### Area First Designated In Nation

EDA Official Says All Area Projects Now in Washington

The five-county area served by the Big Sandy Development District received encouraging news Tuesday, and so did the Prestonsburg area.

Thomas Francis, Washington, D. C., director of the Office of Development Districts, Economic Development Administration (EDA), told representatives of the five counties at a May Lodge luncheon meeting that the Big Sandy district is the first of its kind in the nation to be officially designated as such by EDA and that this prime status entitles the district to a 10 percent bonus of funds for future

### The Only College We'll Ever Have

The groundbreaking ceremony conducted at Prestonsburg Community College last Friday afternoon did not attract the attention it deserved. True, the program was merely symbolic of a work already begun, but the importance of this work needs recognition on the part of Floyd county and

The groundbreaking represented the development of a college campus which is almost certain to be the only one Floyd county will ever have. It symbolized progress toward a student body that could within a few years reach 1,000 or more. One day, as Kentucky's population soars and the demand for higher education grows, it could be a full-fledged four-year college.

This is not a flight into fantasy to speak of a major educational institution, if the people of this area ever make up their minds that they have in this college something that holds for this part of the state and for the young people of the area something worth their interest and service.

Dr. A. D. Kirwan, acting president of the parent institution, the University of Kentucky, was not engaging in idle talk when he spoke of the programs of education and service that are envisioned for Prestonsburg and other colleges of the community

These two buildings that are due for completion on the campus here next year involve the expenditure of more than a million dollars. The investment in money here has been no insignificant figure.

We who have both present and future at stake here need to make an investment in Prestonsburg Community College that is not measured in mere terms of money.

HIGHWAYS — The state has 113 miles eligible for improvement under the program. Od mis, 57 miles has been completed - mostly on KY 15, beween Jackson and Hazard. Another 53 miles are under construction, mainly on KY 15 and KY 23, and will be done next

Right-of-way acquisition and design is going on for another 254 miles and 49 more miles area in the planning stage.

### The purchase can be made Financing of Building For Hazard Arranged

The Kentucky Commission on more influence upon the grow-RIGHT Higher Education last Thursday ing family. The mother's heart took action which in effect comletes the financing arrangements for construction of the University of Kentucky's Hazard Community College.

The Commission, meeting in Frankfort, approved UK's application for a facilities grant of \$552,735. Actually, this is a recommendation that a grant of hat amount be approved by the S. Office of Education in

Robert F. Kerley, UK's vicepresident for business affairs, mphasized that federal approval still is required before grant becomes official.

The Commission also amended plan by which federal educaonal facilities funds are allocated. The amendment brings the state plan into conformance with a recently amended federal law that increases the amount that can be granted for community college construction to 50 percent of eligible cost. The previous limit on such grants was 40 percent.

This action, said Kerley, means that the University may now file a supplemental application to the Commission on Higher Education for an additional grant of \$138,184. This would bring UK's total grant application for constructing the Hazard college to \$690,919, or 50 percent of that portion of the building's cost which is eligible for federal assistance.

The U. S. Office of Education lready has approved UK's loan request for an additional \$426,-000 to be applied to the cost of the Hazard project. The total amount thus expected in federal funds, including loan and grants. is \$1,116,919. Kerley said the balance of the project's estimated \$1,528.184 cost will come from University revenue bonds.

And, be it said to their credit, each one had sacrificed a promising caabolition, when it was not only unpopular to stand out for this reform but was positively dangerous - even in Massachusetts. Holmes, realizing how much human suffering there is because of lack of sanitation, was a piofield. I have been told by sevhis essay on what used to be called "childbed fever," really blood poisoning from lack of


Naturally since my own years have been many, I have loved these two fine men. Holmes, though a small man, retained his youth. A great walker, al most a fanatic about rowboats, always popular in social circles, he somehow outlasted all his compeers. Whittier, who spent more than 60 of his 85 years as a semi-invalid and who had to watch almost every day of his "e to see that he did not overwork his frail body, kept vigor of mind and did not allow an ailing body to bring ailing thoughts. For years on end he had to limit his reading to less than an hour at a time, and writing, by which he made his living, brought headaches that the medical science of the time did not know how to treat. Some of his friends called Whittier the Hermit of Amesbury, and, as compared with the socially active Holmes, he seemed just that.
