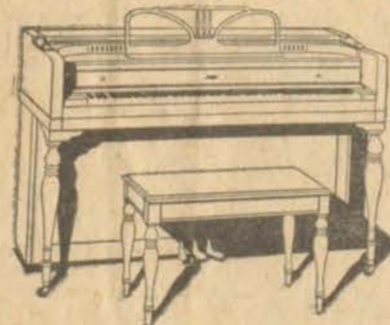

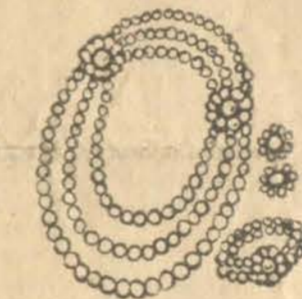

Mr. Robinette, who is a representative of the Federal Wages and Hours Division, won the Peterson Classic and \$25,000 grand prize in 1959 and \$8,000 two years ago on the first televised PBA tour, but none of these events was ever watched more closely or ever drew wilder applause than his performance here last Wednesday night. He is a member of the AMF Staff of Champions.

Robinette had 11 strikes in a row, then on the 12th a stubborn four-pin threatened to stand but finally eased over to make the perfect game. He was bowling with Bill Goebel, Jr., of Prestonsburg, at the time. Goebel won the first game with a 229 to 199 for Robinette. Then came Robinette's 300 second game.

Two nights earlier, Goebel bowled a 713 series in Progressive League play at Lake Lanes. Robinette was presented a \$250 check for this perfect, and Goebel, the same night, was awarded the 700 Series trophy. As proof that the 713 series was no fluke, Goebel last Friday night in Industrial League competition bowled a 267 game. He was named Bowler of the Week at Lake Lanes.

tinued their assistance right on through the six weeks following the disaster, reported Dale E. Roe, area director for the American Red Cross. The Rescue Squad building was made available for a clothing warehouse so that flood victims could obtain contributed clothing, he said.

Another of the nine organizations was the First Methodist Church here which made possible enough space so that volunteers could assist more than 1,100 families with their recovery plans.

"Also on the list of organizations to whom we should like to express appreciation," said Roe, "are the two Floyd county radio stations, WDOC and WPRT, and the Floyd County Times. Very much needed in disaster relief operations is information such as how to apply, where to apply, and Red Cross principles and practices. It is vital that people know that they will be assisted, that the principle is to help people help themselves and that all Red Cross help is a gift, not a loan. Your newspaper helped a great deal, both for the Red Cross and for the disaster victims."

In extending appreciation to these organizations and to the 82 individuals, Mrs. Heinze, Roe, and Disaster Chairman Harold Dicks, jointly, said that such help made possible effective, quick, and humane service to these families which were hit by the March 12 flood.

Each of the 82 individuals will receive a recognition certificate. If someone should receive one of these recognition certificates and has not, it would be appreciated if the name could be given to Miss Ella Noel White, executive for the Floyd County Chapter, American Red Cross.

"It was a great pleasure to work in Floyd county, and greatly pleasing to see such a spirit of cooperation on the part of all organizations, government officials, and the people themselves," Roe said.

Disaster sufferers who were loaned cots, blankets and mattresses following the flood are requested to return them as soon as possible. Disaster Chairman Dicks said.

This equipment is government property, and it is needed in other disaster areas, he pointed out. Collection points are:

In Prestonsburg, at the Rescue Squad building; in Martin, at the fire department; in McDowell, at the high school; in Garrett at Griffith's Furniture Store.

Betsy Layne and Allen were called to the scene, and they are credited with preventing destruction of the entire installation. The owner said approximately one-third of the plant was burned and that his loss will range from \$20,000 to \$25,000. The fire was brought under control at about 3:30 a.m., and the firemen saved the coal conveyor system, a coal crusher unit, motors and other equipment.

Mr. Hale said he could not at this time make a statement as to the origin of the blaze. He said he will rebuild the plant.

Two juveniles, one from Baltimore, the other from Lenore, West Virginia, are in jail here after having broken into several places in this and Pike counties. Baltimore authorities are seeking the return of one of the boys to answer to charges there, but County Judge Henry Stumbo said he had not, in view of the number of offenses in which the youth is implicated locally, decided to relinquish the prisoner.

State Detective Potter said the youths first broke into the concession stand of a drive-in theatre, near Pikeville, and that they later admitted taking \$18.85 in cash there. Working downriver, they next burglarized Jones' Store at Banner, taking clothing. At Allen they broke into the Williamson Glass Company, operated by R. C. Dyer, and stole some tools. These, Detective Potter said, were apparently used to force entrance to the nearby Hall Concrete Block Products Co., from which cash was taken. Their last reported break was at the home on the Auxier road of Russell Dixon, where they stole a shotgun.

The youths told Potter where they had hidden tools taken from Dyer and the shotgun taken at the Dixon home. These were recovered.

Civil Service Exams Slated In July; Six Test Centers Announced

A Civil Service examination for young men interested in entering one of the Service Academies will be given on Monday, July 8, 1963. Presiding officers will be the Rev. Samuel Vander Meer and Mr. William R. Miller, president and vice-president, respectively, of the Kentucky Regional Group. James Gayheart, student at Alice Lloyd College, will preside over the youth section.

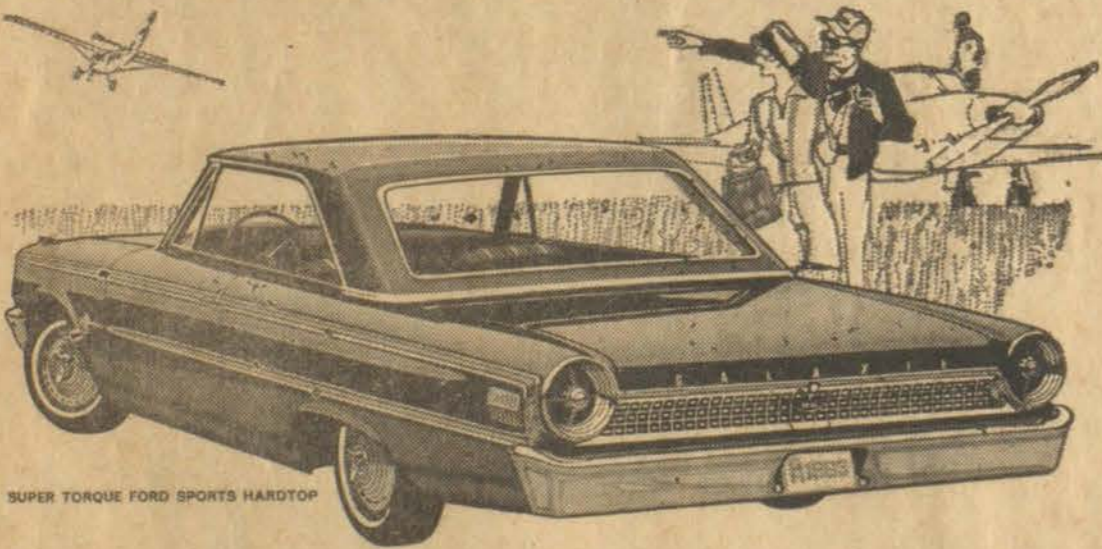

BONUS-AMENDMENT TEXT

SENATE BILL NO. 296, 1958 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 1. The Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky is hereby proposed to be amended by the ratification of a new section to read as follows:

The General Assembly shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of bonds of the Commonwealth, notwithstanding the limitation of indebtedness in Section 49 or any other section of the Constitution of Kentucky, which shall be in addition to all other bonds of the Commonwealth heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated SOLELY for the purpose of paying a cash bonus not to exceed \$500 for service outside the continental limits of the United States, and \$300 for service in the continental United States to the veterans, their widows or heirs, or next of kin, of the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict, who were residents of the Commonwealth at the time of their ENTRY into the service and at least six months prior thereto. The General Assembly at the same session authorizing the issuance of the bonds shall levy a tax upon all retail sales at such a rate as will pay the interest upon and retire the bonds in not less than 30 years, PROVIDED that retail sales of FOOD and FOOD PRODUCTS, MEDICINES and CLOTHING may be EXEMPTED from such tax.

NOTICE

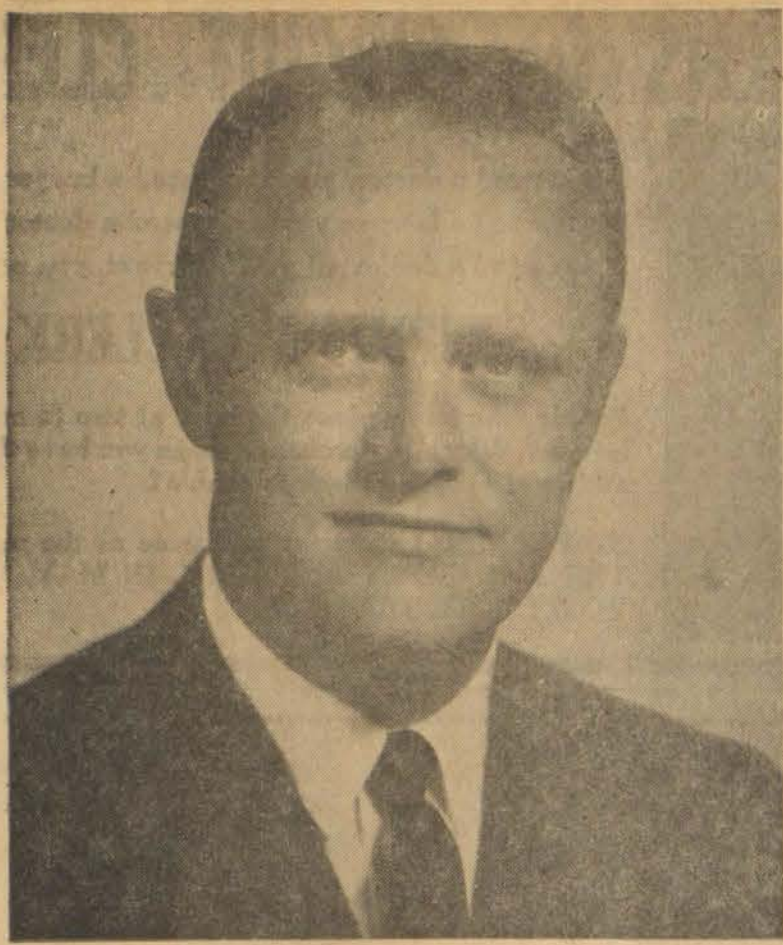

Highway Improvements In Floyd County By the COMBS Administration

Vote for Breathitt--- Continue To Build Roads!

In its first three calendar years through December 31, 1962, the Combs Administration spent a total of \$8,301,301.72 in Floyd County to build and maintain roads.

Floyd County's allocation for rural secondary roads and rural highways for the 1962-63 fiscal year is \$284,630.60. Distribution of rural secondary road funds (2/7 of the 7-cent gasoline tax) is now determined by the Rural Secondary Formula, which was adopted by the Combs Administration in 1961 and then enacted into law by the 1962 General Assembly. This impartial formula guarantees every county a fair share of such funds. Floyd County's 1962-63 allotment under this formula is \$219,775.56. In addition, the State will spend \$64,855.04 this year in Floyd County under the rural highways program.

Under the past administration, only \$131,967.43 was spent in Floyd County for rural secondary roads and rural highways in fiscal year 1957-58. The record shown below was copied from Highway Department files. The "real" truth is far different to what was printed last week by the Chandler forces regarding Floyd County highway construction under Combs.

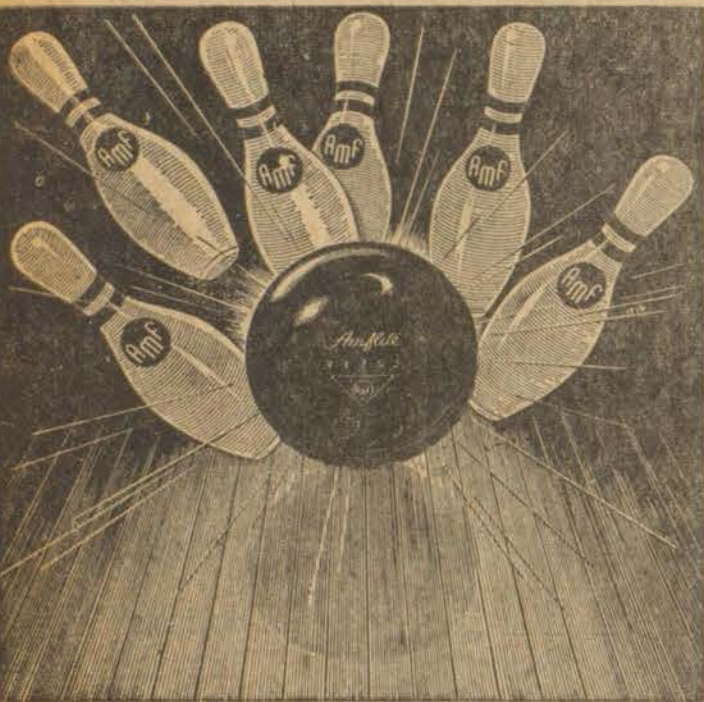

Adolf extolled his "heroes of spring" from Palestine, Texas, to Greenfield Hill, Connecticut, where dogwoods were first planted ornamentally as early as 1795.

The happiest year for Muller was in 1941 when the Men's Garden Club of America gave him their annual Johnny Appleseed award.

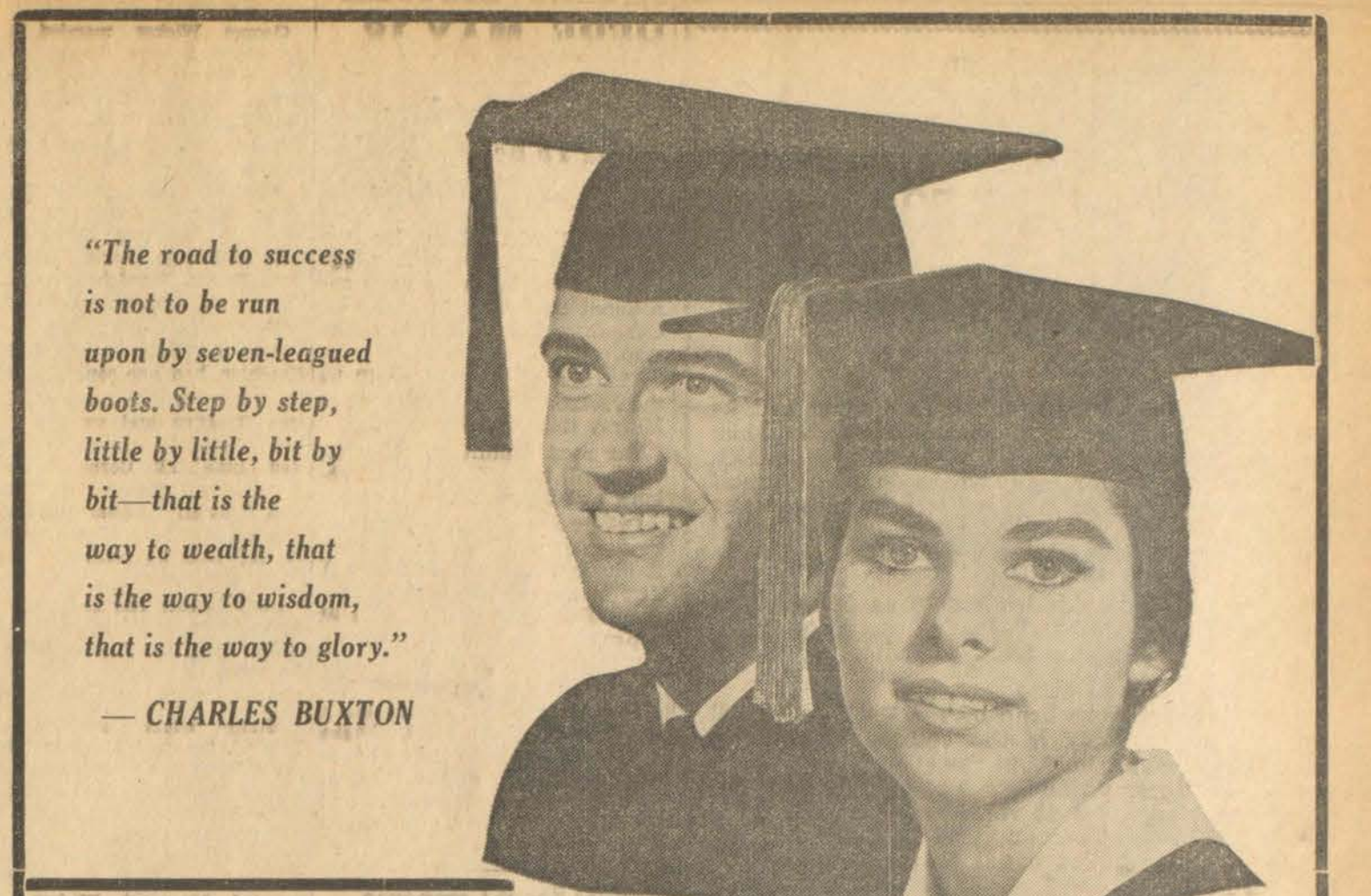
