QUESTIONS

If the federal government can say, and mean it, that a given community must construct a sewer system and a sewage disposal plant at great cost to the people for the purpose of halting pollution of a stream, why cannot the same government direct with like authority a coal company in Virginia to take whatever measures are necessary to halt its pollution of a stream which is polluted not only in that state but also when it enters neighboring Kentucky?

Virginia is a member of the Ohio Valley Compact. But Richmond, Virginia is not only far away in miles but also far distant in its thinking on stream pollution when the mountainous areas of Western Virginia and Eastern Kentucky are affected. This Ohio Valley Compact, as we understand its origins and purposes, is dedicated to the protection of the entire Ohio River watershed. Then why does it continue with a see-no-evil, knownothing, do-nothing policy?

Since we are asking questions, we add this one: Why doesn't the Ohio River Compact take federal action against the state of Virginia and thus force that state to take steps to control its industries in their work of mass pollution?

An investigation made only recently by the Kentucky Water Pollution Commission shows that at least 90 percent of the pollution of the Big Sandy river and its tributaries by coal-mine wastes is coming out of Virginia. And Kentucky is powerless. It cannot enforce anti-pollution laws in Virginia. It has no streams running into Virginia, and so is powerless even to retaliate, if retaliation would

The federal government needs to do some serious thinking as millions are about to be spent toward what is hoped to be the reconstruction and rehabilitation of Appalachia, of which this area is a part. This includes human as well as natural resources, with planning centering on the construction of highways; the development of the region as a giant center for tourism, emphasizing the natural beauty of this corner of the United States; work toward curbing stream pollution and healing the scars left by augers and shovels used in coal mining; the retraining of the thousands left jobless because of automation, and the improvement of educational facilities for many other thousands on whom the progress and economy of the region will heavily depend in the years ahead.

But are these new roads to be built only to export raw materials in continuance of a generations-old violation of Appalachia's needs and rights? And are millions to be spent beautifying here in one spot while ugliness is created there

Money will not cure Appalachia's ills, but it will help. A concerted effort on the part of government, state and federal, and the people will make effective and of real value the money to be

The problems must be attacked, intelligently and systematically, and all down the line, not merely in isolated pockets or in individual in-





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

Med Scholarship Fund Designed To Encourage Location of Physicians

The Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund just announced a new program designed to encourage more young physicians to locate in ten Kentucky counties where there is a critical need for physicians, according to C. C. Howard, M.D., Glasgow, chairman of the Fund's executive

The new program has two parts, Dr. Howard said in making the announcement in Louisville today, following a meeting of the Fund's Executive Committee. One of the programs is designed to assist interns getting out of training in June; the other is set up to aid students entering the medical schools of the

Here is how the two plans

The Fund will agree to contract with a young physician starting practice who will go into one of the ten critical counties and offer him four \$500 loans, which would be payable in one, two, three and four years. The \$2000 would help the young physician become established. For each year that the doctor stayed in the county, one of the \$500 loans would be cancelled. This will apply also to present Scholarship Fund recipients.

The second part of the plan offers the prospective medical student a loan of \$2000 a year for each of the four years, provided the student will contract to locate in one of the critical counties, Doctor Howard reported. After the student goes into practice, for each year he stays in the critical county one year's loan

will be cancelled. "The Executive committee of the Fund is deeply grateful to the Legislature and the Administration for the substantial support it gives the Fund each biennium," Doctor Howard said. "We hope to use these funds in the most efficient manner possible for the

benefit of the people." The Fund's chairman pointed out that the board of trustees of the Fund, with the help of the records of the Kentucky Medical Association and the State Department of Health, determines each year what the ten most critical counties are. If the needs of a county on the list are met, it will be dropped from the list and another county will be added.





And took another second in braking: from 65 to 0 mph in 172.0 feet. The cumulative result: we won all the marbles in Class IV.)
